Donald Lane of West Peru Primary, Violet Kazregis of the Union School and Rubina Vaughn of Peru Center have perfect attendance records for the past four terms. They did not miss a day for 51 weeks.

REPAIRS AND EQUIPMENT

The roof on the southern side of the East Peru schoolhouse was re-shingled. New blackboards were installed in the Union building. New door steps were built for the Union school. At the Knox school the roof was repaired to some extent but it will be necessary to do more next Summer if a school is continued in that district. The doors, windows and toilets of the Knox school were repaired also and some door steps built. As there was no furniture except two tables in this schoolhouse it was necessary to provide seats and desks for the pupils, a desk for the teacher, stove, water cooler and many smaller articles of equipment. All the equipment of the Union school was destroyed by the fire in December so there was nothing to transfer to the Knox. A few seats were required for some of the other schools because of increase in the enrollment of pupils. More of the appropriation was expended for equipment than for repairs.

The high school tuition list contains 27 names. The town paid tuition for that number of pupils for the fall term. This winter there are 26 attending high school and that will be the approximate number for the remainder of the school year. Next June about 6 will be removed from the list by graduation, decreasing the number to 20, but the same will be increased to 30 or more by pupils who will be promoted to high school from the eighth grade.

PHYSICAL EXAMINATION OF PUPILS

The annual physical examination of the pupils was made by Miss Ruth Woodward of the Public Health Nursing Service. Information concerning her work has been submitted to me by Miss Edith L. Soule, Division Director, of the State Department of Health.

The appropriation made at the last annual town meeting for State Department of Health for Public Health Nursing for Schools was \$50. This amount entitles the town to six days' service. To date Miss Woodward has rendered enough hours of service to equal four and one-half days. Before June, 1931, she will give one and one-half days more.

The examination of pupils furnishes the following items of interest:

Some parents do not understand how the number of defects can exceed the number of children examined. It is because one child may have more than one defect. For example, one pupil might have defects of eyes, ears, teeth and

throat. If the nurse finds such a case she scores that child with four defects. The defects found this year are as follows:

The nurse plans to make many home visits before the end of the year for the purpose of follow up work. The outstanding defects to be corrected as you will note are dental, throat and glands. As a rule the defects of glands are caused by defects of teeth or defects of throat.

A larger appropriation is asked for the coming year in order to employ another nurse who will devote entire time to school wok. There is as great a necessity for preventive work as for corrective.

BUDGET FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

Your School Committee and Superintendent have considered the needs of the schools for the ensuing year and submit the following budget for the annual town meeting:

The recommendation for common schools is \$1000 less than the amount raised last year because the unexpended balance is much larger than usual. The chief reason for the large amount on hand is discontinuance of transportation of pupils during the months when it was considered suitable for the children to walk to school. The sum asked for repairs and equipment is \$300 more in order to provide some new desks for the Dickvale School and repair the roof of the Knox. It will not be necessary to raise money for flags as the unexpended amount will meet the demands. The other items of the budget call for the same amounts raised last March. The

total amount of the recommendations is \$720 less than the budget of last year.

The financial statement of the schools is appended to this report. It was not necessary to overdraw any account except the one for repairs and equipment. After the destruction of the Union schoolhouse last December the Knox building was repaired and equipped. Consequently the expenditures of this account were more than anticipated at the last annual meeting. The total amount unexpended in the school department is \$1,178.63.

In closing I wish to thank all the citizens of Peru who have aided the schools in any way the past year.
