TO THE CITIZENS OF THE TOWN OF DAMARISCOTTA:

The Committee chosen by you on June 12th, last, "to investigate the accounts and financial transactions of the town," with authority "to employ an expert accountant, should they deem it necessary," have attended to that duty and beg leave to submit the following report:—

On the above date the Committee met and organized, and it was the unanimous opinion that the services of an accountant were necessary. The chairman of the Committee was instructed to ascertain upon what terms such accountant could be obtained and to report to the full Committee. This was done, and upon this report the Committee voted to employ Mr. Wm. Franklin Hall of Boston, Mass.

On July 9th Mr. Hall began his examination, having been placed under oath "to impartially investigate the financial affairs of the town of Damariscotta, to make no alterations in the books, orders or papers,

and to make a true report" of his findings.

The work has been presecuted as rapidly as the previous engagements of the accountant would admit; and when we state that the examination covers a period of twenty-five years; that every order issued and paid during that time (so far as the orders could be found) has been checked both upon the selectmen's and the treasurer's records; that seventy-six thousand four hundred fifty-three dollars twelve and one-half cents in coupons have been sorted, counted and placed in convenient form for easy future reference; that the refunding operations of the town (both, the six per cent. Railroad bonds into four and one-half per cent. bonds, and the town debt proper into five per cent. bonds) have been carefully gone over; that every item on both sides of all statements of accounts with the town which we could secure has been examined and verified, so far as that could be done with the material in existence, we believe the citizens of the town will comprehend in some measure the magnitude of the task, and will appreciate it.

It may be said that much of this work was unnecessary, and so it appeared to the Committee, until in the process of the investigation errors began to crop out in most unexpected places. Then it was unanimously agreed that nothing short of an exhaustive examination would be of any value, or satisfactory to the town. Such a report we believe Mr. Hall has given us. In brief we may say that it shows:

In accordance with our arrangement I have undertaken to audit the accounts and the financial transactions of the town of Damariscotta for a period of twenty-five years, being 1864 to 1888 both of them inclusive, during which Mr. William K. Hilton has occupied the position of town treasurer.

In the prosecution of the work statements have been obtained from the State Treasurer; The Treasurer of the Knox & Lincoln Railroad Company; the Cashier of the First National Bank of Bath; the New Castle National Bank, David W. Chapman, Cashier; the First National Bank of Damariscotta, and considerable correspondence besides was carried on in the endeavor to get desired information. Those persons who appeared to be personally concerned in the management of the affairs of the town have been invited to come before me and aid in the unraveling of the many perplexing transactions which presented themselves.

I found that there was a large quantity of coupons in the office of the selectmen which were in a condition that made it almost impossible for anybody to get an account of them.

It was absolutely necessary that a correct account of these coupons should be obtained and I gave my attention among the first things which were undertaken to accomplish this.

Mr. James H. Hilton, chairman of the present board of Selectmen, brought the coupons to the room in the Maine Hotel where the work of investigation was carried on. He personally opened nearly if not all the packages containing coupons. He remained with the committee and myself during all the time that this part of the work was carried on. The coupons were sorted, affixed to sheets representing the bonds to which they belonged, and then, the sheets were computed and the amount of the coupons ascertained. This was a very arduous task and represents many days of the closest application on the part of several members of the committee, Mr. Hilton and myself.

I will now take up the different features contained in my report which as may readily be supposed are not a few considering the many years covered by the examination.

In the first place I will take up the history of the railroad bonds

then the following features in their order, viz:

- 1. The 41-2 per cent, bonds issued to refund the 6 per cent. railroad bonds.
 - 2. The 5 per cent bonds issued May 1, 1878.
- 3. Statement of coupons charged to the town, with a comparison of same with the cancelled coupons.
- 4. Comments on Auditor's report presented at town meeting in March, 1889.
 - 5. An account of D. W. Chapman or the New Castle National Bank.
 - 6. Collector's Notes.
 - 7. Abatement of Taxes.
- 8. Statement of items on the Treasurer's book charged to the town, not covered by town orders, 1864 to 1888 both inclusive.
 - 9. List of bonds paid.
- 10. A Statement of all the credits upon the Treasurer's book 1864 to 1888 both inclusive.
 - 11. Statement of irregularities in the Treasurer's account.
 - 12. Statement of the school fund for the State.
 - 13. Statement of the pension receipts and payments.
- 14. Statement of clerical errors on Treasurer's book 1864 to 1888 both inclusive.
- 15. Statement of amounts due to the town of Damariscotta from Wm. K. Hilton its late Treasurer.

History of the so called Railroad Bonds, whereby the Town loaned its Credit to the Knox & Lincoln Railroad Company to the extent of One hundred and thirteen thousand dollars.

