WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

Androscoggin, ss.

State of Maine

To L. C. Mendell, Constable of Greene in said County,

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Greene, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said Town on the 12th day of March, 1928, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles to wit:

Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of the Town Officers.

Art. 3. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 4. To see if the Town will choose one or more Road Commissioners.

Art. 5. To see if the Town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools, current expenses and cost of poor, repairs of roads and bridges and defray all other town charges for the year ensuing, including the snow bills for the past year.

Art. 6. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise to pay for High School tuition for the ensuing year.

Art. 7. To see if the Town will vote yes or no on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary

to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 19, of Chapter 25, of the Public Laws of 1916.

Art. 8. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the Section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25 of the Public Laws of 1916.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise to pay on debt and interest for the ensuing year.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise for Memorial Day for the ensuing year.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise for the salary of the Superintendent of Schools for the ensuing year.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise for a Grammar School graduation.

Ar. 13. T see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer to make a temporary loan.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise money and what sum for the maintenance of State and State Aid Highways within the limits of he town, under the provisions of Sections 9 and 18 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise for repairs of Schoolhouses.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise for text books and supplies.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to pay a man, and a man and team per day for labor on the road, also compensation for all Town Officials.

Art. 18. To see if the Town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$120.00 for the maintenance of street lights for the ensuing year.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.

Art. 20. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to lay out a road from the place of Vesta F. Chadbourne in Greene in a northwesterly direction across her land and the land owned by Fred A. Richardson; the road to be about a mile in length and to be of such width as the Selectmen shall deem best, and that one-half of the road shall be on the land of Fred A. Richardson and one-half on the land of Vesta F. Chadbourne; this road, so laid out, to join another road now at the foot of Hatch Hill, so-called.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise to build the road described in the preceding Article.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise to build a wood-shed on the back end of the Town House.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise to purchase a tractor and snow plow.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay the overdraft on the remodelling account, in School Department.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for flags for the Schools.

Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote to continue the Hill School for the coming year.

Art. 27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Health work the ensuing year.

Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote to sell, or raise money to repair the Greene Corner Schoolhouse.

Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to purchase an oil burner for the Patten schoolhouse.

Art. 30. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise to gravel a section of College Road from J. M. Tanguay's residence toward Lewiston.

Art. 31. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise for maintenance of Third Class road.

Art. 32. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise for cutting bushes on the State, State Aid and Third Class Roads.

Art. 33. To see what action the Town will take on any business which may legally come before the meeting and to see what sums of money the Town will grant and raise for same.

Art. 34. To see if the Town will accept the list of Jurors as prepared by the Selectmen, Clerk, and Treasurer.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising the voting list, at the Town House at nine o'clock in the forenoon of the day of said meeting.

REMARKS

As we submit to you our report for the fiscal year of 1927, we will call your attention to a few things accomplished during the year.

We will mention the fact that the Steel Bridge has been put in place at the Thompson Bridge location and if kept painted and planked should make that place safe for many years.

Our business relations with the Central Maine Power Co. on the river have been very satisfactory and we think they have maintained their usual spirit of fairness as they paid \$116.00 for Guard Railing a section of the River Road near Turner Centre Bridge, which we requested be done.

We have a Legislative Resolve fund from the State, available this coming summer of \$1,000.00 to be used on the Meadow Hill road, procured by the efforts of Hon. F. A. Morse and our district representative. This will be a great help to that section of road.

Under the Laws of 1927, the Attorney General ruled that Towns which failed to cut and remove all bushes, weeds, etc., within the road limits of the State Road, State Aid Road and Third Class Road in 1927 were not eligible to Third Class Road State funds in 1928.

Now, we, instead of calling a special Town Meeting for the necessary funds instructed the Road Commissioners to do the work on the State Road and it was carried along in the Town Road account. This work cost \$205.27. P. N. Rose expended \$155.27 in this work and R. A. Wing expended \$50.00. So those amounts should be deducted from their expenditures on the Town Road making their overdrafts that much less as we were responsible for that extra expenditure being made.

On our State Aid Road, R. A. Wing built 1650 ft. of road costing \$1,758.32.

On our Third Class Road, P. N. Rose built 2,300 ft. of road costing \$2,671.24.

On our State and State Aid Maintenance, after paying

to the State \$384.00 for the State Road Maintenance and smoothing the State Aid road several times, the balance of the expenditure was for gravel resurfacing of the State Aid road, and if there could be as much resurfacing done every year it would keep this road in good condition.

The Third Class Road was kept in fine shape, the first two years construction, or about one-half the entire length of the road, was thoroughly resurfaced and the whole length of the road "around two miles" is in excellent condition.

We have expended the past year \$34.00 for clearing cemeteries of bushes and caring for Revolutionary Soldiers' Graves, and there should be two cemeteries fenced the coming year.

