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## Report of the Town Council Chairman

Windham, is a magnificent place to live, work, raise a family, and enjoy. I am fortunate to do all of these each and every day. I am also privileged to represent Windham on the Town Council and to work with a team of people - council, staff, and a community, who are committed to making Windham what it is today and plan for what it will be tomorrow.

Economic times are still tough in many areas and a lot of our neighbors continue to struggle every day. The Town Council and staff recognize these challenges and continue to do what we can to stretch every dollar while maintaining the highest level of service possible for our citizens.

As we work to keep costs and property taxes under control, we must recognize the needs of our growing community and plan accordingly. Windham's growth will not be avoided, but can and will be managed. This Town Council has recommended no increase in property taxes for FY 2013/14; however, growth and expansion will have a cost. The Council is currently working on several impact fees, has identified several new TIF districts, and has started a building and field capital fund. These items are far overdue and are only a few new revenue generating and planning tools which will allow both short and long term objectives to be met, in a responsible and fair manner.

Windham cannot and must not stand still, and can and must plan for today and tomorrow. The Town Council and Staff are working each day, with your support and insight, to make today better than yesterday, and tomorrow better than today. Your insight and perspective is important. Be actively involved as early and as often as possible. The result of our collective effort will be a better Windham for our generation and those to follow.

# Town Manager's Annual Report

Last year I wrote about Windham celebrating the 275<sup>th</sup> anniversary of its founding. So much has changed over that span of time it would be hard to know where to begin. In fact, as many have observed in many other places, the only real constant is change. Places that are wooded now may once have been farm fields. Areas where there were once farm fields are now neighborhoods. And Windham will continue to change.

Though we might regard what we see today as permanent, history tells us this is not so. It will continue to change – a little here, a lot there, and more or less at different times. That makes it sound inevitable – and it is, and beyond our control – which it is not, at least to some degree. The Windham we have today didn't happen all at once. The Windham of tomorrow won't happen all at once, either, but many of the seeds of that future are already with us today, and we have the opportunity to sow more of the seeds of that Windham to come.

Sowing the seeds of change? Now where have I heard that before? Doesn't matter, but what does matter is how we choose to make a difference, to sow seeds of change in the community. A few years ago a group came together with the goal of providing a way for people to get involved in growing things, in supplying some fresh produce to the local food pantry, and to give people another way to interact as community. That effort led directly to the creation of the Windham Community Garden which, in a very short time, has grown (forgive the pun) to be more popular and more successful than even its most optimistic supporters would have thought at the start.

Drive by on Route 202 by the public safety building and skate park, stop in and talk with some of the gardeners (but don't be surprised to have to start weeding!), and think about signing up (better do it early, space goes fast!), and see for yourself. The community garden isn't just growing vegetables, it's growing community. And the change that led to the garden came from a few people with an idea who chose to get involved.

Over the next couple of years we, as a community, will be engaged in a process to write an updated comprehensive master plan for the town. Sure, it will involve meetings and flip charts and maps and markers and dots and facilitators and on and on. But mainly it needs to involve you, and your ideas, and your seeds of change. Not all of them will take root and grow, but they'll never have a chance if you don't plant them. Plan to attend some (or all!) of the meetings, participate in the forums, both in person and online ([www.windhamcommunityforum.org](http://www.windhamcommunityforum.org)), but make sure to add your voice to the process.

Windham is a great town. It is the Lakes Region's marketplace, an integral part of Greater Portland, and it will continue to be a great place to live, work, raise a family, and have a business. In the years (decades? centuries?) ahead the trees and fields will still be green, the water clear, and the people engaged, friendly, and hard-working. And we're all going to work together to make it happen so that, on another milestone anniversary, others will look back and say we did.

# Superintendent of RSU#14

RSU #14 has been working on a blueprint from our Strategic Plan to transition into a standards-based system. We have stayed focused on learner-centered classrooms and are excited that students are engaging in creative and innovative learning. Student initiative and engagement will increase as we allow our students to articulate their learning goals and celebrate their responsibility for demonstrating their success. Along with transitioning to a standards-based education, our top priority is to ensure our learner-centered classrooms continue to emphasize high-quality instruction for all students.

Windham High School was chosen to participate in an innovative new program that will help its students more easily make the tough transition from high school to college and the skilled workforce. The 4-year grant is funding college-access and career-readiness resources for students ranging from connecting them to early college programs, developing mentoring and internship opportunities, and providing outreach services for parents. The pilot program is the result of a partnership between the MELMAC Education Foundation and Jobs for Maine Graduates. The primary goals of the partnership with our high school is to increase the high school graduation rate and for students to connect their personal aspirations with a plan for their life after graduation. Through the grant we have a full-time college counselor available for students and their families to provide a range of support for career options, career pathways, education requirements and connecting students to dual enrollment and early college programs.