At a special meeting held September 21, 1867, the following votewas passed, viz.:

VOTED: That in conformity with an act entitled, An act to amend former acts to incorporate the Penobscot and Lincoln and Kennebec Railroad Company, approved March 21, 1864 and amended February 6 and 28, 1867.

The Town of Damariscotta hereby loans its credit to the Knox and Lincoln Railroad Company for the sum of sixty thousand dollars provided the line of said railroad shall pass through said town or within one hundred rods of the line of said town, and the selectmen and town treasurer of said town of Damariscotta are hereby authorized and instructed to prepare and deliver over to the directors of the Knox and Lincoln Railroad Company town bonds with coupons attached to the amount of sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000,) in strict conformity with all the provisions of the vote and the acts of the Legislature above included.

That the town Treasurer be and is hereby directed to issue said Bonds upon the conditions aforesaid in convenient installments as the same may be required by the exigencies of the company in the proportion to the issue of bonds by the other towns and cities which may have loaned their credits to the said company pursuant to the provisions of the several acts.

That no loan of the town of Damariscotta to said company shall be made or issued until the entire road from Bath to Rockland shall have been surveyed and located and the estimated costs of building the same shall have been fully made and provided for by subscription for stock, and by the loans of towns and cities on the line of said road or otherwise, and the loan of Damariscotta shall be called for and paid only in proportion to the calls and payments on amounts loane I respectively by the cities and towns.

At a special meeting held September 30, 1870, the following vote was passed, viz.:

That the credit of the town of Damariscotta be and hereby is pledged for the sum of twenty-two thousand, four hundred dollars (\$22,400) to aid in the construction and equipment of the Knox and Lincoln Railroad, and that the Selectmen and Treasurer are hereby directed to deliver to the President and Directors of said railroad, as soon as practicable after this vote shall be legalized by an act of the Legislature of the State, bonds of the town payable to the bearer thereof in twenty years with coupons for interest at three per cent. (3 per cent.) semi-annually properly signed and recorded to the above amount, provided however and this vote is on condition that there shall be voted by the several cities and towns through or into which said railroad passes, including Damariscotta, credit and aid to said railroad as aforesaid, and bonds issued therefor of like date, to the amount of at least four hundred and seventy-five thousand dollars (\$475,000) and provided, further, that said railroad company shall execute and deliver to the cities and towns issuing said bonds a second mortgage of all its property and rights of property in said railroad, present and prospective, including its franchise condition to pay said bonds and coupons as they shall become due and hold said cities and towns harmless therefrom.

(The above vote was passed by only one vote in the negative.)

At a special meeting held June 28, 1871, the following votes were passed, viz.:

VOTED: That the credit of the town of Damariscotta be and hereby is pledged for the sum of thirty thousand, six hundred dollars (\$30,600) to aid in the construction and equipment of the Knox and Lincoln Railroad, and that the Selectmen and Treasurer are hereby directed to deliver to the President and Directors of said railroad as soon as practicable after this vote shall be legalized by an act of the Legislature of this State, bonds of the town, payable to the bearer thereof, in thirty years with coupons for interest at three per cent. (3 per railroad as aforesaid, and bonds issued therefor of like date to the cent.) semi-annually properly signed and recorded to the above amount. Provided however and this vote is on condition that there shall be voted by the several cities and towns through or into which said railroad passes, including Damariscota, crtedit and aid to said

amount of six hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$650,000) and provided further that said Railroad Company shall execute and deliver to the cities and towns issuing said bonds a third mortgage of all its property and right of property in said road present and prespective, including its franchise, conditional to pay said bonds and coupons as they shall become due, and save said cities an 1 towns harmless therefrom, and also provided, that any city or town aforesaid which may issue one year bonds in aid of the construction and equipment of said road shall be, and is, authorized to retain of the thirty year bonds an amount equal in value to the amount of such one year bonds which may be issued by such city or town until such on vear bonds are returned by said company to such city or town.

VOTED: That the credit of the town of Damariscotta be and hereby is pledged for the sum of thirteen thousand dollars (\$13,000) one year bonds.

First passenger train over the Knox and Lincoln Railroad arrived at New Castle from Bath July 17, 1871, at 4 o'clock and 10 minutes P. M. Signed, W. W. KEENE, Town Clerk.

In accordance with the foregoing votes, bonds were prepared and issued in aid of the Knox and Lincoln Railroad Company as follows, viz.:

All bearing interest at 6 per cent. payable semi-annually and no record whatever of these bonds was made by the town. This statement which I have just made was prepared from the cancelled bonds now in the possession of the town. In the warrant for the March meeting of 1873, an article was inserted as follows, viz.:

ART. 17. To see what action the town will take in regard to the payment of the interest on the bonds issued in aid of the Knox and Lincoln Railroad Company. At the meeting held March 17, 1873, in accordance with the warrant referred to, the record states:

ART. 17. Passed by no action.

