

PENOBSCOT SS.

To Eugene T. Hatch, Constable of the Town of Newport, in the County of Penobscot.

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Newport aforesaid, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Odd Fellows Hall, so-called, in said town, on Monday, the 1st day of March, A. D. 1926, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art 2 To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art 3 To hear all reports made at said meeting and act upon the same.
- Art 4 To see if the town will vote to fix the compensation of its Board of Selectmen and Assessors, allowing such sum as may seem commensurate with the duties of the office.
- Art 5 To choose three or more Selectmen.
- Art 6 To choose one or more Overseers of the Poor for such term of office as the town may by vote decide.

- Art 7 To choose three or more Assessors.
- Art 8 To choose a Town Treasurer and fix the salary of same.
- Art 9 To choose a member or members of the Superintending School Committee.
- Art 10 To choose three or more persons to enforce town ordinances.
- Art 11 To choose a Chief Engineer and assistants of the Fire Department.
- Art 12 To choose Sextons for the various cemeteries in town.
- Art 13 To determine the number of Road Commissioners, not exceeding three, and the term of office for the same; also fix the compensation of such Road Commissioner or Commissioners, and choose the same by ballot; or instruct the Selectmen to appoint the same.
- Art 14 To choose a night watchman for the ensuing year.
- Art 15 To choose all remaining town officers required or permitted to be chosen at the annual town meeting, excepting a Collector of taxes; and to determine how many, if any, of the said town officers shall be appointed by the Selectmen.
- Art 16 To determine when the tax list for the year 1925 shall be committed for collection; also when taxes thus committed shall be paid, and what instructions, if any, the town will give in relation to the same. Also to see what instruction and condition the town will impose upon its Collector of Taxes relative to settlement with the town, and to receive bids and propos-

als for the collecting of taxes for the ensuing year on such terms and conditions as may thus be determined.

- Art 17 To choose a Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.
- Art 18 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, to pay town charges and contract obligations.
- Art 19 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, for the support of the poor.
- Art 20 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, to apply on debt and interest account, and for a sinking fund toward the retirement of the town bonds of 1910 issue and the temporary town orders issued on account of balance of indebtedness of bond issue of 1917; or what action the town will take relative to the subject matter of this article.
- Art 21 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, to make, construct and repair highways, bridges. ways, crosswalks and sidewalks in said town and determine the per diem compensation of laborers and horses thus employed.
- Art 22 To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriation and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid on its highways, as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916, and acts additional thereto and amendatory thereof
- Art 23 To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$732 for the improvement of the sections of the State aid work as outlined in

the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1913 and acts additional thereto and amendatory thereof.

- Art 24 To see if the town will vote to raise money, and what sum for the maintenance of State Highways during the ensuing year within the limits of the town, under provisions of Section 8, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916 and acts additional and amendatory thereto.
- Art 25 To see if the town will vote to pay the Chief of the Fire Department one hundred and fifty dollars per year for his services.
- Art 26 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, for the use and maintenance of Newport Fire Department for the ensuing year, and whom it will authorize to expend the same.
- Art 27 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, for the maintenance of the Fire Alarm System.
- Art 28 To see what sum of money the town will appriate and raise for the Common Schools.
- Art 29 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, for the maintenance of a Free High School.
- Art 30 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, for fuel and lights for the Free High School.

- Art 31 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, for the services of a Janitor for the High School.
- Art 32 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the purchase of school text books.
- Art 33 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the purchase of school supplies and apparatus.
- Art 34 To see if the town will raise and appropriate money, if so, how much, for the teaching of music in the public schools.
- Art 35 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for school house repairs.
- Art 36 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate as a salary for the Superintendent of Schools.
- Art 37 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, for the purchase of books and to pay necessary expenses of the Free Public Library.
- Art 38 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, for aid to the G. A. R. Post, and other Patriotic societies, in the observance of Memorial Day, 1926.
- Art 39 To see if the town will raise and appropriate money, if so, how much, to hire a night watchman for Newport village for the ensuing year, said watchman to perform the duties as heretofore required, or as may be prescribed and required.