The tragedy that occurred in Newtown, Connecticut will forever change the way we manage and operate our schools. The safety of our students and staff is paramount and we have already made some changes to our security systems. You will be noticing significant alterations to our buildings and how they are accessed, as well as the systems used to monitor each site. We will be installing additional interior and exterior cameras in all our schools, along with upgrades to school access points. As we move through this process we will be working closely with local law enforcement and will continue to seek input from our school risk consultant whose recommendations have been incorporated into the planned work.

The RSU #14 School Nutrition Program continues to be recognized for providing age-appropriate calorie limits, larger servings of vegetables and fruits, a wider variety of vegetables and legumes and more whole grains. Students are growing vegetables in our school gardens and the produce is being used in our school meals. Overall participation has increased 30% for breakfast and 15% for lunch.

Our accomplishments are too numerous to mention them all but here are some highlights: Pender Makin, Director of the REAL School, was chosen as the Maine Principals' Association's 2013 High School Principal of the Year! The REAL School received a grant for \$133,000 from AmeriCorps and the money is being used for 13 AmeriCorps members to assist in the development and logistics for Service Learning projects; Jordan-Small Middle School was chosen by USM's CEPARE office as a school for their case studies on schools demonstrating academic improvement on the statewide standardized test scores over the past four years; Videographer Gary Harriman did an excellent job putting together our "Inside the RSU" videos showing the work being done in our District and being shown on our website and both local cable stations; Pender Makin, Director of the REAL School, and Dr. Kyle Rhoads, Principal of Windham Primary School, were selected to present workshops at conferences; Jordan Symonds was recognized through the Maine Sunday Telegram as an AllState selection in Girls Soccer; The Board of Directors now has two student representatives from the High School serving on the Board; Manchester School earned the *Let's Go! 5-2-1-0 Silver Award* from the Opportunity Alliance for implementing the 5 priority strategies for preventing childhood obesity; The Windham High School Boys Swim Team captured their 3<sup>rd</sup> consecutive Regional title by winning the South Southwestern Team Championship; Director of Facilities and Property Services, Bill Hansen, was awarded the *ecomaine's* eco-excellence Community Award for the Town of Windham.

# Windham Raymond Adult Education

## Windham Raymond Adult Education: What Will You Discover?

Over the course of 2012, adults of varying ages, vastly different educational, economic and skill levels, with an equally diverse number of interests, found their way to all of the sites where the Windham Raymond Adult Education Program operates in Windham and Raymond. They came for a variety of reasons: to improve their basic reading, writing or math skills; to earn a high school credential; to prepare for post-secondary education or a new job; to take their first ever computer course; to improve their health; or finally to learn a new skill that would enrich their life. Adults ages 17-90 had access to over 300 different adult learning opportunities during this year. That translated into over 3300 total enrollments. Windham Raymond Adult Education (WRAE) continued to seek ways to expand our opportunities to the adults in our communities. Our English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) enrollments grew as more students heard about our high quality, convenient classes. Our Adult Basic Education (ABE) classes continued to provide more intensive research-based reading and writing instruction. Finally, many new holistic health and wellness one-night workshops and more in-depth courses boosted participation even further as people sought ways to take care of their own personal well-being. WRAE has embraced its role in helping to promote a healthier community. We were an active member in the RSU #14 Wellness Team, and the Communities Putting Prevention to Work (CPPW) million dollar federal initiative here in the Lakes Region.

Other efforts continued to focus on assisting adults to transition to further education at the post-secondary level. College transitions programming through our six-year, annual \$30,000 Maine College Transitions Project (MCTP) grant has grown as we seek to assist adults with those post-secondary dreams. For that grant, we partnered/ collaborated with adult education programs in Gray/New Gloucester and Cumberland in order to maximize resources in these challenging times. Regionalization of services has proven to be a successful, cost effective way to serve the academic needs of the adults in our communities. WRAE graduates were even given a free College Transitions course valued at \$50 to encourage them – and provide financial assistance – to continue along their educational path.

One option on that path is the Southern Maine Community College (SMCC) courses offered at Windham Raymond Adult Education, which built upon our existing services, especially the College Transitions program. WRAE provided information about college, one-on-one planning assistance to succeed in college, placement testing, readiness courses, and entry-level college credit classes, all in a comfortable environment close to home. Over 100 local adults also participated in SMCC courses held at Windham High School.

Windham Raymond Adult Education continued to also embrace its expanding role in local economic development efforts and providing high quality workforce development training. Working with the local Chamber of Commerce, our local economic development director, Genest Concrete and St. Joseph's College, new employment soft skills training programs and even a very successful regional job fair were offered.

Due in large part to a FAME (Finance Authority of Maine) grant and then through local funds, WRAE was able to hire a Career Pathways Coordinator, Tina Christophersen. Her main role was to develop and implement job training and career pathways certificate programming for adults that would lead to employment. An on-site mobile welding unit was brought to Windham to provide job training in a high demand occupation. Working in partnership along with local machine shops, Portland Adult Education and PATHS, WRAE developed a 150-hour long Introduction to Precision Machining Technology program designed to provide the essential skill set and knowledge for an entry-level machining position.

