MAYOR'S ADDRESS

Gentlemen of the City Council:—

In conformity with the requirements of law you and I have each taken the oath prescribed by the Statutes of this State before entering upon the discharge of our duties for the ensuing year. This administration after having been in power for the two preceeding years finds itself returned to serve the people of this City for the next ensuing year by the largest vote ever accorded a party in a municipal election. Six of the seven wards of the City send representatives to this government who are in political accord with the views of the dominant party in this City.

Having thus been so emphatically indorsed by the taxpayers and business men of this City and having received at their hands such an expression of trust and confidence, it is now our plain duty to devote our energies and thoughts to giving the City the best administration of which we are capable. The expenditure of about one-third of a million dollars to meet the running expenses of the City is no small matter in itself. It is not your money or mine which we are to spend; but the taxes levied upon all and collected from all. We are simply entrusted in their expenditure. To run the different departments of the City successfully and to see that only so much money is used as is suitable for that purpose will require of each a constant alertness and a determination to fully know just how the money is spent, and to demand a full equivalent for every dollar of the City's money thus expended. Insist on the City's rights as much as you would for your own, insist on as favorable prices for supplies for the City as though you were purchasing for yourself. I believe every member of this City government has a desire to serve his City well and faithfully; that he realizes the responsibility resting upon him and that he is fully determined to use his best efforts to give the City a successful administration. I now invite your attention to some of the different departments of the City showing what has been accomplished in the past year and what it is hoped to do in the future.

MAYOR'S ADDRESS

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The tax rate this past year was reduced from 20 mills, where it had been for a number of years to 18.60 mills. Only twice since Lewiston became a City has the tax rate been lower, once in 1872 when the rate was 18 mills; the second time in 1886 when the rate was 18.50 mills. The several departments have been fully kept up to their standards. Besides the running expenses the following have been incurred by way of improvements: Three pieces of Hassam pavement, to wit, one on Main Street from Middle to Bates, one on Ash Street and one on Oxford Street, about 400 feet and paving from Lisbon to Park Streets on Chestnut. Two thousand feet of new hose have been purchased and two thousand feet of old hose have been relined. The City is installing a new lighting machine to light its public buildings. The contract has already been made in conjunction with Auburn for a new ten circuit repeater for the fire department. Two new water wheels have been put in our pumping station, the old and worn out wheel of the electric lighting station has been taken out and been replaced with a powerful one taken from the pumping station; wages totally increased more than \$11,000 over three years ago have been paid, and yet in addition to these improvements, and they will be discussed in detail in their separate departments, with the reduced tax rate, Lewiston will carry to the reduction of the City debt the sum of Twelve Thousand Eight Hundred an Eighty and 66.100 dollars.

At the close of our Municipal year February 28, 1909 there were \$27,597.01 in cash in the Treasury. I believe that a still further reduction can be made in our tax rate for the coming year and even then carry a satisfactory sum to the reduction of the City debt.

SCHOOLS

The schools of our City have been conducted so as to maintain their high standard of former years. Lewiston takes especial pride in her schools. Most of the School buildings are excellent and are in very good condition of repair. The repairs last year were thorough. The wooden sidewalks leading from the street to the school-houses were in many instances torn up and substantial concrete walks were laid in their places. Besides the steady going work of our day schools presided over by competent teachers we find the night schools doing a great deal for the young of our City who have been deprived in earlier

life of an opportunity to acquire an education. It is very interesting to note not only the boys but even young men, men well into the 20's who are taking advantage of the night schools to improve themselves and to watch their interest in their work. That the opportunity thus offered is appreciated in most instances is certain.

At one time during the past year it looked as though there would be a chance for the ambitious young men working in the cotton mills to obtain free instructions in textile matters, this could not have failed to be of assistance but the plans had to be discontinued and the matter temporarily dropped.

Lewiston spent on her public schools this year \$62,305.-43. There are 8,425 children of school age and there are but 2,595 that attend the day schools and 305 that attend the evening schools.

LIQUOR AGENCY

The liquor agency has been conducted this year by the committees of the Board of Aldermen. One committee would have charge of the agency for three months and then the second committee would have a like charge for three months and so on during the year. During the year a legislative committee investigated the agency system in the State. They visited the State agency at Portland and each one of the local agencies of the State. The evidence was published in the newspapers at that time. The committee visited Lewiston, examined the agent, fully looked his books over and published the evidence. From that evidence the people can form their own conclusions. I will, however, say that the profits of the liquor agency for this year were \$8,372.80 and I invite your attention to the following tabulation which shows the sales and profits for the last twenty years in the City of Lewiston so that each one by comparison may see what has been accomplished in this department.

The percentage of profits is 21% and to the interested I would suggest a comparison of results between this year and former years; and also a comparison with the other cities of the State as to percentage of profits to sales.

HIGHWAYS

The highways department of the City is always of interest. The fixed charges of this department such as wages to teamsters, feed for horses and the like is over \$20,000 a year annually.

Total 393 ft. besides the new cement walk laid around Elks Building and French Churches. This shows a part of the work of the Street Department. Much permanent work has been done: the paving has been kept so clean during the summer season as to be a matter of favorable comment by all. I recommend that as much of the appropriation as can be possibly spared be put into paving. The Hassam paving promises to be an attractive paving and seems to meet with the general approval of the citizens. This department has received very careful attention from the Superinten-

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dent and he has certainly conducted it very well indeed and deserves much credit for his honest, efficient efforts.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

This Department is thoroughly efficient. Numbering as it does among its personnel many who have been connected with it for more than a generation we find men who are thoroughly competent fire fighters. The good work of the fire department is recognized throughout the City and the neighboring cities of the State.

The total number of alarms to the department for the past year have been two hundred and twelve.

Making the total loss of 1908 less than that of 1907 by \$194.26.

During the early part of the year the sub fire station on Lincoln Street has been fully completed and its establishment is a source of added security to the residents in that part of the City. The men selected to man the apparatus there were all seasoned firemen.

The Board of Fire Commissioners of this City acting with the Fire Commissioners of Auburn, after an investigation lasting more than two months, and after having been duly authorized by the respective governments of Lewiston and Auburn entered into a contract with the Gamewell Company to install within ninety days from the signing of the contract a ten circuit repeater for the sum of \$2,795. The chief of our Fire Department and the Superintendent of Fire Alarms have for many years been advocating the purchase and installation of a new repeater system. Its absolute necessity has been demonstrated time and again, Lewiston will pay 60 per cent. of the purchase price or \$1,677. The exceedingly low price

at which this repeater system will be installed is due to the sharp competitive bidding of another company. The price at which the purchase was finally completed being nearly \$2,000 less than the first figures of this same Company.

Two more sub-stations are needed and doubtless in time available locations can be secured at reasonable prices.

The finances of this Department are always prudently and carefully managed and this year has known no exception to the Board of Fire Commissioners in the expenditure of its funds.

Two thousand feet of new hose has been purchased at an expense of \$1,400 and two thousand feet of hose relined at an expense of \$700. The experiment was tried this year of relining old hose. Instead of selling this old hose at a nominal amount, two thousand feet has been relined at a saving to the City of \$700 for a like amount of new hose. So far the experiment has proved successful.

POOR DEPARTMENT

Our Poor Department is a subject for careful consideration. The entire cost for this department for this year is

The continual business depression has been felt in this Department and is well illustrated by the fact that the number of families outside of the poor farm that have received assistance is 511 while the number of individuals receiving assistance as members of these families is 1,678, or about one in every sixteen of our population.

