# Superintendent of Schools.

Summing up the work of the year, the schools of the town, as a whole have been successful. While everything has not been accomplished that we might desire, some important things have been done tending to bring our schools to a better graded system.

Owing to the crowded condition of the Primary school, your school Board had the house in Division two fitted up for the Intermediate grade, by laying a new floor, sheathing the lower part of the walls, and putting in new seats. This gave us an out-let for the fifth and sixth grade scholars from the Primary school and those of the seventh and eighth grade from the Grammar school.

Our schools have been under the care of teachers of experience, who have been interested in their work and given good results.

We need an appropriation for the purchase of maps, globes and dictionaries. Some of our schoolrooms do not contain either, while others have only an apology, which has seen its day of usefulness.

Owing to the worn out conditions of a large part of our text books, the school Board introduced the following on the exchange basis: "Progressive course in Reading," "Mother Tongue," Grammar (two book series,) and "Davis and Deans" Geography, (Intermediate and advanced course.) The purchase of these, together with the text books required for the third year course in our high school has overdrawn our appropriation to some extent.

I wish to thank all with whom I have been associated for suggestions received; and for their kindness and courtesy during the last year.

# STATE OF MAINE.

Waldo, s. s. To W. S. Jones, a constable in the town of Brooks, in said county, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the Inhabitants of said town of Brooks, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Union Hall in said town, on Monday the 11th. day of March 1907, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- First—To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Second—To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing, and fix their compensation if it may be necessary.
- Third—To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools; and the poor; and repair of roads and bridges, and to defray all other town charges for the ensuing year.
- Fourth—To see how much money the town will raise for the free high school.
- Fifth—To see how much money the town will raise for the state road.
- Sixth—To see if the town will fix the compensation of the supervisor of schools.
- Seventh—To see if the town will elect one or more road commissioners and fix their compensation.
- Eighth—To see if the town will vote to charge interest on all unpaid taxes after Feb. 15, 1908.
- Ninth—To see if the town will instruct the select-

- men to put into the tax collectors bond that all taxes of the year shall be settled in full by Feb. 15, 1909.
- Tenth—To see if the town will vote to support a public watering tub in the village.
- Eleventh—To see what action the town will take in regard to its bonded indebtedness which falls due July 1st., 1907.
- Twelfth—To see if the town will vote to continue its sinking fund investments
- Thirteenth—To see if the town will vote to require the tax collector to render to the selectmen of the town on the last Saturday of each month a detailed account of all taxes collected and turned over to the town treasurer during the month.
- Fourteenth—To see what compensation the town will vote to pay for labor upon the highway and upon the state road.
- Fift enth—To see if the town will vote to pay Geo.
- H. Ryder more damages for the land taken for the Emmons street in 1906 than the selectmen allowed him.
- Sixteenth—To see if the town will rent the piece of land upon which the woodshed of C. E. Peavey stands, within the limits of the Emmons street, to the said Peavey for a term of years, and if so on what terms.
- Seventeenth—To see if the town will vote to abate the tax of Will Work for 1906 on buildings burned.
- Eighteenth—To see if the town will vote to abate the tax of A. B. Payson for 1506 on buildings burned.
- Nineteenth—To see if the town would be in favor of the selectmen granting a permit to the Monroe

and Brooks Telephone Co., the right of way privilege along the roads and streets of the town.

Twentieth—To see if the town will vote to pay no cash for highway labor to persons whose taxes are unpaid.

Twenty First—To see if the town will vote to instruct and empower their selectmen to hire money to pay the interest on its debt and to pay its-interest bearing orders, should it become necessary.

Twenty Second—To see if the town will instruct the selectmen to purchase the Rose lot for an addition to the new cemetary, or instruct them to see what it can be purchased for and report later.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at Union Hall aforesaid, at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
