To the Superintending School Committee:

Gentlemen:—I submit at this time a report of your schools for the past year. In taking up the work at the beginning of the school year in the fall, I endeavored to carry on the work as Mr. Grindle had planned it, and with as little confusion as possible. I know that many mistakes have been made, and more or less trouble has arisen through my lack of knowledge of some of the school conditions, but I have found the teachers, school committee and citizens ready to made the work easier.

No change has been made in your schools the past year. We have tried to improve our present system as much as possible. Several of our teachers were retained from last year, and the work of all has been entirely satisfactory. It will be necessary to pay our teachers more money the coming year, due to the increasing demand for good teachers and the gradual increase in board.

ATTENDANCE.

I am able to report very satisfactory conditions in regard to the school attendance for the past year. Of course, the usual exceptions occur, several students being rather irregular in their attendance. Once again I urge the parents to use their influence in bringing about better

attendance records. It is the parent who largely determines the attitude of the child in this matter. It is each day's work that counts, and the parent will do well to instill in the child a sense of pride in regular attendance.

Beginning with the spring torm, we hope to start a little competition between the schools of the town in the matter of attendance. A framed certificate will be given to the school having the best average attendance for the term, and it will become the permanent possession of the school winning it three successive terms. Individuals not tardy or absent during the term will be given certificates signed by the teacher and the superintendent. In one of the schools there is a boy who has been going to school for five years, and has yet to miss a day. That is a record which every boy and girl should envy, and try to equal.

By being absent one day, the pupil loses practically two days' work—that of the day missed, and the next day, while he is making up the work which he has lost. It hurts the work of the whole school. The pupils are held back so that those who are absent may not be too far behind in their work. Tardiness is almost as bad as truancy. Nothing is so annoying to the pupils and teacher as to have tardy children coming in from time to time during the first half hour of school. It is just as easy to be on time as to be five minutes late, and it is, I am sure, much pleasanter for all concerned.

REPAIRS.

The most extensive repairs have been made on the schoolhouse in the Wescott district at North Bluehill. The building has been put in fine condition, and is proving to be of great service to the people of that section. The school building at Grindleville has been repaired so that school might be held there. The expense amounted to only \$25, as the committee did not feel like expending a

great deal of money in repairing the building unless the attendance of the first two terms should warrant it. A very successful school of fourteen pupils has been maintained, and I recommend that new seats be installed and other repairs made the coming year.

The rest of the money has been used for painting, renewing insurance policies, general cleaning and minor repair work. Not knowing how much of the appropriation had been expended during the spring and summer, due to the fact that many of the bills were not handed in until quite late, I was rather timid about expending a great deal for fear of overdrawing the account. However, when the town books were closed, it was found that a considerable amount remained unexpended. We shall need at least the appropriation called for for next year, and I hope the town will see fit to raise it.

Quite extensive repairs should be made on the East's Bluehill schoolhouse. New seats are needed for both rooms, and a new hardwood floor should be laid in the upper room. The basement should be drained and the underpinning repaired. Something should be done to improve the draught in the chimney, for the stoves smoke quite badly at times. Of the many needed repairs, the most urgent seem to be those which will bring about better sanitary conditions. Money should be allowed for the thorough cleaning of each schoolhouse after each term of school. Slate blackboards should be added to practically all of the schools as soon as possible. The school in the Billings district, as well as the Mines school, needs painting. Special attention should be given to the improvement of the toilets in several of the schools.

The State department urges that towns adopt some sort of building program. Such a program may have two aims:

- (a) To remodel and modernize one school building each year.
- (b) To add at least one needed improvement to the entire group of buildings.

This town has already started a program along these lines by the remodeling of the primary and intermediate building last year, and the building at No. 6 this year.

The following is a summary of some of the requirements of a modern school building:

- 1. Heating should be by a ventilating heater or jacketed stove with fresh-air intake, foul-air outlet in chimney, with vent at floor level; heater should be placed in "cold" corner of room.
- 2. Lighting should be from left and back of pupils, and the window space should equal one-fifth of floor space.
- 3. Seats and desks should be of adjustable, individual type.
- 4. Blackboards should be of slate, receiving correct light, and placed low enough to be used readily by small children.
- 5. Wardrobes should be connected with the school-room and not the entry, and should be arranged to allow proper supervision and warming from the schoolroom.
- 6. Closets should be built into one of the wardrobes for the storage of books and material not in use.
- 7. Outbuildings should be connected with the main room by covered walks with lattice-work walls and solid middle partition, not reaching to the roof, to allow current of fresh air to flow between outbuilding and school building.

There are other details, but these are the most important. It is hoped that something may be accomplished

each year to bring our schools up to these requirements. Our children, up to the age of fifteen, spend a great part of their time in schoolrooms, and the least we can do is to provide clean, well-heated, well-lighted schools for them.

TRANSPORTATION.

