I have the honor to present for your consideration my fifth annual report of the condition and progress of your schools.

314 citizens have visited the schools during the year, 187 in the village and 127 in the rural schools. An average of 51 pupils have not been absent one half day in each term in the village schools and an average of 12 have not been absent so much as one half day each term in the rural schools. The average number of pupils to a teacher in the village grades has been 36, and in the rural schools 15.

RURAL SCHOOLS.

It will be noted from the above statistics that the number of pupils in our rural schools is slightly larger than last year. These schools are of good working size now, all having maintained an average of more than eight pupils except

the Brown district. These schools are graded according to the same schedule as the village schools and have succeeded in keeping well up to grade. In the Grover school the 8th grade is somewhat in advance of the requirements for that grade and I would suggest that they be given an extra study, agriculture, for the spring term. Some excellent text books are now prepared on this subject for the use of public schools. Classes are fitting for the high school in all the districts except the Brown. Care should be exercised that the grading of these classes be maintained so that they will reach the high school without loss of time.

I regret to report that Mrs. Winnifred Hayden, who has so successfully taught the Grover school during the past year, and Miss Edith Wise, who with equal success has had charge of North Guilford school, have signified their intention of giving up their schools. The Grover school, because of its size and the advancement of the older pupils, will require a teacher of considerable experience as well as one of good training and ability.

The town should vote to reestablish the school in the Brown district at required by law when the yearly average falls below eight pupils.

VILLAGE SCHOOLS.

The village grades and High school are at the present time doing their work extremely well. The resignation of Miss Ellis from our High school staff of teachers was a serious loss to the schools. Because of the high expectations held by her pupils regarding their work for the coming year the loss is the more severely felt by them. It is always unfortunate when we have to take inexperienced teachers to fill High school positions, but inexperienced ones are the only ones available at \$12.50 per week and even they will not accept these wages until all possibility of getting something better has vanished.

Mr. Higgins has proved himself a very fine principal for the High school. His services have been appreciated both by the pupils and the community in a marked degree.

The making of character is a very large part of education and by far the best part. A'High school principal stands for vastly more before his school as a man than as a scholar; his virtues must be positive, not negative, if his pupils are to respect them. Mr. Higgins has met these requirements most acceptably to all.

TOWN HALL SCHOOL.

During my five years of service as your Superintendent I have never failed in my annual report to call attention to the undesirability of having primary schools under the town hall. Those of you who are trying to rear your children in decency and morality, and that includes every father and mother, should rise in revolt when asked to send your children into this place for their early education. I have called your attention many times in the past to the whiskey bottles, cigarette and cigar stubs and tobaco quids that so often have littered the floor in the corridors where the children play. You yourselves can not have failed to notice the indecent figures and drawings that have been marked or cut into the walls in the lower hall way where your children assemble five days in the week. If you have not seen them your children have.

The decency of the public print does not allow me to describe what I have seen there within the past months.

Suffice it to say in one instance that a little girl, who in her home is being trained by her parents in purity, was here found standing upon the upturned trunk of a traveling show and amid the shouts and laughter of a crowd of little children, who were standing around, pointed out to them the details of the most filthy drawing I have ever seen any where.

In all my experience I have never seen any where a sight more revolting than this was. I will frankly say to every father and mother who now send children to the primary schools and to every one who expects to send children there in the future, that so long as this school is under the Hall, you may be very sure that your children will come in contact with these contaminating surrounding.

I think you will all agree that the grounds where your children play, the building in which they assemble and the rooms in which they study, should be as clean and free from objectionable features as the homes in which they live. Such a wholesome condition can never exist at the entrance to a public town hall, more especially an old one.

In closing this my last report to you as your Superintendent, permit me to express my deep appreciation for the cordial support given to me in my work during the past five years, especially by the business men of the town and school officers.

You have here one of the most progressive towns in Maine and you have always evinced a keen desire to have the schools the very best.

To do this you need a new school building for the lower grades, that building should be heated, lighted and ventilated by modern methods. In it there should be a room for Manual training and domestic science. Provide a good instructor for these subjects and then your schools will take a long step forward.