A warrant was issued for a special meeting to be held on the 17th May, 1873, in which the only matter mentioned is a copy, word for word, of the article No. 17 which was passed by at the March meeting without action. On the day set for the meeting there being but five persons present it was voted to adjourn to the 24th, May.

At the meeting held May 24, 1873. The following vote was passed, viz.:

That the Selectmen and Treasurer of the town be authorized VOTED: to issue town bonds or town orders in whole or in part as they may be needed to an amount in the aggregate not exceeding four thousand seven hundred dollars (\$4,700) in convenient sums, redeemable in five years and payable in ten years, with semi-annual coupons for interest attached at the rate of six yer cent. per annum, and should they consider it best for the town, they are authorized to deliver to the Treasurer of the Knox and Lincoln Railroad Company from time to time such portion of said bonds, should they be issued. as may be necessary for the payment of interest due, and becoming due, on the construction bonds of this town issued in aid of said company, which is unable to provide for, and they are hereby further authorized to otherwise dispose of said bonds, as well as to dispose of said orders, should the latter be issued, (except that in no case shall they deliver said orders to said treasurer) in such manner as will be most for the advantage of the town, the proceeds thereof when thus disposed of to be paid to said Treasurer, as the interest becomes due in either case, taking his receipt for so much money paid by the town on account of the construction bonds of this town issued in aid of said Company; provided however that should they pay money to said Treasurer for the discharge of such interest, instead of delivering bonds, the town shall be allowed the difference between a cash payment and what said bonds would bring in the market if disposed of by him.

At the meeting held March 23, 1874 the following Vote was passed, viz:

VOTED: That the Selectmen and Treasurer be authorized to raise the necessary amount to pay the interest on the bonds issued in aid of the Knox and Lincoln Railroad company, in town orders. Also Voted to raise by taxation five hundred dollars to pay interest on same.

Like action was taken at the next yearly meeting on March 22. 1875, but at the succeeding annual meetings of 1876, 1877, 1878 and 1879, the town voted to raise the money to pay the interest on the Knox and Lincoln Railroad bonds by taxation as follows, viz:

From the action at these meetings, beginning with that held March 17, 1873, it appears that the Railroad Company in less than four years after the first issue of bonds, and in about one year after the last issue of bonds found itself unable to meet its obligation to pay the coupons as they became due on said bonds.

Hence the burden was laid upon the town of protecting its credit, and there was paid by this town from July 1st, 1873, to July 1st, 1880, the sum of \$29,250. A complete record of the payment made is not to be found upon the Treasurer's account book.

A statement was obtained from the Cashier of the First National Bank of Bath, Maine, through which institution the money appears to have passed, and by means of said statement it has been ascertained that the money was received by that bank as follows, viz:

The coupons returned to the town, as shown in the statement of the Cashier of the First National Bank of Bath, Maine, were found in their original packages with the seals unbroken and were opened by the chairman of the present board of Selectmen, Mr. James H. Hilton, in the presence of the committee when they were sorted, affixed to sheets of paper and counted. The amount corresponded exactly with the statement, \$29250.

There are no dates on the Treasurer's book of these remittances excepting as to the item of \$15.45, hence the necessity of referring to them by the pages of the book and the years in which they occur.

These two sums make up the amount paid by the town as found by the statement of the bank referred to, viz.: \$29,250.

With regard to the sums of money remitted by the Selectmen or presumed to have been remitted by them, I have endeavored to ascertain how and by what means this was accomplished.

I find that July 1, 1873, the town orders, 6 per cent. authorized by the town to be used for the purpose of paying the interest on the railroad bonds, were probably issued to the amount of \$1,500, and these I am told by Mr. Woodward were placed at 95 cents on the dollar.

No record whatever was kept of these coupon orders.

I can give no further explanation of these matters than this. I have asked Mr. U. W. Woodward who was Chairman of the board of Selectmen during this whole period, in fact from 1872 to 1876 inclusive, to explain how the business was transacted. He is unable however, to furnish me with any information by which I can satisfactorily explain these payments on account of interest that have been made by other than the town Treasurer.

The Treasurer's account book contains no credit of the sums remaining in the several instances noted.

4 1-2 PER CENT. BONDS.

