To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Bluehill:

I herewith submit to you my annual report as superintendent of schools of Bluehill.

At the last session of the legislature, a very important measure was enacted, taking effect July 1, 1924, relative to the certification of teachers. It is now no longer possible for a teacher just entering the profession to secure a renewal of her certificate unless she shall present evidence of having attended an approved normal school, either resident or summer session. A permanent certificate will be granted (after July 1, 1924) only to those teachers who have completed one year at normal school or twenty-four weeks of study

in an approved summer school, which shall be considered the full equivalent of one year of resident study, coupled with five years of successful teaching experience. Those having experience prior to July 1, 1924, may be granted permanent certificates upon presenting evidence of professional study equivalent to not less than twelve weeks in approved summer schools, or one semester of resident study, coupled with five years of successful teaching experience.

In lieu of a written examination, a candidate may receive a certificate for two years upon the satisfactory completion of a summer school course of six weeks in an approved normal school. This certificate may be renewed upon its expiration, provided she has in the meantime attended a second summer term of six weeks; but it will not be made permanent, as I have explained above, unless she shall have attended normal school for twenty-four weeks.

The law is not retroactive, but the State department has ruled that if evidence is presented that a teacher, by means of holding a permanent certificate, is apparently taking advantage of her immunity and refusing, in consequence, to attend normal school or in other ways to improve herself professionally, her certificate may be revoked, and she be compelled to make application for a new one in the same manner and through the same process as would any other teacher seeking a certificate for life.

School Year and Teachers.

All the schools in town have had the usual thirty-four weeks, which is the average for the State. Beginning with this fiscal year, it is hoped we can add a week or two to our school year, which is the goal for which we have been striving.

During the past fiscal year we have employed in our schools four normal graduates, two who have attend-

command for one year, and two who have attended summer sessions. This has given us eight teachers who have had special training. Several of the others have taken the teacher-training course in the academy. All the rest have been, for the most part, teachers of successful experience.

Quite a number of teachers plan to attend normal school this summer, and one or two intend to take the special one-year course at Castine. I am advising all teachers of five years or more experience to take this special course before the privilege is withdrawn. If they wish to return to Bluehill to teach after graduating, their positions will be awaiting them, and an increase in salary.

Transportation.

Several small schools have been closed for a term or two this year, as their attendance did not warrant their continuance. Some of these outlying schools fluctuate greatly in their enrollment—one term there might be only five pupils, the next term twelve or fifteen. Grindleville, with only two pupils, was not opened in the fall, nor Morgan's Bay, with but five, in the winter. Transportation is, of course, furnished the children in these two schools.

At the time of the opening of the schools in September, I found there were but three children in the Hinck-ley district who would attend that school. Several others preferred to come to the village grammar school. I encourage this all I can, for I believe a year at least in this school is a splendid thing for any child, for it stands to reason that in a larger class, with more competition, a pupil derives vastly more from his attendance than he does in a school of four or five pupils, other things being equal.

The transportation problem is a difficult one at best.

In some districts, several arrangements are possible, and it then resolves itself into a question as to which one will best serve the largest number, keeping always in mind the expense.

Conveyance has been furnished in the Hinckley district for the last three weeks of the winter term, during the time of the worst storms and travelling. This arrangement apparently satisfied those parents who had children to be transported. If a family lives one and one-half miles from a schoolhouse, they cannot reasonably expect conveyance for their children, nor a school to be opened primarily for their special benefit. This is a ruling by the commissioner of education.

Teachers' Institute.

The first in a series of three teachers' institutes to be held in this district this year took place at Bluehill Friday, Nov. 14. The purpose of these institutes is to bring something that is tangible and of practical value to the teachers. They are not pretentious, differing in this respect from a large convention, which is apt to be more of an inspirational nature.

