## MAYOR'S ADDRESS

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*Gentlemen of the City Council:*

In pledging ourselves to-day to the faithful discharge of the duties incumbent on our several offices, we make the first acknowledgement to our fellow-citizens of our appreciation of the high honor we have received at their hands. If, at the expiration of our term of office, we have in all matters remained true to the oath here taken, then, and then only, shall we become deserving of the trust reposed in us.

We represent in the citizens of Auburn, a people of high intelligence, who can differentiate between false economy and the wise expenditure of funds, and who expect us to transact the city's business in such a manner as will result in its ultimate good, whether such transactions involve large or small expenditures.

It is our province this year to face problems, that from their complexity and demand for good business foresight, will tax our ability. But as this condition of affairs in no wise lessens our duty to meet them, intelligently consider them, and after due consideration fearlessly transact them, I ask you, each and all, to specially exert yourself to give our city a wise and economic administration.

## HIGHWAYS

The care and maintenance of our highways, sewers, sidewalks, etc., has always been one of the most serious matters to be considered by each city council. The creation of the Public Works Commission was for the purpose of more wisely handling this department. It has not yet accomplished results which were expected of it, but I believe none are more anxious for its success than the gentlemen who compose that board, and that they will gladly work with this city council to perfect their organization.

In looking over the city reports for the past six years, I find that the city has spent over \$185,000 in this department, and in every year but one, it has not been able to keep within its original appropriation. We can infer from this that the demands of this department are so great that it can easily spend whatever appropriation is allotted to it, and that the city councils have in the past not been sufficiently familiar with its needs. Before making our appropriations this year, I shall request this Board to prepare a detailed statement of what is absolutely necessary to be done, what it has under contemplation, and what it would

do if the city will provide the funds, during the coming year, and present it for your consideration. We can then act intelligently in making our appropriation, and there will be no excuse for an overdraft. I have the assurance of this Board that they will gladly conform to this request.

As much comment is being made, at the present time, in reference to this Commission, I believe it my duty to place myself on record as endorsing it as the most feasible proposition now in sight for handling this most difficult department of the city. I firmly believe when properly organized, good results will be obtained.

I shall recommend to you that we make the appropriation in this department large enough to purchase a city lot and to erect sheds for the housing of all machines, tools, implements and materials.

Believing that future generations should share the expense as well as the benefits of the Goff Hill Sewer, and that it can be built at far less expense by being carried forward without interruption, I shall ask you to consider the advisability of issuing bonds or city notes to provide funds to carry this work forward to an early completion.

That you may fully realize the enormous amount of work transacted by this department, I urge each of you to read carefully the detailed report of the Superintendent of Streets. Without entering into details, I will say that from the total expenditures of \$37,362.68 during the past year, we find that \$18,001 has been spent on highways within the city proper, \$6,393.54 on outside roads, and \$7,582.94 on sewers.

#### FIRE DEPARTMENT

This department is in the hands of a very able Fire Commission, and has been kept in such efficient condition that no particular comment is necessary. Our Chief Engineer recommends that other quarters be provided for a ward room. I shall leave to your judgment the advisability of adopting this change. To keep insurance rates within proper bounds, a combination chemical and hose wagon and another horse should soon be provided for New Auburn.

#### POLICE DEPARTMENT

Much credit is due our Police force for the distinction Auburn enjoys in being one of the cleanest, law-observing

cities in the State. I have no recommendations to offer in this department. An increase in the appropriation will be necessary to cover the additional expense of the patrol at Lake Auburn.

### SCHOOLS

Of all the departments over which we exercise control, none is more vital to the public at large than that of schools. Every child-blessed citizen, rich or poor, urban or suburban, is quick to detect any legislation tending toward good or ill touching this important question. It is my pleasant privilege to report nothing but advance in connection with this department.

Under the administration of our efficient Superintendent, we have introduced in the past few years a number of features that are praiseworthy. I refer principally to the Training Course, whereby teachers taken from our own High School are made as efficient as graduates from Normal Training Schools. It must be a source of satisfaction to us to note that this scheme, original with us, is being adopted by towns and cities, like us, not favored, or burdened with a Training School, and that results are being reached, without expense, equivalent to those more financially favored.

And the plan of equitable allotment of salaries has not only done away with discrimination along these lines, but now gives outside districts the same advantages as the inside. No more will the country district school teacher be placed to disadvantage on account of location, as the salary is the same in either place, while the Training Course provides as efficient teachers for the country as for the city schools. Auburn enjoys a distinction far above the average for the efficiency of its school system, and to maintain it, those very estimable features, Manual Training and Domestic Science should soon be added. When one has observed what favorable influence these features have toward manual labor the introduction of them is only a matter of means. I shall strongly recommend that we find an appropriation to enable us to make a start along these lines.

I think it ought to be generally understood that Auburn has more country schools than any city of its size in the State, and that it has more children to attend school than is common of a city of its size. While this is creditable in one respect, it works against us financially, owing to the

injustice of the arrangement of allotting the State fund according to the number of children of a pupil age instead of the number that attend school. It is not difficult to find cities twice the size of ours receiving twice the State fund, which have scarcely more pupils attending school than we.

A large amount of renovating and repairing was done last year on our school buildings, so that at present they are in very good condition. I am informed by the Superintendent that with the exception of painting very little will be required along these lines this year. While the School Board does not recommend any immediate action, it calls our attention to the condition of Webster, Franklin and Chamberlain schools. All of these are old and can last but a few years. Webster school is crowded, unfavorably located near the railroad, and has poor sanitation and ventilation. It is thought best by them, however, to lay out as little expense as possible on these schools, and when the time comes that they will no longer be suitable, to unite the three into one good school building.

#### POOR DEPARTMENT

We can safely assert, without fear of contradiction, that no city in New England is more favorably placed, or more wisely and economically served relative to its poor than Auburn. To care for the unfortunates of a city of nearly 15,000 population at an expense of less than \$4,000 a year is a matter that will bear favorable comparison with any city of like size within my knowledge. During the past year we have supported at the city farm over twenty people, seven at the insane asylum, and all of our outside poor at an expense of \$3,696.13, net. This also includes that much needed improvement of installing electric lights at the farm.

Much credit is due the Clerk of the Overseers of the Poor for the economic administration of affairs in this department.

#### WATER WORKS

Fourteen years of municipal ownership of our water supply, under a well organized and efficient commission has well founded the theory of handling the most important and difficult departments of the city in this wise.

The report of the Water Commissioners shows that during this period the plant has increased in value from \$250,000, the original purchase price, to \$335,295, the present estimated value, and that in that time \$59,000 of bonds have been retired and about seventeen miles of relays made on main lines. In addition to this, about one-third of the new reservoir on Merrill Hill has been completed. This work was estimated to cost \$29,000 complete, by the engineer. Additional work in concreting, not reckoned by the engineer, would increase the estimate \$10,000. The work already done shows a saving from the engineer's estimate of about 40%. The Commission believes that the reservoir can be completed this year, and are contemplating issuing sufficient bonds to carry it forward without interruption.