For the year preceeding the number of families outside the poor farm receiving assistance was 421 and the number of individuals receiving assistance as members of those families 1,394. The number of families receiving assistance outside the poor farm were 90 more this year than last. The number of individuals composing same were 284 more this year than last.

To this department are charged the support of the Insane at Augusta for which the City is liable. There were thirty-one at the beginning of this year for whom the City were responsible and thirty-four at the end of the year, so we find an increase of three. The amount paid by the City for these patients at the Insane Hospital this year

was \$3,125.80. Beginning Jan. 1st, 1910 however the State will assume the entire burden for the support of the insane.

The poor farm is not a suitable place in which to bring up those children who without any fault on their part find themselves objects of public charity, and it is a matter of congratulation to the City that it has such institutions as the Healy Asylum and the Girls' Orphanage located here, and frequently destitute children are taken there who would otherwise be obliged to go to the City Farm and the City has paid during the past year the sum of \$1,551.32 for board of the children in those places. Seventy-four persons have been deported to other States, Canada and even to Europe during the past year, the amount of the expenses being \$217. A large saving to the City was thus effected. Their pauper settlement was not here. So far, I have taken up that class of the indigent poor that live outside of the poor farm and now I will allude to those at the farm.

The number of inmates at the present time is 66 being 2 less than one year ago. Over \$1,000 were spent in repairs on the buildings the past year and many articles purchased for the use of the farm. A large cooking range and hot water tank was also purchased. The cost of running the City Farm this past year was \$11,235.79, an increase of about \$2,000 over the year before but this difference is accounted for in the repairs and purchases above alluded to. The amount of money turned into the Treasury from the sales of crops from the farm was \$1,163.78.

The farm raised this year 100 tons of hay, 19 tons of Hungarian, 125 bu. of oats, 700 bu. of potatoes, 100 bu. of turnips, 75 bu. of beets, 50 bu. of beans, 25 bu. of carrots, 6,000 heads of cabbages. 75 bu. green peas, 10 bu. onions, 50 bu. tomatoes, 10 bu. pole beans, 1 ton of squash, 1 ton of pumpkins, 150 tons of ensilage corn, 300 doz. sweet corn, 5 tons of straw and 25 bbls of apples. It requires a great deal of tact to manage the Poor Department. Cases of genuine necessity must always receive assistance. It is hard to discriminate at times. Mr. Labranche and his wife are certainly adapted to this work at the farm and Mr. Cronin is remarkably efficient in the discharge of the delicate duties as agent. To assist the bona fide in distress, to hunt out the pauper settlements of those belonging to other towns, to collect from them, to trace up State paupers and get the money back from

the State and transact the thousand and one duties of that office requires tact, patience, perseverance and good judgment.

ASSESSORS

We have been very fortunate in having this year as a member of the Board of Assessors and as chairman Mr. Geo. Pottle. A recognized authority on taxation he has endeavored to justly lay the burden of taxation. The Board of Assessors have given much time and have endeavored to treat all interests fairly. The people have paid their taxes promptly there being now less than \$7,000 of uncollected taxes for the year.

THE BOARD OF HEALTH

The City has been singularly fortunate in having no contagious diseases of any consequence this year. The collection of garbage has been transferred to this department from the State department. The Board is now purchasing its anti-toxine direct and for one-third of what it has been previously paying. The department is efficiently and economically conducted.

ELECTRIC LIGHTS

For years the question of replacing the water wheel at the electric lighting station has been advocated and finally this year one of the water wheels used for the Worthington pumps became available for that purpose and the change was made. We now have power enough to turn twice the shafting in the electric lighting station. Investigation was made with reference to buying a new electric lighting machine and it was purchased and is now in the station and will be ready for operation in the near future. The public buildings of the City will be lighted from the City plant and at an annual saving of about Two Thousand Dollars. The lines of wires have been overhauled during the past year and put into good condition. The superintendent and his crew have taken active interest and brought the plant up to a good condition of efficiency. It is also planned to put incandescent lights in the back alleys. The machine in process of installation being sufficient to generate lights for that purpose as well as for lighting the public buildings.

PUBLIC LIBRARY

A model report from the Librarian of the Carnegie Library contains much entertaining information. 5,319 more volumes were taken by readers from the library than during the year before. The total amount taken this year being 61,867. The whole number of days the library was opened being 303. The daily average being 204. Largest daily circulation being February 13th. 497. Smallest daily circulation being June 9th. 87. Number of volumes taken out by adults 46,981. Number of volumes taken out by children 14,886. Besides a large number of books in the English language (the number being about 1,400) there were 198 French books and 17 German books purchased during the year. The books in the library by actual count number 15,494. The library is well patronized and is certainly filling an important place in our civic life. As the years come and go this is more apparent and the City can well afford to appropriate the annual sum of \$5,000 for its maintenance.

WATER BOARD

The Water Board has been the scene of unusual activity during the past year. It has met and solved several important problems and has in view important extensions.

After several meetings with the Union Water Power Company it was agreed that the City should install two new water wheels for the Worthington pumps and repair the pumps and this the City did at an expense of \$4,520.-69. The Union Water Power Company on the other hand cancelled its bill of about \$3,500 for excess pumping and agreed to make no charge in the future for water used in excess of 600 Horse power. Tests were also made of the large users of water and in some cases it developed that the amount paid was wholly inadequate for the amount of water consumed and so the Water Board are trying to reach an amicable adjustment which shall provide for just compensation for water already had and a satisfactory basis for water to be furnished in the future.

The practical use of the by-pass installed last year was demonstrated this year when the water wheels for the Worthington pumps were being installed. The City below the canal was put onto the gravity system by the use of the by-pass, and the Dean pump, with both Worthington pumps out of commission, was sufficient to keep the pro-

per amount of water in the reservoir. The by-pass will prove of the greatest service to the City.

The Water Board have ordered the pipe to be laid to the City Farm and undoubtedly will lay the line of pipe from the reservoir for the accommodation of the residents in that vicinity. The pipe could be so arranged that when necessary to clean out the reservoir the water could be discharged by means of this pipe and not as now when a large number of takers must be cut off this side of the reservoir.

COLLECTION OF TAXES

The report of the Collector of Taxes for this year shows very gratifying results.

This is an admirable showing in that Department and shows not only the promptness with which our citizens have been ready to respond to the payment of their taxes, but also the tact, hard work and faithfulness of our collector.

INSPECTOR OF BUILDINGS

The Inspector of Buildings presents his report and it appears that last year there were built forty-six buildings which is a large number. He further reports that the contractors were very prompt in making changes to meet

his suggestions realizing that a strict compliance with the law might favorably affect the insurance rates.

POLICE MATRON

The police matron as usual has rendered valuable assistance to the police department and to the agent of the overseer of the poor. She is constantly busy calling daily at the homes of the persons requiring assistance along the line that she can furnish, and many instances are known where she has been of great practical help.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

The report of City Marshal Cailer contains many interesting facts.

The total number of arrests being 1416
By comparison with last year it appears
that the total number for that year was 1113,
or 303 more arrests this year than last.
The arrests for intoxication this year
was 1139,
or 246 more for that cause than last year.

