Town Warrant

To William Tomlinson, a Constable in the Town of Rangeley, in the County of Franklin, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Rangeley, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at Oakes & Badger's hall in said town, on the seventh day of March, A. D. 1921, at one o'clock in the afternoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

ARTICLE 1

To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE 2

To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 3

To hear reports of Town officers and take action thereon.

ARTICLE 4

To choose all other Town officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 5

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of a Free High School for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 6

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of common schools for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 7

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the purchase of textbooks for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 8

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the repairs of schoolhouses for the ensuing year.

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay for supplies for the schools for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 10

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of the poor for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 11

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the repair of highways for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 12

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the repair of bridges for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 13

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for breaking winter roads for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 14

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay the interest on Town bonds for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 15

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to build and repair sidewalks in Rangeley village for the ensuing year, and how same shall be expended.

ARTICLE 16

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day, and how same shall be expended.

ARTICLE 17

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Library association for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 18

To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on taxes, and if so, how much, and how much money shall be raised to pay discount.

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to pay Rangeley Water Company for the use of water for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 20

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay miscellaneous expenses for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 21

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay the expenses of office of the Selectmen for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 22

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay abatement of taxes for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 23

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay Town officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 24

To see if the Town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the Town to State aid, as provided by section 18 of chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

ARTICLE 25

To see if the Town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$732.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the Town is allowed to raise under the provisions of section 18, chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

ARTICLE 26

To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise to pay the Oquossoc Light and Power Co., for Road light outside of the Village Corporation.

To see if the Town will vote to have the streets in Rangeley Village sprinkled and, if so, to raise money for the same, or take any action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 28

To see how much money, if any, the Town will vote to raise to pay on Town debt.

ARTICLE 29

To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise to pay for care and improvements of the following cemeteries in town:—Village, Nile and White Schoolhouse, so called.

ARTICLE 30

To see if the Town will vote to elect one or more fire wards, as required by chapter 108 of the Public Laws of 1913, and to take any action relative to the same that the Town may vote.

ARTICLE 31

To see what action the Town will vote to take upon section 21, chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916, as amended by section 5 of chapter 258, Public Laws of 1917, which provides for towns making additional appropriations and receiving additional aid and a bonus; and what sum of money the Town will vote to raise, or instruct the selectmen to hire, if any, for said purpose.

ARTICLE 32

To see if the Town will vote to provide a night watchman for Rangeley Village, if so, to proceed to raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 33

To see if the Town will vote to pay the J. M. Munyon Estate the sum of \$600.00 for lands and dam as specified and described in the petition presented to the municipal officers signed by F. B. Colby, M. D. and twenty-nine others, tax-paying citizens of Rangeley. Meaning the same lands, dam, et cetera, taken by eminent domain by the Town of Rangeley through its municipal officers, the date of said taking being March 3, 1917; if so, proceed to raise money for the same; excepting such, if any, as sold and deeded from same.

To see if the Town will raise money, and how much, for a Mothers' Aid Fund.

ARTICLE 35

To see if the Town will vote to make permanent improvements in certain places on the Carry Road, so called, between Oquossoc and Haines Landing and any other place or places in town on town ways, if so, proceed to raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 36

To see if the Town will vote to extend or pay \$4,000.00 of town bonds that were due December, 1919, and to proceed to raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 37

To see how much money, if any, the Town will vote to raise for patrol and maintenance, if so, proceed to raise the money for same.

ARTICLE 38

To see if the Town will vote to buy of the Grange their stable, piano, furnace, dishes and chairs, if so, to proceed to raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 39

To see if the Town will vote to sell any, or all, of the following properties owned by the town:—Town House, White Schoolhouse, Frazer Schoolhouse, so called, or to take any action the voters may vote.

ARTICLE 40

To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that part of the County Road over the top of the Big Hill, so called; meaning that part of said road which has not been used for many years.

ARTICLE 41

To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the lists of voters, at the Town hall at 12:30 o'clock in the afternoon on the day of said meeting.



To the Citizens of the town of Rangeley:

Find herewith the fifth annual report since the Rangeley School Union was formed, ending to date March 1, 1921.

The work of the school year ending June 30, 1920, was, in some respects, of a doubtful character. Low salaries, a continual "merry-go-round" in changing of teachers, uncertainties growing out of unsettled conditions, high prices for "upkeep," and a failure to make due preparation, all contributed to the unpleasantness of the situation.

But since the opening in September school matters have moved along more gracefully. Our salaries have increased; we have had no changing of teachers, we have had only a slight epidemic of whooping cough, and an occasional warning that the prices of certain commodities might be increased "without notice."

At the present time we are employing nine teachers in the town of Rangeley and some way ought to be provided to retain for another year those who are meeting with a high degree of success. Rangeley should not pose as a laboratory where inexperienced teachers may experiment for a brief period and then go elsewhere.

The most unfortunate backward step for the past year has been elimination of music from our schools. The children of our town should be regarded as worthy a partial music education as well as a partial mathematical one. Possibly quite as many homes in Rangeley have been made more happy by some daily musical exercise as by some mathematical performance.

