

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Islesboro, qualified by law to vote in Town Affairs, to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Monday the Second day of March A. D., 1942 at ten o'clock in the forenoon E. W. T. to act upon the following articles to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To receive the report of the several town officers and act upon the same.
- Art. 4. To see what percent the town will vote to pay its Tax Collector for collecting taxes and the length of time from the date of commitment, taxes shall be paid to the Town Treasurer.
- Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to employ a Doctor for the ensuing year.
 - (a) To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay a Doctor.
 - (b) To see whom the town will vote for the Selectmen to employ.

- Art. 8. To see what amount of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Support of Schools.
- Art. 9. To see what amount of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Repairing of School Buildings.
- Art. 10. To see what wages the Town will vote to pay for men, trucks and horses on the highways for the ensuing year.
- Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen in behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable and to execute quit claim deeds for such property.
- Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer to procure a temporary loan or loans not exceeding a total sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00) and to execute and deliver in the name of the town, its note or notes therefor, said loan or loans to be paid during the municipal year out of money raised by taxes during such current year.

- Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer to make temporary loan or loans not exceeding \$6,000.00 to cover a possible deficit in the Ferry Accounts for the ensuing year.
- Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate sufficient amount of money for the proper maintenance of approximately Two Hundred Fifty feet of Point Comfort Road; as the above mentioned stretch of road is now impassable at times.

The Selectmen give notice they will be in session at the Town Hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon on day of said meeting for the purpose of revising the list of voters in the Town of Islesboro.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the Citizens of Islesboro:

I herewith submit my fourth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

A survey of our schools shows that at present we have 125 children attending school, 80 in grade schools and 45 in high school. 16 seniors were graduated from high school last year, and 19 from the eighth grade. We had 10 beginners in school and 14 freshmen at the high school in September. These young people have been offered coursés approved by the State Department of Education, and each has shown the required proficiency before being promoted from one grade to the next. Attendance has been at a high level this year, and there has been a minimum of absence due to sickness or other causes so that our schools have been able to get ahead above the average rate.

The resignation of Mrs. Nancy MacLanchlan at the Christmas recess made possible the temporary closing of the Ryder school and the setting up of a general school bus service. The children have the benefit of a two-teacher school and a regular school bus. This is considered a safer conveyance and a more desirable arrangement so far as school practice is concerned, and, in this case, is less expensive to the town. In view of the fact that the school bus provided has ample room the high school students are permitted to ride without added cost to the town.

On Dec. 6, 1941 a citizens meeting was held to endeavor to find out how the town felt about relocating the schools of the town. Growing out of a demand at that meeting the school committee acting in conjunction with the town officers had an inspection of the town hall made by Crowell & Lancester, a firm of registered architects. In their opinion copies of which are on file at the Selectmen's and Superintendent's offices, with the repairs then underway (and since completed) the building was entirely safe for use either or both as a town hall or school house so far as collapse in anyway was concerned. It was further pointed out in the citizens' meeting that with the small enrollment in the grade schools of the town we could have more efficient schools if they were maintained as three units instead of five as then in effect. Floor space for three units is available in present buildings without major repairs if the town hall space is allowed to be used. The savings made in teachers' salaries and fuel will more than offset the cost of conveyance and give more money for other purposes of the schools. Moreover, with all the children of a grade in the same building it will be possible to set up a uniform system of textbooks less expensively to the town. Please bear in mind that these are statements of fact and not necessarily recommendations of your school committee. The committee is the servant of the voters and will be glad to carry out your wishes in the matter.

Economies have been practiced in the school department so that the accounts would not be overdrawn, but I feel it is my duty to point out that there is a limit to which sacrifice can be made and still keep our schools on the plane which I feel sure the town wishes to have them. Amount available in 1940-41 was \$400 less than the year before. Amount available this year was \$535 less than 1940-41. These are trying times and all costs are necessarily high but I feel that we should be very unwise to affect further economies at the expense of our children. I urge you to provide as well as possible for the schools.