The program consisted of teaching exercises, demonstrations of reading and writing by specialists from Boston and New York, addresses by members of the faculty of the Eastern State normal school at Castine, an address by Dr. Otis Littlefield on local history, and, in the evening, a lecture by Dr. Dunnack, State librarian, on the subject, "A Romance of Teaching and Book Makers."

Dental Clinic.

There is probably no one cause to which is attributable more of our common ailments than poor teeth. Realizing, as we do, that no system of education can be said to be efficient so long as it neglects the health of the children, we have secured the very best dental chart, showing both the permanent and the deciduous sets of teeth, and through the co-operation of Dr. Barrett, who has given his services, arranged for the examination of the teeth of all the children in town. I understand that 50 per cent. of the local Red Cross funds may be used for the purpose of defraying the expenses of a clinic held to perform the work developing in the examination.

Modern Health Crusade.

This movement, organized in all the schools last year, has been continued, with more interest than ever manifested in it by both teachers and pupils. So faithfully and so well have the pupils of the grammar school performed their daily chores, that they enjoy the distinction of being one of only two schools in Hancock county to receive a national pennant.

Track Meet.

The fourth annual track meet was held at Mountain Park, June 2. For the first time in the history of the meets, the academy failed to win it, both the team cup and the individual cup going to Brooklin high school. The Bluehill boys made a very creditable showing, however, and as most of the points were made by underclassmen, it augurs well for the success of the academy in the meet next June.

B. G. S. A. secured 54 points, as follows: York, 16; Wessel, 9; Grindle, 6; Conary, 5; Richards, 5; Owen, 5; Gray, 2; Earls, 1; Tucker, 1; relay team, 4.

In the evening, an entertainment was given by the "Jolly Jester," health ventriloquist, of New York city, after which the medals and cups were awarded the successful contestants by Mr. Harry Hinckley. He complimented them very highly on their athletic prowess,

and spoke in glowing terms of the good sportsmanship which characterized the meet. This latter feature, he said, was the one which should always predominate in every athletic contest.

The largest audience ever in the town hall, estimated at 500 people, attended the rally and presentation of medals, showing that these affairs are growing in popularity.

School Exhibition.

The annual school exhibition was held on Thursday, May 29. As usual, the program in the afternoon was furnished by the outlying schools, and was exceptionally good, with a larger attendance than usual, every seat in the hall being taken.

Every inch of space on the walls was covered by the exhibits of the different schools in town, which presented a very pleasing appearance with their variegated array of drawings, maps, Junior Red Cross work, posters, etc.

In the evening, the pupils of the grammar school presented an operetta, "The Bells of Fol De Rol." This was staged with special scenery and costumes, and was, perhaps, the most ambitious project of its nature ever attempted here, especially when is taken into consideration the limited number from which to choose a cast. This production required of every character that he or she be able to sing a solo, which certainly speaks volumes for the talent to be found in the seventh and eighth grades.

Supervised Noon Hour and Hot Lunch.

In practically every school in town, the teacher now remains in the building during the noon hour, and serves at least one hot dish to those children who are obliged to bring their dinner. I am convinced that this has been the means of improving both the mental and physical condition of the children in those rooms where at least 50 per cent. of them cannot go home at noon to a hot meal.

Societies, as well as interested parents and friends, recognizing the importance of this work and desirous of rendering assistance in the matter, have generously given of their money and services to promote this worth-while cause. We are indeed grateful to the Village Improvement Society for the extra wiring and grill furnished the primary and intermediate rooms, to Mrs. Fannie Parker for the loan of a grill, to the W. C. T. U. of East Bluehill for a grill; also to Mrs. Beulah Greene, Mrs. Mabel Long, and others, who have furnished ingredients for the hot lunch at their own expense. These favors and courtesies we sincerely appreciate.

South Bluehill Schoolhouse Remodeled.

For many years, South Bluehill has been one of the largest schools in town, with an enrollment of from thirty to thirty-five pupils. This is more than one teacher should handle when she has only two or three grades, but it is simply impossible for her to do justice to the work when she must teach all eight grades.