A reduction in hydrant rates has been made to the city in the past year of \$10 per hydrant, for which I suppose we should be duly thankful, but after careful consideration I must say that in common with a number of my predecessors, I am of the opinion that the statutory provision, making it incumbent on the city to contribute \$3,000 yearly to its sinking fund is ample, and should end in that. The plant is and always will be self sustaining, it is beyond the experimental stage, and provisions made when this Board was created, covering every contingency, no longer applies. I can see no wisdom in assisting a revenue-producing department such as this, beyond what is provided by statute.

#### CEMETERIES

The matter of public ownership of cemeteries, which received consideration at the hands of the last city council is a measure I strongly recommend being taken up this year and adopted. I believe this can be done with little expense to the city, and will meet the wishes of the people whom we represent.

In conclusion, I wish to say that if in this message I have seemed to digress, or bring before you matters of expense, not pertaining to our immediate needs, it is for the purpose of showing that each succeeding year will have its burdens, and that it is unwise for us to procrastinate and wait for more auspicious times. Every piece of legislation that is



due to be transacted this year should be attended to whether difficult or easy.

And now, gentlemen, if you will allow me to remind you of the grave responsibility resting upon us, the importance of faithfully and punctually attending to all of our duties, and of the necessity of the application of energy, judgment and wisdom to all matters coming before us, I sincerely believe we can, by conforming to these requirements, give the citizens of Auburn a satisfactory administration.

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*To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of  
Auburn, Me.:*

GENTLEMEN—The Board of Water Commissioners herewith submit their fourteenth annual report.

At the annual meeting of the board held March 9, 1906, Mr. Geo. B. Smith was elected president of the board, Andrew W. P. Cobb re-elected clerk, Forrest E. Bisbee re-elected superintendent, and L. L. Rand re-elected engineer.

On October 5, 1906, Mr. Mark H. Merrow was elected president *pro tem.* in place of Mr. Geo. B. Smith who removed from the City.

During the past year your Commissioners have completed the blasting and removal of the rock from the site of the proposed reservoir and it is the intention of your Commissioners, if possible, to complete the reservoir the coming year, and we have obtained permission from the State Legislature to issue bonds to provide funds for that purpose. We have also purchased (two lots) twenty thousand square feet of land on Gamage Avenue, to provide gravel to use in concrete work on the said reservoir.

During the past year the rent of Hydrants has been reduced from thirty to twenty dollars per year.

The suit against the City for non-payment of Hydrant rents pending at the time of our last report has been settled by payment of the same in full.

The following statement shows the net income of the works for the year ending February 28, '07. Also a detailed statement of the assets and liabilities. We also give a condensed statement of the entire net income for the fourteen years that the City has enjoyed municipal ownership.

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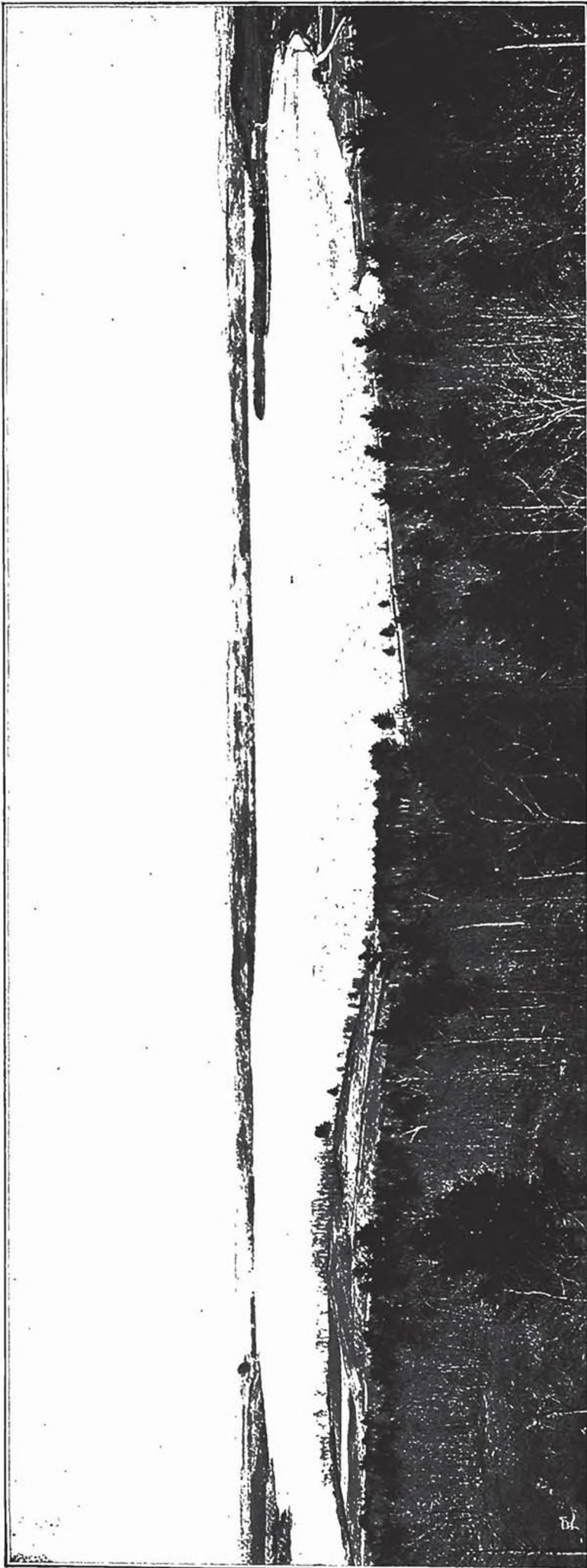

# REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF WATER WORKS

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AUBURN, ME., March 1, 1907.

*To the Honorable Board of Water Commissioners:*

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to report to you the Fourteenth (14) annual report of the improvements and workings of this plant.

This has been a very cold winter to take care of the water plant, but the snow came early and up to this date we have had only two frozen pipes in the street, one on Gamage Avenue, and one on Third Street. With the Thawing Machine we can thaw a service in a few moments.

## STATION AND MACHINERY

The boilers and pump are in good working order. The boilers were inspected by the Maryland Casualty Company of Baltimore, Md., and found to be in good condition, care and management.

## RELAY OF SERVICES

A relay of fifty-five (55) services have been made at a cost of stock and labor—\$485.86.

## NEW SERVICES

Seventeen (17) new services at a cost of labor and stock—\$143.06.

## LEAKS

The number of leaks have been few, seven (7) Corporation leads, and two in the main line; one in a two-inch pipe on Centre Street and one on the side of Goff Hill in the twelve-inch main. A twelve-foot length of pipe burst the

full length, causing an expense of \$83.61. The cause, I think, was from a pocket of air. When the air got a relief the water hammer caused the pressure to increase and split the pipe.