The burial of Mrs. Kneeland and the Jacob Cohen fire added to our current expense considerably as you will notice.

We have darwn 949 Town Orders amounting to \$26,312.56 during the past fiscal year.

Thanking you sincerely for your support and courtesy we respectfully submit to you or Report for the fiscal year of 1927.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Greene:

Herewith I present for your consideration my second annual report of the conditions of the schools in your Town.

To preface my remarks I wish to quote a few words from a recent speech of Calvin Coolidge, President of the United States.

“Education raises persons above their surroundings and makes them masters of themselves, rather than being mere creatures of circumstance. It is not enough merely to know how to get a living, it is necessary to know how to live.”

The schools should first of all provide the working tools in that great endeavor of securing a livelihood and at the same time this early training should provide means by which these young citizens may govern themselves harmoniously. This is a big undertaking and requires the best kind of teachers. That we are able to compete at all with our big brother, the city, approaches the miraculous.

This year we are fortunate in having a corps of excellent teachers who are striving with all their might to improve our schools. They are doing excellent work and they appreciate your co-operation and help. The school and the home working together can accomplish wonders.

We were fortunate this year in securing Mrs. Virginia Beal as helping teacher. The class room instruc-

tion has improved and I believe that the pupils have benefited greatly by it. However we must not let up in our endeavor for our teaching is far from perfect. Education is not stationary, we go ahead or we fall behind. The work of the helping teacher keeps the other teachers on the alert and greatly improves the efficiency of the school.

This past year I have endeavored to improve the instruction by the means of teacher's meetings or institutes. At the first meeting held at Turner Center I endeavored to explain the general management of the schools. The following subjects were taken up: The Aim of Rural Education, the drive for this year (reading to understand), the opening of school, discipline, grading, school activities and school records. The second meeting was held at Turner Village. Miss Pansy Smith of Boston gave an interesting talk on reading and explained the Beacon Method. The last meeting was held in the Patten school, Mrs. Beal gave a demonstration in first grade reading and Miss Lou Buker, Primary Supervisor of Reading in the City of Augusta, gave a very helpful talk on the problems in reading. These meetings I believe have been very beneficial to the teachers and I regret that the distribution of the schools prohibit the holding of more such meetings. For this spring I have planned to hold another meeting for all the teachers at which I want to make up and explain the psychology back of the class room recitation. The place and time of this meeting has not been decided. Notice will be given in due time and any parent that wishes is cordially invited to attend.

This past year the Mountain school house was remodelled to meet the State requirements. This piece of work is most satisfactory and we cordially invite you to inspect this school house. Funds did not allow us to complete the work for there is a front sill that needs to be renewed and one side of the roof will need to be cared for within a few years. This coming year I hope to place new windows at the Morse school for at present the light there is very poor. A jacket was placed on the stove at the Morse and the heating in that school is improved. A new stove was placed in the Lane school. It will only be a matter of a few years before new desks will be necessary in the Lane school for the ones being used there at present are in very poor condition. The gutters on the Patten school need attention and I hope to have these repaired this coming summer. The insurance on the Patten school I believe should be purchased on the three year basis thereby saving the town the cost of one-half year's insurance.

At town meeting I will have a report to make on the oil burner that is being tried out at the Patten school.

I would like to have some health work done in the schools this coming spring and have asked for an appropriation for the same. Last year the Town of Turner had some work done in dental hygiene with most

satisfactory results. During the fall term there was not one absence because of toothache.

The instruction in music this year has been under the supervision of Mrs. Ruby Briggs, who has given us one day a week during such time as it was possible to visit the schools. I feel that you will be pleased with the Children's Day Entertainment which will be given May 17. Mrs. Briggs report follows.

To the Superintendent of Schools:

It is with pleasure that I submit my first report to the citizens of Leeds and Greene.

In terms of hearty praise would I speak of the co-operation received, especially from the teachers, for what is done in the school room thruout the week in daily practice is the only way to gain results.

I am much pleased in the individual voices, in getting the children to sing alone, for in this way they have the confidence to appear before the public. What parent is not proud to see his boy or girl the center of attraction?

Some time has been spent on two part music and I hope by the close of the school year to have accomplished something in this line.

It seems a pity that one can not make visits thru the winter months but sometime this difficulty may be overcome.

The traveling Victrola has proved a source of enjoyment as well as being instructive. We have new records and a new way of presenting the Listening Lessons which I think very good.

In the way of entertainment, the pupils in all of the schools in Leeds did credit to themselves in their Childrens Day program at the Grange and I think the pupils of Greene have a similar day this spring, May 17th.

Members of the V. A. Deane High School may take part in the festival at Lewiston in May.

In closing I wish to speak of the willing spirit of the boys and girls and of the kind words and help of the

Superintendent and committee. It certainly has been much appreciated.