At the March meeting held the 22nd March, 1880, it was voted to adopt the following resolutions:

RESOLVED: That the Selectmen and Treasurer are hereby authorized and instructed to issue one hundred and thirteen thousand dollars (\$113,000) in bonds of the town, bearing four and one-half per cent. (4 1-2 per cent.) interest per annum, payable in twenty years from the first day of July, 1880, with interest coupons attached, payable semi-annually on the first day of January and July of each year, and that said Selectmen and Treasurer be directed to exchange said bonds with the holders of the Damariscotta six per cent. bonds issued in aid of the Knox and Lincoln R. R. Co., and that said Selectmen and Treasurer be authorized to sell at par any or all of the said four and one-half per cent. bonds and with the proceeds of any such sales to take up a like amount of the said bonds issued in aid of the Knox and Lincoln R. R. Co. and that the interest on said bonds hereby authorized to be issued, over and above what the railroad shall pay, shall be raised by taxation each year. and also two thousand dollars shall be raised by taxation each and every year after this year, to act as a sinking fund with which to take up said bonds at their maturity until the amount of the outstanding bonds shall be reduced to such an amount as the earnings of the railroad will pay the interest on.

Under the instructions contained in this vote the Selectmen arranged with David W. Chapman, Cashier of the New Castle National Bank to assist them in the operation of refunding the six per cent. bonds by the issue of the four and one-half per cent. bonds.

Your attention is called to the fact that in all the votes passed by the town with respect to the issuing of bonds, the wording of the votes passed has been, "The Selectmen and Treasurer are hereby authorized and instructed to issue" &c. I mention this, from the fact that as far as my observations and enquiries go the Treasurer has had very little, if anything, to do with the manipulations of the various issues of bonds

by the town, excepting the affixing of his signature to them, which may have been all that was expected of him.

There was no complete record kept of the refunding transactions so far as I can find, neither the Selectmen, the Treasurer or Mr. Chapman, either of them or all of them together made sufficient records to cover the entire business done in this refunding of the 6 per cent. railroad bonds. In proof of this it will be shown that, when the Auditors reported to the town in March, 1882, the amount of bonds outstanding, they were mistaken as to the real facts in the matter.

The way in which this is demonstrated, is, that it appears by the Treasurer's books and by an account rendered by Mr. D. W. Chapman, which will be referred to again hereafter that \$4,100 of the old 6 per cent. railroad bonds have been paid in cash, and of this amount \$2,500 has been paid since the meeting of March, 1882. This will appear in the statement of BONDS PAID.

As to the 4 1-2 per cent. bonds, a record, in the book containing a memorandum of them, states that No. 87 for \$500 was exchanged for 6 per cent coupon orders in March, 1884. These latter were five of the \$100 town orders bearing 6 per cent. interest, issued July 1, 1873. From the coupons cancelled it would seem that No. 64 for \$100 could not have issued until after January, 1885, as the first coupon from that bond is the one due July 1, 1885.

Hence it may be said that as \$109,500 in 4 1-2 per cent. bonds have been issued, which will be apparent by the coupons cancelled and charged to the town, in the statement elsewhere, and \$4,100 in 6 per cent. railroad bonds have been paid in cash, there was \$600 more 4 1-2 per cent. bonds issued than were required to fund the old 6 per cent. bonds, for, if you deduct \$4,100, the paid bonds, from the amount of the old railroad bonds issued, which was \$113,000, you will have \$108,900; and that is the amount that was really issued in the process of refunding the 6 per cent. bonds. The additional sum of \$600 was issued as indicated, in all probability, in 1884 and 1885. As to the \$500 bond there is no doubt about that whatever, because the record in the book shows positively the time it was issued and the purpose it served, and there is strong probability that the \$100 bond was issued for a similiar purpose, viz: to take up one of the \$100 town orders bearing

6 per cent. interest. There were fifteen of these \$100 town orders issued; eight appear to have been paid in cash, five were exchanged for the \$500 bond, leaving two to be accounted for. If one of these was exchanged for the No. 64 bond \$100, that would leave only one to dispose of. These have all been cancelled and are in the hands of the Selectmen, but the entire absence of any systematic records of those transactions in bonds makes it utterly impossible for me to state definitely the manner in which they have been carried on, or the results, excepting as they appear from examinations, investigations and presumption. As to the 4 1-2 per cent. bonds which are now outstanding, viz: \$103,900. I can unhesitatingly say that proof is ample to demonstrate the correctness of this statement.