East Bluehill has had two schools for a number of years, when very frequently their total enrollment would not exceed that of South Bluehill, which had but one school. It stands to reason that two teachers, with seventeen or eighteen pupils and four grades, can accomplish vastly more work than one teacher with thirty-five pupils and eight grades.

So, to give the children at South Bluehill the same opportunities and advantages that are enjoyed in other parts of the town, we are inserting an article in the warrant recommending that the sum of \$1,500 be ap-

propriated for the purpose of remodeling the building, so as to provide another room. This will then enable us to divide the school into primary and grammar rooms, employing two teachers, one to teach the first four grades, and the other the last four.

It seems to me that the people of South Bluehill are very deserving of this improvement in their school, as they have patiently borne the old arrangement uncomplainingly taking it for granted that the school authorities recognized the need and would attend to it in due season.

Electric Lights.

Through the enterprise of the teachers and pupils and the co-operation of the parents, the building at East Bluehill has been wired for electricity. This seemed like a stupendous task for a small community to undertake, especially as poles had to be set from the main road, thereby adding materially to the expenses. It is a tribute to the perseverance of these good friends of the schools that not a cent of the cost of this much-needed improvement remains to be paid.

The primary and intermediate rooms in the village have also been wired, and from the proceeds of a picture, "Robin Hood," presented December 30 and 31, a very substantial payment has been made on the expense of the same. In this connection, I wish to thank the summer residents for the tickets which they purchased to aid us in our project.

Repairs.

Most of the money appropriated for repairs (both regular and improving sanitary conditions), has been expended at East Bluehill this year, where very extensive improvements have been made. It was at first intended simply to place a cement base under the fur-

nace, leaving the rest of the cellar as it was, but upon starting the work, the basement was found to be so wet and full of rocks that it was deemed best, and even a matter of economy in order to preserve the building, to extend the cement floor over the whole cellar. This, of course, cost a great deal more than we had estimated in our budget.

Among other repairs and improvements at the East Bluehill schools this year are the following: Rollway, bulkhead door, cesspool for chemical toilets, new furnace and new steps.

At the present time there are only three buildings belonging to the town where the sanitary conditions have not been improved—South Bluehill, Mines and Eastward. South Bluehill should be attended to first, and it will also be possible to take another school this year, perhaps the Mines, as the outbuildings there can easily be connected.

The sill of the Village schoolhouse is rotting, and needs attention this year.

The remodeling of the South Bluehill building and the improving of the sanitary conditions at this school I have outlined elsewhere in this report.

Bluehill-George Stevens Academy.

The following teachers have had charge of the work in the academy for the entire fiscal year: A. A. Garcelon, jr., principal, French and science; Mildred C. Hinckley, assistant, Latin and mathematics; Caroline Garcelon, assistant, English and history.

Mr. Garcelon is a graduate of the naval academy at Annapolis, and has taught very successfully in the famous Abbot school for boys at Farmington, and Dow academy at Franconia, N. H.

Mrs. Garcelon is a normal graduate, with special work at Bates college. Previous to entering upon her

duties here, she was engaged for several years in junior high school work in the city of Portland.

Mrs. Hinckley, U. of M., has served very efficiently as teacher of Latin and mathematics for the past four or five years.

It is a matter of more than passing notice that the graduates of Bluehill-George Stevens academy have made and are making a most remarkable record in their subjects in the respective colleges which they are attending. At present we have several students in Colby college of whose scholastic attainments we should be justly proud, for it reflects a great deal of credit on their preparatory school. There is never any question about the renewal of the certificate of the academy (for the usual period of three years) when the New England College Entrance Board convenes, for no graduate who has been certified into college has failed to stay there for lack of preparation.