Windham Raymond Adult Education/Windham High School became an authorized Certiport Testing Center. Anyone who was interested in taking any of the Microsoft Office certification tests were able to purchase test vouchers and schedule tests at our learning center. In addition, a local manufacturer requested computer skills upgrade training (Microsoft Excel 2010) training for all employees who use the software at work. That resulted in the development of customized Excel training for the company. It is an important role that WRAE envisions itself being more involved with in the future.

### Enrollment/Participation Figures

There was a slight decrease of 118 (3%) in adult enrollments from the same period of time last year (January – December). This is a 3 year increase of 372 (12.5%).

## REPORT OF THE CODE ENFORCEMENT OFFICE

The Code Enforcement Office offers a variety of services to residents and property owners. In addition to issuing building, internal and external plumbing, and electrical permits; the Office's responsibilities include the adherence and enforcement of land use and shoreland zoning, gravel pit regulation, junkyard regulation, flood plain regulation, rules in regard to the conversion of seasonal dwellings in shoreland areas, and the standards of the Street Naming and Addressing Ordinance, Wireless Telecommunications Tower Ordinance, Surface Water Protection Ordinance as well as the Mass Gathering Ordinance. Windham has 14 lakes and ponds covering 32,180 acres of area and 15 rivers, streams and brooks, all of which are in Shoreland Zoning.

Code Enforcement was responsible for processing 714 permits in 2011 resulting in revenue of \$123,096.15 and in 2012 was also responsible for processing 947 permits, resulting in revenue of \$141,885.85. This includes for permits: Building, Junkyards, Plumbing, Shoreland Review, Soil and Erosion, Use and Wastewater.

**Stormwater Education** was provided by Cumberland County Soil & Water Conservation District and Portland Water District to 304 students at **Windham High School and Windham Middle School**. The total number of student contact hours equates to 1,643 hours.

Lesson topics included a facilitated "Eco-centricity" event where high school students taught lessons to middle school students which included conservation-based lessons about geology, water, soil, atmosphere, ecology, and wildlife; water quality discussion and macro invertebrate sampling and identification (bio assessment). Staff provided input about water quality during high school students' presentation about a wetland ecosystem; various lessons included information about non

point source pollution, human impact, watershed characteristics, stormwater, low impact development, and behavior change.

### Yardscaping Healthy Lawn Care

The Cumberland County Soil & Water Conservation District worked with Blue Seal and Aubuchon Hardware to provide healthy lawn care information to their customers. The District also staffed a healthy lawn care display at Blue Seal's spring open house on May 6<sup>th</sup>.

### Staff

Last year was extremely busy for the Code Enforcement Office, new single family home permits nearly doubled from 2011. We saw expansions and renovations of local businesses as well as the construction of new commercial establishments. We welcomed Wayne Matthews as a new Code Enforcement Officer in October. He brings a wealth of knowledge to the department in building construction as well as his experience as a veteran fire fighter. # Economic Development

The Town of Windham is actively working to support the many entrepreneurs, business owners and workers through an action plan approved by the Town Council and being implemented by the Economic Development Office. The Town's business directory, [www.WindhamMarketplace.com](http://www.WindhamMarketplace.com), where over 800 Windham businesses are listed, has had over 9,800 views in 2012 from people all over the United States, especially New England, as well as many area residents looking for goods and services our businesses supply. This year we contracted for a Retail Market Analysis to define our market as well as to develop new and exciting marketing ideas for the Windham Marketplace. This Analysis completed by The Retail Coach has shown us that we are a strong market, with much more room to grow in both sales and retail selection. We have brought that information to our existing retailers and to local property owners and developers. We are also reaching out to retailers and developers who do not have a presence in Windham to let them know how good of a market we are. We have maintained our Holiday flag program along our roadways, and we have advertised the Windham Marketplace both regionally and locally in print and on TV. We have sponsored the Rotary's Ice Fishing Derby as well as other local events, including the Sebago Lakes Region Job Fair held at St. Joseph's College. At this year's Job Fair over 300 job seekers found 44 employers and educational groups waiting to talk to them about their employment future.

## Windham's Brownfields Program

We continue to assist the Town and property owners in redeveloping sites with potential or real environmental contamination. This program, funded through a US EPA Brownfields Assessment Grant, works towards changing underutilized and potentially contaminated parcels into productive and economically viable properties. If you own or know of a property that could benefit from the Brownfields Program, please contact the Economic Development Office.

