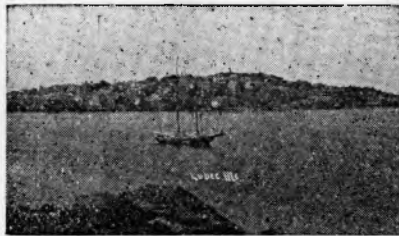

School Superintendent's Report

TO THE SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE OF LUBEC—
GENTLEMEN:—

I hereby submit my second annual report of the condition and progress of your public schools.

VILLAGE SCHOOL

We began the fall term in the village under unfavorable conditions. Work upon the grade building had not been completed and we opened the fall term in a building that was not ready for occupancy.

It was also necessary to crowd the high school into the same building with the grades, and this has occasioned more or less confusion, and the loss both to the grades and to the high school, has been very apparent to all. Considering the difficulties, I have only words of praise for your teachers.

Under the efficient direction of Miss Olive Y. Coolidge, the different grade teachers are doing excellent work. The new teachers, Miss Etta Trecartin, Miss Gretchen Mulholland, and Miss Lena Sperry have already proven their worth, and in all the different rooms the pupils and teachers are working together to make the schools of Lubec rank among the first. The work that is being done in your different schools is worthy of praise; yet the number of parents and citizens who visit the schools and see what is being done in the different rooms is far too small. I wish to invite more of you as parents and citizens to visit the schools and spend a part of some day in getting acquainted with your child's teacher. A few words of encouragement coming from any parent is a great help, and I am sure that most of your teachers deserve such words.

RURAL SCHOOLS.

Taken as a whole, the work of the rural schools during the past year has been very satisfactory. Space will not allow me to review what has been accomplished in each rural school, or to compare these schools. Briefly, the work of your rural schools can be summed up by saying, that in these districts where we have secured trained and experienced teachers; we have had a successful school; in those schools where inexperienced teachers have been placed, the work has not been as satisfactory. The town is to be congratulated upon the standard which it is demanding for its teachers, and I believe the citizens of any rural community have the right and should demand the same training and efficiency on the part of its teacher as is demanded in the village and city schools.

The teacher of a rural school also has a right to demand a comfortable school house, efficient janitor service, and a satisfactory boarding place. While most of the rural school houses are in good condition, one or two are in need of repairs, and money should be raised at the annual meeting for that purpose. I am glad to announce that during the past year permanent improvements have been made in several of these rural schools. A steam heating plant has been installed at No. 3. South; a heating and ventilating stove has been placed in the "Ridge School", sanitary closets have been placed in the school at No. 9; the school room at Bailey's Mistake has been enlarged; and minor repairs made upon other buildings as needed.

THE NEW GRADE BUILDING

While there are always improvements to be made in any new structure and even though there are desirable minor changes that should be planned for the near future, the new grade building is one of which the town has reason to be proud. The lighting of the different rooms with the adjustable curtains which have been put in is admirable. The ventilation, as soon as some minor changes are made in certain shafts, will be all that could be desired.

Considered as a grade building, the building is admirably planned and suited to the needs of the town. The change from the old grade building to the new is one that is appreciated by both pupils and teachers.

HALF DAY SESSIONS

At the beginning of the fall term, the number of pupils enrolled in the first grade at the village school was too many for one teacher and in October the grade was divided.

One half of the pupils attended the forenoon session and the rest came in the afternoon.

During the winter term, the number of pupils decreased so that both divisions were allowed to attend both forenoon and afternoon.

If the number increases for the spring term as we expect it will, we shall again resume the half-day session plan.

By so doing the teacher will have more time for the individual pupil, the child will not become so tired of his school work, and at the end of the school year I believe the pupils will have better preparation for second grade.

COURSE OF STUDY

At the beginning of the fall term, there was placed in the hands of each teacher a course of study for the different grades. This course follows the outline made out by the State Educational Department and is the same for both rural and village schools.

A well defined course of study is a great help in any school system, because it gives definiteness to the efforts of the teacher, and directs those efforts along the line of systematic progress.

To the new and inexperienced teacher, the course is invaluable as it shows plainly the work that should be done by the different classes.

By emphasizing the essentials, the course will make for thoroughness, especially in the rural schools, where the tendency of some teachers has been to pass rapidly over work which was not understood by the pupils.

WEEKLY REPORTS.

Weekly reports are required from each teacher showing attendance, tardiness, cases of dismissal, loss of time, cases of corporal punishment, etc. The report also shows the needs of the school, in regard to supplies, repairs, books, etc. These reports are of great assistance in keeping in touch with the rural schools.

HELPFUL ORGANIZATIONS.

The Parent-Teacher Association, which has been formed in the village, and the School Improvement Leagues, in the different rural schools, are valuable additions and of great assistance, and have done much to make the school year successful.

These School Improvement Leagues, which during the past year were in ten of our rural schools, are doing excellent work in promoting better rural school conditions, and the financial assistance which they render, must not be overlooked.

In the village, several meetings of the Parent-Teacher Association have been held, and at these, the attendance and interest both of parents and teachers, have been pleasing.