- Art 40 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for Town Hall repairs and supplies for the Town Office, if so, how much.
- Art 41 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, if so, how much, to repair or build sidewalks, whether concrete or gravel or both and whom they will authorize to expend the same or what action they will take in regard to the subject matter of this article.
- Art 42 To see if the town will vote to enter into a contract with the Turner Centre System for a term of one or more years for coal ashes and use of steam for pump and fire whistle as required, and what instruction it will give its Assessors and Selectmen in relation thereto.
- Art 43 To see what sum the town will vote to pay for the services of its Superintending School Committee.
- Art 44 To choose a special Municipal Board of Mothers' Aid and Childrens Guardians of not less than three members, at least one of whom shall be a woman, to serve in accordance with Chapter 222, Section 4, of the Public Laws of 1917, as amended by Chapter 171 of the Public Laws of 1919.
- Art 45 To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to make a temporary loan to pay town charges and other obligations should it become necessary at any time during the year to do so.
- Art 46 To see if the town will vote to raise money for putting a tar surface on Elm St. beginning at the M. C. R. R. crossing and ending at the [7]

Main St. bridge, also tar surface on Mill St. and Water St. from Main St. to North St., or otherwise improve such road or roads as the town may determine, or what action they will take in regard to the subject matter of this article.

- Art 47 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, for the Newport Band
 for giving twelve band concerts during the months of June, July and August.
- Art 48 To see if the town will vote to raise \$193.50 to pay on the Fish Screen erected in 1923 at the outlet of Lake Sebasticook.
- Art 49 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to pay the overdrafts on school accounts if so, how much.
- Art 50 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, to be expended on Lunt St., so-called, leading north from North Street.
- Art 51 To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Mary J. Folsom; the income to be used in giving perpetual care to the Dennet A. Folsom lot in the No. Newport Cemetery.
- Art 52 To see if the town will vote to appoint a Committee to investigate the needs of the Free Public Library; to investigate the matter of a suitable place or lot for a Library building, the same to make report at a future town meeting or what action they will take in regard to the subject matter of this article.
- Art 53 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for permanent repairs on the

Camp Benson Road, so called, between the railroad crossing at the station and Camp Benson.

- Art 54 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, to be expended by the Maine Publicity Committee for advertising the State of Maine.
- Art 55 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much for school flags and poles.
- Art 56 To see if the town will vote to build a catch basin at the corner of Adams St. and Park Ave., so called, near residence of Chas. Mathews, if so, how much money they will raise for the same.
- Art 57 To see if the town will vote to abate the tax assessed in 1925 on the buildings of F. A. Richardson and C. C. Watt, that were destroyed by fire.
- Art 58 To see what action the town will take in regard to taking care of the surface water in front of the store of Mrs. Mary Peavey on water Street.
- Art 59 To see if the town will raise a sum of money to be used for repairs on the Public Hall at E. Newport.
- Art 60 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money. if so, how much, to re-surface the concrete side walk on Mill St., from Main St. to the Walker Cafe on said street.
- Art 61 To see if the town will vote to approve a list of jurors as prepared by the Municipal Officers, Town Treasurer and Town Clerk.

- Art 62 To see if the town will vote to employ a school Physician, if so, how much money they will raise for the same.
- Art 63 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to be expended on Elm St. north of the watering trough, for such a distance as may be determined for the purpose of keeping the dust down during the summer months, treating with oil, tar, or otherwise as may be determined, or what action they will take in regard to the subject matter of this article.

The Selectmen will be in session at their office in the Town Hall for the purpose of revising the list of voters in said town, at nine o'clock on the day of said meeting.

Hereof fail not to make due return of this warrant with your doings thereon on or before the day and hour of said meeting.

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN OF NEWPORT PUBLIC LIBRARY

The past year has been one of progress and growth, 266 volumes having been added to the shelves.

This is the largest number of books ever added in one year and was made possible by the gifts of 93 books and by the check of seventy-two dollars (\$72.00) given to your librarian by the Newport Woman's Club for the purchase of books. Recently, another check of fifty-five dollars (\$55.00) has been received from them for the same purpose.