Projects to date have included:

- ◆ The former Heritage Metalcraft Building - An environmental assessment was completed prior to a new owner taking control of the property. The contamination on the property has been remediated and the property is currently being renovated for use as a Bio-fuels sales center.
- Two parcels at the former mill site in South Windham - Extensive environmental assessments have been done on both of these properties.
- ◆ 13 Depot Street - Minor environmental concerns were found on this property and the new owner/developer is working to remediate the property and currently has plans for 13 units of housing.
  - ◆ 7 Depot Street - This former mill site was found to have widespread contamination on the grounds and in the building. The property has been fenced to secure the property from trespassers. This site is currently undergoing analysis for possible inclusion in other Federal and State environmental programs.
  - ◆ The Chaffin Pond Property, now the Donnabeth Lippman Park - An environmental analysis of the property was completed prior to the Town purchasing this property. Additional environmental assessment work was completed on the quality of the groundwater for potential reuse.

The *Windham Economic Development Corporation* (WEDC) continues to support the community by providing assistance to both the Town and businesses located or looking to locate in Windham. Projects have included:

### Town of Windham Economic Development Strategic Plan

The WEDC has spearheaded the efforts to develop an Economic Development Strategic Plan for the Town. We have met with various groups and the Town Council, and are taking those results public for more discussion and refinement. The Economic Development Strategic Plan will be incorporated into the comprehensive planning efforts underway by the Town's Planning Office.

### Anglers Road Property

The WEDC purchased this property to assist the Town and State in realigning the Anglers Road, Whites Bridge Road and US Route 302 intersection. The WEDC has worked with the Town Council and Planning Board in rezoning this parcel to C1 and has developed conceptual plans that would lead to a redevelopment of the property along with the realignment of the intersection. This property is currently being marketed for sale.



### Marketing Windham

The WEDC continues to collaborate with the **Sebago Lakes Region Chamber of Commerce** and the Town to market the Town of Windham as being a great place to start and expand business. The WEDC Board also continues to promote our economy by sponsoring and participating at various trade shows and business events:

Participating in the **Maine Real Estate and Development Association's** (MEREDA) Annual Forecast Conference and Member Showcase.

At this conference of Maine Real Estate professionals, Windham was pointed to as having an additional 44,000 square feet of new retail building construction while maintaining one of the lowest vacancy rates in the Greater Portland Region.

- ◆ Sponsoring **Windham's Summerfest Business Showcase** - Over 30 local businesses participate in this annual event to help promote their offerings to the thousands of Windham and area residents visiting Summerfest.
- ◆ Sponsoring the third annual **Sebago Lakes Region Job Fair** - This year's Job Fair held in partnership with Saint Joseph's College, the Sebago Lakes Region Chamber of Commerce, Windham Raymond Adult Education, and the Maine Today Media group was the most well attended to date. With 45 employers and over 400 job seekers many employers were able to meet with potential employees.
- ◆ Sponsoring local **Retailers Forums** - This past year, with plans to continue, the WEDC partnered with local retailers and the **Sebago Lakes Region Chamber of Commerce's Retail Committee** to develop marketing plans and events to help promote Windham businesses as well as to draw consumer traffic to the area. The Shop Local campaign was a result of these forums as well as the very successful Seasons Greetings Saturday held Thanksgiving weekend. Look for continued marketing efforts and new events in the coming year.

The Town continues to partner with, local businesses, the Sebago Lakes Region Chamber of Commerce and regional and state agencies to work to improve our local and regional economy. The Economic Development Office stands ready to support anyone who looks to turn their dreams into reality and their plans into action.

# Windham Fire-Rescue Department

"The mission of the Windham Fire - Rescue Department is to assist the citizens and visitors of our community with emergencies that they are unable to handle themselves". This mission means the department will respond to many situations to provide assistance or advice on the emergency.

The Windham Fire - Rescue Department has four locations that we provide response from. These locations are: District 1[South Windham (16 members)], District 2 [North Windham (18 Members)], District 3 [East Windham (13 Members), and District 4 [Windham Center (11 Members)]. Other groups that operate under the Windham Fire-Rescue Department are the Rescue Company and the Windham Fire Police Company.

Windham Fire-Rescue provided service to the community for another year. This past year, 2012, saw a decrease in the number of requests for service. The decrease was 107 calls for service, which amounts to 4%. In reviewing the statistics, one can see that the largest percentages of calls were related to medical emergencies. Windham Fire-Rescue is in line with the national average of 65% to 75% of the total volume of calls being medically related.

The 65-75 members of the department participated in training on a regular basis. The amount of documented training time for the year 2012 was 6,787 hours. The programs are diverse ranging from becoming a basic firefighter, officer development programs, medical emergency programs, advanced firefighting skills, vehicle extrication programs for beginners and advanced, and specialty programs. This amount provides a wealth of knowledge to handle the communities' emergencies.

A large challenge this past year was to meet a new Bureau of Labor Standard requirement for driver training. Each member of the department was required to show competency on each piece of apparatus that they are cleared to drive and operate. This was a test that had to be documented with an over the road driving evaluation. This will have to

be demonstrated every three years. We have established a schedule so that members don't have to do all of them every year. We are proud of the member's ability to complete this task.

