Since all the school children received physical examinations last year, it was not planned to do them again this year.

The local Health Council has been active in the public health program and in October entertained the health councils in Knox County for their second annual meeting. A stimulating and worthwhile

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program was planned and carried out, and a delicious and attractive tea served in the library.

I wish to thank the Owl's Head Health Council, health officer, school and town officials and members of the community who assisted in the public health program this past year.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Superintending School Committee and
the Citizens of Owl's Head:

Please accept my first annual report as your
Superintendent of Schools.

The town has been very fortunate in retaining the services of good teachers in its three schools. Their work is unusually fine. The attitude of the pupils is cooperative and courteous. Achievement tests show that a good quality of work is being done. It is gratifying to have good teachers who are willing to work in rural schools for a low salary.

The school buildings are in good condition. There are few rural schools that are as attractive and well kept as those in Owl's Head. The Ash Point building has been newly painted in a light shade of paint. This color makes the room pleasant and helps to save the eyesight of the pupils. All of the buildings are now equipped with oil heaters. There are some small repair jobs that should be done this summer. It would be a good idea to install a drinking fountain at the Ingraham's Hill school.

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Fire extinguishers are needed in all of the buildings.

Books, Supplies and fuel have all increased in price. It is necessary to request a larger appropriation to meet the cost of these items. There is need for an up to date set of reference books in each school. Some instruction in science is a necessity in these days of scientific developments.

The town should continue to set aside funds toward the construction of a new school building. There are bills before the State Legislature and the United States Congress which will furnish aid in the construction of new school buildings. The town should have its plans made so that it get the benefit from either or both of these sources of assistance.

I want to express my appreciation to the School Committee and the Citizens for their helpfulness and loyal support of the schools.

Gentlemen:

In accordance with Chapter 16, Section 3 of the Revised Statutes of 1944 and at your request, the records of the Town of Owl's Head have been audited by Auditor C. G. Hawes for the period January 1, 1948 to December 31, 1948 inclusive.

The examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards applicable in the circumstances and included all procedures which were considered necessary. Insofar as could be ascertained within the scope of the examination, the financial transactions of the Town appear to have been properly handled, with such exceptions as may be noted in the accompanying Comments.

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Exhibits and Schedules incorporated in this report present the results of the financial operations of this Town for the period designated.

A recommendation is also offered which is believed to be worthy of your consideration.

CASH—

Cash available for current expenditures at December 31, 1948 amounted to \$3,340.24 which amount reconciled with the bank statement of the First National Bank of Rockland as follows:

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An analysis of receipts and deposits indicated that all cash had been properly recorded and promptly deposited in the bank.

Expenditures were made by check and supported by warrants which had been properly authorized by the Selectmen.

TAXES RECEIVABLE—

The 1948 commitment of taxes, which amounted to \$20,591.00 was added and found in agreement with the warrant of the Assessors. Supplemental taxes in the amount of \$25.25 were collected. The balance due from the Collector on this commitment was represented by a list of unpaid taxes according to the records of the Collector.

There were no prior years' taxes receivable.

Requests for verification were mailed to a representative number of taxpayers whose accounts were outstanding at the year end.

TAX LIENS—

The balance of tax liens at December 31, 1948 was \$157.42. Payments received during the year appear to have been credited to the proper accounts. All tax liens on file with the Treasurerer were examined.

TAX ACQUIRED PROPERTY—

There was no change in this account during the year under review.

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CAPITAL RESERVE FUND—

The investments representing this fund were examined with the exception of the investments purchased December 30, 1948 which amounted to \$1,998.00. This amount was verified by a receipt issued by the First National Bank of Rockland and checks cancelled by the bank. This fund was established in accordance with a vote of the Town at the March 20, 1944 annual town meeting to be used for schoolhouse and town hall construction.

ACCOUNTS PAYABLE—

Teachers' pension deductions payable to the State Retirement System represents the accounts payable.

SURPLUS—

The unappropriated surplus of \$3,900.47 at the end of the year reveals a net decrease of 2,935 88. The major item contributing to this change was the high school tuition appropriated from surplus.

TRUST FUNDS—

The time deposits and the U. S. Defense Bond representing the Cemetery Perpetual Care Funds were examined. All income received appeared to have been properly accounted for.

GENERAL—

The bond of the Treasurer-Tax Collector was ex-

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amined and appeared to be adequate.

The overlay of 222.73 was within the 5 percent legal limit.