It is with regret we note the passing of Mrs. Eugenia Rowling and Miss Anne Farnsworth. The schools have lost much when they lose these two fine teachers. Requiescat.

In closing I wish to call attention to the part our young people are playing in this period of National emergency. It will be noted that practically every one of them is either in service or is directly connected with the defense program. This showing if no other justifies our efforts in the schools.

Thank you for this opportunity to report.

Report of High School Principal

To the Superintendent of Schools, the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of Islesboro:

I do, herewith present my report of the High School for the year ending March, 1941.

The fall term opened September 8, 1941, with an enrollment of 51 pupils. Of these 17 were boys and 34 girls. But at the opening of the Winter Term, we have but 46 pupils, due to the fact that many of the families have moved away to secure work at the defense work centers.

Some seventeen of our young people have joined the Armed Forces of the United States and are now serving in the four corners of the globe.

Our basketball teams have been very successful; both in the number of games won and in the friendships formed with members of the visiting teams.

Due to the War and the different priorities, I feel that we will have to make a drastic change in our Athletic program. Just what this change will be, I cannot say at the present time. It may lead to the cancellation altogether of our interscholastic contests, but this will have its advantages. It may be the means of discovering new and undeveloped talents.

Our Boys' Minstrel Show this fall proved very successful, and the girls, not to be outdone are presenting an All-Girl Minstrel Show this season. Our Senior Play is also to be presented in the coming weeks.

Since Christmas vacation, we have added to our curricula, a course in General Mathematics. This is more of

1:

a supplementary course than one of replacement. The College Preparatory students will take Algebra and Geometry during their last three years of high school.

Our High School still meets with the requirements set up by the State of Maine Department of Education for a "Class A" high school. There is on display in the high school building, a certificate to that effect.

I take this opportunity to publicly compliment those young people who have made such a fine showing for themselves in their chosen fields. They are a credit to both the Town and the School. May they always keep up the good work.

I wish to express my gratitude to the Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Howard D. Fowlie, the Superintending School Committee, Miss Verna Diggles, Mrs. Eleanor Mills, Mr. Fletcher Alley of the high school faculty and to Reverend and Mrs. Lauris Whitman, for without whose help and cooperation little could have been accomplished. To all those who have contributed in any and every way to the success of the school, I give my sincere thanks.

Report of Supervisor of Music

Jan. 24, 1942

Supt. Fowlie and Board of Education:

It is my privilege to submit my first report as supervisor of music in the Islesboro schools.

While it is difficult for a new teacher to see results in the first half year, I do feel that the school music is showing progress.

The Primary Grades have had the usual rote songs, the aim of which, is to increase their vocabulary and a love of singing. A class with a lot of songs at its disposal is never dull. Ear training and tone placing have not been neglected. Dramatized songs, which the Eastern Music Conference has recently introduced, prove enjoyable to the children. The first fundamentals in note reading will be taken in this last half of the year.

The rhythm band fills an important place in the teaching of time, and much interest is shown in this.

The Grammar Grades have had the usual drill in note reading and technique. Excellent two part work is being done in the upper grades. A Harmonica Band was organized last term and a large number have purchased harmonicas. The children seem to enjoy this novel way of producing tones which they must be able to read before playing.

The Music Appreciation in Islesboro schools is especially interesting because of the large library of records at the disposal of the class, and the use of the splendid radio-phonograph!

The Grammar schools are learning the tones of orchestral instruments and voice qualities, as well as how to listen intelligently to all types of music.

Work has been started on an Operetta "The Maid and The Golden Slipper" which will be presented as the annual music exhibit. The cast includes children from all the grades.

I would like to stress here the need of a piano for the Pendleton school. This would greatly add to the enjoyment of the singing and aid in tone placing.

The High School music continues along the outline of the State program of school music, and I am happy to say, ours compared favorably with that of other schools of similar size.

New work books in Appreciation have been used in the upper classes and the cultured value of music is emphasized. Ranks average well and show a favorable interest in this subject, which must be accepted with Literature and Art. New chorus work has been purchased and time is given to singing each week.

The boys and girls have each presented an entertainment in the form of a Minstrel Show. These may be considered more recreational than educational, but good proceeds have been added to the athletic fund, and I have been principally interested in their love of singing.

An Operetta "College Days" will be presented later in the year and the usual program music for graduation is being prepared.

I have visited each grade school three days each week, and the High School two days each week.

Through this report I wish to thank the teachers for their splendid co-operation and extend to all parents and friends an invitation to visit the Music Classes.

Report of Islesboro Sailor's Memorial

To the Selectmen of Islesboro:

Though Islesboro Sailor's Memorial was open to the public last summer for a period shorter by three weeks than in the preceding season, more than one hundred more visitors registered than in 1940. The new record book, given by Frederick Bertolet of Reading, Penna., shows that 1,189 out of town guests visited the Memorial in the period between June 15 and Sept. 15. These with the home town folk who registered brought the number to well above 1,300.

The Memorial was fortunate in receiving from Charles Dana Gibson three oil paintings of local men who have helped to make town history. Many visitors, some from distant places, declared they made their visitation for the sole purpose of seeing these pictures. Mr. Gibson himself came to the Memorial to supervise the hanging. These, and the handsome outside sign given by Miss Alice P. Stevens of New York, were factors in the increased patronage.

The registers now show that the Memorial has had visitors from every continent in the world except Australia. A caller from Algiers in the past summer added Africa to the list. Several South American countries are represented on the books, but they still lack registrations from North and South Dakota to complete the complement of the United States.

Among the visitors last summer were many from the conquered countries of Europe, refugees who had fled their

own lands to escape the horrors of war. Among the countries thus represented were Hungary, Austria, Czecho-Slovakia and Kaukasus. Several of these had borne royal titles in their home lands under former governments. These came to Islesboro and Dark Harbor to visit acquaintances among our summer colonists.

Donors to the Memorial's collection during the summer included: Mrs. Louden (Kate Durkin) Page of Beverly, Mass., Ralph Pendleton, Brooklyn, N. Y., Mr. and Mrs. Charles Charest, Mt. Vernon, N. Y., Mr. and Mrs. Charles Dana Gibson, Mrs. Cora Coombs Collins, Melrose, Mass., who together with four of the grandchildren of the late Joseph William Collins, formerly of Islesboro, gave a valuable volume on fisheries and game in New England; Harvey Knight, Camden, Miss Alice Williams, East Longmeadow, Mass., Miss Alice L. Pendleton, Islesboro and Brooklyn, N. Y., and the following local folk: Millard Boardman, Pearl V. Fairfield and Capt. Hobart Dodge.

Capt. John Dodge of Baltimore, Md., formerly a resident of Islesboro, is sending a piece of the torpedo which so recently almost sank his ship off the Atlantic coast when the vessel was attacked by an enemy submarine. Alpheus Pendleton is giving an ancient flint-lock rifle with attached bayonet, used by his grandfather, Samuel Pendleton, in the war of 1812.

The flag given by the late Mrs. Emma Pendleton Davies, had become badly frayed and weather beaten in the three summers it had flown in the grounds. Mrs. E. Delmar Hatch took the bunting home and repaired it so completely that it will do service another season.

Vesper services were held each Sunday evening during the summer last year with several guest speakers; among them was the wife of a high-ranking officer of the British Navy, who wished to remain anonymous because of the important secret mission on which her husband, whom she accompanied here, was in America. Other guest speakers included the Rev. Frank Haggard of Hartford, Conn., the Rev. John Frazee of New York City and the Rev. C. Leslie Glenn of Washington, D. C.