### HYDRANTS

The City has one hundred and nine (109) Hydrants. Two were set this year, one in Mechanics Row and Packard Streets and one on Centre Street near French. We have fifteen (15) private hydrants, making a total of one hundred and twenty-four (124).

The care of Hydrants to date is—\$182.65.

GATES.—The gates are all in good working order having a total of four hundred and fourteen (414) in the Main Pipe Lines.

### IMPROVEMENTS

The work of building the new reservoir on Merrill Hill was commenced June 1, and was discontinued October 24. In that time the earth was removed from the plot, two hundred and sixty-seven feet by two hundred and seventy feet. The Steam Drills were set to work and drilled the face channel around the side with holes six inches apart; the depth of holes was from two and one-half feet to eighteen feet in depth, then holes were drill two and one-half feet apart over the surface of the proposed reservoir plot and all of the holes were blasted and rock removed from the grounds of the reservoir to the yard to crush for the concrete. Except some two hundred yards on the west side, near Wall E. this can be removed directly to the Stone Crusher and save one hauling. If we had not broken the Steam Derrick mast should have moved the same.

The Engineer's estimate calls for a cost to remove the earth of \$544 and the stone, \$12,929.00 to the Stone Crusher Yard, a total of \$13,473.

The cost to do the work by the Water Commission by day work was: Tools bought, \$1,549.80; labor, teams and material, \$6,590.56; adding \$300.00 to remove the stone blasted in the reservoir to the Crusher, a total of \$8,440.36 with a credit of tools to be sold, of \$1,000.00, leaving a net total of \$7,443.36.

To complete the reservoir the Engineer's original estimate will have to be changed. The bottom is of shale rock and would not hold water so that the side wall that was channeled and the bottom would have to have a cement floor. As the Engineer has been sick I have been unable to get his estimate.

The Gate House figures to construct the same was \$2,410.00; but with the consent of this Board and the Engineer the Gate House will be reduced in size and set back of the reservoir embankment, changing the cost of the Gate House to about \$800.00.

To finish the reservoir this year the Commissioners have purchased the pipe, specials, gates and gate standards also of G. H. Fields, lots Nos. 6 and 7 on Gamage Avenue for the sand to be used in the concrete. Bids have been sent out for the hauling of the sand and clay.

### RECONSTRUCTION

The service for hose on Granite Street is not what it should be and if the Street Department put in the Sewer System in that street this year I would advise changing the 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch pipe line under the electric car track into the ditch with the sewerage and change the size of the pipe to 6-in. for 400 feet and 4-in. for 380 feet, then if at any time you wish to set a hydrant on that street the pipe will be large enough to supply the same. The cost of pipe, gates and specials would be, \$423.00; labor, \$175.00, making a total of \$598.00.

### EXTENSIONS

A house being built on Winter Street, north of Rowe Street, a distance of 485 feet from Rowe, we have a 1-in. pipe over the same ground a distance of 250 feet to the Vining house, so called, but this pipe is old and will not supply the two houses. I would recommend putting in a 2-in. pipe at a cost for pipe, gates and specials \$95.00; labor \$50.00, making a total of \$145.00.

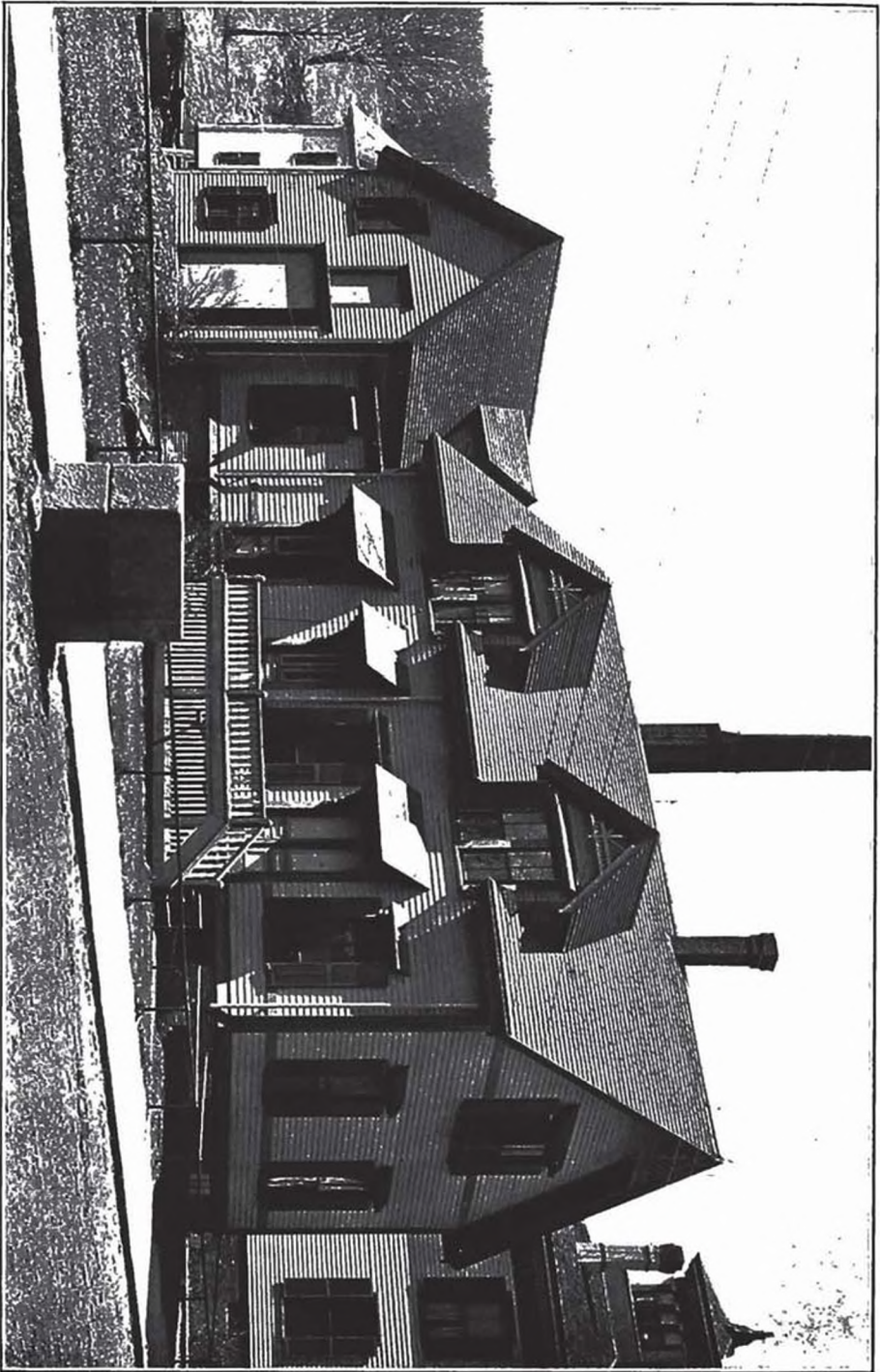

## REPORT OF POLICE MATRON

---

*To the Honorable Mayor and Members of the City Government:*

GENTLEMEN—I herewith submit to you an account of my work during the year ending February 28, 1907. In reviewing the labors of the year I am glad to report the moral and financial improvement in the condition of many families I have been accustomed to visit in the years gone by. Many to whom a helping hand has been extended in some pressing time of need have tided over their difficulties and are now self-supporting, law-abiding citizens and are among the most willing to render assistance to those less fortunate than themselves. During the past year there has been considerable sickness among the poor, especially through the fall and winter months. Measles and pneumonia have been the prevailing diseases. To our kind and thoughtful citizens who have contributed so generously of their means to supply the needs of the destitute sick ones, I wish to extend my heart-felt thanks.