There is a vast difference in graduating a student and in certifying him. The State department of education recommends that a student be graduated after remaining five years in high school, for it contends that a student who cannot ordinarily finish a secondary school course in four years, barring sickness, is incapable of ever doing the school any harm by attempting to attend higher institutions of learning. This student would be graduated but not certificated. If a college was willing to waive the extra percentage, or points which he lacked, and to take him on trial for the first semester, it would not then reflect on the school if the student failed in his work.

For a detailed account of the work in the academy, I refer you to the principal's report which follows:

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT.

To the Superintendent of Schools and the Trustees of the Bluehill-George Stevens Academy:

Gentlemen:—In submitting to you this annual report from your academy, I wish to express my appreciation of your support and co-operation in all my endeavors, as principal, in holding to the traditions of the school, and in keeping it up to the standard requisite for a Class A institution.

Through you, I want to thank the citizens at large for their interest in the academy and its work, and for their attendance at the several affairs held by the student body.

To the parents I would like to have it made known that it has been gratifying to observe, in the work of the pupils, the results of the inspiration and encouragement which they have received in their home life.

The teachers cordially invite the parents to visit the school during sessions. They are at all times open to suggestions of a constructive nature, and stand ready to discuss with the parents any phase of their children's educational problems. The sending out of commendation and delinquent cards, a practice introduced last spring term, is intended to keep the parent informed as to the pupil's general status. More detailed information will be cheerfully furnished upon application.

The present enrollment is sixty-two—thirty girls and thirty-two boys. These are divided fairly equally into four classes, and distributed among the three courses offered by the curriculum.

The courses seem to be very well balanced, and include all the studies which could be properly cared for by three teachers, the number now employed. Were sufficient funds available, courses in book-keeping, do-

mestic science and agriculture could be introduced to great advantage to the community.

During the present semester, a departure has been made in the basal French text. The direct method was introduced into the sophomore-beginner's French class, with excellent results. Two new subjects have been recently taken up—community civics and problems of democracy. A desirable reaction to both of these has already been noted.

In athletics, the teams representing the school have brought credit upon themselves. Handicapped, as they are, without a gymnasium, and with the members of the teams living, some of them, at great distances from the school, the boys and girls both deserve nothing but commendation for their untiring efforts in this direction. In dry, pleasant weather, calisthenics have been conducted in the schoolyard, sometimes by the students themselves, and all have shown an active interest in this form of physical education.

Effort is being continually made along the line of moral education, with, in general, satisfactory results. With a better understanding of the work of the school, the parents are helping us instill in the minds of the pupils the fundamental that the rules of the school are made for the benefit of the pupil, and as such, must be respected by him.

The school building appears to be in very good repair, and the heating plant efficient. The janitor is conscientious in his duty, and keeps the building and grounds clean and orderly at all times.

A request has recently been made by a local organization for the use of the assembly room in which to hold one of its meetings. Personally, I was very much pleased at this request. I consider the schoolhouse in the light of a community center. In using it for community purposes, it is but extending those influences

for which the school exists. With the approval of the superintendent of schools, acting for the trustees, I shall always be glad to do my part in extending the hospitality of the academy, at all times, to our citizens for community entertainments or welfare work.

Recommendations.

In accordance with our usual custom, we have made a budget for the coming year, placing a conservative estimate on the cost of each item connected with the schools, and the estimated receipts. We recommend the following amounts to be expended under the different accounts for the ensuing year:

Common schools	\$5,800
Repairs	800
Repairs (improving sanitary	conditions) 400
Text-books and supplies	1,000

We are recommending more for common schools to provide for the extra expense of transportation, and another teacher for South Bluehill. The amounts for regular repairs and special repairs are just the same as last year.

We are recommending, under a special article in the warrant, the sum of \$1,500 be appropriated for the purpose of remodeling the building at South Bluehill. As I have explained elsewhere in this report, this is an absolute necessity in order to relieve the congestion in this school. I am sure all will agree that we endeavor to keep our recommendations down to a minimum, and to ask for no more money than we need.

