During the past year the new school building in the village has been painted two coats and the grounds thoroughly cleaned, also some repairs on the well house. The hall building has also been painted two coats and walls and ceiling gone over with muresco which gives a much more cheering aspect to the interior. In the primary room new slate blackboards have taken the place of painted plaster. Storm windows have been put on the north and west sides.

The house at Lows Bridge has been painted two coats. Some plastering and other repairs done at the Brown house. Guilford Centre house has been painted. The Grover schoolhouse has been painted, much improving its outward appearance, new slate blackboards put in and a new stove, also a new out building and woodhouse have been built. After thorough examination of the house at North Guilford, your committee decided that it would be unprofitable to expend anything in repairs on it, and would recommend erecting a new building in that district this year.

There are many more repairs that need to be done but the committee decided that if the town voted to build a new schoolhouse it would not be best to recommend higher appropriations than were absolutely necessary and would therefore recommend the following appropriations:

#### Report of Superintendent of Schools.

In offering this report I desire in the first place to thank the school officers, teachers, citizens of the town and pupils for the respect, kindness and co-operation given me in the discharge of my duties the past year.

In entering upon the duties devolving upon the Superintendent of Schools, I was well aware of the responsibility resting upon me. It was not a new thing. I was also aware of the enviable reputation the schools of our town had attained under the direction of my predecessor and it has been my endeavor to keep them in the lead, or at least that they should not take any retrograde step; whether I have succeeded or not is for you to decide.

This is an age of progress and as much so in educational matters as in everything else. The superintendent who does not keep in touch with the methods of to-day is unfit for his position. The teacher who still holds to the methods of the past should be discarded and an up to-date one put in his place. The school buildings of the past will not do for to-day. The text books, the supplies and in fact everything connected with the educational interests of our children has made great and rapid strides in advance but the end is not yet.

It has been my endeavor to secure only wide awake, progressive teachers and with slight exceptions I think I have succeeded. In the village schools the same corps were retained that were in the schools when I came into the office, and I think I can safely say without fear of successful contradiction, that for earnest, conscientious, up-to-date work they cannot be excelled.

In our rural schools where it was possible I have tried to retain a successful teacher for the three terms, but sickness and unavoidable circumstances have prevented, yet in most instances their places have been well filled.

The reputation of our high school has not diminished but I think has taken a step in advance. At the commencement of the fall term we had the largest number from adjoining towns that have attended since the high school was instituted, there being sixteen, while several others have been attending the grammar grade preparatory to entering the High school. The whole number from neighboring towns has been twenty-eight.

At the Centre the children have raised funds and purchased a fine flag which was raised at the close of the spring term with appropriate exercises and an address by Rev. R. H. Aldrich.

Af North Guilford the children also have secured funds to purchase one which they hope to raise over their new schoolhouse.

I would recommend that you make a very liberal appropriation for supplies and appliances, as the rural schools are entirely destitute of maps, charts and globes which are an absolute necessity.

The whole number of scholars in town between the ages of 4 and 21 on April 1st, 1899 was 426. The highest number registered any term was 308.

The undersigned would call attention to the fact that families in which are contained any of the contagious diseases to which a physician has not been called are expected to report same to the Secretary of the Board of Health, and the penalty for neglect is as great as though a physician failed in the same duty. Not a case of whooping cough was reported and yet scarcely a family in town escaped a call. Through a non-reporting and in consequence of which the cases were not quarantined the disease spread with great rapidity and many of the children have sustained injuries which will last them through life. The same can be add of the measles which are prevailing at this time. From this time

on we shall hold the heads of all families to account for non-reporting and will not take "ignorance of the law" as a satisfactory excuse.

The abundance of contagious diseases necessitated the purchase of an apparatus for disinfecting and we accordingly secured a Robinson's Formaldehyde Generator.

#### Warrant for Town Meeting.

To Wm. G. Thompson, Constable of the Town of Guilford, Piscataquis Co.

#### Greeting:

In the name of the state of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Guilford, qualified to vote in town affairs to assemble at Guilford Hall in the village of Guilford on Monday, the 26th day of March, A. D. 1900, at ten o'clock  $\Lambda$ . M., to act on the following articles, to wit:

- ART. 10. To see if the town will vote that all taxes shall be collected and paid to the Treasurer in the following manner: one-third on or before July 1st, 1900, one-third on or before Nov. 1st, 1900 and the remaining one third on or before Mar. 1st, 1901.
- ART. 11. To choose a Collector of Taxes and see what method the town will adopt for the collection of taxes for the ensuing year.
  - ART. 12. To choose one or more Auditors of Accounts.
  - ART. 13. To choose one or more Constables.
  - ART. 14. To choose Truant Officers for the ensuing year.
- ART. 15. To choose Surveyors of Wood, Bark and Lumber and all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- ART. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay the Supt. of Schools, for each day of actual service or pay a stated salary.
- ART. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools.

ART. 18. To see what sum of money the town will refer repairs and insurance on schoolhouses.

ART. 19. To see what sum of money the town will yote to raise

a Free High school at the village.

ART. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise the purchase of school books.

ART. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise

for supplies and appliances.

ART. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for support of poor and other town charges.

ART. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise

to pay outstanding debts and interest on the same.

ART. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of roads and bridges and how the same shall be expended.

ART. 25. To see if the town will vote to raise twenty-five dollars the help pay expenses of Memorial Day and pay the same to C. N. Rand, chairman of committee of arrangements.

ART. 26. To see if the town will vote to have printed town reports

for the next annual meeting and raise money to pay for the same.

ART. 27. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for

fire purposes and electric lights.

ART. 28. To see if the town will vote to raise the sun of two hundred dollars or other sum of money to erect a hose house in the village on the old schoolhouse lot or elsewhere.

ART. 29. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen and town agent to prosecute all persons in town who violate the prohibitor law during the municipal year A. D. 1900, and to see if the sum of twenty-five dollars shall be raised to pay for the same.

ART. 30. To see if the town will vote to pay members of fire company the amount of their poll tax for serving in the fire company for the

ensuing year.

ART. 31. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to

pay for storing hose cart and hose for the ensuing year.

ART. 32. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of water pipe and to lay the same for fire purposes in the village and how the same shall be expended.
