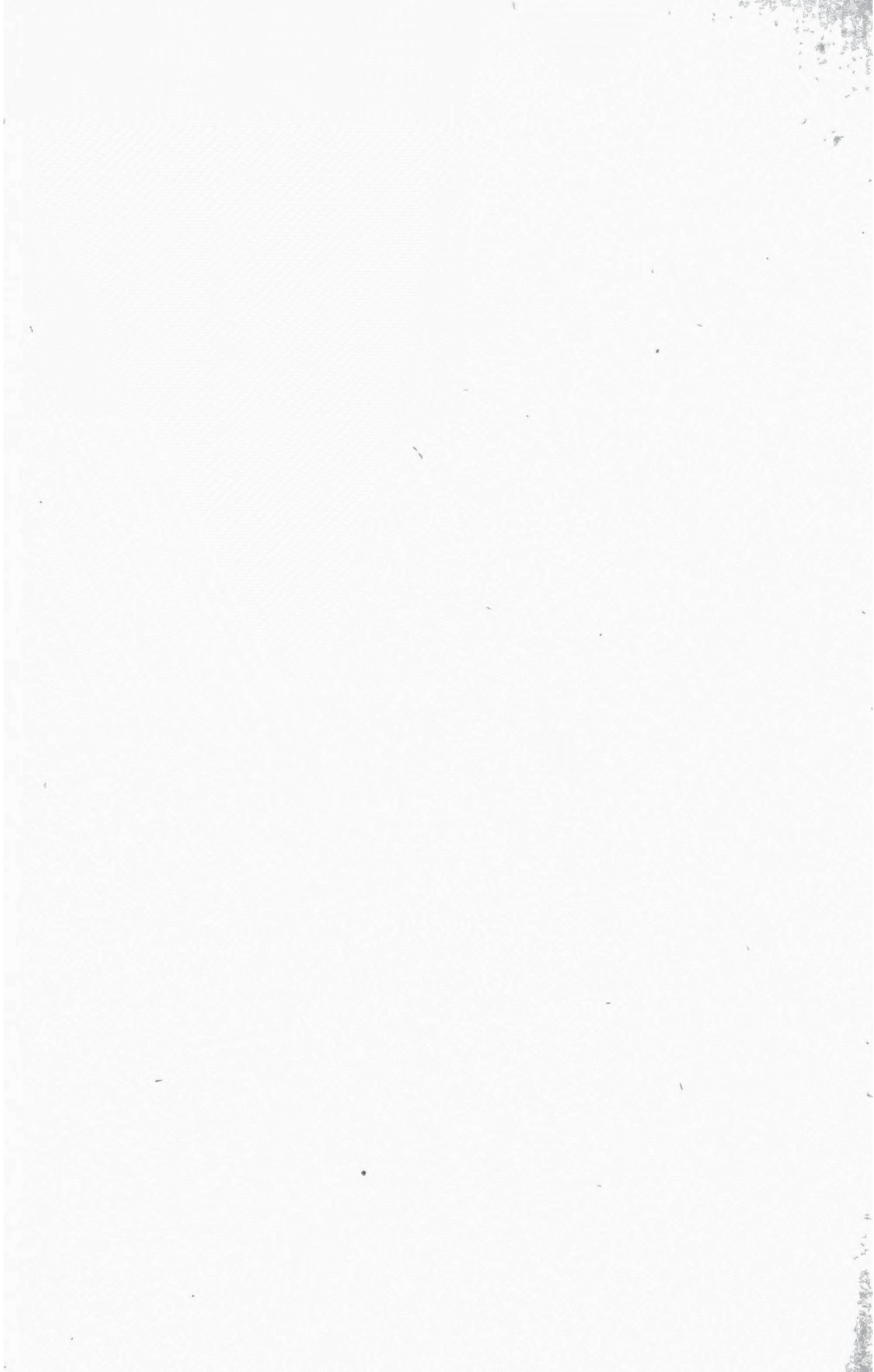

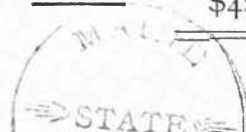

*To the Citizens of Bluehill:*

I have the honor to submit to you a report of your schools for the year 1907-8.