The department was able to visit the Windham Primary School during the month of October. Each class was visited by department personnel and presented with a planned lesson in Fire Prevention. In addition to the schools we visited many day care facilities with the apparatus and the equipment. These accomplishments took the better part of the month of October. Administrative Assistant Nancy Graves was kept busy keeping the schedule correct so that personnel knew where they had to be when.

The department is currently using three pick-up trucks in responses and activities. These three vehicles are going to be utilized in responding to emergency medical calls in the North Windham, South Windham, and East Windham areas. The concept is to reduce the road mileage and fuel consumption of the larger vehicles with the smaller pickups. In addition it is nice to have the four wheel drives for the winter season.

This current budget year has allowed us to make some major headway in replacing some of our equipment. We just received Town Council permission to replace our self-contained breathing apparatus in a joint bid process with several other communities. Windham with the Town of Gorham was able to purchase a set of portable jacks that will allow our shared mechanic to lift our heaviest vehicles and work under them instead of from a creeper laying on the floor on his back. We are preparing to present to the Windham Town Council an approved purchase request for our vehicle extrication equipment which has served us since the 1980's. In our operating budget we planned and will be making the purchase for a protective clothing extractor to wash our personal protective clothing. This will enable us remove some of the products from fires which will go towards removing the cancer causing products found in fires today.

If you have questions, concerns, or comments, please feel free to come by one of the stations and see us. If you would like a tour of our facilities we would be glad to show you the facilities and display the equipment that your tax dollars have purchased to protect and serve the community. We look forward to another challenging year of serving the community of Windham. Please be extra careful this year with your fire related activities.

We as a department and community will face new challenges this year from the passage of Maine's and Windham's new open fireworks legislation. We would be glad to hear any issues and explain our perspective, or you may call the Chief's office at 892-1911. If you are interested in joining our membership, please call or come by Windham Center station to obtain an application to become a member of the Windham Fire-Rescue Department.

This is a photo of one of six heavy duty jacks that were purchased jointly between Windham Fire-Rescue , Gorham Fire Department, and Gorham Public Works. Each of the jack units has forks for before and after the wheels. The units work together on each wheel to lift the vehicle and safety locks secure the vehicle in the air. It has the capacity to pick up each of our vehicles and allow the mechanic to work in a standing position. These units can be used on any vehicle in the Windham Fire-Rescue, Gorham Fire Department, or Gorham Public Works fleet.

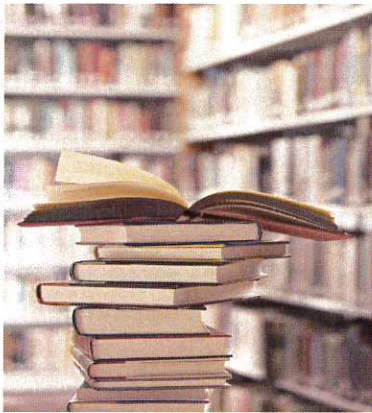

There were a few new services added in 2012. The library is now lending out a telescope for one week at a time. A grant from the Cornerstones of Science Foundation made this possible. It has proved enormously popular so there is reserve list for it. New on the technology front is that you may load your library barcode on a smartphone and we will scan it instead of your card if you prefer. The library's teen group, the TNT Club (Tweens & Teens Club) now also participates in a monthly newsletter "Pow!" which features info about the group and reviews books, films and more.

Our collection of over 47,000 items includes books, magazines, newspapers, DVDs, audiobooks, music CDs, and even Kilowatt energy detectors. Some of the other services not listed above include outreach to senior housing and assisted living facilities, a Tea every six weeks, a monthly book discussion group, a summer reading program for children, teens and for adults, a meeting room space, a quiet study room, tax forms and tax form downloading, exam proctors, art exhibits and collections on display, museum and park passes, and access to research and periodical databases.

The Windham Loan Closet is located near the Windham Public Library at 221 Windham Center Road and is open by appointment only.