The Police Department found 148 stores and buildings open, discovered 8 fires, issued 543 calls for the patrol wagon, recovered property lost or stolen to the amount of \$921.60, served 513 notices and found 41 dangerous places in the street. The Marshal has his department well in hand and did most efficient service in the Scott murder case. I am aware of no trouble existing in any of these Departments. There has been no friction during the past year. The heads of the different departments have taken great interest in their work the past year and have endeavored to do their best. The committee work has been excellent and the prevailing spirit is in the air among the members of the City government to do the best that they can in the coming year for the City. Last year the work was very harmonious in the City government and I trust that this year the spirit of good fellowship may attain to a great degree among the members and that a high standard may be the aim of each member to do the work well and faithfully for otherwise is the difference between success and failure. The City will not run itself. Each man must do his duty in the direction of the affairs of the City.

A large amount of building is again promised during the coming summer. The City is increasing by leaps and bounds. It is a center of trade and rapidly is attracting to it many neighboring towns as customers. With a natural tendency toward the City, the great mills in thriving condition, business conditions good, the coming year promises to be exceptionally good for the City which we are proud to call our homes.

And now, gentlemen, that we are about to enter upon our initial work of selecting officers for the different departments for the ensuing year, I shall be pleased to meet you in the rooms of the City government below and to enter upon our duties and trust that wise counsel may prevail and officers adapted for their work may be chosen by you.

To the Honorable Board of Trustees of the Lewiston Public Library.

Gentlemen:—The sixth annual report of the Lewiston Public Library covering the work of the year from February 29, 1908 to February 28, 1909, is herewith submitted for your consideration.

Fearing to weary you with a repetition of details, since the library has been conducted on the same general lines as last year, we have compiled tables of the various statistics, which will tell the tale as briefly as possible.

The total circulation of the year shows an increase of 5,319 over that of last year, with a corresponding increase in daily average work at the desk and in the reference department. The addition of Miss Eleanor Sands to our library staff has therefore been most grateful, for we have long felt that the work could not be properly carried on with our small number of assistants. Now we are able to maintain a better supervision of the separate rooms, to do more satisfactory work at the desk and to care for important items which have hitherto been neglected.

The rule has been made that during the busiest hours of the day someone shall be on duty in the children's room and another shall be ready for looking up references and taking charge of the other two rooms. It is our wish that the children's room shall never be without an attendant, for the realization that some controlling power is always to be found in the room given over to his use has a salutary effect upon the child; besides, he is happier to know that his questions will be answered and that books will be chosen for his needs than when he is left to his own devices. The same theory seems to fit the other departments of the library; and it is gratifying to note that of late the spirit of law and order has been much more apparent among both old and young visitors of the building than has been the case in previous times. The quiet of the reading rooms is almost unbroken now-a-days, and deeds of vandalism are on the decrease. Naturally, it has been a great relief to know that every day there is some supervision of the different branches of the work and that the children are not neglected, as they often had to be, while reference seekers or desk attendance took us all away from the vicinity of the young people.

We are one and all anxious to express our thanks to the trustees for this increased aid; and it is hardly

possible to emphasize too much the efficiency and faithfulness of those who have the work in hand. During the last two and a half years there is, we believe, no instance on record of any trouble between them and the public—a fact which speaks much for both sides.

It may not be out of order to state that the utility of the magazines in the reading room would be greatly increased if the files could be completed. The gaps in the numbers of volumes need filling and the value of our reference work would be doubled if the missing ones could be added. Recently we have been able to obtain some few volumes, by exchanging some of our unused and unbound magazines for others of more value to us, but there are still great deficiencies in the department. Possibly some of the readers in Lewiston might help the matter and also rid themselves of a useless burden, if they would contribute to the library some of the periodicals which they do not care to bind for themselves, but might always consult upon our shelves. "Whether a public library be large or small", says the late librarian of the Congressional Library, "its value to students will depend greatly upon the care and completeness with which its selection of periodical works is made and kept up from year to year."

Among gifts to the library should be mentioned a valuable engraving, representing the signing of the treaty of peace between the United States and Spain at the conclusion of the Spanish American War. This picture, sent by the Honorable Whitelaw Reid to Senator Frye, was by him given to the Lewiston library, where it is prized, both on account of its donor and its historical import. In addition to his usual generous presentation of government publications, Senator Frye has recently sent to us a rare set of books, the "Journal of the Continental Congress", twelve volumes of which have been issued by the government up to this date. It is an expensive and important work, only one copy of which is provided for each congressman, and it contains data of the utmost value to the student of history.

Two valuable acquisitions are the "History of the district of Maine", by James Sullivan, with a map of Main dating from 1795, and a copy of the "Frontier missionary", by W. S. Bartlett. These were purchased by the library and may be seen in the office of the librarian, where they are kept.

Since Miss Sands has been with us we have finished the long task of copying the children's catalog and filling it with the larger one, so that now we have a complete record of the classified books of the library for consultation by the general public. We have made a beginning of classifying and writing cards for the mass of government documents and pamphlets in the upper stack room, and hope before long to have everything systematized for much needed reference. A list of un-

bound magazines has been made; the record of subjects corrected and kept up to the present time; and the borrowers' cards have been revised. A catalog of fiction for printing is in process of making and the books in the library have been counted by means of the corrected shelf list.

Last May, when we had assistance at the desk from Misses Laura B. Stetson and Shirley E. White, we completed the inventory of the books, taken then for the first time since 1903. Statistics of this inventory are given with the other particulars of the library administration.

During the month of January we had with us Miss Jessie Wright as a student of our methods; and she proved a helpful assistant. In the city are now three beside the library force who understand the desk routine and can be called upon in case of emergency. This may some day be most convenient.

The new French and German books have met with the heartiest of welcomes; and it would be well if we had a few more German books of a popular nature. They would certainly be read and reread.

For concluding particulars we beg to refer to the following summaries, which we trust may prove satisfactory to all concerned.

The Library was opened to the public February 9, 1903. The circulation during the remainder of February was 4,511 volumes.

A careful examination of the report will reveal the fact that there have been circulated among our readers 5,319 volumes more than during the preceding year, the largest daily circulation being 497 and the smallest 87.

It is most gratifying to us that we are permitted to add to the library each year quite a large number of volumes, and the past year has been no exception to the general rule, the addition having been 1,438. We have found it advisable to provide Miss Gilmore with an additional assistant in order to better convene the patrons and maintain a greater degree of efficiency in the management of the affairs that seemed to us to demand our attention. There has been a very marked improvement in many directions and some of them have been referred to in the Librarian's report, as you will readily see upon a careful reading. Additional insurance to the amount of five thousand (\$5,000) dollars has been placed upon the property after careful consideration. Once again we avail ourselves of this opportunity to invite the attention of all lovers of good literature to assist us by recommending any good reading material that will be in any way helpful to the reading public. Our Librarian is constantly investigating these matters, but will gladly receive information from our people that will assist her in bringing to our attention the consideration of purchasing of useful and helpful literature that will, in any degree, help us in providing good food for thought, study and improvement, not only in the minds of our younger element, but of all. An error was made in preparing the financial report by the omission in footing of an item of \$1.70 on a bill of the Electric Light Co. which presents a difference of this amount between the Librarian's account and that of the City Treasurer pertaining to the annual expenditure. We always aim to have these matters agree and this is the only instance where there has been an error of this nature. This is regretted by no one more than by Miss Gilmore.

Gentlemen:—I herewith respectfully submit the following report of the City Farm and almshouse for the year ending February 27th 1909.

