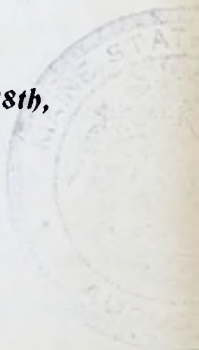

TOWN WARRANT

ANDROSCOGGIN, SS. STATE OF MAINE.

To C. S. Foss, a Constable of Town of Greene, in Said County.

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town of Greene, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town, on the 14th day of March, 1910, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

FIRST. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

SECOND. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

THIRD. To see if the Town will choose one or more Road Commissioners for the ensuing year.

FOURTH. To see if the Town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools, current expenses and cost of poor, repairs of roads and bridges, and defray all other town charges for the ensuing year, including the snow bills for the past year.

FIFTH. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise to pay tuition for ensuing year.

SIXTH. To see if the Town will vote "yes" or "no" upon the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907 as amended by Chapter 69, Public Laws 1909, relating to the appropriation of

money necessary to entitle the Town to State aid for highways for the year 1910.

SEVENTH. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate, in addition to amounts regularly raised and appropriated for the care of highways and bridges, the sum of \$400.00, being the maximum amount which the Town is allowed to raise, under the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, as amended by Chapter 69, Public Laws 1909.

EIGHTH. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise to pay on the debt and interest for the ensuing year.

NINTH. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will grant and raise to cut bushes in the Public Burial Grounds for the ensuing year.

TENTH. To see if the Town will vote to legalize the doings of the Selectmen and Treasurer in the hiring of \$1,850.

ELEVENTH. To see what action the Town will take in regard to moving or building a school-house near the residence of H. L. Keyser and how much money will be set aside for such purpose.

TWELFTH. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise for Memorial Day of the ensuing year.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the voting list, at the Town House, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon of the day of said meeting.

SCHOOLS

At the first meeting of the School Committee for the year it was decided to open and maintain a school in the Mountain school-house, and the wisdom of this move has been shown, as the total registration in this school has been 13, with an average attendance for the year of 11. The other schools were continued as last year, making a total of five schools.

The length of the spring term was ten weeks. The fall and winter terms each continued for eleven weeks, making a total of thirty-two weeks for the year.

The average attendance during the three terms has been 83 per cent. of the number registered. Now, while this may be called a fair showing when all conditions are considered, it would seem that by the united efforts of parents, teachers and the pupils themselves, a still better showing may be hoped for in the future. We also find that more cases of tardiness are reported than seem to be necessary, and we trust that all will agree that it is for the best interests of each school and of every pupil that all members of the school should be present and ready for the work of the day at the appointed time, thus securing the greatest amount of benefit from their attendance.

During the year eight teachers have been employed, nearly all of whom have had considerable experience, and in our opinion have shown great interest in their work and have labored conscientiously for the advancement of those entrusted to their care. Two of this number have remained in the same school during the entire year. Three have taught two terms, and three one term each. We feel that intelligent and enthusiastic service will ever be productive of gratifying results and that on the whole, good work has been done during the past year.

CONVEYANCE

One of the most puzzling questions to be referred to the judgment of school officials is in relation to the conveyance

of pupils who live at some distance from any school. The policy of the past year has been an attempt to dispense with all unnecessary transportation and yet furnish it in all cases where it seemed needful. By so doing, a material reduction has been made in the cost of conveyance, thus making it possible to add two weeks to the school year, giving 32 weeks in all.

We realize that with the small number of pupils in our schools, only 114 different scholars registering during the entire year, that only a few schools can profitably be maintained, thus leaving pupils at such a distance from a school that conveyance seems necessary, at least in a few cases. The cost of the team conveying pupils to the Hill school from the eastern section of the town has been nearly one-half the total cost of transportation. It would seem to be a wise plan to place a school-house at such a point as would be most convenient for all the pupils of this school, thus discontinuing the Hill school, for a time at least, and thereby saving nearly \$200 annually, as well as serving far better the interests of the neighborhood.

BOOKS

During the year the exchange of geographies, which was begun last year, has been completed and an entire change has been made in the grammars. A three-book series has been adopted which gives to the younger pupils an easy introduction to language work.

REPAIRS AND SUPPLIES

The Lane school-house has been shingled and minor repairs made on other buildings. A twelve-inch movable meridian globe has been placed in each school and a line of school report books adopted.

CONCLUSION

Three branches of the School Improvement League have been organized, at the Lane, Corner and Patten schools.

These, if properly conducted, may add much to the interest of the schools and the beauty of their surroundings.

In closing, I wish to express my appreciation of the kindly support given me by citizens, and especially by the members of the school committee, who have done all within their power to make the year both pleasant and profitable.