There are better days ahead for the schools of Maine. The progress of the past generation will be more than duplicated in the next. The campaign of progress is not only being carried on along the old lines but into many new fields. The school of the future will be a model from the standpoint of Sanitation. It will wage the fight against infectious and contagious diseases where alone education will be effective. It will co-operate with the business man, farmer, merchant and mechanic in training boys and girls to do the world's work better and with greater profit to themselves. In truth it will be the training school for the whole boy and the whole girl. We are going to ask for our children the very best and what that is to be each succeeding year will reveal.

Report of Board of Health.

To the Inhabitants of Town of Guilford:

Your Board of Health respectfully submit the following report. During the past year our town has been very fortunate in not having any epidemics of a serious nature. The few cases of contagious and infectious diseases that have visited us have been very mild in form, leaving no serious results.

We are very pleased to say that no nuisances were reported during the past year.

To every Person that offers milk or its by-products for sale in the Town of Guilford:

In order to protect the citizens of Guilford from the sale of milk and its by-products coming from tuberculous cows, the Board of Health of this town have drawn up by-laws which require owners of cows who offer milk for sale in Guilford to have their animals tested for tuberculosis once in every twelve months.

Whoever violates these rules is liable to a fine of not more than \$50 as provided by the Revised Statutes of the State of Maine. These rules not only cover the sale of milk but also the cream furnished the creameries and butter offered for sale.

Said rules have been approved by Wm. P. Whitehouse, Justice of Supreme Judicial Court and they go into effect at once, March 16, 1910.

The rules are as follows:

Guilford, Maine, February 23, 1910.

We, the undersigned:

The duly elected and legally qualified local board of health for the town of Guilford, in the county of Piscataquis and state of Maine, by virtue of and pursuant to the powers and duties given by the Revised Statutes of Maine, ch. 18, Sec. 30, paragraph 50, as amended by the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1909, ch. 130, have made and do hereby make subject to the approval of any justice of the Supreme Judicial court of Maine, the following orders and by-laws, to wit;

Section I.—Any person who shall own a cow or cows, the milk of which he

shall sell or offer for sale in said town in any quantity however small, shall have such cow or cows tested for tuberculosis by a registered veterinary surgeon, as least once in every 12 months. And whoever shall purchase a cow, the milk from which he shall sell or offer for sale in any quantity, however small, shall cause such cow to be tested as above provided, unless such cow has been so tested within 12 months prior to such purchase.

Section II.—It shall be the duty of such registered veterinary surgeon to give to the owner or owner of each cow so tested, a certificate in writing showing the true result of such test. And it shall be the duty of the owners of such cows to keep such certificate and exhibit the same to any member of the board of health in said town when requested.

Section III.—Whoever wilfully violates any provision of the above orders and by-laws, shall be punished by a fine not more than fifty dollars as provided in section 50, of said chapter 18, of the Revised Statutes.

These orders and by-laws are hereby approved.

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To Selden D. Rice, a constable in the town of Guilford in said county:

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Guilford, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall in said town on the fourteenth day of March, A. - ART. 10. To choose a superintendent of schools or to see if the town will vote to authorize the superintending school committee to elect a superintendent of schools.
- ART. 11. To choose a collector of taxes and see what method the town will adopt for the collection of taxes the ensuing year.
- ART. 12. To choose one or more auditors of accounts.

- ART. 13. To choose one or more constables.
- ART. 14. To choose truant officers for the ensuing year.
- ART. 15. To choose surveyors of wood, bark, and lumber and all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

 ART. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay the super-

intendent of schools for each day of actual service or pay a stated

- salary.

 ART. 17. To see what sum of money, the town will vote to raise for the support of schools.
- ART. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs and insurance on school houses.

 ART. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for purchase of school books.
- ART. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for school supplies and appliances.
- ART. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of poor and other town charges.

 ART. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay
- outstanding debts and interest on the same.

 ART. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of roads and bridges.

 ART. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of the sidewalk on Water Street leading to the depot, and other necessary repairs on old sidewalks in the village.
