REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Repairs

The first repair job should be the building of two tennis courts back of the High School Buildings. The ground has already been broken for these courts.

The Grammar School Building is 26 years old and the ideas regarding placing of the toilets have changed in a quarter of a century. In modern school buildings toilets adjoin and sometimes connect with the individual School rooms. In this way teachers have some control of the pupils and toilets. Additional toilets are needed on the top floor of the Grammar School.

The Oquossoc School should either be fixed up or turned back to the selectmen. Last fall people broke into the Oquossoc School and smashed the rear door and various windows.

It would be nice if the stage at the H. S. could be widened 10 feet.

Student Aid

The boys in Town have been very fortunate with having an opportunity to earn money in the summer. Many deserving boys have been aided in their efforts to secure an education. We have some real boys and girls in this Town and in the next generation they will be the leaders of the community. Almost half of the High School students go away to School and I wish every student that graduates could have an opportunity to go further if he or she so desires. Perhaps in time this condition of things can be brought about. I know this that the boys and girls help themselves tremendously.

Finance

In 1932 \$21,173 was raised by taxation for running expenses of the Schools. In 1938 \$16,707 was raised for the running expenses of the Schools. I am just wondering if the part of this \$4,466 "cut" could not be restored.

This year the average of School rates is .0127 for a State average while the average of municipal rates is .057. Thus we see that Rangeley with a School rate of .0082 and a municipal rate of .043 is well below the State average.

I should like to see a small trust fund started, see it grow with compound interest and perhaps in 50 or 100 years it would be big enough to pay half at least of the running expenses of the Schools. This is no idle dream but sound doctrine.

Manual Training

More parents, "Hobby" fans, and interested citizens have spoken to me about starting a manual training course than ever before. I am interested in Manual Training and would like to see all persons join hands and do something for the boys. All people do not have the same talents and we like variety. Some boys would like to stay in Rangeley and build up a little business with their own hands. I think we should offer the same encouragement to boys who want to stay in Rangeley as we offer to those who want to go to College. We do offer to girls a well established Home Economics Course.

There are three main aims of Manual Training Courses:

1. "To present to the pupil through shopwork, visitation and study the best possible exploratory concept of what industry is and does.
2. "To try out the pupil through the making and studying of a variety of interesting articles that provide him with experiences which will aid him in the discovery of his interest, aptitudes, and abilities.
3. "To correlate the activities of the school shop with the pupil's School and home life."

Inexperienced teachers of manual training get a salary of \$1,000 per year while experienced teachers command a salary of \$1,800 to \$2,000.

If it is planned to hire an inexperienced teacher the following appropriation is recommended for the first half year, September to February first:

Salary	\$ 500
Equipment	1,200
Supplies	250 and cost of wood floor

For the following year with an inexperienced teacher an appropriation of \$900 would be recommended. \$1,000 would be paid for salary, and \$300 for supplies and materials with a reimbursement from the State of \$400.

Musical Instruction

The study of musical instruments by pupils of both the grade schools and high school is steadily increasing. At present there are seven pupils studying violin, one clarinet, one saxophone, five drums, six trumpets, one trombone, and two cellos, making a total of twenty-three pupils availing themselves of the free instruction given during school hours.

As soon as each pupil has mastered the fundamentals of his instrument he is admitted to the orchestra, where he benefits by the cooperative effort of group activity. The orchestra numbers fourteen pieces; and by the end of the year we expect about five more to have joined the organization.

A string ensemble made up of four violins, two cellos, and piano, rehearses once a week.

The high school glee club, consisting of twenty-eight members, successfully presented an operetta on January 28. The proceeds from this will buy music for the glee club and a new instrument for the school.

Domestic Science Instruction

The Home Economics Department has been serving noon lunches during the winter term. This lunch consists of a hot dish, such as soup, cocoa, or scallop which is served to about 125 students each day. The average cost for each student each week is about 7 cents. The food for the grammar school students is sent to their building in a large kettle and served there.