This season the crops have been fair for such a dry season as we have had and I have been able to turn to the City Treasurer the sum of \$1,163.78.

We raised 100 tons of hay, 19 tons of Hungarian, 125 bushels of oats, 700 bushels of potatoes, 100 bushels of turnips, 75 bushels of beets, 50 bushels of beans, 25 bushels of carrots, 6,000 heads of cabbage, 75 bushels of green peas, 10 bushels of onions, 50 bushels of tomatoes, 10 bushels of pole beans, 200 bunches, 200 heads of lettuce, 1 ton of squash, 1 ton of pumpkins, 500 cucumbers, 150 tons of ensilage corn, 300 dozen ears of sweet corn, 5 tons of straw, 25 barrels of apples.

During the year a new cooking range and hot water tank have been installed for kitchen use. And over a thousand dollars for repairs on buildings, one new rack, one set of heavy wheels, one new potato digger, one new seeder, one new cart-body, 25 acres of new land, 30 acres of land ploughed ready for Spring use, one new set of double harnesses, 1,000 loads of manure, and ready for Spring use, 1,500 loads of cotton waste. Disposed of one old horse.

The ice-houses have been thoroughly repaired and 560 cakes harvested without any expense to the city.

I have had 1,000 feet of mixed lumber sawed out for necessary repairs about the farm.

Through the courtesy of Geo. W. Bean, agent of the Androscoggin Mills, and Libby & Dingley, I got all the cotton waste from their mills for nothing. I wish to extend to these gentlemen thanks for the same.

The health of the inmates has been fair this year, there has been eight deaths this year, and the number of inmates is 66.

In conclusion I wish to thank Mayor Morey, and

Board of Aldermen as Overseers of the Poor for their kindness and advice, during the year, and to P. J. Cronin their clerk, with whom it has been a pleasure to cooperate, to look after the poor, Dr. R. J. Wiseman the City Physician, the City Marshal, and all the other City Officials with whom I have come in contact, in doing my work.

Annual Report of the Overseers of the Poor

Office of the Overseers of the Poor

Lewiston, Maine, March 1st, 1909.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council.

Gentlemen:—The annual report for the year ending with the above date is hereby submitted to you in accordance with our usual custom and agreeable to the City Ordinances.

Herein will be found a statement of receipts and the monthly expenditures of this department, a record of the number of persons and families, that have been helped, the cost of supporting the insane patients at Augusta, board of children at Healy Asylum, at the Hospital Annex, and private families, board of old soldiers, cost of maintaining the outside poor, also cost of maintaining City Farm.

The continued depression in the general business of the country has made greater the necessities of such as almost every year have to seek public aid, and while it has added thereto a great number who hitherto have been able to provide for themselves by the product of their own labor, but lessened incomes and advancing years have brought quite a good many families to the end of their resources and made it imperative that they apply for such aid as could be obtained at our hands. In consequence of this we have been obliged to assist a number of families who, under ordinary conditions would not have found it necessary to apply for public aid.

There is little reason to hope for any marked decrease in pauperism in Lewiston, for we have with us now all the elements that go to make a metropolis. Our very liberal ideas of benevolent assimilation bring to us people that do not readily assimilate, a large number of people who for a long series of years, have been residents here and have now reached that period in life when they are able to do little or nothing for their support; who for numerous reasons have not accumulated anything in their active life and are now compelled by the

direst poverty to seek their support from charity almost entirely, and public charity gets its full proportion of this class.

There is too an increasing element of those who ought to support themselves and their families, but their intemperance habits are such that a large portion of their time is spent in the county jail, and their wives and children must receive support at the hands of the Overseers of the Poor. Also many families have received aid this year, who have been deserted by their husbands or father, this class have greatly increased, and our legal obligations to them are by no means great, humanity only prompted us to aid these families in their distress.

The entire cost for this department for the year has been \$31,221.79.

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sundry persons for the support of their relatives or friends at the Insane Hospital and from produce sold from the City Farm and receipts from State for support of non-settlement paupers.

OUTSIDE POOR

Under this head are included all persons who have received supplies of groceries, fuel, rent, board, shoes, medicine, etc., exclusive of City Farm, Insane Hospital, Hospitals in City, Board of old soldiers and children. The number of families in this class is somewhat in excess of any previous year, but the expenses for their support is very materially decreased from the amount expended for the previous municipal year. The reasons are that a more careful discrimination has been exercised and measures have been taken and enforced that made it necessary for many of them to make greater effort for their own support.

The conflicting opinions existing relative to the expediency of rendering aid to any outside poor outside of the almshouse makes it imperative that aid should be given to such as live in their homes, however humble and poor such homes may be. That some obtain aid under the present system who are unworthy there is not much doubt. The chief argument of quite a good many of these is that they are as needy as some of their neighbors whom they know to be receiving public aid, and there is no doubt their reasoning is correct. It has been my aim to get as near to what is the real conditions of each person or family as possible and in this I have been generally successful. But when it comes to widows with a family of children and none of them able to do anything to aid to the support of the family of which they are members, there can be but one answer to the question as to whether such families shall receive assistance or not, and the answer must invariably be in the affirmative,

and this is also true of old people, wholly incapable of labor of any kind.

During the year 511 families and 1,678 persons of this class have been helped.

INSANE PERSONS

In numbers and cost of support in the Insane Hospitals, this class increases every year. The power to prevent it is not vested in our Board or any other person or organization. People will become insane and throughout the entire country, if not the world, insanity is increasing to a degree that is almost if not quite alarming.

After considering the burden of cost of our Insane and the State having splendid institutions for them, I with other Overseers of the Poor took up the matter, and after considerable time and labor had a bill passed by the Legislature of 1907, whereby, that on and after Jan. 1st, 1910 the State will bear ALL the expense of those in the Insane Hospitals at that date and all committed thereafter, thus after Jan. 1st, 1910, we will be relieved of this expense which I think is only just, and that the State should assume all the expense.

At the beginning of the year there was at the Insane Hospital at Augusta for whom the City was first responsible 31 patients.

During the year I have collected from towns, friends and guardians for the support of the insane \$364.53.

AID AND BOARD OF OLD SOLDIERS

The care for the old soldiers continues to increase somewhat in cost, on account of the class of men who seek the relief which doubtless a well meant enactment was designed to afford. But it does seem somewhat incon-

sistent on their part to receive a fairly liberal government pension and then to expect the town or city where they have a legal residence to furnish nearly their entire support. Patriotism and sentiment are all right and are qualities we should all possess, but the demands of some of those with whom we have to do are unreasonable and when the time comes for the quarterly pension they make no provision to better their condition, and the city has to continue to furnish them as before.

As previously shown the sum paid for board of old soldiers is \$1,706.20.

Besides many families of this class are receiving aid at their homes.

BOARD OF CHILDREN

It has been so well demonstrated that the City Farm is not the proper place for young children that the Overseers of the Poor within the past few years have been providing homes and paying board for such children as may from time to time come under their care, either from loss of parents or parent to properly provide for them. Some of them being provided with permanent homes or being boarded at the Healy Asylum and at the Hospital Annex and in private families. Many take advantage of this plan and have their children boarded at cities' expense when if they were to be sent to the City Farm they would make some effort for their support, and therefore lessen the burden of the City. After a careful investigation I find that no city or town in the State is boarding as many children as Lewiston. I also find that many cases where we are called upon to take the children, is caused by intemperate parent or parents and in many cases desertion, the children must be cared for but I would recommend that a more stringent rule be adopted by the board so that aid be furnished only to the most worthy.