In the course of the examination of papers from the office of the Selectmen, an account, which has been alluded to, was found, which, upon examination proved to be an account of the refunding by the New Castle National Bank, of which Mr. David W. Chapman is Cashier. covering \$74,400, 4 1-2 per cent. bonds issued, and \$75,000, 6 per cent. bonds redeemed. This was the only account, (and by that I mean, an account in dollars and cents) which could be obtained. A memorandum or statement in the hand-writing of Mr. Chapman was found stating that he had delivered to the Selectmen \$108,000 in 6 per cent. bonds, between July 14, 1880 and Oct. 29, 1881, and that for \$105,000 of them delivered at certain stated times he held receipts. balance, \$3,000, it is said \$2,000 was taken from a Mr. Stewart, and \$1,000 taken up at Auburn, paid for by W. W. Keene. There was also found a detailed statement of several sheets, each one headed, "4 1-2 per cent, bonds sold by D. W. Chapman," which upon being examined and computed was found to cover \$91,500. Upon this statement the names of parties to whom bonds were issued were placed opposite the numbers of the bonds. As before stated the account found covered \$74,400, 4 1-2 per cent. bonds issued, among which are \$3,700, sold by Samuel Hanson, Portland, and \$9,200 sold by Mr. Flye of the Damariscotta National Bank which are not noted on the statement of "4 1-2 per cent. bonds sold;" add these to the \$91,000 and we have \$104,400 as the total amount of 4 1-2 per cent. bonds sold or placed by D. W. Chapman, of which \$74,400 only is covered by the account referred to. The account commences July 6, 1880 and runs to November 9, 1881.

This account has never been a part of the records of the financial transactions of this town. The Treasurer has no recollection of ever seeing it; the contents have never been spread upon the town Clerk's records, and I have not found anybody who appeared to know anything about it. It was amongst old papers in the office of the Selectmen and was stumbled upon by accident, while looking over the mass of papers which were examined. Besides containing the matter re-

ferred to about bonds, it covers payments of coupons to the amount of \$3,672.00 as well as the payment of \$600 old 6 per cent. bonds, all paid with money belonging to the town, yet no record of same is found upon the books of the Treasurer.

The full particulars of this account will be found elsewhere.

From the account and statements referred to it appeared that Mr. D. W. Chapman had been very intimately concerned in the business of refunding the 6 per cent. bonds, but as the account covered only \$74,400, there was needed apparently a further account to cover the difference between the \$74,400 and the 104,400, viz. \$30,000. tion to Mr. Chapman for further accounts by a member of the Committee in July last was answered by his saying he had none. September he was invited to meet the Committee, and did so, but his manner evinced so much reluctance to impart any information which might throw light upon the matters referred to, that I could not help feeling that he was not in sympathy with the objects you desired to accomplish, and therefore was indisposed to render me any assistance. Afterwards I succeeded in obtaining from Mr. Chapman accounts covering payments of coupons and bonds which enabled me to clear up certain matters upon the Treasurer's book which I found to be transactions that had passed through Mr. Chapman's hands. accounts, however have been furnished by him touching the refunding of the 6 per cent. bonds, and although repeatedly asked for, no more information can be obtained, excepting that his explanation of the matter is, that this amount, \$30,000, must have been exchanged without differences occuring in the process, and that no account was necessary.

It is certainly to be regretted that in matters of so much importance, no complete account or record was kept and preserved. I can only say that after the most exhaustive researches and examinations, it has been impossible for me to add materially to the information contained in the account and statements spoken of.

From the statement of coupons from 4 1-2 per cent. bonds cancelled, which follows, can be seen what are now outstanding of this issue of bonds. This will demonstrate the statements already made with regard to the real amount of the 4 1-2 per cent. issued.

In a book which contains a memorandum of bonds issued it would seem that there was \$10,000 in bonds of \$1000 each which were not issued, viz.: Nos. 15 and 27 to 36 inclusive; yet among the coupons, there appeared one coupon from bond No. 15, which is included in the preceding statement. It also appears that Nos. 43, 44 and 48 of the \$500 bonds were cancelled and not issued. One coupon each from the bonds numbered 43, 44 and 48 was found. Bond No. 86, \$500 which was, according to a note in this book to that effect, cancelled the present year, viz.: March 16, 1889, and which was examined together with other cancelled bonds, had five coupons cut off, being one row of coupons from the bottom of the bond

Mr. James H. Hilton was positive the bond had never been issued and was unable to account for the removal of the coupons. They were not found among the coupons cancelled.

Of the \$200 denomination Nos. 50, 51, 52, 53 and 56, 57, 58, 59, 60, were marked "cancelled, not issued." One coupon of each however, was found among the cancelled coupons. No. 86 of this denomination is marked "error, not issued" and there is no No. 90 upon the book; from these two bonds of \$200 each, there were found fourteen coupons from each one, being coupons 2 to 15 inclusive.

Of the bonds for \$50, Nos. 33, 34, 35 and 38, 39, 40, 41, 42 are blank upon the book, as if not used. That they were used however is quite apparent by the coupons which appeared to have been paid and cancelled and which came from these bonds. Thus it appears as before remarked, that the record of bonds was not carefully kept. The omission entirely of bond No. 90, \$200, is somewhat remarkable.

