#### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Brooks:

In accordance with the law I hereby submit my first annual report as Superintendent of your Schools.

The schools have been maintained for thirty weeks and the work accomplished is all that could be expected. An all day teachers meeting was held at the school building with Miss Florence Hale of the State Department as a speaker. Much good was derived from this meeting. It was found necessary at the beginning of the year to re-grade a large number of the scholars as many had been allowed to go into grades which were much too hard for them. Unless a scholar gets a good foundation in the fundamentals, reading, writing and arithmetic his work will be a discouraging proposition throughout his school course.

Certain tentative rules and regulations have been adopted which are necessary in a school of one hundred and seventy-five that would not be necessary in a rural school of twenty.

#### TEXT BOOKS

The schools are well supplied with books. A considerable number of new books having been purchased in the past year. It has been necessary to use the book appropriation also for supplies and rental of typewriters. It will be a great saving to the town when the school may own its typewriters, as a rental of \$3.00 per month on a machine that can be purchased new for \$70.00 is rather large interest.

#### REPAIRS

A considerable amount of minor repairs have been necessary this year especially, as nothing much had been done since the building was completed.

It was necessary to clean the floors and windows which had not been done before and to paint the lower walls where they had become badly soiled. Repairs were three times necessary on the pump, due to broken shaft.

#### ATTENDANCE

On the whole the attendance has been very good. Comparatively little time has been lost due to sickness. There have been cases of unnecessary absence and it has been necessary to resort in some cases to the truancy law. This is always unpleasant but sometimes seems the only course. It should be realized that our school year is short and that it is absolutely necessary for the scholar to get in practically full time to keep up to grade.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

In making the following recommendations for the ensuing year, I am submitting only what I believe to be very necessary and advisable.

First I would speak of the appropriation of \$250 for agricultural equipment in order to receive the benefits of the Smith-Hughes Act. For the ensuing year this will give us \$250 from the federal government in addition to what we already receive from the state and this amount from the federal government will increase as our agricultural course develops, and without further expenditure more than would be necessary any way to carry on this course. The appropriation of this \$250 does not necessarily imply that it must all be expended but it is a requirement that it shall all be available for this purpose. We are now well started with the commercial course which is very popular. We have been hiring typewriters for this course at an expense of \$3.00 per month. These machines are second hand. We can purchase new machines for \$70 each. Considering express charges this means an interest charge of approximately 40 per cent.

In making up the recommendations I have separated the text book account from the physical apparatus and supplies account. In the next report this will indicate more clearly how much has actually been expended for text books and how much for other purposes. It seems that it has been customary in the past to include various items in the text book and supply account. Note also that it has been necessary to purchase 12 new seats in the past year for the High School at a cost of over \$50. This amount had to come from the repair account. This literally was not a repair item as they were additional equipment and were not to replace old seats.

To summarize, I recommend the following appropriations:

#### REPORT OF HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

To the Citizens of Brooks:

It is with pleasure that I present to you this brief report of the conditions and some of the needs of our High School for the current year. The courses of study now offered are adequate in so far as appropriations will allow. However, you doubtless desire to improve the school, not only for the benefit of your own children, but in order that it will offer even greater inducement to children from neighboring towns, who already constitute sixty per cent of the fifty-two pupils in attendance.

I strongly recommend acceptance of the Smith-Hughes proposition, as Federal aid for agricultural education, under the provisions of this act, is bound to increase. Physical and chemical supplies, a few text books and at least three typewriters are also necessary.

An improvement which would have been highly desirable the past year, and which, no doubt, will be absolutely necessary with the opening of the fall term is an increase of floor space. The increased attendance, as you know, has obliged us to resort to the antiquated system of double seats; and no large body of pupils, nor any teacher, can be a highest efficiency under such conditions. While the room this year has been full to overflowing, there is a senior class of only five and a probable entering class of twenty-five. I would further recommend better preparation of students who are to take up High school work. No student can get what he should from a High school course without having a proper foundation, and. moreover, without this the work is made doubly hard for pupils and teachers alike. A more thorough preparation in English is a special suggestion that I would make to grade teachers, even though thoroughness would mean confinement to a narrower field.

In closing, let me thank you all for your co-operation in making our school work and our school activities a success.