For these gifts of money from the Woman's Club and for the gift of books and magazines from other friends of the library, I extend in the name of the town, sincere thanks.

In the book purchases of the year, I have not only tried to supply a reasonable amount of new fiction for both adults and juveniles, but have also greatly increased the material in non-fiction, especially in Biography, and have added a set of Compton's Encyclopedia.

In the future, I hope to be able to meet the request of the reading public and to satisfy more fully the needs of the Woman's Club, and the needs of the teachers and students.

The circulation of books and magazines is still on the increase.

The Library has been open Wednesday and Saturday of each week except for the two holidays, May 30th and July 4th.

REPORT OF THE SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

To the Superintendent of Schools, School Board and Citizens of Newport:

Music is a "universal language," the language of the emotions. It is the aim of music lovers and teachers to make this language present on all occasions, social or patriotic, at home or in the church, in the community, inspiring all that come under its influence.

It is by laying the solid foundation in the schools that America will come to lead the world in music as it does now in the high spots of civilization. A music-loving people must develop from the teaching of vocal music in the public schools and in the organization of orchestras, bands and glee clubs in the high schools throughout the country.

No finer argument for the benefits of music in the schools could be found than in quoting from Mr. Charles Ames, Principal of Brown School, Hartford, Conn.:

"Its hygienic side, calling for deep breathing, its mental-disciplinary side, developing thought and expression, its cultural side, embracing a knowledge of the science of music, and an intimate association with religious thought and the best literature of all ages, in all lands, and its art side, awakening the musical sense, and stimulating an appreciation of beauty in art and in life, and a recognition of those higher, spiritual emotions that concern one's eternal welfare—these are all of prime importance."

The work is progressing satisfactorily in the grades. The rural schools are of especial interest to me, and I feel amply repaid, after a hard trip through storm and snow, to be greeted by the eager, enthusiastic faces of those boys and girls.

The teachers are interested and helpful, for they have a great realization of the part that music plays in the everyday life of the children entrusted to their care.

There is a fine co-operative spirit in Newport between Superintendent, teachers and pupils, and I am especially grateful for the consideration shown to me, a stranger.

The high school chorus is accomplishing good work in reading. The orchestra lost a number of capable musicians through graduation last year, however, the faithful members that are left are making every effort to uphold the standard set in previous years.

A great need is the fostering of an interest in instrumental music, beginning in the lower grades. Instruments owned or rented by the town, placed in the hands of talented pupils, who are unable to purchase for themselves. It would mean, in future years, musical organizations in your town. "the Newport Band" or "Orchestra," and the satisfaction of being known as a musical town.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF NEWPORT HIGH SCHOOL

To Mr. E. O. Small, Superintendent of Schools, Newport. Maine.

I have the honor of submitting to you my second annual report as Principal of Newport High School.

The High School opened this fall with an enrollment of 129 students, distributed as follows:

This number shows a small increase over last year, which makes the seating capacity more inadequate than ever. As this is detrimental to the efficiency of our school, the problem should be solved in the near future.

The attendance for the fall term has been very satisfactory, the per cent of attendance being 92.2. Such a good record is due to the cooperation of the parents, and the interest of the students. Through experience they have learned the value of being present each day, as irregular attendance results in disinterest, lack of ambition, discouragement, and finally failure.

In order for any school to retain its high standard of efficiency, modern text-books are needed. In this respect we have been fortunate in obtaining a satisfactory number this year, a large percentage of them being purchased for the English Department. Good English is the slogan for all schools. Without the proper literature and rhetoric books no English Department can hope to obtain the standards that are demanded by the colleges of today. High schools are judged mainly by the kind of English their boys and girls use. Therefore, I feel justified in striving every way possible for the building up of our English Department.

Last year we were in the Bates debating tournament. The students were interested, as was shown by the large number that tried for the teams representing our school. This year the same interest was in evidence by the number that took part in the preliminaries for the teams that are to debate against Bangor and Ellsworth High Schools.