Taking the coupons which have been cancelled as a guide the entire issue of the 4 1-2 per cent. bonds was as follows, viz.:

This does not include any of the bonds, from which only one coupon was found. Hence there doesn't seem to be any chance for doubt as to the amount of the 4 1-2 per cent. bonds issued. Of these there have been paid the following bonds which are cancelled and were produced for my examination by Mr. James H. Hilton, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, viz.;

Deduct these from the amount issued and there remains outstanding one hundred and three thousand, nine hundred dollars (\$103,900) in four and one-half per cent. bonds.

Among the envelopes which contained cancelled coupons there was one which is endorsed: "Coupons taken from bonds before they were sold, \$358.87" in the hand writing of Mr. D. W. Chapman.

The endorsment being upon the back of the envelope, and the face of the envelope being covered with figures and writing, it escaped being seen when the envelope was opened. In looking over the envelopes afterward to see if possibly some coupons had been overlooked this was discovered. What particular coupons the envelope contained cannot be stated as they were mixed with others from various envelopes and packages and have been included in the statement of cancelled coupons. This amount \$358.87 should be deducted from the sum of the coupons cancelled in order to ascertain the amount of coupons paid by the town from the 4 1-2 per cent. bonds, and by doing this we have the net amount paid \$37,635.75.

Two other envelopes containing coupons taken from bonds before being sold were found containing respectively \$245.25 and \$96.75. These coupons however were kept apart from the others and have not been included in the statement of coupons cancelled. They have been affixed to sheets of paper and a statement made which gives the facts as found with regard to them.

Leaving outstanding \$16,050.00 apparently but as to the bond given as No. 0 for \$100 it is probable that the three coupons from that bond belong to one of the other bonds for \$100 and that in reality there is now outstanding \$15,950. The numbers and dates were written in upon the bonds of the denomination of \$100, \$500, and \$1000, and the three coupons might not have been numbered, yet may still belong to one of the bonds of the \$100 denomination. The coupons having been cancelled by a punch which in many cases cut out the date there may be some misstatement regarding the dates of coupons, but the number of coupons from each bond however is correct.

This issue of bonds was made under authority of a vote passed at the March meeting, 1878, and was not to exceed twenty thousand dollars. "The proceeds of same to be used to take up the outstanding bonds and orders of the town which are now bearing six per cent. "interest." Said bonds were to run ten, twenty and thirty years.

Bonds were dated May 1, 1878, and issued as follows, viz.:

With regard to this issue of 5 per cent. bonds in 1878. I found a memorandum of them giving names to whom they were issued, in the book from the Selectmen's office called "Record of town bonds."

In the town order book was found written against certain records of town orders issued "Funded in five per cent. bonds." A list was made of all such orders and it will be found herewith.

By this list the orders thus marked amount to the sum of \$15,639.93 while the 5 per cent. bonds issued were \$19,950.00.

as the difference between the bonds issued, and the orders taken up together with cash received by the Treasurer. Upon arriving at this result I inquired for what source information might possibly be obtained which would explain this and enable me to show the disposition which was made of these 5 per cent. bonds, which were authorized to be issued "to take up outstanding bonds and orders bearing six per cent. interest."

I was told that the only member of the board of Selectmen who served in that year, 1878, who was now living was W. A. Jones, and he was invited to wait upon the committee. From him I endeavored to ascertain how the business was transacted. I regret to be compelled to say that he was unable to throw the least light upon the matter, and I therefore submit the result of my examination as to the issue of these bonds by which from all that I can gather from the books of the town, it appears, that they have been issued in excess of the amount apparently required for \$2.353.55.

It is somewhat remarkable that without a single exception the orders, marked as indicated, and a list of which now follows, are not in existence; at least, they cannot be found.

Referring to the statement of coupons which has just been read, I desire to call your attention to the coupons charged in the municipal years of 1880, 1881 and 1882.

To make the showing that I desire to present I propose to regard the account from D. W. Chapman, Cashier of the New Castle National Bank as a supplement to the town Treasurer's account.

No part of this account as I have before stated has found its way into the Treasurer's book in any shape that can be defined and hence, as i twill be shown that the town's money was used in offsetting the charges found in the account, it must be treated as a part of the Treasurer's account, made up by D. W. Chapman.

Town meeting was held on the 21st March, 1881, hence the 23rd, March was after the town meeting.