The Home Economics department has also had charge of making new basketball suits for the girls.

There are 56 girls taking Home Economics this year. Half of these girls are in the Junior High Division.

Age of Entrance to School

The average child is not ready to read until about six or six and one-half years. In most cases kindergarten work has to be given to children who come to school when only five years of age. To secure genuine first grade work for your children and those of other people do not start your children in the first grade until six years of age.

I wish to thank the School officials, teachers, parents, children and all others who have worked for the good of the Schools.

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL OF HIGH SCHOOL

To the Citizens of Rangeley:

The High School registration for the Fall term was 102; there were 56 boys and 46 girls. The number by classes is as follows:

There were 22 who were not absent for a single session and an average attendance of 91.

A seven|five rotating schedule has been adopted this year. By using this schedule it is possible to have longer class periods and more supervised study.

Interest in music is developing and credit is given toward graduation if one does satisfactory work in either glee club or orchestra.

The N. F. C. I. Prize Speaking will be held in Phillips on March 14. This is earlier than the contest has been held in previous years but is thought to be better for those schools that wish to send speakers to the State contests that are usually held early in May.

The school is entered in the sectional One-Act Play contest as in past years. Many schools competing are larger than Rangeley, however, honors have been won and much benefit derived. There are some, who have ability, who do not care to take part in prize speaking or dramatics. The training in such work is helpful to all who participate and one should not think that time is wasted if a prize is not won.

Thirty Rangeley boys and girls are studying in some professional school or college. This is a record that many larger towns cannot equal and shows that the people of Rangeley have a real interest in education.

The athletic program is much the same as last year. However, one change has been made in respect to tournaments. All tournaments are to be conducted under the direction of the State Principals' Association which hopes to do away with some of the stress and commercialism that is noticeable at times.

To the Selectmen of Rangeley:

DEAR SIRs:

During 1938 there were reported four cases of chickenpox, one of German measles, one of mumps, two of scarlet fever, one of whooping cough, and five of pneumonia.

With Mrs. Dennett 31 were vaccinated against smallpox, 53 were given toxoid to protect them against diphtheria, 74 were given Schick tests to learn if a previous toxoid had successfully protected them, 99 were given Dick tests to find if they were susceptible to scarlet fever, and 59 were tuberculin tested.

At the time the first case of scarlet fever was reported — the report was made on a Saturday evening and a visit to the case was made Sunday, at which time request slips were left for Mr. Irish that Dick tests could be made Monday.

Arriving Monday morning found that the patient had come by bus, hence a list of those was given me by Mr. Irish, who also detailed a pupil who could tell me where all the families lived, and we secured request slips from all parents of those who came by bus and all these, and those who secured signatures when at home for dinner were given Dick tests that day.

A close watch was kept on all contacts and but one other case developed — a preschool child.

A sound picture, "Science and Modern Medicine", was shown by Dr. Mitchell of the State Bureau of Health to two groups of high school pupils, 83 being present.

One attended the chest clinic held at the hospital monthly and conducted by Dr. Cromwell, Superintendent of the Central Maine Sanatorium.

62 pupil inspections were made either by request of Mrs. Dennett or the teachers.

Our sanitary engineer has made 36 inspections of water supplies and 52 plumbing inspections.

Report of County Nurse

To the Citizens of the Town of Rangeley:

I hereby submit the eighteenth annual report of nursing activities from January 1, 1938, to January 1, 1939.

In February in behalf of and to a family many visits of investigation were made. One call was for the purpose of instructing mother of new baby, and five calls to secure interest of families to have needed corrections done.

In March made arrangements for two children to go to oculist after checking over visual acuity tests.

In April assisted Dr. Arms in giving toxoid, tuberculin and Schick tests as well as vaccinations. Planned and carried out methods of distribution of posters and pamphlets for Early Diagnosis Campaign.

In May a spring inspection of all school children was done.

In July conferences with various people to plan a Well Baby and Preschool Clinic.

In November the annual health inspection of schools and notices of defects found were sent to parents.