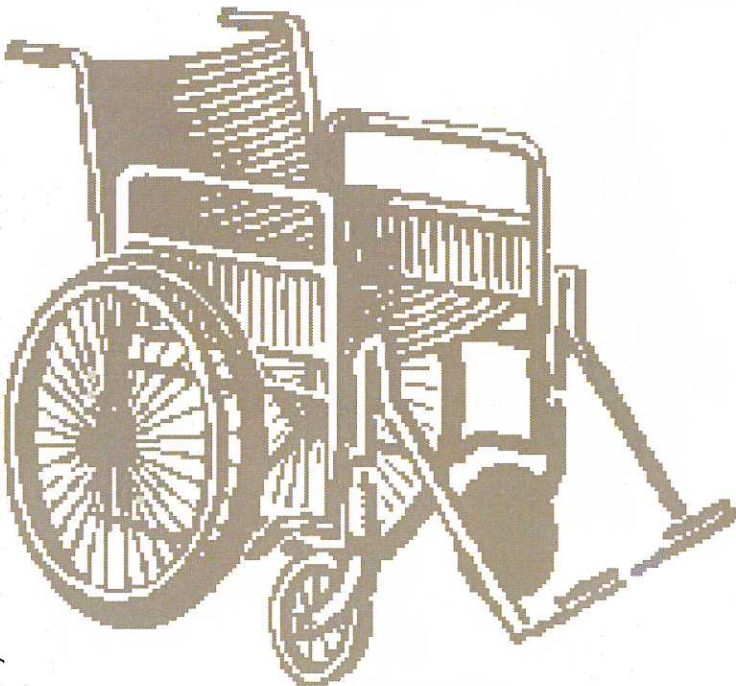
To borrow supplies free of charge, residents may call the Town Office at 892-1907.

# Motor Vehicle Registration and Tax Collection

The Tax Collection Office is responsible for the collection of all Windham properties. The new property tax bills are processed, sorted and mailed by the computer company, in August. In May, a courtesy notice is sent to homeowners who have a balance due. At the end of June, a Tax Receivable Summary is prepared for the auditor stating balances due on all taxes. Eight months from the date of tax commitment, if any tax remains unpaid, the lien process begins.

## Windham Parks and Recreation Department

In spring of 2011 the Town of Windham purchased 123 acres that was known as the Chaffin Pond Preserve from the Portland Water District. The property was purchased through a generous donation of the Lippman Family and the area is now known as the Donna Beth Lippman Park. Mitchell & Associates was awarded the bid to develop a Park Master Plan in early 2102. After stakeholder meetings, surveys, public meetings and council meetings Mitchell & Associates completed the Park Master Plan which was adopted by the Windham Town Council in December of 2012. The next phase will be implementing the master plan in phases as funding becomes available over the next three to five years.

2012 Dundee Park summer season was a challenging one with repairs being done to the Dundee Dam which significantly impacted the water levels during the summer months. We ended the season with 14,870 visits at Dundee Park which was lower than 2011 visits of 17,338. Most seasons are around 17,000 to 18,000 visits. We sold 317 passes and 13% of our visitors were group users from Windham and surrounding towns. Mona Dodd our long time park manager was joined by Ron and Dusti Faucher who all did a wonderful job considering the challenges presented by the low water levels on the Presumpscot River. Changes to the bath house, which was built in early 1970's, are being considered to provide better service and improve access to individuals with disabilities. Bids for the project will be going out in early 2013 for construction in spring of 2013. We are looking forward to a more normal and exciting 2013 season.





Many people may not know that the Parks and Recreation Department offers several adult programs during the year. Our Men's 30 and over Basketball program is all year long with eight teams playing weekly at Town Hall gym and Manchester School gym. We offer an adult open gym program at the Windham High School on Sundays. We have over 35 adults playing basketball or volleyball from November to March. Also during the months of February and March we offer a co-ed adult dodge ball program. Dodge ball can be a great work out for all who join in on this classic game.

Our summer day camp program was very successful in 2012 with 203 children enjoying one of the three day camps run by the Department. Not only do we serve the children of Windham, we hire close to 30 camp staff which provides them with a summer job that provides them with a great experience and great memories. During the winter months our ski program at Shawnee Peak was enjoyed by 28 youths from Windham. Even with limited snow on the ground Shawnee's snow making allowed us to complete the five week program.

One of the most popular special events was the Annual Halloween Adventure which was held at the Manchester School. We had 245 youths and adults attend this night of Halloween fun and scavenging for treats in the dark. Our annual Windham Summerfest was held on June 23<sup>rd</sup> with lots of family fun, foods and activities. Despite the rain on Saturday evening, the fireworks were held on Sunday which was enjoyed by thousands of residents from Windham and surrounding towns. Many thanks to Shaw Brothers Construction and McGoldrick Brothers Blasting Services for sponsoring our Fireworks display.

We encourage Windham residents to enjoy one of our great conservation/trail areas; Lowell Preserve, Lippman Park and Mountain Division Trail. Trail maps are available at our office in Town Hall or on our web site at [www.windhamweb.com](http://www.windhamweb.com). So keep active and enjoy our trails, parks, programs and special events during the year!

# Windham Planning Department

The Planning Department is responsible for helping the community manage and guide its physical growth. To accomplish this, planning staff work on both short and long range projects. Short range projects involve providing staff support to the Planning Board in the review of development proposals. Long range projects involve the preparation of comprehensive plans, zoning ordinance amendments and issue-specific reports and studies.