This past year we estimated our appropriation for common schools to a cent, and had just enough to last us through the winter term.

In a group of eighteen towns of the same valuation and school census as Bluehill, we still rank fifteenth this year, so it proves we are modest in our recommendations. The valuation of a town is the primary basis on which to estimate appropriations for reasonable expenditures. The valuation of Bluehill, now considerably over a million dollars, places it in the class of wealthy towns.

General Remarks.

Plan books, teachers' reports (both grades and academy) and the State course of study, have been in use in the schools this year, as for the past several years.

This year we have added another card to those records of scholarship and physical condition which we had before, so that, if a child should be transferred from one school to another, he should take with him the following cards: 1, rank card; 2, pink card; 3, white transfer card; 4, transcript from permanent record book; 5, physical record card; 6, dental card. This ought to give a complete record, so that the new teacher will have no difficulty in classifying the pupil when he enters her school.

This year more schools than ever before in this district have organized school improvement leagues, and with the dues and other receipts have purchased grills, clocks, globes, volume library and other equipment. Children will appreciate more the things earned for their school by their own efforts, than if these same things were furnished by the town.

Several of the schools in town are enrolled in the Junior American Red Cross movement. It is comparatively easy to enroll, and an opportunity is presented

to perform a significant service for the school and the community.

At the institute in Bluehill, the county convention in Ellsworth and the State convention in Bangor, we had 100 per cent. attendance of our teachers. This is very commendable, showing that the teachers are progressive and are endeavoring to improve themselves professionally.

The grammar school has displayed the same resourcefulness this year which has characterized it for some time. If the students need any extra equipment, they usually buy it with their league money. This year they have purchased books, repaired the clock, bought a grill, paying for the extra wiring for the same, and contributed their usual amount to charities.

The statistics in this report, which I have tried to give as much in detail as possible, are based in part on the returns at the end of the school year. It would be quite impossible to use the complete returns for the fiscal year, as the schools are still in session when this report is filed.

I am duly sensible of the constant assistance in my work of the superintending school committee, the members of which are never too busy to help me with their advice and co-operation. I am also indebted to the town officials for the courtesies and favors they have extended, to the faithful teachers, and to all others who have aided me in my endeavor to make our school system more efficient.

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet in Town Hall, in said Bluehill, on Monday, March the second (2nd) A. D. 1925, at nine (9) o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1 To choose a moderator to preside at said town meeting.

- 2 To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3 To hear and act on the report of the town officers for the past year.
- 4 To choose selectmen, assessors and overseer of the poor. Auditor.
- 5 To choose a treasurer.
- 6 To choose a collector of taxes.
- 7 To see if the town will vote for one or more road commissioners.
- 8 To see if the town will fix the compensation of the selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor, collector of taxes, treasurer, auditor, road commissioners, labor and teams on highway.
- 9 To choose all other town officers.
- 10 To see what sum of money the town will raise to defray current expenses.
- 11 To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of its poor.
- 12 To see what sum of money the town will raise for repairs on schoolhouses.

- of remodeling and enlarging the schoolhouse at South Bluehill.
 - 14 To see what sum of money the town will raise for school supplies and text-books.
 - 15 To see what sum of money the town will raise for common schools.
 - 16 To see what sum of money the town will raise for free high school.
 - 17 To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State-aid road, as provided in section 19 of chapter 25 of the revised statutes.
 - 18 To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$600 for the improvement of the section of the State-aid road as outlined in the report of the State highway commissioner in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of section 18 of chapter 25 of the revised statutes of 1916.
 - 19 To see if the town will raise money and what sum for the maintenance of patrol State-aid highway during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town under the provisions of section 18 of chapter 25 of the revised statutes of 1916.
 - 20 To see if the town will vote to raise \$1,000 to shape and gravel the road beginning at Walter Wescott's on the Bucksport road at North Bluehill extending in a northerly direction until money is expended.
 - 21 To see if the town will vote to raise \$1000 to be expended on the highway leading from the top of the Nevins Hill, so-called, in a southerly direction until money is expended. To be built under third-class specifications.
 - To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to be expended on the (so called) Mines Road, beginning at top of Stover Hill, so called, going west.