At Thanksgiving all needy families were remembered with bountiful dinners donated by the various churches, missions, W. C. T. U. and private individuals. And at Christmas time two Christmas trees, loaded with useful gifts, beside toys, games, books, candy and pop corn were provided for our city children at New Odd Fellows Hall under the auspices of the W. C. T. U. The Loyal Temperance Legion furnished the entertainment. My most grateful thanks are extended to all those who contributed to make this Christmas festival the success it proved to be. My thanks are also due to the friends who have assisted me in so many ways by donations of money, clothing, groceries and fuel. And here let me say I have never asked for assistance of our citizens in any line of work during all the years of my service for this city, but what my request has been granted willingly and even gladly. During the year I

have received from the W. C. T. U. \$61.65 beside much help from individual members. At Christmas time I received in cash \$75.00 from the business men and many contributions from merchants of clothing, books, toys, candy, etc. The East Auburn Benevolent Society sent me \$5.00 and a large bundle of new clothing for the Christmas tree. Many ladies contributed mittens and stockings. At various times during the winter I have received money in letters from unknown friends which I have used in special cases of need. Many warm garments and many boxes and parcels of groceries have been given for those in need. I have endeavored at all times to supplement the labors of the truant officer and whenever a case of non-attendance at the public school has been due to a lack of proper clothing I have been able to supply that want from the stores donated by our well-to-do citizens. In this city there are comparatively few children left homeless. Of the number who by death or other misfortune have become thus dependent ten have been through the W. C. T. U. provided with free temporary homes and one has been legally adopted. No children are at our city farm. Two young women have been assisted to reach their friends in the Provinces, the money for their expenses having been raised by private subscriptions. One unfortunate woman was sent to the Temporary Home at Portland. Several children enjoyed an outing of several weeks during the summer vacation through the kindness of friends living in the country.

Our Free Lodging Room which is under the direction of the Auburn W. C. T. U., has been occupied nearly all winter and has proved to be a desirable factor in charitable work.

In the work of moral reform I have been constantly supported and upheld by the W. C. T. U., the Reform League and the churches. The pastors have been most helpful in any case I have reported to them, both by advice and material aid.

During the year I have made 3,680 calls; distributed 5,295 articles of clothing and bedding, beside five hundred new pieces of clothing given at Christmas time. I have

written 311 business letters, found work for 97 women and girls, beside day labor for men and women.

A large amount of the best literature has been distributed where it would be appreciated. I have visited the railroad stations daily, the police station when necessary, and the city farm occasionally. In conclusion I wish to acknowledge the unfailing courtesy which I have always received from the city officials, the police force and the public generally, to all of whom I tender my sincere thanks.

## REPORT OF BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS

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*To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of  
Auburn:*

GENTLEMEN—The Board of Public Works of the City of Auburn, hereby submits its fourth annual report for the year ending February 28, A. D. 1907.

The total appropriations for the repairs of high-ways, bridges, sewers, new roads and streets, sidewalks and paving, was	\$30,350 00
Receipts from sewer and sidewalk assessments, and other sources,	1,833 83
Transferred from other sources and appropriations,	2,700 00

The total expenditures have been,	37,362 68

Quite an amount of work, of a permanent character, which was contemplated early in the season had to be postponed for the year, owing to the unusual condition of the roads by reason of very deep frost and later by heavy unprecedented rains which badly washed all of the roads throughout the City and caused a large expenditure of money to make them passable. The Court Street sewer, which was built in 1873, was found to be so worn and defective from Pleasant Street to Minot Avenue, that it had to be frequently repaired and we deemed it to be for the best interest of the City to rebuild it with new and larger pipe, which was done at an expense of \$5,692.00, exceeding by \$4,192.00, the amount appropriated for repairs of sewers. The amount expended for repairs of

other sewers in addition was \$660.42, making a total expenditure of \$6,352.42 for the rebuilding and repairs of sewers while only \$1,500.00 was appropriated for this purpose.

We have built on Goff Hill 1,133 feet and on Whitney Street 218 feet, a total of 1,351 feet of new sewer.

It was found necessary to cut down and grade the street and sidewalk on Third Street hill near the St. Louis Church, which was done at an expense of \$1,069.65.

On account of the building of the Electric Railroad in Broad and South Main Streets we were obliged to grade and widen these streets at cost of \$422.70. These were unlooked for expenses and consequently were not provided for when the appropriations were made.

For a more minute detailed account of the expenditures and work done we refer to the report of the Superintendent of Streets and Sewers which we herewith append as a part of our report.

It was not contemplated when the Dennison Street Bridge was built that it would be used by the electric road, the weight of traffic over this bridge has greatly increased, causing an undue strain upon it, and we believe it should be inspected by an expert and if need be, strengthened. We also desire to call attention to the Littlefield bridge which was built in 1877, and think it also should be thoroughly inspected.

We again renew our suggestion made in former reports that a suitable lot should be purchased for the use of the Street Department. There is now no place for the storage of carts, sleds and other machinery when not in use, or to care for material used in the repair of roads and bridges.

## REPORT OF CITY SOLICITOR

---

AUBURN, ME., Mar. 16, 1907.

GENTLEMEN—In accordance with Section 8 of Chapter 10 of the Charter and Revised Ordinances of the City of Auburn, I beg to submit my report as City Solicitor for the year ending March 18, 1907.

There are three matters which demand an extended report at my hands, namely, the suit of St. Albans vs. the City of Auburn, the petition for the discontinuance of the so-called Danville Junction Road, and the matter of State support for "Tommie" McNally.

When I assumed the duties of my office there was pending in the Supreme Judicial Court for Somerset County the suit of St. Albans vs. The City of Auburn. This was an action for the support of an insane pauper, Elmer E. Southard, alleged to have a settlement in Auburn. In September last this suit was settled by the payment of one hundred dollars by the City of Auburn, and the town of St. Albans assumed further responsibility for Southard. The sum paid was less than the cost of defending the action, and the city is now relieved from a troublesome suit, and liability for support of the pauper.

In the matter of the petition of George C. Wing and forty-nine others asking for a discontinuance of the proposed road at Danville Junction, the County Commissioners have decided against the petitioners. It will now be the duty of the city to build the road during the coming season, else the County Commissioners will appoint, under the pending petition of Hiram Ricker & Sons, dated April 25, 1906, an agent to construct the way.