As Miss Tibbetts was unable to return this year on account of ill health, Mrs. Newman was elected to fill the vacancy. Under her supervision the music in the High School is making rapid progress.

We were very fortunate in having Mr. Dorr to coach the basketball teams. His work is to be commended highly.

I believe a regular course in physical education should be conducted in all high schools. This would be carried out by an instructor devoting half of his time to academic subjects, and the remainder to physical training. Every boy and girl who is in good physical condition should receive at least one forty-minute period each week. The aim of instruction would be to give such calisthenics as would correct defects in posture, and develop vigorous, healthy physiques. Parents send their children to school to train their minds mentally, but what good is a schooled brain without a strong and well developed muscular system? Without the latter the body ceases to function properly. The adolescent stage is the most vital period in a boy's or girl's life. They need to be educated mentally, morally, and physically. As the youths are attending school during these transformation years, physical education has a legitimate right to be on every high school curriculum.

Besides health, the aim of instruction in each department of a high school should be to train the boys and girls in the following objectives—worthy home membership, vocation, citizenship, proper use of leisure time and ethical character.

The success of a high school depends in a large measure upon the loyalty and spirit of its students. If a school is to attain its highest success, there must be unity of spirit. "A house divided against itself cannot stand" is an expression that is fraught with meaning. In all athletic contests there must be team work. The same is true in the school building. The teachers and students must work together. In this respect I have every reason to feel satisfied with the school. The students as a whole have good school spirit, and realize that only through their good, honest, and faithful endeavors Newport can boast of one of the best high schools of its size in the state.

The care of the school building has been very satisfactory this year. Regardless of the cold, unpleasant weather, the rooms have always been comfortable and cheerful in which to work.

We are very fortunate in having the same teachers on the faculty as last year. It is a pleasure to work with such a loyal group. I wish to extend my sincere appreciation to them at this time for their earnest cooperation.

In concluding, I wish to thank you and the School Committee for the advice and support given me during the past year, also the parents and other citizens for their assistance.

SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Newport:

During the several years that I have been connected with the schools of your town I have found the work very enjoyable and pleasant because of the frank and open-minded attitude taken by the parents and citizens. Differences of opinion have arisen but they have been only those which might arise through varied conceptions of what is best for the welfare of the schools.

There is today a splendid spirit of cooperation among the parents, teachers and school officials of this town. I sincerely hope that in the near future an organization may be formed such as a Parent-Teacher Association, which will have as its purpose the establishment of a closer relationship between parents and those who have the education of their children in charge. Intelligent cooperation brings splendid results to all.

There are very many ways by which parents may help in the education of their children. They may insist upon their children having at least nine hours' sleep. They may find out how much time should be devoted to home work and see that it is faithfully done. They may instill in their children habits of obedience and respect for authority. They may encourage punctuality and regular attendance, not permitting trifles to interfere. They should keep in mind that school offers unlimited opportunities to those who take advantage of them, parents as well as pupils. It also seems to me important that parents should not criticize the teachers or school at all within the children's hearing.

During the past year the education of each child in this town has cost \$36.05, which is \$1.67 cheaper than the average cost per capita in towns of the size of Newport in the State and \$1.34 cheaper than the cost last year.

During the past year many parents have availed themselves of the opportunity to visit the schools. No evening sessions were held during American Education Week because of other important events which occurred during that week. We are planning a visitors' evening later with the schools in session and hope that at that time many parents will be present.

Through the cooperation of the Newport Trust Company school banking is to be installed in the village grades. The object of the school bank is to teach habits of thrift to boys and girls during their habit-forming years and to show them that no amount however small is too small to be worth saving and no boy or girl too young to be a saver. We who have your schools in charge are confident that your boys and girls will be greatly benefited by this banking system.

VILLAGE SCHOOLS

With the beginning of the Fall term the largest number of pupils in the history of the town began their school year in your village building. There are today 211 pupils enrolled in the village grades and 139 enrolled in the Junior and Senior High Schools. All but one of the village teachers returned to their schools and have been faithful and conscientious in their work. The resignation of Miss McCollor was accepted and Miss Mary Marsh was elected to fill her position.