In the municipal year of 1882 we find on the Treasurer's book \$6981.75. Or nearly seven thousand dollars charged to the town that year on account of coupons, a rather significant fact in view of that other fact that there appears to be \$2733.04 more charged than there are coupons in the possession of the town to show for same. I found great difficulty with regard to a large credit item on the Treasurer's book of \$4138.53, purporting to be dividends received from Knox & Lincoln Railroad Company in the year 1882.

was unable for a long time to get any clue to where that item came from. It would not equal any specified number of amounts which were paid to the town by the Railroad Company. The Treasurer was asked to explain it, but couldn't. The Auditor, Mr. James Stetson, was unable to account for such an item. Mr. David W. Chapman was applied to in vain. Although a Director in railroad and knowing well the amounts customarily paid to the town he could not tell what it meant.

At last I got statements of certain transactions which passed through the New Castle National Bank and the mystery was solved for the amount appeared, immediately. It was the sum total of various items as I shall show you later on, from November, 1881 to February 9th, 1883, covering the municipal year of 1882, in fact the charges in this account, are up to March 9, 1883, and there are over two thousand dollars charged for coupons. The Treasurer copied into his book the charges, and entered the sum of the credits in one amount, which clearly showed where this mysterious item came from. came to be so many coupons charged in the year 1882 is very strange. It is, of course very difficult to count coupons when they are loose and mistakes are almost unavoidable when it is attempted. The manner in which the coupons have now been counted, renders it quite an easy matter to get a correct account. And I have no hesitation in saving that the account of the cancelled coupons which I shall now present you is a correct one and can be verified with little difficulty, in a very short time.

I can offer no further explanation of this matter than appears from these statements, whether anybody else can do so or not is a matter for the town to consider. In view of the manner in which the business has been transacted, it seems as if the person best qualified to explain the matter is David W. Chapman.

Regarding the Auditor's Report, Presented at the Town Meeting in March 1889.

The outstanding 4 1-2 per cent. bonds are said to be by this report \$103,100. While the fact is, that the amount of these bonds outstanding is \$800 more or 103,900.

Now as to the statements regarding bonds paid on pages 14 and 15 of that report.

It is stated that the following bonds were paid, since March 20, 1882, viz.:

Then, under the caption "Explanatory" it proceeds to show what has been done with the amount of the sinking fund, which for the eight years past has been raised each year to the extent of \$2,000 per annum and would therefore produce \$16,000 to be accounted for. It goes back to the report, March 20, 1882, and quotes as follows:

In the summary, it is stated that the liabilities of the town exclusive of the 4 1-2 per cent. bonds March 12, 1888 was \$17,447.38 this should be \$400 more as may be seen by the report of that date.

The assets of the town, meaning balance in hands of the Treasurer March 12, 1888 is put down \$1259.51 this should be \$1289.31 or about \$30 more.

Make these corrections in the figures, which are plainly required by the facts, and the gain over last year is \$322.20 more than the sum stated:

What wonder is it that matters should be "obscure" under such faulty statements.

The Account of D. W. Chapman or the New Castle National Bank.

I now wish to exhibit the transactions contained in the account to which I have several times alluded.

The following sums of money belonging to the town went into this bank and are covered by the charges contained in this account, viz: and in first place, an item, which gave me the greatest trouble to understand, of \$2000, charged upon the Treasurer's book, page 314, as "Paid check New Castle Bank."

Now, right here I desire to call your attention to the statement presented to the town meeting March, 1882, where it is said that the expenses of refunding the R. R. bonds has been \$461.50 including \$155 for printing the 4 1-2per cent. bonds. We will now see what has been done with the \$6282.56 of the town's money.

This note was one which was signed by seven citizens of the town, and among them was Mr. James Stetson, and although this gentleman was on the board of Selectmen in 1880 he never knew whether or not the note was used, but said that he thought it wasn't. This note was dated about the 20th July and was on 6 months time. It was used immediately, as it was disconuted by the First National Bank of Bath, and the discount was charged to the town in this account, but, how carefully it was guarded, is shown by the omission to say anything about it in speaking of the expenses of refunding the 6 per cent. bonds, and hence it has never been considered in that light at all. The note was paid afterwards on the 22nd January, 1881, and is a part of this account.

as the expenses which this account shows to have been incurred in the process of refunding instead of \$461.50 as stated at the March meeting of 1882, which is more than double the amount reported to the town.

COLLECTOR'S NOTES.

It appears to have been the custom of the town for the Collector of taxes to give his note for the amount of the taxes committed to him for collection, exclusive of the state and county taxes.

This originated in 1862 when it was provided by a vote of the town that the collector should give four notes for the amount of town taxes committed to him for collection, payable in 3, 6, 9, and 12 months from the date of said tax bill with interest after DATE. Said notes to be signed jointly and severally with at least four good names, besides the Collector's, as surety. This was apparently designed to be in lieu of bonds, for it is further provided, that the Collector shall give a sufficient bond for the collection and payment of state and county tax and all other taxes committed to him for the ensuing year with the exception of the town taxes for which he has given his notes.