I have spent a great deal of time, and engaged in a large correspondence endeavoring to obtain proof sufficient to substantiate the claim being made to the Governor and Council that "Tommie" McNally, an insane pauper for whose support the City of Auburn is now liable, is properly a state pauper. I regret to report that I have been unsuccessful in this for the reason that the people who knew this

boy's mother, and the length of her residence in Lewiston, have disappeared. Most diligent search has failed to reveal a single person who can give reliable testimony in this respect. In this matter and in the St. Albans suit I have received the cordial and energetic support of Mr. J. M. Stevens, Overseer of the Poor.

The various duties which fall to the City Solicitor as the prosecuting officer for the Auburn Municipal Court I have discharged. I have rendered opinions in all matters submitted to me by the City Council and have at all times endeavored to hold myself in readiness to serve the City and its officers. At the present time there are no matters in my hands demanding attention.

The figures show a slight increase, 1,679 volumes, in the circulation over that of last year. Each month, except two shows an increase, sometimes a large one, over the corresponding month of the previous year. The exceptions are December and January, the decrease in circulation being directly traceable to the large amount of illness in the city, particularly among the children. The character of the circulation, as regards the use of the different classes of books, is practically the same as it was last year.

Fewer books have been added this year than were last, but some of them have been more expensive, particularly the "New International Encyclopedia" and a good number of volumes of the "International Library of Technology." An additional set of Shakespeare in 20 volumes and 65 volumes of "Speakers" may also be mentioned. The set of the "Arena" has been practically completed and bound, and also the set of "Popular Science Monthly" which is filled, but is not yet all bound. For the rest, the selection of books has been, as usual, to meet the needs of the readers. The library is better able each year to answer the demands upon it, and each year shows an increasingly large amount of reference work done in the building, of which no account is kept. This is perhaps the most valuable part of the



work in the library, as it is certainly the part which is the least realized by the public.

An additional assistant was found necessary and has been employed since the first of September. Miss Wiggin and Miss Spooner are very efficient and adequate assistants and their work is much appreciated. With their help, we are now equipped to give better and more effective service than ever before.

GENTLEMEN—I herewith submit my yearly report as Milk Inspector for the year ending March 31, 1907.

The samples of milk which I tested this year have all been of a very fair quality with little or no adulterations. The milk sold in the city of Auburn is of a much better quality than what it was a few years ago.

The barns inspected this year are cleaner and more sanitary than they were a year ago. By explaining to the farmers what they had ought to do and how to do it, they are more than pleased to comply with my requests which explains the better sanitary conditions.

The places where milk was stored which I inspected are mostly in the refrigerators of the grocery stores and all always clean and sanitary.

The cows inspected were most all in a healthy condition. The owners of cows to-day know that they must feed and care for them properly in order to get the desired returns.

The cows tested with the tuberculin test were mostly in apparent healthy condition but the test showed that some were diseased. When I find any diseased ones I notify the State Cattle Commissioners and they destroy them and disinfect the barns.

# REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH

---

*To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Auburn:*

GENTLEMEN—The Board of Health submits its twentieth annual report for the municipal year ending Feb. 28, 1907, and the mortality statistics for the year ending Dec. 31, 1906.

## ORGANIZATIONS

The Board consists of the following members: Dr. D. A. Barrell, J. H. Chase, and Dr. B. G. W. Cushman. D. A. Barrell is chairman, and B. G. W. Cushman is secretary and health officer. At the annual meeting held in May, 1906, John J. Lawler was appointed inspector of plumbing for one year.

## CONTAGIOUS DISEASES

There have been under quarantine fewer cases of contagious diseases for the past year than for several previous years. There has been no small-pox; and a smaller number of cases of diphtheria and scarlet fever. Especially is this true of the latter disease which has continued in the mild form prevalent in this city for a decade past. But the death rate from contagious diseases has been higher than for several years. One death occurred from scarlatina, four from diphtheria two from whooping cough, and ten from measles; making the total seventeen as compared with four for the previous year. In our opinion there were more than a thousand cases of measles and these of a very severe type, and it is to this disease that the increased mortality from contagious diseases is due. There have been no deaths from typhoid fever although a few scattered cases have been reported to the board. The expense of our department to the city has been about \$1,000 less than for the previous two or three years; this is because there were no small-pox cases.

## DISINFECTION

Disinfection has been carried out in the usual way. The permanganate process has been used to generate the formaldehyde gas and results have been highly satisfactory.

## NUISANCES

Considerable time is spent by the Board, especially during the summer months, in an investigation of complaints regarding nuisances. A large number have been remedied during the year; others have been brought to our attention which it was not possible to remove.

## SEWERS

We wish to again call your attention to the need of a sewer at Lake Grove. Without one there, it is impossible to obtain even fair sanitary conditions during the hot season of the year. The sanitary conditions exist in other localities which can be improved, but not removed, on account of a lack of sewers. Money spent in keeping our city healthy is a good investment.

## CONTAGIOUS DISEASES IN ANIMALS

The by-law adopted by the Board of Health in regard to contagious diseases in animals has been instrumental in bringing the attention of the Board to several tuberculous herds. These have been tested and the diseased cattle killed by order of the State Cattle Commissioners.

## PLUMBING

All new, altered or repaired plumbing has been inspected, and done in accordance with the regulations of the Board.

# REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER

AUBURN, ME., March 1, 1907.

*To the Board of Fire Commissioners of the City of Auburn:*

GENTLEMEN—I present the following as my report of the condition of the Fire Department for the year ending February 28, 1907.

The force of the department consists of 57 regular and 15 substitute men as follows:

Chief Engineer, four Assistant Engineers, twenty-five hose men, twelve ladder men, engineer and fireman of steam fire engine, two permanent men at Court Street station, one permanent man at New Auburn station, five drivers of apparatus, five fire police, and the fifteen substitute hose and ladder men.

The number of fire alarms the department have responded to from March 1, 1906, to February 28, 1907, were as follows:

Bell or general alarms, 16. Still or telephone calls, 94. There were also 10 small fires in the fire district where no alarm was given and 13 fires in the rural or outside section, making the total number for the entire city, 133.

The total loss so far as could be learned was \$49,312.22, of which \$5,678.22 was in the city fire district, and \$43,418.00 in the section outside, which makes the inside much below the average and the outside very far above.

The department have laid during the year 15,700 feet of hose, and used 854 gallons of chemicals, which is 2,800 feet of hose and 232 gallons of chemicals less than last year.

During the past year two new hand chemicals have been added to those we already had, making the number now in use 11, otherwise the apparatus as regards the several hitches and appurtenances carried on them is practically the same as in my last report, therefore I have not made an itemized list as then.

We have been fortunate in having to use the fire

engine but very little this year, so that the amount of coal for it is not much different from what it was at time of my last report, which I then reported as 12 or 13 tons.