I would recommend as I have in my past reports that the town of Newport maintain a thirty-six week school year. Reports from the State Department of Education show that most of the towns of the size of Newport of this State are maintaining this length of a school year. The average boy or girl needs thirty-six weeks to complete his school year's work.

HIGH SCHOOL

At the close of the Spring term the annual Junior Prize Speaking Exh bition was held. The judges awarded their decisions to Alice McKenzie and Newell Littlefield. At the graduation exercises on the Friday following twenty-four pupils received their diplomas.

We are indeed fortunate in maintaining the same efficient teaching force as of last year. We are grateful to Mr. Rand, Miss Pratt, Miss Davis, Miss Knowlton and Miss Sewall for their splendid work in maintaining the high standing of our High School.

We now have enrolled in our Senior High School one hundred and twenty-four pupils, four times as many as were enrolled twelve years ago. Thirty-seven pupils from the neighboring towns are enrolled in our High School. Statistics show that it cost \$58.13 per capita to educate your High School pupils during the past year.

I would recommend that the town of Newport employ a teacher to teach Physical Education in the High School and grades and also teach some High School work. The State will pay \$800 toward the solary of such an instructor. The citizens of the town are now being asked to make individual contributions toward the promotion of our school athletics and physical education. It ought not to be necessary for this condition to exist. While too much emphasis ought not to be placed on athletics in our schools, yet a well-trained and healthy body is essential in the education of our children today.

I wish to call your attention to Mr. Rand's report.

RURAL SCHOOLS

At the close of the Spring term three of the rural [73]

teachers resigned their positions, Miss Griffith at the Gilman School, Miss Odlin at the Coburn School, and Mrs. Littlefield at the East Newport Primary School.

With the beginning of the Fall term Miss Alta Parsons was hired to teach the Gilman School. She has been doing splendid work and has the cooperation of the parents. Miss McGregor is teaching the Coburn School and is doing good work. Mrs. Tasker is continuing her good work in the Hubbard School. At the East Newport School Miss Verna Steen is teaching her second year in the upper grades. She is a capable and energetic teacher. Miss Marjorie Steen is teaching the lower grades and although the enrollment in her school is small her pupils are making excellent progress.

I find a splendid spirit of cooperation among the parents in the rural districts. There have been some inregularities in school attendance but the majority of these can be traced to sickness of pupils. Never have you had in your rural schools teachers who have had more professional training than those who are now teaching them. Two of the teachers have graduated from normal school and the others have had normal school or summer school training.

MUSIC DEPARTMENT

A musical program was presented at the close of the Spring Term by the pupils of the village grades which demonstrated the splendid training they are receiving in music. We were very sorry to receive Miss Tibbetts' resignation at the close of the year. Mrs. Grace Newman was elected to fill the position as music supervisor and is doing splendid work. We were fortunate in securing such a capable supervisor. I wish to call your attention to her report.

REPAIRS

During the past year the necessary minor repairs have been made on the school buildings. Next year the interior of the village building should be painted.

In my past reports I have recommended that some action be taken toward the standardizing of the rural school buildings in this town. If sufficient money could be raised each year so that one building could be standardized, at the end of four years the town of Newport would have a modern school building for every pupil.

SCHOOL PHYSICIAN

At the last town meeting no money was raised to hire a school physician. I hope that this year the citizens of this town will see fit to raise money enough to employ one. Without a school physician we who have your schools in charge have no one to help us if an epidemic appears in the schools. Then, too, your boy or girl should receive a physical examination each year, for a sound mind can not function without a sound body.

I wish to express my appreciation of the loyal support and keen interest shown by the citizens of the town in the schools during the past year. I also wish to take this opportunity to thank the school committee for their splendid cooperation and their confidence in me. Since the education of the future citizens of our town, state and nation depends wholly on us, may we all work together for the best interests of our boys and girls.