## Department Structure

The Department is staffed by Planning Director Brooks More, Assistant Planner Ben Smith and Administrative Assistant Lisa Fisher. Brooks is responsible for overall management of the department and long range planning projects. Long range projects, which are undertaken as directed by the Town Council and Town Manager, include a range of topics that deal with land development and transportation. Ben is lead staff member for short range planning issues. The majority of this work involves coordinating Town staff's review of development proposals. These reviews are provided as recommendations to assist the Planning Board in its decision making on Subdivision and Site Plan applications. For those not familiar with these terms, subdivision applications involve the division of land into multiple parcels, while site plan applications are typically for the construction of commercial or industrial buildings on a single parcel. Lisa provides assistance to the public and support on development review and research projects.

## Short Range Planning Activities

During the 2012 calendar year, the planning department assisted the Planning Board with eleven (11) subdivision applications, six (6) site plan applications, and two (2) rezoning application. In each category this represented an increase over application levels in 2011.

In addition to development reviews and rezoning applications, staff assisted the Planning Board with revisions to application checklists, Board rules of procedure, and managing performance guarantees for projects under construction.

## Long Range Planning Activities

In 2012, the department worked on the long-range planning projects listed below. Additional information on these projects can be found on the department's webpage at [www.windhamweb.com](http://www.windhamweb.com).

### ◇ Land Use Ordinance Committee

- ◆ Issues Addressed: Accessory apartments; commercial zoning on Route 302 between the Rotary and Page Road; Street standard amendments; Water main and fire apparatus impact fee; Recreational vehicles used as dwelling units; Commercial 1 District sidewalk impact fee, and creation of a Retirement community overlay district.

### ◇ North Route 302 Transportation Plan (White's Bridge Rd. to Mineral Springs Rd.)

- ◆ This is a plan for the infrastructure needed to accommodate future growth in this section of the Roosevelt Trail corridor.
- ◆ Awarded \$7,000 grant from the Portland Area Comprehensive Transportation Plan to develop funding alternatives.
- ◆ Staff is currently working with Eaton Peabody Consultants to develop funding system that will result in new development funding its share of transportation improvements.

### ◇ 21<sup>st</sup> Century Downtown Plan

- ◆ Comprehensive effort to build upon the sense of place in the North Windham commercial district through transportation improvements and land use planning tools.

- ◇ Town Energy Plan/Windham Energy Committee
  - ◆ Department Staff is working with the Energy Committee to make energy efficiency improvements to Town facilities.
  - ◆ Committee conducted energy audits of Town Hall and the Windham Library.
  - ◆ Committee conducted streetlight mapping project to identify unnecessary streetlights. The goal of this effort is to reduce Town costs and energy usage for running additional streetlights.
- ◇ Presumpscot River Watershed Coalition Regional Land Conservation Project
  - ◆ Effort to develop a shared vision and priorities for land conservation in the Presumpscot River watershed.
- ◇ Portland Area Comprehensive Transportation System (PACTS) Planning Committee
  - ◆ Federally mandated transportation planning and funding agency for the region.
- ◇ Windham Design Guidelines
  - ◆ The Town Council adopted revisions that create a hybrid system of design guidelines and standards. The revisions are intended to provide a minimum level of design for all commercial projects.

#### Looking Ahead


During calendar year 2013 the Planning Department will continue working to improve the development review process and assist the Land Use Ordinance Committee. In addition, staff hopes to commence a number of projects that will help the community as it prepares for the future. Some of these projects include:

- ◇ Impact Fees. Continued work on impact fees for capital improvements such as recreation facilities and transportation improvements.
- ◇ Comprehensive Plan. Prepare update to 2003 Plan.
- ◇ Windham Active Lifestyles Coalition (WALC). Provide Staff assistance for this ad hoc community coalition that was formed in 2012.
- ◇ 21<sup>st</sup> Century Downtown Plan. Progress towards Town Council adoption of the Plan, and implementation of recommended strategies.



The term Index Crimes refers to the most common crimes that are tracked by the FBI for Statistical purposes. The following Index crimes were reported in 2011: Criminal Homicide (0), Rape (3), Robbery (5), Aggravated Assault (9), Simple Assault (106) Burglary (65), Larceny (258), Motor Vehicle Theft (9) and Arson (6).

The Index Crimes decreased by 14.75% from 2010. Compared to the 14.93 % increase from 2009 to 2010. The clearance rate decreased 1.64 % from the 2010 rate of (45.14 %) and 2011 rate of (43.5 %).

In addition, the 108 Simple Assaults that were reported, 85 of those Assault cases were cleared which resulted in a clearance rate of 78.70 %

## OTHER ACTIVITIES

### Traffic

Officers conducted 2966 traffic stops which resulted with 136 Seat Belt citations, 209 Speeding citations, 54 OUI Arrests and 27 Operating after Suspension citations. The remaining 2,540 stops were issued either a citation or warning for other traffic violations.

### Accidents

There were a total of 727 traffic accidents investigated: 488 were reportable accidents, 367 were property damage, 121 involved injuries and 0 were fatal.