The floors for sleeping room, hall, and entry ways which I asked for last year, were not changed owing to lack of funds in hands of the Committee on Public Property. All of said committee thought it should be done as requested, and I certainly trust it may be done this year and also that the floor behind the horses may be made right as the top boards have worn through in places.

One thousand feet of Eureka Fire Hose was bought during the year. We now have 3,000 feet that has been used but very little and as we have not given the older hose a very great amount of testing there has been only two or three hundred feet of condemned hose turned over to the street department. We now have in use a little over 11,000 feet that is in serviceable condition and as I foresee quite an amount of money will be called for in the department the coming year, I shall not recommend the purchase of any hose at this time.

The Hydrants are the same as in my last report with the exception that the 5-inch hydrant that was at the Pumping Station storehouse has been set on Center Street near the junction of French Street. I feel it my duty to again call your attention to the matter of some of our old hydrants as therein recommended.

In connection with the matter of hydrants it looks to me that there should be better hydrant service on Knight Street, and I would like very much for the members of the Commission and the City Council to personally look into the matter and see what the situation would be if a fire of any magnitude should get started in the Auburn Wagon Works, Tibbetts Mill, E. W. Penley's establishment or the smaller buildings at the lower end of that street.

The Fire Alarm Box ordered for upper Court Street was given so late that it will not be connected with the service until well into the coming year. I will here state that as in my judgment the section in the vicinity of Granite and Fern streets stands in as much need of a box as the place where the new one is intended to go that I recommend that

another be ordered for the said location, and did I not know that the funds would not permit, I should recommend that boxes be obtained for quite a number of other locations where they are fully as much needed.

I called your attention to the condition of our fire alarm system in my last report and there stated the need of making changes and instead of having our entire line of wire in one circuit that the Repeater be changed so that it would be in not less than three circuits. I now understand that Lewiston is about to change their two circuits to more, and while it might be well for some reasons to have an entire system of our own the way Auburn and Lewiston are situated with either at any moment liable to require the assistance of the other, it now seems to me that some arrangement like the one at present existing between the two cities should be made and if Lewiston does take the case in hand this year that Auburn should have the matter looked up so as to be ready to act as would be for the best interest of the city.

My recommendations for the last two years in regard to the use of the Court Street fire station as a polling place for Ward 3 and of having it in the basement of the Library building seem to get no further than my reports, and as that shows by the Commission and the City Council not taking any action in the case that as regards the matter I am in a hopeless minority, I trust the Commission will pardon me if I again mention it, but I truly feel that any man holding the position of Chief Engineer would think of the matter as I do.

Auburn and Lewiston have been fortunate in regard to their fires for the past year, so much so that neither party at any fire they have had has required even the whole amount of their own apparatus. I am pleased to say that the same good feeling exists between the two departments as has been the case for a long time.

As the pay of the men employed as laborers on the streets and sewers is now \$1.75 per day, it seems to me that the permanent men in the fire department, certainly being men with much greater responsibility resting upon them, should in equity receive \$2.00 per day, and therefore I approve and recommend that their pay be raised to that figure. The

old hose reel which has been in use for 36 years is, in my opinion, a piece of apparatus that should be changed for an up-to-date hose wagon arranged to carry the chemical extinguishers and other appurtenances to much better advantage.

There are many other things that could well be added to our present equipment which, taken in connection with all the other requirements of the city it would be useless to ask for, therefore I have only suggested those things which I deem to be a necessity or of greatest importance.

In conclusion I thank all those connected with the department's affairs from the highest to the lowest degree for the cordial support and assistance given me and especially to the Commission for their uniform kindly consideration and courtesy.

We hereby render our annual Report of the Schools of Auburn. This includes the Reports of the Superintendent of Schools, the Supervisor of Music and Drawing, together with tables showing statistics relating to school finance and attendance.

The Report of the Superintendent of Schools will be found to include a resume of the steps taken by this Board for the improvement of the important interests committed to its charge. To these various things no other reference is necessary.

It is gratifying to announce that notwithstanding the several steps taken which in our opinion will prove advantageous to the schools, all have been accomplished with practically no increase of the appropriations.

In case of the repairs appropriation which this year was overdrawn, we have to say that the overdraft became necessary because of the necessity of making certain repairs the cost of which could not be foreseen.

The most expensive repairs and those necessitating the overdrawing of the account were those on the Chamberlain and Washburn Schools. In the former case it was found that the plumbing conditions were such as to be a positive menace to the health of the pupils. In the latter the boiler was condemned by the insurance inspector.

There was, therefore, no other course open except that of attending to these important needs. While the expenditure for repairs was unusual it will be seen that it was necessary and, under the circumstances, unavoidable.

Owing to the fact that many of the school buildings, particularly those in the country, are old, the necessity for frequent repairs must increase. It should be borne in mind too that the cost of making repairs is rapidly and considerably increasing with the higher price of labor and mate-

rial. In view of these facts the normal appropriation for repairs and insurance should be made larger.

The Board is glad to place on record its appreciation of the support given by the citizens, and of the efficiency of the teaching corps upon whom the welfare of the schools must mainly rest.

# REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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*To the Superintending School Committee:*

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to offer for your consideration the twenty-first Annual School Report of the City of Auburn.

## ATTENDANCE

The steady gains which the city is making in population are well indicated in the increase of enrolment in the schools.

There has been far greater irregularity of attendance, however, than for several years, on account of a severe epidemic of measles which prevailed throughout the fall term and for the first few weeks of the present winter term. The teachers of all schools have given so careful attention to the special conditions resulting from this broken attendance that at this date practically all the classes have accomplished the full quota of prescribed work.

We have comparatively little truancy; the majority of the cases reported are those of pupils who have confirmed habits of truancy and concerning whom it is necessary to exercise constant vigilance.

In view of the current discussion relative to child labor, it is timely to state that it is the custom of your superintendent to exercise extreme caution in giving to children excuses to remain from school in order to work. During the present school year only five excuses of this kind have been granted, and these were given to children all of whom were over fourteen years old and had accomplished at least a part of the grammar school course. In three cases the help of the boys appeared to be absolutely necessary for the keeping of the families from pauperism and in two cases it was believed that the boys would receive the greater profit from manual labor.

## TRANSFERS AND CHANGES IN SCHOOLS

Several minor changes in the arrangement of the grades have been made. Because of a more uniform classification of pupils it was found unnecessary to continue four rooms in the Wilson School. At present the first and second grades, the former in two divisions, are in this building and all the other grades in New Auburn are in the Lincoln School. Because of an especially small eighth grade it was thought best for this year to combine this with the ninth under one teacher.

The fifth grade classes of the Park Hill and Merrill schools were transferred at the opening of the year to the Webster School, where they were combined under one teacher. By this arrangement two teachers in place of three are employed in each of the primary schools mentioned.

For the spring and fall terms the children of Washington Street Extension were conveyed to the New Auburn schools, but the building used last year as a schoolhouse again becoming available, a school was re-opened this winter term. No other changes over the preceding year have been made in the rural schools.