The Maine Legislature (Chap. 73, P. L. 1919) has made Physical Education mandatory on all the towns and cities of the state, including both elementary and high schools. For this year we seem to be able to "bridge over" by requiring certain physical exercises in the class room. Very likely the state will press this matter from year to year until Rangeley will be called upon to regard it seriously. The time may come when the town will feel that some gymnasium privileges should be provided for this part of our required training. Would it seem advisable to advocate that the town move the "Kennebago" school building to the village and transform it into a gymnasium, or that certain changes be made in the Town Hall for the same purpose? Perhaps in this connection the town ought to be urged to make a small appropriation for medical inspection for the coming year. This should be sufficient to defray the expense of referring to our local physician suspicious cases of ills and ailments so common among children and regarding which the teacher does not feel competent to pronounce judgment.

At the opening of school in September several unfortunate irregularities in grading were discovered, due to certain conditions prevailing at the time of closing of school in June. These were readjusted, in many cases, and the teachers have been urged to use every means available to avoid its recurrence next June. With this end in view all pupils were rated at the middle of the present school year, February 1. The teachers were requested to send notices to the parents of those pupils who were at the time below grade. In this way we have been trying to save some of the children who might otherwise lose the year. We presume that the parents would rather know this too early than too late and we solicit their co-operation in this undertaking. Especially should parents on receipt of these notices arrange with the teacher to offer such encouragement as may be possible to assist the back-

ward pupils.

The Educational Department at Augusta has outlined certain requirements to be met by the authorities having oversight of the class "A" high schools. These call for an expenditure of \$1.00 per pupil for books and material for our high school library and \$1.00 per pupil for material for chemical and physical laboratory. This year we have not met fully the library condition, but probably more "

than complied with the requirement for our laboratory.

In the fall of 1919 we admitted to our high school both the 8th and 9th grades from the grammar school. No discrimination of these classes was shown. There were eighteen pupils from the 9th grade and seventeen from the 8th. Some uncertainty has been expressed on the wisdom of eliminating entirely from our schools the ninth year of work. In this connection it is interesting to note that at the present time just 50 per cent. of those admitted from the 9th grade, nearly two years ago, are now in school, and 69 per cent. are in school of those who were admitted from the 8th grade at that time. This should not be regarded in a large sense as a final argument for this policy of school administration. It is good as far as it goes and is certainly encouraging. It may seem advisable to follow up these two classes for the remainder of the course before a final conclusion is reached.

At the high school commencement last June the follow-

The matter of conveyance remains nearly the same as last year except a slight increase in cost. Mr. Ira D. Hoar still continues to bring in the children from the Kennebago community at a cost of \$4.00 per day, and is conveying about fourteen pupils. Mr. George R. Pillsbury is rendering a similar service in the White District, so called, bringing in seven pupils at \$3.00 per day. Fred Pillsbury & Co., convey from that section at a cost of \$2.00 per day for three pupils. This means \$9.00 per day for the care of twenty-four pupils or at the rate of about .37 per day for full time. But all parties driving conveyance teams are paid only for service rendered.

COMMON SCHOOL PROGRAM FOR THE COMING YEAR

It is hardly necessary to remind the town that we had a complete change of elementary teachers at the opening of schools in September. This is quite a common occurrence in Rangeley and is not always regarded as a favorable omen. To avoid a repetition of this we are asking for an appropriation sufficient to offer some increase in two or three instances in order that our more deserving and conscientious teachers may be induced to remain for another year. The following outline represents approximately what we have in mind:

It is highly improbable that we shall be able to retain the most efficient of our high school teachers for another year at our prevailing rate of salaries. It is quite likely that to secure new ones at our present schedule would be attended with some difficulty. Very likely it will be some years before the teaching profession becomes stabilized. We are accordingly calling your attention to the following high school program for the coming year:

We have made a good beginning in the improvement of the grounds at the Oquossoc school. Last year's appropriation was inadequate for the work and we are hoping that the town will make it possible to complete the improvements this year.

SCHOOL REPAIRS

Much of the wood work on the interior of our high school building needs revarnishing and some wainscotting should be placed on the plastered walls. The interior wood work has about 5000 sq. ft. of surface. The material and

labor for this work will probably cost \$150.00.

Two or three painters were asked last year to make estimates on painting the high school building but we did not succeed in interesting them. The house is 340 ft. in circuit and about 32 feet in the wall. Including the tower and gable there would probably be a painting surface of 11,000 sq. ft. which will require about 40 gallons of paint for two coats. We are estimating the cost of this work at \$400.00.

We have neglected to repair the concrete floor in one of the basements for some time. It is in rather poor condition and to resurface this will cost, according to a recent estimate about \$100.00.

Extensive repair work is called for on the ceiling in the upper corridor. This contains about 500 sq. ft. and based on the expenditure for similiar work last year this will cost about \$90.00.

We are asking for \$200.00 for emergency repair work, much of which may need to be applied to our present heat-

ing plant.

Three parties have made inquiries for the selling price of the "Kennebago" School Property. One has made a similar inquiry relative to the "White" school building. And one has asked if the shed at the Quimby is for sale. Both of these school houses are not in use and have been idle for some years. They are worth less this year than they were last. The question is raised;—what are we keeping them for? The town is carrying \$1,300.00 insurance on this property. Why not dispose of them and remodel the Town Hall for Gymnasium purposes for our schools?