These organizations afford an opportunity for the parents to become familiar with the actual work done in the schools; and they can be of greater assistance in securing adequate equipment, in improving the general sanitary conditions, in demanding efficient teachers, and in creating those underlying conditions in the community without which, schools of the highest type are impossible.

MUSIC INSTRUCTION

At this time I would call the attention of the School Committee to the need of systematic instruction in music in the different schools. Music in the public schools has great educational value and must not be looked upon as an accomplishment for the talented. The study of music should not be confined to those who display unusual ability or taste in that direction.

Properly taught, music trains the ear, the eye, the voice, and the hand, and furnishes the best kind of exercise for the intellect. It is not the aim of public school music to turn out musicians, but to make appreciative listeners.

We need a Supervisor of music in our schools.

It is in the instruction of music and drawing that the schools of Lubec are behind the schools of other places.

The Maine school Report for the year 1913, shows that eighty five towns and cities in Maine have special instruction in music. In fact at the present time there is hardly a town in the state of the size of Lubec, where systematic instruction in music is not given.

By joining with Eastport or some other town, a special teacher of music could be employed who would give her whole time to this department, and the cost to each town would certainly not be prohibitive.

For the improvement of your schools, I believe this step should be taken.

HIGH SCHOOL.

The work of the High School during the year, has not been entirely satisfactory either to the teachers, or to myself.

The crowded condition of the pupils throughout the year, has occasioned more or less loss. In the recitations, too many of the pupils have shown a lack of preparation. And when one considers what is being done by the citizens of the town to maintain a good High School, the spirit of the student body is certainly in need of improvement.

I call your attention to the report of Principal Prock, and especially do I commend his words on attendance and study hours.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation of the hearty co-operation of my teachers, of the unfailing support of the committee, and of the interest shown by the citizens.

Report of Principal of High School.

TO THE SUPERINTENDENT AND SCHOOL COMMITTEE—
GENTLEMEN:—

In accordance with the usual custom, as principal of Lubec High School, I hereby submit my second annual report.

STATISTICS

The total registration at the beginning of the school year was 140, consisting of 28 Seniors, 32 Juniors, 39 Sophomores and 40 Freshmen. This was a slight increase over last year. There was one special. One Sophomore and five Freshmen enrolled at the close of last school year, did not return last September. Two Juniors who were each conditioned in three subjects at the close of last year, wished to enter the Senior class, but they were not allowed to do this, so they left school. One Junior, who was conditioned in one subject at the beginning of the year, having failed in every study but one during the Fall term, has been put back into the Sophomore class. Another Junior left soon after school opened, because, on account of sickness last spring, she was so far behind her class. Two Sophomores have left this winter, because of indisposition to do their school work. Three Freshmen have left because the work was too hard. The Special became tired of school work and left at the close of the Fall term. One Sophomore came from Framingham, Mass. High School. There are now enrolled 28 Seniors, 30 Juniors, 38 Sophomores and 37 Freshmen, making a total of 133.

ATTENDANCE.

So far this year the attendance has been very good, considering the long distances many students have to come, and the numerous bad storms. The students have been unusually well so but very little time has been lost on account of sickness of any kind,

The average attendance of the students living out of the village, has generally been better than that of those living in town. Why parents living in town, should allow their children to stay out of school so much, is one of the puzzling things to teachers. Is it because of the indifference of these parents? If so, I sincerely hope that Parent-Teachers' Association will make them realize their duty and responsibility to their children in school affairs.

To do good work, and to get the most out of school, every pupil must be in school every day, and must be attentive and studious. Parents, it is your duty to see that your children get all they possibly can out of their High School course.

VISITS OF CITIZENS.

There have been eighteen visits by citizens, since the school opened last September. This is a gain over last year, being almost twice as many. This is by far too small a number of visits.

I think parents generally intend to visit school, but because of various things they are prevented from coming. It may be because of carelessness or because they feel that they are not welcome.

Parents, it is your duty to visit school to see what your pupils are doing, and we want you to come often. You will be most cordially welcomed, if you will only come.

STUDY HOURS.

The necessity for home study for pupils in the High School is very evident; so parents should require their children to study at home at least two hours every evening of the five school days in each week.

Every pupil in the High School has at least four recitations, and many pupils have more than four, out of the possible seven periods in the school day. This leaves but three study periods at the most, for each pupil to get at least four lessons. The periods are forty minutes each, making an aggregate at the most of two hours or an average of half an hour to a lesson.

Parents, do you think you could get four High School lessons in new subjects in two hours? How then do you expect you children to do more than you could do yourselves? Do you not see that home study is absolutely necessary for good work in the High School?

NEEDS OF THE SCHOOL.

The school should have a course in Manual Training for a part of the students.

There are several students in the High School, who do poor work in the regular courses, because the subjects do not appeal to them. These same students would do well in Manual Training, because they are interested in this kind of work. It is a wrong idea to compel students to take school work which they do not like. A liking for school work must be created in a student, before he will succeed. The school is greatly in need of a library. I most strongly recommend it, and no pains should be spared to secure it.

I most heartily thank the Superintendent and the School Board for the assistance which they have so kindly and generously rendered. Respectfully submitted,