## TEACHERS

The changes which have occurred in the teaching force during the year are recorded in a table appended to this report.

Among the conditions favorable to good school work in Auburn none is more potent than the fine spirit which exists among the teachers. As a body I have found them eager to know and make use of the best methods, ready to make reasonable sacrifices for their work, aggressive in accomplishing their tasks and loyal to the school system with which they are connected. These qualities are reflected in the schools which they serve and bring together into a fine working unit all the parts of the school system.

## WAGE SCHEDULE

Among the important advance steps made in our schools recently was the adoption of a regular rule for the employment and advancement of teachers. This definite rule has been in operation somewhat over two years and has worked very advantageously.



A second step somewhat connected with this was the provision made last June for an advance in the salaries paid teachers. Under the new rule the maximum salary paid to all women grade teachers is to be twelve dollars, hitherto it has been eleven dollars for grammar grade teachers and ten dollars for primary and rural teachers.

In the high school the maximum salaries of women assistants is seven hundred dollars in place of six hundred dollars.

Even under the new schedule the salaries of our elementary teachers are lower than in most other Maine cities, but this increase is certainly an appreciated and deserved recognition of the larger demands made on our teachers in way of preparation and living expenses.

### TRAINING COURSE

There was graduated last June the first class completing our newly organized training course, the plan of which was fully outlined in a former Report. The members of this class are now teaching in the schools of this city and are rendering a highly acceptable quality of service. It is found, in practice, that this course affords a fine opportunity for the students to observe, study and practice a wide variety of the best methods. Its graduates do not suffer by comparison with those of other schools and courses.

It should be borne in mind also that this result is secured practically without cost to the city, since the students render a very full and actual service for the pay they receive.

In passing it is interesting to note that this system of teacher training has attracted attention in other cities similar in size and resources, and has already been adopted in one or two other places.

### INDIVIDUAL INSTRUCTION

A third movement that has come into our schools recently is that included in the plan of individual instruction which was outlined in the Report of last year. It is now possible to judge somewhat its results. The plan is in use in practically all the elementary schools and is employed to some extent in the high school.

Probably no more valuable comment on the working of the plan could be made than included in the following

extracts from reports made by thirty-one Auburn teachers at the close of the last school year:

1. "It has long fostered a spirit of independence among the pupils studying alone and it has encouraged those most in need of assistance."

2. "It brings the teacher and pupil into closer sympathy and it is especially helpful in cases where pupils are too slow of comprehension to take in the class explanation and are too diffident to ask for help."

3. "It has encouraged more careful, exact and thoughtful work."

4. "I know my pupils better."

5. "Those who do not understand often get more help in fifteen minutes devoted entirely to them than they would in days of class instruction."

6. "It has developed the ability to concentrate thought and has promoted self-reliance."

7. "I have noticed a growth in the power of certain pupils to get knowledge for themselves from the book."

8. "It has proved beneficial to the majority of pupils by giving encouragement to some and by teaching self-reliance to others."

9. "Some pupils who formerly seemed to be working blindly, now work with intelligence. The class as a whole works more independently."

10. "Several pupils who were below grade finished the year with the grade."

11. "I think that it has shown pupils that I am personally interested in them."

12. "I have done much more effective work through individual than through class instruction."

13. "I have been able to save several pupils to their grades."

14. "I have been able to correct errors in understanding before they became fixed."

15. "It has certainly given one boy confidence in himself and caused another to be promoted who could not possibly have been without it."

16. "It tends to the fullest harmony between teacher and pupil. Not only can the difficulty be found but the real cause of it. I am certain that time is spent to great advantage; it has given us our first lesson in climbing."

17. "One boy saved and many benefited."

18. "It has been very helpful."

19. "I promoted three pupils who, without individual instruction, would have been obliged to stay in my room another year."

20. "I discovered the special needs of pupils who had worked at a disadvantage. It has helped me greatly with the foreign children."

21. "It has made discipline very easy."

22. "It helped a boy who appeared almost a hopeless case."

23. "I am wholly pleased with results."

24. "Very satisfactory results. Two pupils saved to the grade."

25. "It encourages the slow and backward pupils."

26. "Individual instruction benefits the entire class and not simply the child who receives it. Recitations can be made more interesting if the teacher does not have to stop the recitation frequently to explain some subject to a backward child. The child who receives the individual instruction steadily gains confidence in himself and soon will become eager to recite correctly before the class. The child to whom the recitation period was a thing to be dreaded comes to enjoy it."

27. "Individual instruction has especially helped foreign speaking children."

28. "The teacher comes into more intimate relationship with the child and is able to study his needs more closely."

29. "It has saved one pupil to his class."

30. "It has made marked improvement in several cases."

31. "I consider it a benefit."

The foregoing expressions represent all the teachers who used the plan during the first year except five who had employed it only for the last few weeks of the year and did not feel justified in expressing an opinion.

Reports this year continue to endorse the plan.

## TEXT-BOOKS

No changes have been made in any of the basal series of texts used in the elementary schools. In the high school there have been introduced Redway's Commercial Geography, Harding's Mediæval History, Vos' Essentials of German, Mills' Algebra, Bennett's Latin Writer and Latin Composition, Avery's School Chemistry and Bacon's New German Course.

## REPAIRS

Important repairs have been made during the year on a number of the school buildings of the city. At the Chamberlain School new sanitariums were installed, a new furnace was provided, and new floors were laid. The inside walls were tinted.

At the Washburn School the old boiler, which had been declared by the inspectors to be unsafe, was replaced by a new one. The interior walls and woodwork also received attention. The school-room walls of the Merrill and Park Hill schools were also made fresh by tinting and varnishing.

Nearly all the rural schools received attention in the way of repairs. A large number of these rural school buildings and some of those in the city should be painted next summer.

## THE WEBSTER SCHOOL

The Webster School building ought to have special attention this ensuing year. The heating and ventilation are both inadequate. The seats and desks in several of the rooms are not adapted in size to the pupils who occupy them. The floors and staircases are badly worn, the light in some rooms is insufficient.

I would call your attention to the fact that the three neighboring schoolhouses, the Webster, Franklin and Chamberlain are all old structures good, at best for comparatively few years of service and that two of them, the Webster and the Chamberlain, are in unfavorable proximity to the railroad.

Would it be feasible to dispose of these buildings and replace them with one large, centrally located building? By such an arrangement the city might have a building with all rooms on the first and second floors, having a modern equipment in respect to lighting, heating, ventilation, sanitation and seating, with a provision for manual training.

If there is any likelihood that such course may be adopted within a few years the repairs to be made on the Webster School should be of a somewhat more temporary nature than would otherwise be the case.

## COURSES OF STUDY

No important changes have been made in either the high or common school courses of study. The increased attention paid to certain phases of arithmetic work is yielding satisfactory results. The outline of the course prepared last year has proven helpful in establishing uniformity of work.