The amount paid for board of children for the past year has been \$1,551.32.

STATE PAUPERS

Persons having no settlements in the State we designate by the above name. This class of persons are a continual source of expense to the City, and more and more every year are their numbers increased, and with the as-

urance worthy of all praise they claim support from the public farms when they never in any way contribute in the least to the public benefit.

For the support of non-settlement persons, the Legislature of 1903 enacted a law making a charge upon the State, again the Legislature of 1905, strengthened the enactment of 1903, so that in future years the burden of support of this class will be borne by the State instead of the municipality where they may be the recipients of public charity. Such a measure seems only reasonable in view of the fact that all or nearly all of these persons and families are in the larger towns and cities of the State and scarcely any in the agricultural towns who have to support those only who have pauper settlement in their towns. In order to place the burden of their support on the State requires a lot of hard work, and proof of their non-settlement, and sworn affidavites presented to the Governor and Council this I have been able in nearly all cases and presented such proof affidavites and bills to the Governor and Council who after due consideration have allowed the same and paid for this department \$832.09.

TRANSPORTATION OUT OF THE STATE

This has been a remarkable year for those who have been sent away at the expense of the City. To save the expense of their support, 74 persons have been sent to other States and to Canada and Europe, involving an expenditure of \$217.00. Many of this class have no settlement in the State.

I found on investigating the condition of such persons that the prospects for self-support was such as to warrant even the expenditure of a large amount if necessary in order to rid the City of their future support.

HOSPITALS

As previously shown the amount paid for our sick at the Hospitals, is \$706.35. This class seems to be on the increase. The calls on this department have been very many, and every case has been looked into and assistance rendered where most needed. Many have been disappointed in not being assisted by this department for aid of this kind which if rendered makes of them paupers where they may be treated at the hospitals by

consulting and making their own arrangements with the management.

There is no doubt a great amount of work done by the hospitals of our city for which they receive no compensation. The State each year makes an appropriation for them and our worthy poor should certainly be entitled to some consideration.

CITY FARM

The care and protection of our people at the City Farm, is a matter in which all good citizens are interested, and it is with great satisfaction that we announce that in no instance have we known any ill treatment to any of our people there. Cleanliness, order and harmony have prevailed and a general homelike appearance has been manifested throughout the year.

The Superintendent and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. Cyrille Labranche, are peculiarly adapted to the places they occupy, and although the expenses have increased for the past year, the number of inmates have correspondingly increased. Quite a number who have been assisted among the outside poor have during the past year sought a home there which of necessity must be their only home until the weary wheels of life stand still.

The large number of inmates and the number of old and sick persons to be provided for together with the needed extensive repairs, made this year in the buildings at the City Farm, brings expense of maintaining this branch of the department for the year just closed to \$11,235.79.

The City Government of this year have purchased pipe for a water main to the farm to be laid this coming year, this will of course necessitate quite an expense to this department for piping the buildings but it is something that is very much needed as it will be a protection in case of fire and also better water for the inmates.

To Superintendent and Mrs. Labranche I wish to extend my thanks for the able manner in which they have managed the affairs of the farm.

I wish to say that I have had an opportunity to see the workings of this branch of the department in all its details and wish to say that Mr. and Mrs. Labranche have taken a personal interest of all under their care and in every matter connected with the City Farm he has consulted this office at all times when the occasion re-

quired and our relations have always been the most pleasant and everything has worked in harmony for the best interests of the tax-payers of our city.

CITY PHYSICIAN

This department has cared for a large number of sick people during the last year. The calls for medical treatment have at all times been promptly attended to by Dr. R. J. Wiseman, and many thanks is hereby tendered to him for the prompt and energetic, and efficient manner in which he performed his duties as City Physician.

POLICE MATRON

The work and services of our Police Matron, Mrs. Catherine V. Tracy are so well and favorably known that no words of mine can add to her good name. Some of her work is done indirectly in the line of this department and while she has saved much more than her salary in this department alone, she has done an inestimable amount of good where no one else could reach. She is deserving the highest praise for her devotion to her work and faithfulness in the discharge of her duties. We hope and expect she may be returned for the coming year and if it be so we bespeak for her greater success because of the experience of the closing year.

In conclusion I wish to thank Mayor Morey and the Board of Overseers of the Poor for the many courtesies extended to me during my term of office and City Solicitor, William H. Hines for his council and advice upon matters of importance, also City Marshal Cailer who never failed to give help when needed. The difficult and delicate duties I have tried to perform in such a manner as to protect the interests of the City and at the same time render such aid to the poor that no reasonable person could complain that I had dealt harshly or unjustly to them I have undoubtedly made some errors in judgment in dealing with the hundreds who have sought aid from the City, but I have endeavored to do my duty, and if to err at all, to do so on the side of humanity.

Report of Chief Engineer of Fire Department

To the Honorable Board of Fire Commissioners.

Gentlemen:—Herewith I have the honor to submit to you the annual report of the Fire Department for the municipal year ending February 28, 1909.

MANUAL FORCE

The present force of the Department is as follows: Permanent men:—One Chief Engineer; One Superintendent of Fire Alarms; One Driver Hose No. 1; One Hoseman Hose No. 1; One Driver Chemical No. 1; One Tankman Chemical No. 1; One Pipeman Chemical No. 1.

Call-men:—Four Assistant Engineers; One Department Surgeon; Two Enginemen; Two Stokers; Forty-six Hosemen; Fifteen Laddermen; Six Drivers; Four Fire Police.

The total value of property involved in fires, the amount of insurance thereon, and the losses entailed for the year ending Feb. 28, 1909, are as follows:

There were 59,750 feet of hose laid, 2,431 gallons of chemicals used, 1,670 feet of ladders used and 259 miles traveled by the Department during the year.

BUILDINGS

The building on Lincoln street which was secured last year is now occupied by Hose Co. No. 4. The apparatus rooms in the Central Fire Station on Ash street and the Park street Station should have new floors. The store house at the Central Fire Station, Ash street needs repairs, otherwise the buildings are in good condition.

APPARATUS

The coal wagon has been repaired and is used by Hose Co. No. 4 as a hose wagon. Hose wagon No. 1 has been varnished, the exercising wagon has been repaired. This leaves the apparatus in good condition except such pieces as need paint and varnish.

The Apparatus is as follows:

- Two Steam Fire Engines
- Four Hose wagons
- Two Hose Reels
- Four Hose pungs
- One second sized Aerial Ladder Truck
- One steel frame Hook and Ladder Truck

HOSE

We now have on hand 13,400 feet of cotton rubber lined hose, of this 11,250 feet is serviceable, and 2,150 feet is unserviceable for Fire Department use, 100 feet of condemned hose was sold to Street R. R. Co. During the year 2,000 feet of hose was purchased and 2,000 feet re-lined.

HORSES

Seven horses are owned by the Department. No changes have been made.

RECOMMENDATIONS

In order to increase the efficiency of the Department I will repeat the following recommendations:

A permanent team for the use of the Chief Engineer of the Department.

A permanent team for Engine No. 3 and Hose No. 2 of the Central Fire Station, Ash street.

A permanent team for Ladder No. 2, Park street Station.

A three horse hitch for Engines Nos. 3 and 4, Chemical No. 1, and Ladder No. 2, to be used in hard travel.