To those who are not familiar with the office of superintendent, the duties, no doubt, seem very simple. A large proportion of the people think the work consists wholly of visiting the schools. I will, in my own behalf, mention a few of the duties of a superintendent of schools. The census of pupils between the ages of five and twenty-one years must be taken, and returns made to the State superintendent; the examination of teachers must be held, and papers corrected; all letters of application from teachers must be answered, and teachers elected by the committee must be notified of their appointment; suitable text-books must be purchased and delivered to the various schools; reports of the academy, also of the common schools, must be made to the State superintendent; the schools must be visited, and the examination of pupils must be conducted.

These and many minor duties I have endeavored with the unfailing support of the committee faithfully to perform, and, though I have undoubtedly made many mistakes, I will ask you in your criticism to remember that "to err is human; to forgive, divine".

A great bar to progress in our schools at the present is frequent changing of teachers. Low salaries have excluded many persons who should be in charge of schools. Many of our best teachers have left town simply because they receive more for their work elsewhere. In the past

year many teachers have resigned positions to attend normal school. We are glad to have them anxious to continue their education, but regret very much that we cannot pay wages enough to retain their services after they have been trained for teaching. The best teacher can do little more than get a school in good running order during the first term, and when there is a new teacher every term for six or seven terms, the result is far from satisfactory.

#### EQUIPMENT.

We do not expect a carpenter to do good work without good tools, and so we have no right to expect a teacher to do good work in our schools, which we may call educational workshops, if they lack the necessary tools.

Since cleanliness in the scale of virtues is given a place even in advance of wisdom, it is not improper that the way to cleanliness be provided for those pupils whose homes have forgotten its importance, or who may have fallen from grace between home and school. A wash-basin, soap and towels go far toward adding to the mental as well as to the physical brightness of the school, and would serve as a means of keeping the text-books clean. Each school should be provided with a good metallic tank for drinking water, instead of the ordinary water-pail, which is nothing more than a receptacle for disease germs.

All the schools are greatly in need of maps, and several are not provided with a large dictionary. In order for pupils to do their work well, these things are absolutely necessary. It is possible for any school to have them.

It is true, of course, that many supplies might properly be purchased by the town, and it certainly is true that they may just as properly be obtained through the efforts of the school, and what is provided in the latter

way will be most highly appreciated. It has been demonstrated that a dictionary bought by the pupils outlasts three bought by the town, and the difference is not in the quality of the binding or of the paper; it is in the quality of the interest in the book.

Not all the things we want for our schools will come at once. But by getting a few things each year, and having them properly cared for, we will in a comparatively short time have every school-room well equipped for the work to be done.

#### TEXT-BOOKS.

When I entered upon my duties as superintendent there was not a common school in the town which was well supplied with text-books. I know that every teacher who taught in Bluehill during the spring term will endorse the above statement. It would have required just double the appropriation for this year to have bought the books necessary, and so some of the teachers have had more or less difficulty to do good work with the old books.

Both of the schools in the village and both of the East Bluehill schools have been supplied with all new books, with the exception of grammars. These books have been well cared for, and although many of the old books taken from the East Bluehill schools showed that they had been maliciously destroyed, the books furnished for this year are in excellent condition, and I wish to take this opportunity to say that the pupils in the East Bluehill grammar school have taken better care of their text-books for the past year than they have in any other school under my supervision.

I have devoted a great deal of time to inspection of books, and those that I have found damaged have been paid for by the pupils using them. Many new books have been furnished for the academy. I wish to impress



it upon the minds of the voters that the appropriation for text-books not only has to supply eighteen common schools and the academy with text-books, but also all the schools in town with crayon, erasers, writing-books, practice paper, and examination paper.

The appropriation for 1907 was \$400, and more than one-third of that amount has been used for the academy. If the town will raise \$400 for text-books for 1908, all the small schools can be furnished with new books, as the village schools and the East Bluehill schools will require very few new books for the next year. Some of the bills are smaller because of credit received for old books collected from the various schools and returned to the companies we purchased new books of last spring. Without this credit, the text-book account would have been overdrawn about \$150.

#### REPAIRS ON SCHOOLHOUSES.

No extensive repairs have been made the past year because the appropriation was too small to do the work that should be done in the school-rooms where repairs are most needed. The walls and ceilings of the school-rooms in Bluehill village, East Bluehill and district No. 15 ought to be sheathed the coming year. Many of the schoolhouses are in need of two coats of paint, and it would be economy to attend to this matter in the near future.

One of the laws enacted by the legislature of 1907 was the one requiring superintendents of schools to report to the municipal officers of cities, towns and plantations all schools within their jurisdiction without flags, and it is the duty of said municipal officers to furnish flags to all such schools, to be paid for by said municipalities. Many of the schools are provided with flags at present, but most of them are in poor condition. A special ap-

propriation for flags will not be necessary, provided the voters are liberal in their appropriations for repairs.

#### COMMON SCHOOLS.

The common schools have been in session for twenty-seven weeks, one week less than last year. The reason for this is the increase in salaries of teachers. It is becoming harder each year to find good teachers for the wages we can offer. A teacher whom we want in our schools can easily command from \$9 to \$12 per week elsewhere. The statistics in the table of teachers' wages, etc., will show the number of schools, the whole number of scholars in town, attendance, average attendance, teachers' wages and experience.

The town has maintained eighteen common schools throughout the year. This is one school less than last year. The South street school, or the school in district No. 14, was discontinued at the close of last year, and the four scholars who were in the school at the time of its discontinuance have attended Beech Hill school for the past year. Each of these pupils received ten cents per day for transportation for every day he attended school. The total amount paid them for the year is \$49 65. The cost of running the school in district No. 14 would have been \$180. So by making this arrangement with the parents in that precinct, it has saved the town \$130.35.

Two schools, No. 2 and No. 21, have failed to maintain an average of eight pupils for the year. It will be necessary by law to suspend these schools for the coming year unless special action is taken by the town to continue them. I would recommend closing the school at Bluehill Falls, and transporting the scholars to South Bluehill. The town cannot curtail expenses any by closing the school in No. 21, as the cost of transportation to the

nearest school would be as much if not more than the expense of running the school in that district.

The whole number of scholars in town April 1, 1907, between the ages of five and twenty-one, was 510.

BLUEHILL-GEORGE STEVENS ACADEMY AND FREE HIGH SCHOOL.

Spring term—Principal, William H. Patten; salary \$950; first assistant, Miss Edna Cornforth, salary \$450; second assistant, Miss Ethel Foster, salary \$396. Attendance, 83; average attendance, 78; length of term, 11 weeks.

Fall term—Principal, William H. Patten, salary \$1,000; first assistant, Miss Alma Morrissette, salary \$450; second assistant, Miss Georgia Connor, salary \$396. Attendance, .87; average attendance, 81; length of term, 14 weeks.

The winter term is now in session. The length of the term will be eleven weeks.

Mr. Patten resigned at the close of the fall term, and Mr. Bryant W. Griffin was elected principal at a salary of \$800 per year. The assistants are the same as for the fall term.

That the pupils from the grammar school enter the academy before they are well prepared is the opinion of every principal who has had charge of the school. The reason for this is plain to be seen. Every pupil before trying the entrance examinations should have done at least nine grades of work in the common schools. Our boys and girls are forced to try those examinations after doing eight grades of work, and consequently there are many failures. If we are to give pupils good preparation for the academy, we must have an intermediate school. For many years the primary and grammar schools have been attempting to do the work of three



schools. In the primary room there are five grades, and no teacher can do the work that is required for this school.

To make room for the scholars who enter each year, the fifth grade pupils must be advanced to the grammar schools. Many pupils are not prepared to take this step, and so they have to be dragged along through this school, and at the end of three years pushed out to the academy. The only remedy for this condition of affairs is to have an intermediate school, and I hope that at the annual meeting in 1909 some definite action in this matter will be taken. I thought of having an article inserted in the warrant for this year, asking the town to make a special appropriation for this purpose, but I realize that it is costing Bluehill a large sum of money to maintain so many schools. I don't believe that there is another town in the State which has to carry on as many schools to accommodate the same number of pupils.

The average attendance in several of the schools for 1907 has been less than ten, but at the same time more than eight. Now I think that in 1908 the average will fall below eight in several schools, and then some of these schools can be closed and the few pupils remaining transported to the village provided an intermediate school is organized. At present we cannot accommodate any more scholars in the village schools than properly belong to districts 8 and 9.

I would respectfully recommend the following appropriations: For common schools, \$2,200; for text books and supplies, \$400; for repairs, \$500.

In closing, I wish to express my gratitude to the people of the town, and especially to the committee and other town officers for many favors and courteous treatment. I also wish to mention my appreciation of the earnest efforts and co-operation of the teachers and pupils.

STATE OF MAINE.

HANCOCK ss.

To *Alfred C. Osgood*, a constable of the Town of *Bluehill* in said county, *Greeting:*

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the town hall in said town, on Monday, the second day of March, A. D. 1908, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- ARTICLE 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
  3. To hear and act on the reports of the town officers for the past year.
  4. To choose selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor, treasurer, auditor, agent, and one member of the school committee.
  5. To choose a collector, fix his pay, and see if the town will vote any discount for prompt payment of taxes.



6. To choose one or more road commissioners, if the town votes to do so.
7. To choose all other necessary town officers.
8. To see what sums of money the town will raise for the following purposes :
  - For support of schools.
  - support of poor.
  - free high school.
  - free text-books.
  - town and incidental expenses.
  - repairs on schoolhouses.
  - snow breaking.
  - Memorial Day.
9. To see what sum the town will vote to repair roads and bridges, fix the rate of pay for men and teams, and the hours of labor for same.
10. To see if the town will vote yes or no upon the adoption of the provisions of chap. 12, of the public laws of Maine for the year 1907, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to State aid for highways for the year 1908.
11. To see if the the town will raise, appropriate and set apart for the permanant improvement of highways within the town such sum of money as is contemplated and directed by section 5 of chap. 112 of the public laws of Maine for the year 1907, being the sum of ninety-nine dollars.
12. To see if the town will vote a sum of money to repair sidewalks.
13. To see if the town will take any action in regard to the ledges in the highway at the Falls, and what money they will raise for the same.
14. To hear the report of the selectmen in regard to the bridge and hill at Peters brook, and what money if any they will raise for same.
15. To see if the town will vote money for street lamps in the village.
16. To see if the town will vote money for libraries.
17. To see if the town will vote money to build an iron fence at the old cemetery.
18. To see if the town will vote to close certain roads in the town to automobiles as authorized by the last legislature.
19. To see if the town will take any action in regard to having a union Superintendent of Schools.
20. To see if the town will take any action to prohibit sliding or ball playing on the village streets.

21. To see if the town will vote to continue the schools in districts Nos. 2 and 21, if there should be less scholars than the law requires.
22. To see if the town will raise money to insure the town hall.
23. To see if the town will vote to accept Chap. 148, laws of 1905, in relation to doors to voting booths at State elections.
24. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors as revised by the selectmen, clerk and treasurer.
25. To see if the town will vote to have fireworks on the Fourth of July and grant license to sell the same.
26. To see if the town will vote a sum of money to clear up and improve the parade ground, or authorize the selectmen to lease it for a term of years to have it cleared up.
27. To see if the town will lease the land in front of Adelaide Piersons' house, enclosed by her fence, until the town needs it for road purposes, on her own petition.
28. To see if the town will vote a sum of money to buy flags for the schoolhouses as provided by law.
29. To see if the town will raise a sum of money to remove the ledge in the hill near J. Sewall Gray's homestead.
30. To see if the town will permit the Chase Granite Co., in behalf of Mrs. E. A. Slaven, to remove the present wooden gateway at the entrance of Seaside cemetery and to erect in its place a gateway of granite and iron (or other metal), according to a design to be presented at the next regular town meeting.
31. To see if the town will vote to abate for a period of ten years the taxes on the plant of any person or corporation who shall pay yearly not less than \$25,000 in wages to the inhabitants of this town.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session at their office in town hall in said town on the morning of the election, at eight o'clock, to correct the list of voters.