The town has done comparatively little transporting the past year. The children from the Witham district have been transported, as formerly, to the Hinckley school. The children at West Bluehill have been transported, during bad weather and hard traveling, to the school at West Sedgwick, where the tuition was paid. The children from the Granite district attended school at the village and at East Bluehill, and, in the winter term, were transported during bad weather. The school at Seaville is the only one failing to maintain the average attendance necessary to continue it unless the town so votes. I recommend that this one be maintained the coming year.

TEXT-BOOKS AND SUPPLIES.

No great change has been made in the text-books of the schools. A new set of arithmetics is being tried out in one of the large schools, with excellent results. A new health reader is being used at the present time in a few of the schools. New English text-books and French readers have been purchased for the academy. Recently, several new geometries were added to replace old, worn-out books. In fact, the largest part of the appropriation has been spent for the latter purpose. It was found to be impossible to keep from overdrawing this account, because of the two new schools to equip and because of the increase in prices of all kinds of supplies, especially paper. At least \$450 should be raised for this account the coming year.

BLUEHILL-GEORGE STEVENS ACADEMY.

For a report of the work of this institution for the past year, I refer you to the report of the principal. As usual, the work has progressed smoothly and steadily, under the guidance of the excellent corps of teachers. Mr. Rowe, the new principal, has won the respect and esteem of the entire student body, and the spirit of the school is of the best.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT.

To the Trustees of Bluehill-George Stevens Academy and Citizens of Bluehill:

As principal of the academy, I submit the following report:

The school has at present fifty-five students—thirty-one girls and twenty-four boys. The senior class numbers ten, the junior eleven, the sophomore nineteen, the freshman fourteen, and there is one special student.

The attendance for the fall term was unusually good, considering that many of our students live so far from the village. The following students were not absent or tardy during the fall term of fourteen weeks: Bertha Hinckley, Nina Horton, Gladys Leach, Esther Astbury, Virginia Chase, Thelma Grindle, Helen McIntyre, Helen Merrill, Howard Curtis, Walter Littlefield, Edward Snow, Mervin Bowden; and these students have not been absent or tardy during the year thus far: Ethel Astbury, Shirley Emerton, Hattie Curtis, James Hall, Harold Osgood, Wallace Perkins and Arthur Snow.

We have appreciated the electric lights, which have made it possible to use the building evenings frequently for social gatherings.

The school has needs which deserve careful consideration. The first and greatest immediate need is a new

encyclopedia, which would cost about \$100. A second is a room equipped for science work. A third is another practical course like our present Teachers' Training course, such as one in business or agriculture. We feel the growing need of such a course, for at present some of the studies we offer students do not interest them, and, unless they get to college, do them little practical benefit, except the benefit always gained from forming right habits by doing whatever they have to do, and doing it well, a benefit which, great as it is, a student finds it hard to see.

Such a course, also, would appeal to that class of students who are now leaving school or are not passing in one or more studies. These are the girls and boys who need our help most, that they may be able to live more happy and useful lives. Finally, the greater the number of pupils our school may reach, the more varied its courses, and the broader its interests, the greater is its influence in the community.

I wish to thank the townspeople, parents, friends, and students for their interest in our school and its activities.

GENERAL REMARKS.

During the fall term many of the teachers took advantage of the day allowed for visiting schools and made a trip to Castine. There they observed work of the normal school classes, and reported an enjoyable and profitable trip. We should encourage teachers in their efforts to improve themselves in their work. I hope many of the teachers can make arrangements to attend some one of the summer schools now open to teachers. It was hoped that a teachers' meeting might be held during the winter

term, but owing to the unusually stormy weather it was thought best to postpone it until the beginning of the spring term.

I notice that Mr. Grindle urged the formation of a Parent-Teacher association in the town. Such organizations have been established this year in Brooklin and Sedgwick, and they have done much to arouse greater interest in the schools and their problems. I would be glad to assist in organizing one in Bluehill if the people of the town feel that they would like to take hold of it. Perhaps the present Village Improvement society might take up the matter. I hope that something of the sort may be done soon.

This year we have been able to maintain a school year of thirty-four weeks, two more than last. I hope we may be able to gradually increase the length until the entire thirty-six weeks may be maintained. Quite an appreciable difference can be noticed in the amount of work accomplished with a school year of thirty-four weeks.

I would like to propose that a ninth grade be added to our present eight-grade system in the village schools. This extra grade would not affect the grading of the rest of the classes, but would simply be added to the present system. It would be my idea to have this ninth grade take up the elementary parts of algebra and Latin and more advanced work in arithmetic and grammar, etc., with the hope of preparing the student more carefully for the work of the freshman year in the academy.

The village schools have been fortunate in obtaining the services of Miss Bostelmann as music teacher the past fall and winter. A concert is to be given soon by the pupils of these schools. The pupils of the grammar school are to be commended for their efforts to secure money for this work. I hope the citizens will see that some arrangement is made for the continuance of this plan.

I take this opportunity to thank the school committee, teachers and others who have helped me in my work. May we not cooperate still further during the coming year and give our children the best schools possible?