The purchase of 2,000 feet of cotton rubber lined hose.

The purchase of two new hose wagons and one hose pung.

A Fire Station should be located in the vicinity of Frye street and one near the Sisters' Hospital.

Four new Fire alarm boxes should be placed: one at the corner of Skinner and Wood streets, one at the corner of Howe and Ash streets, one on Wood street near new High School building, and one at the corner of Chestnut and Lisbon streets.

The installing of a tower bell striker in the tower of the Grammar School building on Horton street.

The increasing of the membership of Hose Co. No. 4 from five to ten men.

REPORT OF

Superintendent of Fire and Police Alarms

**To the Honorable Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the
City of Lewiston.**

Gentlemen:—I have the honor of submitting herewith my nineteenth annual report for the year ending February 28th, 1909.

The full number of alarms received at the Ash Street Engine House was 259, of which Lewiston had 75 box alarms, 13 Chief's calls, 118 telephone and 6 still alarms. Total 212.

Auburn had 23 box and 24 Chief's calls. Total 47.

The working of the system during the year has been very satisfactory, with a few exceptions, when it has failed to register correctly, owing to long lines and wet weather. There have been few breaks and burnouts.

No new signal boxes have been added in either city.

A new combination indicator and gong has been installed in the central station on Ash street; and the old indicator and gong transferred to the new hose house on Lincoln street.

In the way of permanent improvements, the Fire Commissioners have acted on my recommendation, made for the past five years, and contracted for a ten-circuit repeater, complete with batteries, test instruments, charging board and protector board. After this system is installed the cost of maintenance will be no greater to the cities than with the old system, for the reason that the cities will own the entire system, while formerly they have been obliged to rent a part of it.

I would recommend that new platinum contact springs be put in all the boxes in place of the old flat spring contacts. This improvement would not be expensive and would add much to the reliability of the boxes.

I recommend new signal boxes in the following locations:

At the corner of Wood and Skinner streets;

At the corner of Ash and Howe;

At the lower end of Bartlett St. or vicinity.

I wish again to call especial attention to the great need of placing small and inexpensive signal boxes on the outside of City Hall and every theatre and school house in the city.

The following is a list of apparatus, wires, tools and materials in my care: In Lewiston: one three-circuit repeater, 42 signal boxes, 1 combination gong and indicator, 2 engine house gongs, 2 engine house indicators, 1 stop clock and register combined, 2 door openers, 3 strong current protectors, 5 galvanometers, 3 switch boards with switches, 236 cells of storage battery, 1 tower bell striker, one 2,000 lbs. bell, 1 compressed air whistle plant, 14 mechanical gongs, 2 electric light emergency switches, 75 glass jars, about 30 miles line wire. At the new house on Lincoln street, one instrument board, recently installed and equipped with main line indicator and gong, stall door opener, electric light emergency switch, trap opener and push button and bells to the several rooms. A telephone system consisting of three sets of instruments connecting the Chief's residence with the Ash St. Engine House and the Hook and Ladder House.

In Auburn: 25 signal boxes, 1 combination gong and indicator, 1 combination indicator and vibrating bell, 1 tower bell striker, 2 door openers, 10 mechanical gongs, 1 automatic line cut-out, 15 miles line wire, private mill circuit, consisting of 5 signal boxes, 1 engine house gong, 10 electrical mechanical gongs and about 7 miles of line wire.

The police system consists of: 4 circuit central office apparatus bell and register for stable, 11 street signal boxes, 13 sets Bell telephones, 68 jars of battery, 6 miles line wire.

I recommend for the police department, first, a thorough repairing of the lines and the telephone system and the purchase of a time stamp for the central office.

Tools and materials include: five ladders, 1 set digging tools, 1 hatchet, 1 draw-shave, 1 hammer, 1 hand saw, 1 monkey wrench, 1 soldering torch, 2 hand baskets, 3 brick drills, 1 angle bit brace, 3 chisels, 4 iron brackets, 4 iron pins, 10 glass insulators, 25 porcelain cleats, 20 porcelain brushings, 80 two-pin arms, 14 second-hand 2-pin arms, 6 four-pin arms, 150 wood side brackets, 125 wooden pins, 10 ft. No. 12 rubber covered wire, 10 ft. No. 14 rubber covered wire and one quarter mile of iron line wire.

In closing this report I wish to thank the Board of

Fire Commissioners, the Chief and Board of Engineers, officers and members of the Department for their help and kindness to me in the discharge of my duties in the department.

During the past year the department has consisted of twenty-eight men, the roster following, City Marshal Arsène Cailler, Deputy Marshal M. F. Pettingill, Captain John R. Maliar, and at the beginning of the year Marcellin Rancourt was detailed to act as inspector. There are at the present time twenty-four patrolmen. Only one patrolman goes out this year, Patrolman Bourassa. The work of the officers as a whole has been very satisfactory. As I have had the pleasure to state in previous reports our city has been free from any breaks of consequence and what little property has been taken

has been promptly recovered and the offenders taken into custody. That this is due to the efficiency of the department may well be seen by the figures given above.

The Mayor and the Police Committee of the City have upheld me most cordially in the execution of my duty and for this I am most grateful.

The deputy, the captain and in fact all the men of the department have co-operated to make my task more light by their eagerness to respond to their duty. To them I express my sincere thanks.

Mrs. Tracy, the police matron, has been of great help to the department when women were in custody and she deserves well the thanks of the Police department. The Overseer of the Poor, P. J. Cronin has also been of much assistance to this department and to him I express the thanks of the department.

I present also the thanks of the department and specially of myself to his honor judge Cornish, to Clerk S. J. Kelley and to Miss Metcalf for the valuable advice they have so often given us.

Report of Police Matron

To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Lewiston.

Gentlemen:—I herewith submit my second annual report as Police Matron for the year ending Feb. 28, 1909.

I have reported at the Police Station every morning and attended women prisoners. I have labored to try and encourage this class of prisoners to lead better lives.

Some think taking a pledge is a help to keep sober, when they think it will do any good, I have gone with them to a clergyman and a few, to my knowledge, have kept their promise.

The best way that I can see is to encourage them to keep at some kind of employment.

As a rule these unfortunate women appreciate kindness and when one is willing to help themselves, they will find many willing to help them.

I have also performed any other duties required by this department.

I also report to the clerk of the Overseers of the Poor; to this department I am always willing to render assistance in cases of sickness or distress. I have not kept account of the calls I have made during the past year; but there is not a day, that I do not call on some family for one reason or another. Any case reported to me as needing my attention is properly attended to. Many times I spend part of my Sunday doing some service for persons ill and alone. I find that it is impossible to give the history of each case, but I have found that many a woman left with children, if they have good health, can do a great deal to support herself and her children, with encouragement and a little help.

One case I especially remember: a woman was left with three children, her husband having disappeared and none of the children were able to work. A kind woman agreed to take the little four year old girl, without any expense to the mother or to the city; the boy was placed in the Healy Asylum, at a reasonable charge, which the mother was able to pay. I found employment for the mother in a family where she was able to keep

the youngest child with her; thus this family was provided for without any assistance from the Poor Department of the City.

One more case I will mention to show some of the work done. A woman who was thought to be past redemption, on account of habits of intoxication, has for the past six months not only kept sober and supported herself, but also sends money every month to pay the board of two of her children. She seems to do better away from Lewiston. I find it a pleasure to help those who are willing to help themselves.

