

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Report of Audit, Town of Owl's Head

Augusta, Maine, March 4,1939.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Owl's Head:

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and to the Citizens of Owl's Head:

This is my seventeeth annual report on your schools.

Schools opened in September with no change in the teaching force. Early in the term, however, the illness of Mrs. Scammon made it necessary to secure a teacher for the remainder of the term at the Timber Hill school. The town was most fortunate in securing the services of Mrs. Bernice Sleeper of South Thomaston, who taught until schools closed for the Christmas vacation. Mrs. Sleeper did an excellent piece of work, pleasing alike to the school officials and the parents.

Miss Edith Grover, the teacher at Ingraham's Hill was called home in December by the illness of her father, and her place was taken by Miss Coffey during the last week.

Commendable progress has been made in all three schools. The teachers are faithful and efficient, they employ progressive methods of instruction and maintain orderly schools. There has been no serious disciplinary troubles this year. Miss Coffey assists

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the teachers and works diligently to perform her part of the teaching. There has been a good degree of cooperation between her and the other teachers. It is difficult at best for teachers to conduct two classes in a room at one time, but the plan has been a help in our system.

During the year some changes in textbooks have been necessary. The reading books were getting out of date, and have been replaced by the Elson Gray texts. The new books are highly recommended and seem to bring good results. It has been necessary to buy a considerable number of books. In the hands of small children, books are soon worn out and texts must be occasionally renewed if the pupils are to have adequate preparation for our rapidly changing society. Especially in a system where all grades are found in the same room, it is important that the pupils use the most efficient tools of learning.

The schools held graduation exercises at the Ash Point Chapel in June. These exercises were creditable to pupils and teachers.

At present some of the citizens are making plans, looking to a consolidated graded school. This is the most efficient type of school and one of the objectives desired by all educators. There would be a considerable expense and very careful study and planning would be necessary for the successful execution of the enterprise.

Another plan is the proposed grouping of grades. In this like the consolidated school, a conveyance system would be required. I know of no town that

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employs such a plan where the buildings are so widely separated.

There has been talk of a temporary school for the Grammar grades at the town hall. This would be very difficult if not impossible unless a real emergency existed.

These plans, however, are made in good faith and are entitled to respectful consideration.

The Parent-Teachers' Association is welcomed. It should be of great value by improving relations between school and home and in creating a sentiment friendly to improvement of the schools.

During the year various minor repairs have been made and some seats have been purchased. In the coming year more repairs will be needed especially on the sheds. More desks should be purchased.

Finally, I thank the officials and the citizens for their continued support and cooperation.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money, (suggested \$2,000.) to be used for no purpose other than a Consolidated School building. If the vote be "yes" to elect a committee of three (3) to be custodian of all money so raised.

Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a committee of three (3) to investigate and report at our next annual Town meeting on the cost, plans, location or other necessary details of a consolidated school building.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for construction of Roads and Bridges.

Art. 21. To see what scale of wages the Town will vote to pay the ensuing year.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the care of the Poor.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the Town refer O, a will vote to raise for Mothers' Aid.

Art. 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue notes for Temporary Loans.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Lights.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Officers' Salaries.

Art. 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of One Hundred and Thirty-Eight Dollars \$138.00) for the maintenance of improved sections of Third Class Roads, or to be used in conjunction with the State apportionment for construction.

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate for State Aid Road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sec. 19, Chap. 28, R. Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the Town for State Aid Highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State Apportionments.

To see what disposition the Town will make of a certain lot or parcel of land situated in Owl's Head, bounded and described as follows:—beginning at an iron pin driven into the ground on the northerly side line of Main Street (so called) and at a point eighty (80) feet, more or less, easterly, from Marsh Street, (so called) thence northerly one hundred and ninety (190) feet, more or less, to an iron pin in the

northerly side line of the shore and wharf property (so called) thence easterly on said northerly side line twenty-five (25) feet, more or less, to the shore of the beach at a stake; thence southerly by the shore to an iron pin twenty-four (24) feet, more or less, from the point of beginning; thence north 85 (degrees) west twenty-four (24) feet, more or less, to place of beginning and being the easterly part of the shore and wharf property.

Art. 34. 'To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for School Nursing.

Art. 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$450.00) to be expended on the five public cemeteries in the town, namely, Ingraham Hill, Ginns Point, Ash Point, Holiday Beach and Owl's Head village and if

the vote is "yes" to appoint a committee of three, one each from Ingraham Hill, Ash Point and Owl's Head village to have the care and expenditure of such money raised. Said committe to serve without pay.

Art. 36. 'To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of Fifty dollars (\$50.00) to be expended for the improvement of the triangular lot in front of Borgeson's store.

Art. 37. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for advertising our natural / Mono resources, advantages and attractions, under the provisions of Chapter 5, section 82 of the Revised Statutes of 1930, said sum to be expended under the direction of the Penobscot Bay Region Chapter of the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.

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Art. 38. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable and to execute quit claim deeds on such property.

Art. 39. To see what method the Town will vote to adopt for the collection of Taxes.

Art. 40. To choose an Appropriations Committee. This Committee to be comprised of the Board of Selectmen, School Board, and five, seven or nine voters. Said Committee to make annual recommendations for appropriations and present them at the annual meeting in the form of a budget for the Town's approval. Members of this board to serve

without pay.

Art. 41. To see if the Town will vote for a project.

Art. 42. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town Hall in said town of Owl's Head at 9.30 A. M. for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