The 1948 excise tax receipts, No. 34030 to 34273, and those for 1949, No. 38501 to 38525 and No. 38531 were checked. It was ascertained that all collections had been deposited with the Treasurer.

A review of the valuation records indicated that most of the descriptions of the properties had been entered.

A test check of vouchers and pay rolls was made and it was noted that the school vouchers had not been approved by the School Committee as required by the provisions of Chapter 37, Section 78, Paragraph 2 of the Revised Statutes of 1944.

RECOMMENDATION—

It is recommended that the School Committee approve all school vouchers before presenting same for payment.

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TOWN WARRANT

COUNTY OF KNOX, ss:

To Avarid L. Walker, a Constable in the Town of Owl's Head, in the County of Knox.

GREETING:—

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Owl's Head qualified by law to vote in Town Affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall in said town on the 7th day of March, 1949 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following articles, to wit:—

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside over the Meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To hear and act upon the report of the Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the poor, Road Commissioner, Town Clerk, Treasurer, Tax Collector and Superintending School Committee.

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Art. 4. To choose three Selectmen for the ensuing year.

Art. 5. To choose three Assessors for the ensuing year.

Art. 6. To choose three Overseers of the Poor for the ensuing year.

Art. 7. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Art. 8. To choose a Tax Collector for the ensuing year.

Art. 9. To vote yes or no for a Road Commissioner and to choose a Road Commissioner if the vote is yes.

Art. 10. To choose a member of the Superintending School Committee for the ensuing three years.

Art. 11. To see what scale of wages the Town will vote to pay for the ensuing year.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Officers' salaries.

Art. 13. To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) to be paid to the State of Maine Pub-

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licity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.

Art. 14. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$65.00 for public health nursing in Owl's Head. Said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health, for local service.

Art. 15. To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sections 25 and 29, Chap. 20, R. S. 1944, as amended.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to restore as a town road that portion leading from the Philip Newbert residence (formerly Smith Est.) to the junction near the Etta Woodman residence and to repair same.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to reconstruct the wooden bridge on State Aid Road No. 2 over Cripple Creek. State Engineers believe it to be unsafe for heavy traffic and State and County Aid is available at this time. If this vote is "yes" this article will authorize a vote on the means of financing.

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Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise \$250.00 for the salary of the Superintendent of schools.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to install and maintain a hydrant on South side of Ingraham's Hill at culvert at the Charles Wooster place.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to raise necessary amount for fire hydrants.

Art. 21. To see if the town will install and maintain a light on Shell Street on the curve just below the Sunrise Cottage.

Art. 22. To see if the town will install and maintain a light on top of hill between the residences of Jennie Kirk and E. H. St. Clair.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to install a light and maintain same at the intersection of the main road and the so called Guptill road leading to shore.

Art. 24. To see what action the town will take with reference to raising the necessary money to cover the street lighting service.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 for the purpose of building two turn-outs on the beach road which goes from the Ash Point highway easterly to Crockett's Beach.

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Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to resurface the Lucia Beach road, beginning at the tar road and running to the Ethel Weeks line, also dig ditches and put in a culvert, where needed.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to except so called Guptill road a town road.

Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town roads and bridges.

Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Current Expense.

Art. 30. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Care of the Poor.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to pay transportation on the Wood's Bus, for the High School Pupils.

Art. 32. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Aid to Dependent Children.

Art. 33. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for snow removal.

Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to be expended on the cemeteries in the Town of Owl's Head.

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Art. 35. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Common Schools.

Art. 36. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for School Text Books.

Art. 37. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for School Supplies.

Art. 38. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for School Repairs.

Art. 39. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for High School Tuition.

Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to purchase a lot for the site of a new school building.

Art. 41. To see if the town will vote to construct a new school building and to see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the same.

Art. 42. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the town for State Highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State Apportionments.

Art. 43. To see if the town will vote to adopt the following in regard to the collection of Taxes: Taxes shall become due and payable on Aug. first

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of current year; a discount of 3 per cent will be allowed if payment in full is made within thirty days of date of tax bills; interest will be charged on all amounts unpaid after August first. Delinquents will be dealt with according to the law provided for that purpose. If vote is "no" some other method must be adopted.

Art. 44. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable and to execute quit claim deed on such property, and to advertise land or property in local paper prior to sale.

Art. 45. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue notes for temporary loans.

Art. 46. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town Hall at 9.30 o'clock A. M. for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