A young girl fifteen years of age without a mother's care was getting into bad company on Middle Street. I placed this girl with a good woman in the country. I am in hopes to find her a place in some good family before long where she can earn good wages.

A family who two years ago was a great expense to the city, left the city for a while, as the mother found work outside Lewiston. Owing to the illness of her boy, however, she had to give up her work and come back to Lewiston. She came without money and unable to work, owing to the boy's illness. I asked one of the directors of the social settlement to allow this woman to occupy the settlement house for a month, this they kindly allowed and I am very thankful to them for the favor. The woman now has a good home of her own and is no longer a resident of Lewiston.

At Christmas time this year, the Salvation Army gave to a great many of the poor of our city a good plentiful dinner; and with the help that I received from some of our citizens, who never forget the poor, I have not learned of a family who was without a good Christmas dinner.

One of our business men, a manufacturer, has been very generous the past two years, in giving cloth to make clothes for children, I appreciate this kindness very much and those to whom I have given the cloth were very thankful. The past year I have found permanent homes for five children, three of whom were taken from the City Farm. Two of those taken from the Farm were boys who have known no other home for years, they were brothers and have not been separated, but were both taken into a good home. The other child from the farm was a baby girl and was taken into a childless home. She is loved and cared for as well as one could

wish. The other two children were boys between the ages of twelve and fourteen, both city charges.

During the past year I have distributed about 5,050 articles of clothing, one cook stove, bedding, dishes, lamps, etc.

I wish to thank each and every one who in any way have assisted this department by giving cast-off clothing, household goods and articles of various kind.

I am also very thankful to our daily papers, I have found them very willing to make the wants of this department known. And people in outside towns who have kindly remembered this department.

I have visited our City Farm many times during the past year and have always found the inmates happy and contented. Mr. and Mrs. Labranche seem to be just the right people for the place.

In closing I wish to thank the City Marshal and Police Officers whom I have always found courteous and kind, also Mr. Cronin, Clerk of the Overseers of the Poor, who has always been very willing to help me in any case which I brought to his attention; and to all others employed in the City Building, who have been kind and helpful.

The question of good walks is a matter that appeals to everyone and it is the wish of the Board to do as much in this respect as the appropriation will permit.

During the year all the catch basins have been cleaned out once, and nearly one third of them, two and three times and this part of the work alone amounts to about Twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200.00), which amount must come out of the appropriation for sewers.

STREETS PAVED

3411 yards of Hassam paving have been laid on the following streets:

1361 yards on Main Street.

1067 yards on Ash Street.

983 yards on Oxford Street.

890 yards of granite block paving has been laid on Chestnut St., between Park and Lisbon Sts.

In regard to paving would say, that the Hassam paving is practically a new thing in this vicinity, some of it having been laid in Portland in the past two years which is proving quite satisfactory, and if properly laid, I think will be an improvement over the granite block paving and at a much less cost, and I would recommend that the section of Bates St., between Lowell St. and Main St., and Main St. from Blake St. to Sabattus St. and to the easterly side of Hammond St. taking in the so-called Hospital Square, be paved.

NEW STREETS AND BRIDGES

The South bridge has been replanked, the first Cross Canal bridge on Lincoln St., the Chestnut St. bridge,

the Riverside St. and nearly all of the bridges in the rural districts have either been replanked or repaired.

The Canal bridge on Main St. should receive attention the coming year; this bridge is in one of the busiest sections of the city and with the Electric Railway and the general traffic, it is quite important that it should be one of the safest and I would recommend that a concrete bridge be constructed in this place.

STREETS MACADAMIZED

Bates Street from Oak Street to Ash Street. Main Street from Holland Street to Prescott Street for the entire width and from Prescott Street to the residence of C. I. Barker on the west side.

Several of the streets have been graveled and rolled and a large amount of gravel has been used in repairing all over the city.

During the winter the teams have been employed when not taking care of the snow in hauling gravel from the pit and depositing it in the following places:

Old Stable lot on Bates Street, 505 yards fine gravel;
 Hay Market Square, 150 yards coarse gravel;
 Ash Street, 1,116 yards coarse gravel;
 Androscoggin Mills, 73 yards coarse gravel;

A large amount of gravel has been used in various parts of the city, but I would recommend the use of more crushed stone in place of gravel.

Report of Superintendent of Water Works

Lewiston, Maine, March 8, 1909.

To the Honorable Board of the Water Commissioners for the City of Lewiston.

Gentlemen:—I have the honor to present the twenty-ninth annual report of the superintendent, showing the general conditions of the work for the fiscal year ending February 28, 1909.

The running expense account shows an increase over previous years on account of the installing of two new water wheels for the Worthington pumps, and the general repairing of the pumps at a cost of Four Thousand Seven Hundred Ninety-Four Dollars and Fifty-eight cents (\$4,794.58), the purchasing of a Mueller tapping machine at a cost of Seventy Dollars (\$70.00), the purchasing of a Ellis and Ford pipe cutter at a cost of \$50.00. The purchasing of 2,000 feet of lead line pipe, stop and waste, Corporation, curb, cock and lead connections at a cost of Ten Hundred and Twenty-Three Dollars and Seventy-five cents (\$1,023.75). This with all the other repairs and monthly payrolls, which include the salary of superintendent, clerk, engineers at pumping station and for all stock and supplies used are charged to the running expense account as you will see by the report of the auditor.

WHEELS

The water wheels are all in good condition, except for the general wear they are good for a number of years.

PUMPS

The pumps are in fair condition. With the yearly increase in consumption and the average running time of eighteen hours a day, with the growth of the city and the extending of the pipe line out to the suburbs leads me to think that there ought to be a larger pump put in as soon as possible.

PIPE LINES

Have repaired seventeen lead joints in the main pipe lines, one twenty-four inch split sleeve on the supply pipe from the lake on Centre St. that broke after the ground froze up. Have added one new hydrant on Howe St. Have taken out an old style Mason on Canal St. near Main St. and put in a new Corey. Have repaired six hydrants with new seats. With the early fall of snow which stopped the frost from going into the ground we haven't had but a little trouble with them freezing up. Only two have given us any trouble, and they were out of the city limits. I have replaced twenty-one old gate boxes that have rotted out and topped out two on hospital square, on main pipe line with brick.

CONSTRUCTION

The main pipe line this year has been extended on Lisbon Road, West Rose Hill from end of 6 in. pipe, 152 feet of 1 in. On Webber Ave. from Pleasant St. 431 feet 1 in. pipe. Sabattus and Shawmut Sts. on Shawmut 121 feet of 6 in. Sabattus St. and Sylvan Ave. on Sylvan Ave. 252 feet of 6 in. Pine St. and Howard St. on Howard 171 feet 6 in. Cottage St. and Riverside on Riverside. 163 feet 6 in. On Warren Ave. 351 feet of 1 in. Mountain Ave. and Benson St. on Benson, 218 feet 6 in.

There have been 52 new services and 96 relays. Have used 7,766 feet of 1 in. service pipe. 925 feet of 6 in., 42 feet of 4 in., 136 feet of 2 in., 18 feet of 1½ in. Number of miles of street main to date $41\frac{4439}{5280}$

RESERVOIR

Have repaired the fence all around the reservoir and the road from Webster St. up over the hill that was in bad condition. The gate house at the reservoir and the riprapping ought to be repaired this year.