- 23 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to straighten and repair road from W. K. Carter's corner to the bridge between A. J. Grindle's and the residence of L. E. Leach at East Bluehill.
- 24 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to repair road from A. O. U. W. holl to Dr. Milliken's farm house.
- 25 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to complete Morgan's Bay road from where A. K. Saunders finished work, to the Surry line.
- To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to be expended on the East Bluehill road (so called) beginning at or near the corner of the road leading to Ellsworth, opposite the residence of C. E. Green, and extending easterly to the hill near the residence of A. B. Leach.
- 27 To see what sum of money the town will raise to lower and widen Main street, beginning at Bunker's Corner (so called) and extending to Postoffice Square. This work to be commenced as soon as frost is out of ground.
- 28 To see what sum of money the town will raise for repairs of roads and bridges.
- 29 To see if the town will raise a sum of money to build cement walks, to be built not later than June 15th, if help is available.
- 30 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for improvement of road, beginning at Falls bridge at Mill Island, extending to corner near R. O. Chatto's residence.
- 31 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to repair or build Mill Island bridge, so called.
- 32 To see if the town will raise a sum of money for the following articles:
 Sidewalks.
 Street lights.

Snow breaking Memorial day. Fire company. Forest fires.

- 33 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for laying the dust in the village streets.
- 34 To see if the town will vote to raise \$120 to pay rent of Bluehill academy.
- 35 To see if the town will raise a sum of money for improvements in both cemeteries.
- 36 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to grade schoolhouse grounds at East Bluehill.
- 37 To see if the town will vote to raise \$150 for the purpose of buying a snowplow, to be used and run by trucks, providing that the town of Surry will raise a like amount for the same purpose.
- 38 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the purpose of buying a tractor road machine.
- To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to purchase one Ford truck for road work.
 - 40 To see if the town will vote to employ only Bluehill men and teams for road work.
 - 41 To see if the town will accept the land bought by the selectmen for cemetery as per vote of town at annual meeting, March third, 1924.
 - 42 To see if the town will vote to raise \$800 in payment of land purchased of C. E. Green.
 - 43 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell land purchased of C. E. Green, not available for cemetery purposes, if in their judgment they think best to sell.

- To see if the town will vote to raise \$200 for trimming and cutting the trees on the village streets, providing the Village Improvement society will give \$200 for the same purpose.
- To see if the town will locate and maintain one electric light at or near the entrance to Kneisel hall, on Pleasant street.
- To see if the town will vote to exempt the Memorial hospital from taxation for the year 1925.
- 47 To see if the town will vote to raise \$500 for surgical aid to Harry Patterson.
- To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to pay mothers' pensions.
- To see if the town will authorize the school committee to make a contract with the trustees of Bluehill-George Stevens academy for the tuition of secondary students.
- To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to make a temporary loan not exceeding \$4000, if necessary.
- 51 To see if the town will vote to accept a bequest of \$200 from the executors of the will of Etta Clancy, said bequest to be given on the condition that the George H. Stover lot in Seaside cemetery be given perpetual care.
- 52 To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for advertising our natural resources, advantages and other attractions under the provisions of chapter 4, section 59 of the revised statutes of Maine, the same to be expended by the Maine Development association.
- To see if the town will accept a sum of money from Miss Emma Grindle, the interest to be used for the perpetual care of the Milford Grindle lot in the Seaside cemetery.
- To see if the town will accept a sum of money from John E. Dority and Adelbert Hadley, the interest to be used for

the perpetual care of the Dority and Hadley lot in Seaside cemetery.

55 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