The text books on hand for teaching both language and history are somewhat worn and as both are unsatisfactory I would recommend that a consideration be given to the expediency of making changes.

In the High School Commercial Geography has been substituted for Mediæval History for those students who will take the commercial course. I would strongly recommend that other changes be made in the first two years of this course with a view to bringing it more into conformity with the needs of the pupils who elect it.

## SPECIAL STUDIES

Reports of the directors of music and drawing are appended to this report. The work in both subjects is of a superior quality. At the recent State Teachers' Convention the work done by the High School Glee Clubs called forth most complimentary expressions. As a result several other high schools of the State are giving increased attention to music.

## MEDICAL INSPECTION

There is a very close and vital connection between the physical and mental condition of the child. A surprisingly large number of children do poor work in school because they are below a normal standard of health. Very many difficulties which thus interfere with the child's welfare are overlooked by parents and teachers incompetent to judge of conditions.

There are, moreover, a certain class of diseases known as children's or school diseases. Formerly it was the belief that every child must have these diseases anyhow and no special precautions were taken against them. To-day, however, so rapid has been the growth of medical knowledge and skill, that a successful warfare is waged against diseases formerly regarded as inevitable.

The feature of medical inspection has been in some schools in various parts of the country for several years and from the experience of these valuable conclusions may be drawn. In Massachusetts, so successful have the trials been that a law recently enacted obliges all towns and cities to provide medical inspection.

The advantages to be gained from such inspection are, briefly, as follows:

1. Contagious diseases are detected in their early stages and epidemics avoided or checked.

2. Certain diseases and difficulties arising from uncleanness are discovered and proper treatment recommended and, when necessary, enforced.

3. Individual peculiarities and abnormalities are revealed and proper treatment secured. Among these are defective sight and vision and adenoids. Children sometimes labor for years against difficulties of these kinds without recognition of their serious effects.

4. Opportunity is afforded to advise with teachers on such matters as sanitation, ventilation, etc.

5. Medical inspection gives a chance to discover any special causes of weakened physical condition as excessive smoking or other dissipations to which children are liable.

It should be borne in mind that medical inspection does not involve medical treatment by the inspector. If a child is found to be suffering from any difficulty which interferes with his own progress or endangers his fellow pupils he is sent home, his parents are notified and the family physician may be called. Medical inspectors, as such, do not treat cases.

Under this plan the several buildings of a city are assigned to different physicians whose duty it is to call at stated intervals, usually each morning. If there are any suspicious eruptions, coughs or other indications of disease it is the duty of the teacher to turn the pupils under question over to the inspector for examination. Also she is to report any condition about her school which she believes should have examination.

The system is not expensive in practice when considered from the financial standpoint and from the standpoint of health it has been found to be an actual preventative of disease and a saver of lives.

From statistics gathered in New York, Berlin, Boston and Chicago it has been found that from six to twelve per cent.

of the public school pupils are afflicted with diseases which make them a source of danger to other pupils. In Providence, in one year 1,018 children were found to be in sub-normal health condition. 182 cases of adenoids alone were discovered. In Boston in one year the following were among the cases discovered and reported by the inspectors. The figures indicate the number of cases found and it should be borne in mind that these do not include diseases discovered at home in the usual way.

Diphtheria 23, scarlet fever 23, measles 121, whooping cough 08, influenza 50, erysipelas 2, syphilis 3, tuberculosis 2, malaria 4, acute pharyngitis 438, Follicular tonsilitis 1281, adenoids 58, defective vision 220, eczema 337, lice 2316, itch 42, ringworm 172, urinary disease 29. Of 15,573 children examined 4,952 were found in a normal, healthy condition.

In New York City 400 cases of contagious diseases were discovered in the first four days of medical inspection.

While we may consider ourselves fortunately free from many of the discouraging health conditions of the great cities, yet the experience of teachers is that even in smaller towns problems of this sort are arising with which in the nature of things they cannot be competent to deal. Therefore I believe the entire subject is one that is worthy of your study and investigation.

## MANUAL TRAINING

There has appeared annually in this Report for a number of years a recommendation that manual training be introduced into the schools. This Report must not be an exception.

It ought to be clearly understood that manual training is not merely an extra, an unimportant accessory which may or may not be included with little difference either way to education. Such is not the case.

Manual training is but another name for hand training—and there can be no perfectly rounded system of education while only head training is provided for.

Our schools are already doing a very splendid work for those who will be teachers, ministers, lawyers, writers and storekeepers. They are doing far too little for that much greater class who are to work on the farms, in shops, mills, factories and in all kinds of engineering work.

While we aid boys in school to discover and develop literary and artistic taste, argumentative ability and skill in computation, yet if a boy have any mechanical talent he must discover it and develop it for himself and in the case of the city boy, the chance of its discovery and development is small after all.

Moreover, all normal boys and girls have a need of the training of the hand. If it is given, the chance of the activities running riot in improper ways is considerably reduced. In this age education is carried on in the *doing* of things as well as in the *thinking* of them. And the only opportunity we are giving our pupils to *do* things is through the medium of pencil and paper.

And again, the tendency of an education that is entirely bookish is to promote false ideas of labor. We train our boys and girls away from work. They get the notion that labor, manual labor, is something unworthy and if possible to be avoided and they get this notion from the over-emphasis we are placing on head work. The office of education is to make the whole man capable and efficient and while the brain as the director of the body may receive much attention, yet it will not do to neglect the training of the members which are to do its bidding.

In his annual message, President Roosevelt referred to this great weakness in our schools. He said, "It should be one of our prime objects as a nation, so far as feasible, constantly to work toward putting the mechanic, the wage-worker who works with his hands, on a higher plane of efficiency and reward. Unfortunately, at the present, the effect of some of the work in the public schools is in exactly the opposite direction. If boys and girls are trained merely in literary accomplishments to the total exclusion of industrial, manual and technical training, the tendency is to unfit them for industrial work and to make them reluctant to go into it, or unfitted to do well if they do go into it."

This city has enjoyed distinction as an educational center of the State. It cannot hope to retain this distinction unless it very soon recognizes its obligation in this matter of manual training.

We should not, of course, be moved wholly by the argument of what other cities are doing. Such a consideration may move our local pride and it is well to note that a large number of the Maine towns and cities have adopted manual training courses. But there are other considerations. This



is not only an educational center; it is an industrial center as well and we cannot justify our school system unless we make it serve, in every possible way, the community for which it exists.

Such a course properly and creditably conducted with training for boys and girls can be instituted and supported the first year for \$2,000 and at a somewhat less cost in succeeding years. The entire matter was investigated with great care and reported by a committee of your Board in May 1, 1905. I beg to urge that this matter again be forcefully presented to the City Council early in the year and I trust some practical result will be forthcoming.

In conclusion: The personal interest which each of you has felt in all the measures that have been considered and in the usual conduct of the schools, has been a most important factor in their continued success. For this and the generous support you have accorded me in the pursuance of my duties, I desire to take this opportunity to express my appreciation.
