REPORT OF THE Superintendent of Schools

TO THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE OF HEBRON:
GENTLEMEN:

In accordance with the law of the State I submit to you this report.

The world is moving rapidly in its thought and action and our educational work must move more rapidly to catch up with the demand of the social and industrial conditions around us. We must make more of our schools year by year by giving more to them and asking more of them.

This year has been one of steady work and progress in the Hebron Schools. With the exception of the break caused by Miss Pugsley's resignation, there has been no interruption of our school work.

Our teaching corps has been a very forceful and efficient one. It is to be regretted that the tendency to change positions still prevails to the great detriment of good service that many excellent teachers might render. The best rural schools in this town and State are those in charge of teachers who have served in them for years.

The support of the parents has been most loyal and the smoothness of the administration of your public schools is due to this support quite as much as to the skill and tact of the teachers. I hope that all of the tax payers will notice our excellent attendance which is in a degree a measure of the efficiency of our system. This shows that most of our Hebron parents are instilling into the minds of the children that school attendance is their first duty and business.

School Equipment

This year the work of furnishing globes has been completed. It is the plan of your superintendent to use the unexpended balance and perhaps twenty-five dollars of this year's appropriation for the purchase of the wall maps and a few reference books to assist in the teaching of geography and history.

District No. 8

The school in this district was discontinued after a term of ten and three-fifths weeks during the fall. There were only three attending at

this time and from the present outlook the number of pupils will not warrant the re-establishment of this school for some time to come

Secondary School Pupils

That the people of our town are very much interested in the higher education of their children is shown by the fact that the town is paying the tuition of nineteen pupils, fifteen attending the Academy and four the Buckfield high school.

It is to be regretted that the condition is such that parents having children attending the Academy are obliged to pay fifteen dollars per year in addition to the tuition paid by the town.

Repairs

The school houses known as the Nelson, Sodom, and Academy buildings need painting.

We need a new woodshed with closets in the Sodom District.

The repair problem of this year is at the Academy, where we have twenty-five pupils in the smallest school-room in town.

An article has been placed in the town warrant asking the voters of the town consider, discuss and act as their knowledge of the conditions direct, regarding the Academy School situation.

School Attendance

The school attendance has been excellent in all of our districts with one exception. I have given the number of visits and number of pupils perfect in attendance each term. I find that the school that received the greatest number of visits led in the number of pupils perfect in attendance. Is there a lesson to be learned from this relation?

Every teacher worthy of her position, will welcome every attempt on the part of the parent to encourage the work of the pupil in school and the promotion of good attendance.

I have found that one of the best evidences of interest in the world on the part of the mother is the attendance of her children, but this is not enough. At least one day a year should be devoted to visiting school, both for the good of the mother and the encouragement of the children. This year our list of visitors numbers one hundred and ninety-five. Let us double that number next year.

Report to the Union District

In taking up the work of another man in the middle of the year I have tried to keep all the good things of our school system and increase the power and efficiency of the work from term to term.

I desire to call the attention of the several Committees to three sources of waste or weakness in our school system. First, the attempt to carry on the work without a definite plan, involving a great waste of the pu.

pils' time in repeating subject matter with each change of teacher and omission of many important subjects by the young and poorly prepared teacher. Second, the lack of globes, maps and reference books has for years been a serious hindrance to successful work. Third, the absence of an active progressive interest in our school work has in some sections resulted in an indifference that must be met by a live public spirit.

It has been the privilege of your superintendent to compile after consultations with his teachers and reference to some progressive courses of study now in use in different towns of New England, a course of study for the elementary schools of this Union District. This course has been printed and placed in the hands of our teachers. We have a modern, up-to-date course of study, suggestive and strong enough to keep our schools busy for a number of years to meet all of its requirements. The work of each year in each subject is clearly outlined and so forth. Our teachers deserve great credit for the loyal, tactful manner in which they accepted the change and adjusted their work to meet the demands of the new outline.

Our schools are fairly well supplied with text books and with three or four exceptions in Buckfield, have globes, thanks to Superintendent Sturtevant, or the teacher and people of the school district.

In all of our schools we need more blackboards, wall maps and reference books. Imagine the crude attempts to teach geography and history that have gone on for many years in some of our oldest schools without these aids.

This year we have organized a Parent-Teacher Association in Buckfield and the Grangers of Hebron and North Buckfield have taken a live interest in the schools and manifested a desire to encourage school work in many ways. We trust that even a wider degree of interest will be shown next year.

I wish to urge the several towns of this Union District to increase the length of the school year to thirty-two weeks.

We must send the country boy and girl into active life work to compete with the village boy and girl who usually have the advantage of better teachers, and superior school-room equipment.

It is thought by the educational leaders that the city child needs from thirty-six to forty-weeks per year. Why not give the country child every advantage that we can afford.

Teachers' Meetings have been held in each town to discuss the Course of Study and a Union District meeting was held with the teachers of Sumner as invited guests, January 9, 1914.

I wish to express my gratitude for kindness shown to me and mine by many citizens of this District, to acknowledge the help and many courtesies extended to me by your former Superintendent, Mr. Sturtevant, to thank the members of the several committees for advice, support and encouragement.

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Hebron qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at Hebron Grange Hall in said town Monday the 2nd day of March, 1914, at 10 o'clock, a. m. then and there to act on the following articles to wit:

- 1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2nd. To see if the town will accept the report as printed.
- 3rd. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- 4th. To choose a town treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5th. To choose a board of selectmen for the ensuing year.
- 6th. To choose a board of assessors for the ensuing year.
- 7th. To choose a board of overseers of poor for ensuing year.
- 8th. To choose truant officers for ensuing year.
- 9th. To choose a road commissioner for the ensuing year.
- 10th. To choose one member of the superintending school committee for three years.
- 11th. To choose all other necessary town officers.
- 12th. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to state aid as provided in section 20 of chapter 130 of the public laws of 1913.
- 13th. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533 for the improvement of the section of state aid road as outlined in the report of the state highway commission in addition to the amounts regularly raised for care of ways, highways, and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of section 19 of chapter 130 of the public laws of 1913.
- 14th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools for the ensuing year.

15th. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$125 for Free high schools according to the school laws of 1903.

16th. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$10 for A. A. Dwinal Post for memorial expenses.

17th. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the support of Poor, town officers' bills, miscellanecus, snow-bills, summer work on roads, bridges and brown-tail moths.

18th. To see what sum the town will vote to pay for collecting taxes for year 1914-15.

19th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the salary of the superintendent of schools for the ensuing year.

20th. To see if the town will vote to instruct its treasurer by the written consent of the selectmen to hire money.

21st. To see if the town will elect one or more fire wards, fix their compensaticn and raise money for same.

22nd. To see if the town will furnish bonds for the town officers.

23rd. To see if the town will vote to buy an outfit for the sealing of weights and measures and raise money for same.

24th. To see what action the town will take to authorize its superintending school committee to contract with and pay the trustees of Hebron Academy for the tuition of its high school scholars at said academy for the academic year beginning September, 1914. in accordance with the provision of section 62, chapter 15, Revised Statutes of 1903.

The selectmen will be in session at the Grange Hall on the second day of March 1914, at nine o'clock in the forenoon for correcting the list of voters.