We had occasion to use the new gravity system for the first time for two weeks night and day, during the time of repairs of the Water wheels at the pumping station and it worked perfectly satisfactory. During that time we had to turn the high pressure on once in case of fire, and it was done before the first round of the box was given,

RECOMMENDATIONS

I should recommend the laying of about 125 yards of face wall in the raceway at the pumping station and the lowering of the raceway in the channel about two feet. In doing this it will give us that much more fall and will increase the power considerably. There ought to be a new gravel roof on the pump station. The roof leaks badly over the electric light plant. I, also, recommend the laying of a new floor over the water well as the one there is rotten.

With thanks to the President and clerk of the Water Board, and to the members, this report is respectfully submitted.

Section 1. No plumbing shall hereafter be done on any pipes or fixtures for the use of water from the City Water Works, unless by a plumber licensed by the Board of Water Commissioners of said city. Said Board of Commissioners are authorized to grant and revoke licenses.

Sec. 2. Every Plumber who shall set up any pipes or fixtures for the use of water from said City Water Works, or shall make repairs upon, additions to, or alterations of any pipes or fixtures set up previous thereto, shall, within eight days after the same shall be completed, fill up and return to the Superintendent a report describing all fixtures, both old and new, for the use of water on the premises.

Sec. 3. For any misrepresentation or omission in the report of the work done, said plumuber shall be liable to

suspension or to have his license revoked by said board, and to pay a fine of not less than five or more than twenty-five dollars to be recovered in an action of debt, in the name of the Water Commissioners or City Treasurer before the Municipal Court of said city.

Sec. 4. Water from the Lewiston Water Works will be supplied hereafter only to pipes and fixtures that have been set up and completed or examined and tested by a plumber licensed by the Water Commissioners, and which have been fully enumerated and described in a report made by said plumber to the Superintendent, and approved by him or his Inspector.

Sec. 5. If any plumber or person not duly licensed, shall set up any pipes or fixtures for the use of water from the Lewiston Water Works, or make any repairs upon, additions to, or alterations of any pipes or fixtures previously thereto set up, he shall forfeit and pay a sum of not less than five, nor more than twenty-five dollars, to be recovered by complaint, or in action of debt in the name of the Water Commissioners or the City Treasurer, before the Municipal Court of said City.

Finally passed and approved by City Council March 15, 1881, and March 22, 1893.

SPECIAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

In all cases where the water is turned off at the request of the owner, or agent of the property, a charge of fifty cents shall be made, which amount must be paid before the water is turned on.

No discount will be made for vacant tenements or premises unless notice is given at the time of vacancy and the water shut off. In case two or more takers are supplied by the same service pipe seals will be attached to the fixtures not in use.

No charge will be made for water for extra persons above the limited number in family rates, in one and the same family—but in Boarding Houses and consolidated families, extra will be charged to the amount of fifty cents to each person above this limit of seven (7) persons.

No water-motor shall be attached to any of the water pipes, without permission of the Water Board, and the Superintendent is authorized and instructed to shut off the water at once on premises where any violation of this rule occurs.

No person or persons using city water for motive power, shall sublet to other parties.

No abatement shall be allowed on vacant tenements unless the tenements have been vacant two months or more. The vacancies for a less time of several tenements in the same building, owned by the same person, are not to be added together to make the requisite time (two months or more) for abatement.

All persons using meters are holden responsible for all damage to said meters occasioned by neglect, misuse, or freezing, and the Superintendent will cause printed slips to be placed upon all meters to this effect.

When bills are due and not paid within the limited time, the water shall be turned off for non-payment, unless the bills are under consideration by the Committee on Rates and Abatements.

NEW SERVICES

Pipe bills and water bills must be paid before the water is let on.

Sec. 9. The following regulations shall be considered a part of the contract with every person who takes the water, and every such person, by taking the water, shall be considered to express his assent to be bound thereby. They shall be printed upon every bill for water rent, and whenever any one of them is violated, the water shall be cutt off from the building, or place of such violation, although two or more parties may receive water through the same pipe, and shall not be let on again, except by order of the Water Board, and on payment of two dollars; and in case of such violation the said Board shall have the right to declare any payment made for the water by the person committing such violation, to be forfeited, and the same shall thereupon be forfeited.

REGULATIONS

First. All persons taking water shall keep the service pipes within their premises, including any area beneath the sidewalk, in good repair and protected from frost at their own expense; and they shall be held liable for all damages which may result from their failure to do so.

Second. They shall prevent all unnecessary waste of

water, and there shall be no concealment of the purpose for which it is used.

Third. No alterations shall be made in any of the pipes or fixtures inserted by the city, except by its agent, who is to be allowed to enter the premises supplied, to examine the apparatus, and to ascertain whether there is any unnecessary waste.

Fourth. No water is allowed to be supplied to parties not entitled to the use of it under the city ordinances, unless by special permission.

Fifth. The Clerk and Superintendent with the necessary agents and assistants, may enter the premises of any water taker to examine the quantity used and the manner of use, and to cut off the water for non-payment of rents or fines, or any violation of the foregoing rules.

Sec. 10. The occupants of any premises, when any unnecessary waste of water occurs, shall be liable to a fine of two dollars for the first offense and four dollars for the second offense during the same year, and shall be notified thereof in writing, and if such waste shall not be prevented and the fine aforesaid paid within two days from the time when said notice was given, the water shall be cut off from said premises, and shall not be again let on until the waste be stopped and a fine paid, together with the additional sum of two dollars for cutting off and letting on the water; and in case of a third or subsequent offense, the water shall be cut off, and shall not again be let on, except by a vote of the Board and the payment of such fine, not exceeding ten dollars, as the Board may impose.

Sec. 11. The commissioners shall have power to establish such regulations as they may deem expedient for the introduction and use of water; and the water shall not be supplied to any building unless the pipes and fixtures shall be made conformable to said regulations.

Sec. 12. The water rates shall be fixed by the Commissioners, subject to the approval of the City Council.

Sec. 13. Any person considering his water rates excessive, may apply to said Board for a meter, to be set at his expense, and the amount of his rent, may be determined thereby; and said Board may cause a meter to be attached to any premises where they have reason to believe that an unnecessary or fraudulent use of water is being made, and may assess rates upon such premises thereby.

Sec. 14. All water rates, except for building pur-

poses, meter rates, lawn and street sprinklers, shall be due and payable at the office of said Board, quarterly, in advance on the first day of January, April, July and October. Meter rates will be due and payable at the same place on the first day of the succeeding quarter; and the rates for garden, lawn, and street sprinklers will be due and payable in advance, at the said office on the first day of April and July of each year.

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The City Ordinance, as adopted July 1, 1889, read under Sec. 10, Plumbing Laws, XII:

“Water-closets supplied with water otherwise than from a tank with flush pipe of at least 1¼-inch shall only be used with special permission of the Board of Health.”

LOCATION OF HYDRANTS

Section 16. Any person who shall injure any public pipe or reservoir connected with the Lewiston Water Works, or who shall break and enter the same, or draw off, or cause to be removed any water therefrom, or shall turn off or on the water in any such water pipe or reservoir, or shall make any opening or connection with such pipe or reservoir or removed the cover of any hydrant, except in case of fire, without the license or permit of the Water Commissioners, or by authority of the Mayor and Aldermen, or Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, shall forfeit and pay for each offense not lesse than three nor more than twenty dollars.
