Report of School Committee and Superintendent of Schools

To the Citizens of Hebron:

We hereby submit our annual report covering the fiscal year, February 1, 1942 to January 31, 1943.

THE ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

Three elementary schools are being operated during this school year as follows:

Elementary school tuition is being paid for 9 pupils who attend the West Minot School and one pupil who attends elementary school in Mechanic Falls.

There are 68 Hebron pupils attending elementary school, and thirty of them are being conveyed to and from school at town expense.

In 1942 Hebron did not receive anything from the Equalization Fund, because the preceding year's tax rate for school purposes was lower than the average for the State. This made a larger local appropriation necessary. This year we are informed that a .012 tax rate for school purposes on the state valuation of Hebron would provide money to maintain a minimum program; and therefore, Hebron is not eligible to share in Equalization Fund for 1943.

CONVEYANCE

Three conveyance routes are being maintained during this school year. One of them has been lengthened and enlarged considerably to include the pupils who formerly attended the Sodom School.

Report of Public Health Nurse 1942

Public Health Nursing of the State Bureau of Health is concerned with securing and maintaining better health for every individual in the community. Today your Selective Service Boards are showing that adults are being rejected because of physical defects which can be prevented or corrected. It seems to me at this time of grave emergency that the health of your community is of great importance.

As a measure of prevention of epidemics of diseases which are apt to flourish under wartime conditions due to the shifting population, opportunity for immunization against diphtheria and smallpox was offered in Hebron. Sixty-seven students over five years of age were given the inoculation for diphtheria and forty-six were vaccinated to prevent smallpox.

Visits were made to infants and pre-school children to assist mothers with daily schedules and to assist in correcting undesirable health habits.

Four visits were made to follow up on crippled children to interpret the instruction given at clinic or encourage attendance to clinics conducted by the Bureau of Health.

Nine visits were made to school children. Much of the work accomplished is through home visiting, not only informing parents of health findings, but by getting them to assume responsibility for correction of defects.

The Red Cross Chapter co-operated by being responsible for three children having dental defects corrected, and one student being corrected of eye defect by securing necessary examination and glasses for the child.

Three visits were made to patients with communicable diseases to assist in finding cases and contacts and in securing medical examinations and supervision to promote continued treatment.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for cutting bushes on state aid road. Raised last year, \$90.00. Selectmen recommend \$100.00.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for maintenance of third class roads, to entitle the town to receive its allotment of third class road money from the state. Raised last year, \$650.00. Selectmen recommend \$200.00.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for miscellaneous account. Raised last year, \$500.00. Selectmen recommend \$500.00.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for Memorial Day. Raised last year, \$10.00. Selectmen recommend \$5.00.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for fire patrol. Raised last year \$100.00. Selectmen recommend \$75.00.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for brown-tail moth work. Raised last year, \$150.00. Selectmen recommend \$100.00.

Art. 18. To see how much the citizens of Hebron will vote to raise for each of the school purposes listed below: The recommendations of the superintending school committee are as follows: (a) common school, \$3,850.00; (b) high school tuition, \$1,050.00; (c) textbooks, \$75.00; (e) lights and telephone, \$50.00; (f) repairs, \$50.00. Raised last year, \$4,650.00. Total, \$5,075.00.

Art. 19. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$33.00 for public health nursing in Hebron, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health, for local service. Raised last year, \$33.00. Selectmen recommend \$33.00.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to cooperate with the Maine Forest Service and the Federal Government in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust in accordance with Revised Statutes, Chapter 11, Sections 62-63-64.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a new snow plow and raise money for same. Selectmen recommend \$600.00.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the town for State aid road construction in excess of the amount required to meet state apportionments.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to authorize the officers to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying obligations of the town; such loan or loans to be paid during the current municipal year out of money raised during said current year, by taxes.

Art. 24. To see what action the town will take in regard to having the poll taxes collected, and on what date.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to authorize tax collectors of present and past years to collect all personal taxes according to law, by suing each delinquent taxpayer in an action of debt for same.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quit-claim deeds for such property.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to authorize the treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to execute a quit-claim deed in behalf of the town and, or, assignments with rights of foreclosure in case of unmatured tax mortgage liens releasing its rights in and to real estate held by it by tax deeds and tax liens upon payment of such amount, or amounts, in each case, as the Selectmen in their discretion will deem proper.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to ratify and confirm and approve the acts of the Treasurer and Selectmen hitherto performed by them in making settlement of tax deeds and tax liens by compromising the claims of the town and accepting less than the aggregate of the taxes, costs and interest at 8 per cent.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to sell either at private or public sale, any property to which the town has obtained title, either by tax deeds or tax liens upon such terms and for such consideration as the Selectmen in their discretion deem advisable and in such cases, to authorize the town Treasurer to execute appropriate deeds in the name of the town and to acknowledge the same.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to authorize the school committee to continue school where an average attendance of eight pupils has not been maintained the past year, if they consider it advisable.

Art. 31. To see what sum of money, if any the town will vote to raise for Civilian Defense work in Hebron.

Art. 32. To see what action the town will take in regard to giving the assessors the authority to settle in court, a dispute between the assessors and trustees of Hebron Academy over certain property in Hebron, assessed against them.

Art. 33. To see if the citizens of Hebron will vote to recommend to the School Committee that the schools of Hebron be operated on Eastern Standard time.

Hereof fail not, and have you this warrant with your doings thereon. The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at the Grange Hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