I am assured by Mr. D. W. Chapman, who claims to have prepared the votes passed by the town at the meeting of March 25, 1862, that the record in the Town Clerk's book is wrong with respect to the time from which interest was to run upon the Collector's notes. The interest was to run after the maturity of the notes, and not from the dates of them. The Treasurer was instructed to endorse the notes and when the interests of the town demand it, the vote says, "that he be instructed to have them discounted, either at the bank or by individuals." It doesn't say who was to instruct the Treasurer to have the notes discounted. I presume it was intended for the Selectmen to have this authority.

It is evident that in the beginning of this note business, the Collector was expected by the town, to pay the interest upon his notes after they became due, if he did not collect the taxes with which to take them up at maturity.

As time went on however this was lost sight of, and I find the Collector's notes have generally drifted into the New Castle National Bank and the town has paid the interest, or had the notes discounted.

I find even as early as 1864, \$5.00 charged upon the Treasurer's book for discount on note S. H. Jones. From that time on, discounts on notes have been charged to the town each year to the year 1867 inclusive; when there is a rest, and no discount upon notes appears to be charged to the town again until the year 1880, when it begins again and appears in every year from that time to the year 1888 INCLUSIVE, with the exception of the year 1882.

It is somewhat remarkable that in 1888 the sum of \$117.82 is charged for discount on S. Lane's notes when the Collector for that year was Joseph W. Castner who declined to give any notes for the taxes committed to him for collection. This item upon the Treasurer's

book has against it the initials "D. W. C." which so frequently appear in connection with the financial transactions of the town, and refer to Mr. David W. Chapman.

I find the total amount charged for discount on notes in the Treasurer's book, from and including the year 1864 to March settlement of 1889, to be \$682.69. And the town voted in 1888, \$50 to Samuel Lane, former collector, to pay interest on one of his notes of 1887, making a total of \$732.69.

ABATEMENT OF TAXES.

There appears to have been no abatement of taxes of any extraordinary character made by the Selectmen during the years covered by this examination until we reach the years 1878 and 1879.

It is perhaps worthy of remark that in the year 1879 Thomas E. Gay was one of the board of Selectmen, and that, in that year, in fact, just at the close of the year or March 12, 1880, an order was issued in his favor for \$221.07 "being for abatement of W. H. Chase tax for 1875" signed by himself and U. W. Woodward.

In the same year an order was issued in favor of Thomas E. Gay for \$47.84 for abatements of 1876 and 1877.

It also appears that in 1876 an order was given to Thomas E. Gay for \$136.97 being abatements 1873, 1874, 1875.

Chapter 6, section 95 of the statutes of the State of Maine with regard to the assessment of taxes in incorporated places, provides as follows, viz:

"The Assessors for the time being, on written application, stating the grounds therefor, within two years from the assessment, may make such reasonable abatement as they think proper.

They shall keep in suitable book form, a record of said abatements, with the reasons for each, and report the same to the town at its annual meeting."

Under this statute it would appear that abatements have been made which are illegal and that in fact as regards the abatement of \$221.07 made in 1880 for tax of 1875, there is no question, that no legal abatement has been made, and it remains for the town to decide whether or not the town will abate the tax of W. H. Chase for 1875.

Furthermore, chapter 3, section 35, of the statutes of the State of Maine, with regard to certain duties of municipal officers provides.

"No member of a city government or Selectman of a town, shall in either board of such government, or in any board of Selectmen, vote on any question in which he is pecuniarily interested, directly or indirectly, and in which his vote may be decisive; and no action of such government or board taken by means of such vote, is legal."

Under this statute the order referred to, as having been signed by Thomas E. Gay and U. W. Woodward in favor of Thomas E. Gay for abatement of W. H. Chase tax for 1875 amount \$221.07 is of no force and effect and it remains for the town to take such action in the matter as the facts herein contained may warrant.

I was unable to get any light upon this item of \$4138.53 from either the Treasurer, Mr. James Stetson, who was the first Selectman of that year, 1882, and audited the account, or from Mr. David W. Chapman whose especial attention was called to the item when he was present upon invitation of the Committee, Sept. 20, 1889. It was not an amount which could be made to equal any number of the sums paid to the town by the railroad. Having before me a statement from the books of the Treasurer of the Knox & Lincoln R. R. Co., giving the amounts paid to the town with the dates of payment, I found it impossible to account for this sum by the payments of the Railroad Company.

I was under the necessity of thinking that the sum could not be accounted for, and of applying the amount as follows, viz:
