

## The Mayor's Address

Gentlemen of the City Council:

We have assembled here this morning at the opening of a new municipal year, to begin the work which has been assigned to us by our fellow citizens.

We meet not as Democrats, Republicans or Independents, but as a body to serve the welfare of our fellow citizens and not partisan ends. Our duty is to administer the affairs of the city, carefully, honestly and with such measure of wisdom as we possess. We shall best accomplish this result by faithfully examining all matters which are brought to our attention and taking such action thereon as we believe to be the most conducive to the general good.

We have accepted the trust conferred upon us and registered our oaths, and that trust must not be neglected. We must accept the consequences if the spirit of these oaths be disregarded.

Although the yoke placed upon us is not easy, and the burden far from light, we will, I am sure, get the right answer to the problem which will confront us if we hold foremost in our minds the fact that we are the trustees and agents of our fellow citizens, that we hold their funds in sacred trust, to be expended for their benefit, and, that we should

be prepared at all times to render to them an honest account of the expenditure of those funds.

In this work which we undertake there should be cooperation, and I trust that you will at all times feel that the Mayor stands ready and more than willing to co-operate with his Honorable Board. The door of the Mayor's office swings open with an equal welcome to every man, woman and child in the city, yet no man or group of men will get a more cordial greeting than the members of the City Council who come to talk over the city's business.

With this assurance of my desire to co-operate with you, I welcome you to the task ahead.

#### FINANCES

The finances will naturally receive your first attention and early in the year the important question of appropriations for the several departments will demand your careful attention.

#### SCHOOLS

Our schools are at present in good condition under the Superintendent and Board of Education.

We have established a manual training and domestic science department which are showing excellent results. The new Emery school is a monument to our city.

I would recommend the building of a new school in the westerly section of our city.

#### FIRE DEPARTMENT

We have a fire department of which we should feel very proud. The efficiency of the department has been increased 100 per cent. The apparatus is in very good condition. We have been very fortunate during the past year in regard to forest fires, and I would heartily recommend the patrol of the hazardous districts during the dry season. We should not begrudge any expenditure in this department when it is needed to increase the efficiency.

#### STREETS AND SIDEWALKS

There have been many notable improvements made upon our streets and sidewalks during the past year and much

remains to be done in this line. I would heartily recommend the Hassam paving as being the best adapted for our needs. The cement sidewalks seem to be the most substantial and economical. This matter should receive our attention as soon as practicable. Our motto should be to follow the footsteps of our predecessors in this matter of streets and sidewalks.

#### SEWERS

This particular department is the most vital in our city. Much work has been already done and we are still at the beginning. We must protect the health of our citizens and improve the sanitary conditions of our city by the careful consideration of all matters pertaining to the construction of sewers. The new sewer, of which a large part has been completed, will naturally receive our first attention and by the carrying on of this work until it is finished, it will have a tendency to promote building operations in the section of the city where the constructing of the new sewer will fill a long felt want.

The Mile Brook sewer should be continued this year and the existing nuisance abated as far as possible.

#### PARKS

Some shade trees were set out last year which later will add to the comfort and beauty of our city.

Parks serve their purpose and the matter of playgrounds will give pleasure and secure proper environment for the children. Excellent results were obtained last year by the addition of an instructor at the playground.

Clifford Park can be made a beautiful spot, and I would recommend an increase in the appropriation, and also recommend the continuance of the band concerts.

#### PAUPER DEPARTMENT

Each year the cost of supporting the poor of the City is greater than the year previous, on account of the high cost of necessities. I believe that the unfortunates who come under the charge of this department should be well cared for, and at the same time in a manner as economical as possible. I would recommend some improvements at the City Farm.

#### HEALTH DEPARTMENT

There were no serious diseases during the past year. We had a few cases of scarlet fever. This department is a very important one and extreme caution should be taken, as in the past, in the matter of contagious diseases.

#### WOODLAWN CEMETERY

The Cemetery has been well cared for during the past year and has been in charge of a competent Superintendent, William A. Rumery. Some minor changes have been suggested and they will receive my attention at the opportune time.

#### ASSESSING DEPARTMENT

The efficiency of this department has been kept up to the usual standard during the past year.

#### LEGAL DEPARTMENT

At present, so far as I am able to learn, there is no litigation pending. The dispute between Caroline V. Brown and the City has been amicably settled.

#### POLICE DEPARTMENT

We have a Police Department of which we might all feel proud, the expenditures of the department have been well merited. We have no jurisdiction in this department as it is under the supervision of a capable Board of Police Commissioners. The police force, under the direction of the Chief, has been very efficient. We should co-operate with them at all times. I would heartily recommend the purchase of a patrol wagon, as I consider it essential in a City the size of ours. I would also recommend the urgent need of a padded cell at the police station whereby dangerous patients could be held in restraint. In closing I would say that we must now begin our work as servants. We must not shirk the responsibility that has been placed upon us. We can either demonstrate that we are worthy of the confidence or show ourselves unfit for the trust imposed in us. Our efforts must be to give them good government, and that can only be secured by sincere regard for the people's rights, a wise and conservative management of their affairs and an untiring effort to the people's interests. We must not be actuated by any selfish motives but work together for the best interests of our City.



#### Horses

There are 9 horses in the department, 6 in good condition.

#### **Apparatus**

There are three steam engines, two hose wagons, one combination hose and chemical wagon, one hook and ladder truck, one Chief's Wagon and pung, two hose pungs, one

hose reel at City Farm, one hand engine and hose reel at the Pool, one hose reel at Fortunes Rocks, one hose reel at Pool Road near Morrill School, one invincible nozzle.

There is one dump cart, one set of sleds used in gathering waste.

#### Hose

There is 9,000 feet of two and one half inch hose in the Department. Of this amount 500 feet is at the City Farm, 500 feet at Fortunes Rocks, 300 feet on the Pool Road. There is 1,000 feet of two and one half inch hose and 200 feet of two inch hose at the Pool. I would recommend that at least 1,000 feet of new hose be purchased each year.

#### Fire Alarm

The fire alarm is in good working order. There is 13½ miles of wire, one half of which should be replaced this year.

A new box has been installed at the corner of May and Amherst Streets.

# Hydrants

There have been 10 Hydrants installed on the Kennebunk road.

#### Inspection

I have inspected 700 buildings and business places and reported the same to the State Insurance Commissioner.

Gentlemen:—In accordance with the requirements of the Ordinances of the City I hereby submit my report as Clerk of the Overseers of Poor, for the year ending, Jan. 31, 1917.

#### Pauper Department

Before entering into the details of this department, I would respectfully call the attention of the Board to the increased expenditure on account of the increased cost of the necessities furnished by this Department. The calls upon this department have been many and while it is necessary to practice economy it must not be denied that the unfortunates who come under the charge of this department must have proper food and care in order that their sufferings may be alleviated and this has been done. The high cost of living has been felt in this department more during the past year than ever before, as in the case of the individual who has occasion to attend to the articles of food. There is no actual suffering that we are aware of and we feel that in the care of our Poor we have done our duty.

## Report of Street Commissioner

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Biddeford.

Gentlemen:—I herewith submit my report as Street. Commissioner for the year ending January 31, 1917.

#### District No. 4—Cleaning Streets

The following streets were cleaned daily:

Elm from Mile Brook to Bradbury bridge, Lincoln from Elm to Main, Main from Elm to lower bridge, Water from Main to Talbot's store, Washington from Main to Jefferson, Jefferson from Washington to Alfred, Alfred from Elm Street bride, put on top plank on the Bradbury bridge; required 5 men and carts.

We also have one man picking up paper and rubbish on the streets and I would recommend the use of rubbish cans placed at corners of the different streets. These cans would aid materially in keeping the streets clean.

#### Gravelling

Graham street 55 loads, Alfred street 50 loads, West Street, Hill and Granite Streets 210 loads, South Street 700 loads, Western Avenue 350 loads, May street 35 loads. Myrtle Street 20 loads, Union Street 20 loads.

#### Sewers and Drains

New sewers have been constructed as follows:

Lafayette Street 800 feet of 12 inch pipe, West Cut's Street 96 feet 10 inch pipe; previous to the construction of the Summer Street Sewer, the old sewer was practically all relaid.

#### Pockets and Catch Basins—Built Over With New Brick

1 at the corner of Main and Elm Streets, 2 on Judge Street, 3 on Gove Street, 1 on Cleaves Street, 2 on Myrtle Street, 1 on West Cutts Street, 1 on extension of Graham Street.

On account of the heavy rains the hills on Hill Street, Foss Street and High Street were in a very bad condition and much work was done in order to make them passable.

#### Crushed Stone

We have crushed about 600 tons of stone, of which a number of tons have been sold, and 120 tons were used in repairing the State road.

#### Sidewalks

We have built cinder sidewalks on the following streets:

On Alfred Street from York's Court to George Fogg's residence, on Prospect Street from Harrison Avenue out beyond Mike O'Connor's residence, on Harrison Avenue about 300 feet, on Granite street, from Mrs. Richards' out to Mogan's place.

We have repaired brick sidewalks on the following streets: Gooch Street, 1500 bricks; South Street 800 bricks; Washington Street about 500 bricks; Cutts Street 400.

#### Granite Crosswalks

New crosswalks have been laid as follows:

1 on Pike Street, 1 on Seymour's Avenue, 1 on May Street.

#### Granite Curb Relaid

Extension of Graham Street 110 feet, Corner of Myrtle and Grant Street, corner of Gove and Judge Street, corner of Green and Birch Street.

#### Repairing Streets

Repaired State road on Elm Street from the Mile Brook to the Aaron Road.

#### **Bridges**

The following bridges were repaired:

Replanked the bridge on Gooch Street; replanked the Elm Street bridge, put on top plank on the Bradbury bridge; repaired the Somesville bridge.

## Report of Park Commissioners

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

In the year 1916 we spent the most of our appropriation in aiding the summer playground in Clifford Park, which we established last year. We received great help from the Thursday club, the leaders of which raised a sum of \$500.00 by public subscription to continue the work.

We put in considerable new apparatus, introduced the city water and bubbling fountain sanitary conveniences, and expended considerable money for grading the playground and improving the roads.

We built 200 feet of woven wire "manproof" fence on the west side of the park and surveyed that side, establishing its boundary. We have found it necessary to keep a man at work in the park, often alone and at a disadvantage, in order to prevent fires in the dry weather. We suggest that if this could be made part of the regular beat of an officer this expense would be unnecessary.

We did nothing on the Summer street playground this year, as a sewer was being constructed across it. The coming year this should be graded and enclosed by a proper fence. It was estimated two years ago by a competent engineer that it would cost about \$1,000 to enclose this lot with granite or concrete curbing.

We are again recommending for the safety of the pupils

of the Emery school the closing of that part of Acorn street directly in front of the school house. One child has already been killed in this section.

We respectfully commend to you the report of the playground given by the Supervisor, Miss Viola Campbell.

## Report of Biddeford Playground, 1916

Members of Biddeford Park Commission:

During the eight weeks of playground there were five days when there were no sessions because of unsuitable weather.

Eleven hundred and eighty-seven children were enrolled. The number last year was 693. They came from all parts of the city, a large number living at too great a distance from the playground to become regular attendants. The average was 222, compared with 175 for last year. The total number of visitors who registered was 380.

Our regular corps of paid play leaders was increased by two this year which made possible very much better organization and more varied activities for the children.

Above is the program which we used. Miss Carey worked entirely with the little children, first games, then story telling, folk dancing and lastly handwork. Last year there was no one to work especially with them, therefore, there were fewer and those who did attend, of course, did not derive as much benefit. Other groups, ages eight to twelve and from twelve up, were similarly organized. The only way to have a large regular attendance is by careful organization into groups according to age, etc., and by providing varied and interesting supervised activities. If more children come to the playground than can be looked after in this way, they cannot be counted upon as regular attendants.

One form of play which I consider very important is the creative or constructive. We had a class in handwork for each hour of the afternoon for the girls. I have known a great many children, regular attendants, to come primarily for handwork. Without that attraction they would not have attended. As a rule this class of children needs simple motor play and social plays. They can usually be induced to take part in these activities also. The boys on our playground have been neglected as far as creative play is concerned. I believe we should have had a much larger regular attendance of boys if we had provided handwork for them. My one male

assistant, Mr. Pidgeon, had no time for this work. There should be one more young man to take charge of handwork for the boys. This would permit very much better organization of the boys. To be sure, we made a small beginning this last summer. For a few weeks Mr. Norman Golding, caretaker, had a class of small boys in kite-making and the youngsters were most enthusiastic. In the four classes 153 pieces of handwork were made in all. The children paid for the materials used.

Folk dancing was a new feature and the Misses Carey and Ford were most successful in directing this activity. The Victrola loaned by the Thursday club furnished music. Eleven dances were learned by the children.

Over eighty different stories were told (not read) by the Misses Gove, Carey and Ford. They were most successful in holding the attention of their groups. The stories included folk lore, fairy tales, hero tales, nature and historical stories.

Miss Gove's class in nature study was a success. Every other day they went off for a walk collecting specimens which they learned to name and classify, seventy-six flowers being studied in all. A book "Wild Flowers Every Child Should Know" was presented to Miss Laurette Renouf for general excellence in this work.

The girls' athletic test was a new feature this year. Though only two succeeded in winning badges a large number profited by the different events which give poise and control over the body. Many more will be able to win badges next year. The winners were the Misses Eileen Kearney and Rose Bergeron.

Mr. Pidgeon's work is well known and needs no comment here. He made a specialty of baseball. The boys under his direction did some excellent work at the bar.

Of course there were games and games, each taught with a purpose beyond that of mere amusement.

Closing exercises consisting of a march by the Victrola, the Flag Salute, and the singing of a patriotic song were also a new feature. To draw the children together for these exercises and to induce them to join heartily in singing requires a great deal of tact and good leadership but I believe it is well worth the effort.

The bubble fount was much appreciated by all and also the new toilet. The grading was an improvement and still more needs to be done. The giant stride was a fine new piece of apparatus, furnishing excellent exercise. Several visiting the playground saw few at the slide compared with last year when there were commonly thirty or forty in line, and thought there were fewer children in attendance. That was not the case, but the children were more scattered, many being at the stride at the lower end of the grounds. New swings for the babies and for the older boys and girls were also appreciated.

As last year, a fine spirit prevailed among all the boys and girls.

It is my desire that the work which has been begun by the members of the Park Commission and furthered so unselfishly by them, the Thursday Club, and the citizens of Biddeford who responded so nobly on Tag Day, shall go on and on, growing larger and larger until wholesome recreation shall be provided not only for part of the children of the city for eight weeks in the summer but for every citizen for every week in the year.

## Report of the Public Library

To the Honorable Board of Directors of the McArthur Library Association.

The report of the Biddeford Public library for the year ending Jan. 31, 1917 is as follows:

The library was open 306 days from 10 o'clock a.m. to 9 p.m. The total circulation was 44,403 volumes. The largest full weeks circulation was 1,135 for the week ending April 8th; the smallest, 584 for the week ending September the 16th.

There were 415 new names registered; 43 of those deposited one dollar for the privilege of borrowing books.

Seven hundred and sixty-seven books were added during the year, exclusive of public reports; 298 were purchased from the city and state appropriation; 203 from investfunds; 116 from fine money; 95 were added by binding magazines; 55 were gifts.

The library was moved into its present home in Sept., 1902, and at that time owned about 6,300 books and pamphlets; it is now very crowded and possesses about 17,-400 books and pamphlets, before very long there will be the necessity of purchasing a new stack.

During the year 410 books have been rebound, 45 volumes worn out and withdrawn, 2 destroyed on account of infectious disease, 14 lost in circulation 3 of which were paid for by borrower 1 reported lost last year has been re-

turned, 24 books have disappeared from the children's room. Both reading rooms are largely patronized and some loss is unavoidable where so much liberty is allowed.

One hundred and twenty-five periodicals are received regularly, 33 of which are donated.

Among works of special importance added during the year are the following sets of books: "Library of Factory Management," 6 volumes; "Book of History of All Nations," 12 volumes; "The American Nation," 27 volumes.; and the final volumes of the "New International Encyclopedia". There have also been additions to the French and Greek collections.

The story hour on Saturday mornings has had an average attendance of 19 children.

Ninety-five pupils from the ninth grade and from the lower classes of the High school, who have not previously taken the course, have come to the library once each term, to receive instruction and drill in the use of reference books and other library advantages.

This is the third year that the library has offered this instruction and the object is to cooperate with the schools as a part of the educational system of the city, and give the young people a knowledge of and a pride in the possession of their own All-the-Year-Round university, as public libraries are now sometimes called.

I am sorry to report that only two of the rural schools have taken advantage this year of having the small traveling libraries each term for school and neighborhood use.

Transportation seems to be the chief difficulty.

The wild flower display was continued from April to October, showing 202 varieties during that time. We are indebted to the same old friends and to some new ones for specimens.

This collection has aroused the interest of children in collecting specimens in natural history, and other curious things that come under their observation.

In December, just before the holidays, a book exhibit was held in the Directors' room, showing the best children's books—old favorites in new attractive editions, and the latest books that have been recommended by competent judges as artistic in make-up and wholesome in influence. The exhibit was varied enough to please all tastes and all ages.



Gentlemen:—The Board of Police of the City of Biddeford, in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 625 of the private and special laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-three, have the honor to submit the following report of the actions of the department during the year ending January 31, 1917.

The Board recommends that an increase of twenty-five cents (\$0.25) a day be given to the police officers of our city, as the high cost of living is a hardship to our police officers as well as to other individuals. Secondly, we advocate that our appropriation be made larger because there is urgent need, on account of the increased automobile traffic, during the summer months, for a traffic officer at the corner of Elm and Main streets (Harmon's corner) so-called. Lastly, we advocate the necessity of properly patroling Clifford Park on Saturdays and Sundays of the summer months.