## Sworn Staff

In January of 2012 the department had an approved sworn staff of 26, with two vacancies. During the Spring of 2012, two 32 year veterans of our force retired - Sgt. Ronald Ramsdell and Sgt. David Thomas.

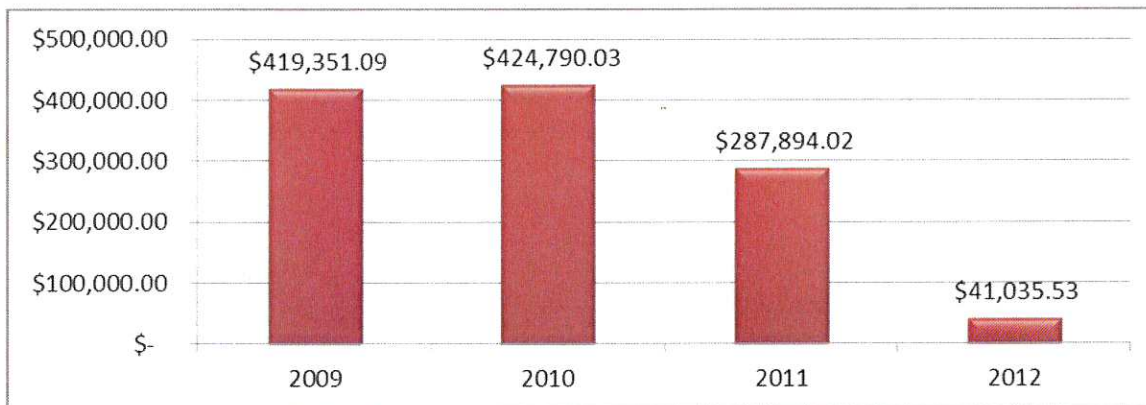
# Social Services

## General Assistance

The Town of Windham's General Assistance Program (G.A.) is a state mandated, municipally administered financial assistance program. It was designed to be a program of "last resort" for residents who are unable to provide for their basic needs. The G.A. office is located in The Family Resource Center at 377 Gray Road. It is overseen by the Assistant Town Manager/H.R. Director and is staffed by René Daniel, G.A. Administrator.

Assistance is available for basic necessities as defined by local ordinance and state statutes. Eligible applicants are assisted through payments made to specific vendors. Administrative costs of the program are paid for through tax dollars. The state reimburses the Town for 50% of the cost of general assistance benefits paid for residents. In 2012, \$41,035.53 was issued to eligible recipients prior to reimbursement. This number reflects an 86% decrease in overall general assistance costs from 2011. The decrease is attributed to diligent oversight of the program: Administration by a certified General Assistance Administrator, strict adherence to the ordinance, better education regarding the program, and furnishing food/non-food assistance through the Windham Food Pantry.

Under G.A., applicants must provide verification of their income and expenses, residence, and if unable to work, medical documentation substantiating their work limitations. Applicants are required to seek work if they are physically able and/or to apply for assistance through other state and federal programs that may be available to them. A determination of eligibility is made for a thirty-day period based on anticipated earnings. Individuals and families that do not qualify for financial assistance are referred to local resources appropriate to their needs.

## FOOD PANTRY/CLOTHES CLOSET

The Food Pantry and its companion Clothes Closet were established in response to a growing need for assistance in the community. Food insecurity is a real and urgent issue and it is being addressed at the Food Pantry with confidentiality and compassion through private appointments with the Social Services Assistant, Madeline Roberts.

Clients are served once a month and receive fresh milk, eggs, bread, and vegetables/fruit (when available) in addition to meat and staple items. Families with children are provided with "extras" during school vacations and the summer break. In 2012, the Pantry served 2431 families made up of 2709 adults and 1081 children for a total of 3790 people.

In addition to the \$20,000 funding provided through the town's budget process, the Food Pantry received U.S.D.A. surplus and "rescued" food from Wayside Food Rescue and has developed a relationship with The Good Shepherd Food-Bank. The Food Pantry relies on, and is very fortunate to have, generous individual and corporate donations as well as community participation during food drives. In 2012, local businesses, churches, service groups, grocery stores, schools and individuals have all been very generous and provided the Food Pantry with \$24,550.38 in cash donations. The Town would like to thank these businesses, organizations, churches, and volunteers that assist those in need throughout the year.

The Food Pantry and the Clothes Closet are open Monday – Thursday 8am – 4pm. Food Pantry clients must provide proof of residency – i.e. utility bill or lease. There is no residency requirement for items needed from the Clothes Closet. Call 892-1931 to schedule an appointment.

# Town Clerk

The Town Clerk's Office wears many hats. We handle all Vital Records for Windham residents, process all business licenses, concealed weapon applications, sell hunting, fishing and dog licenses, take passport photos, accept tax payments, auto registrations, supervise all Federal, State and Municipal elections, handle all voter registration and duties that go along with it, attend Council meetings, and offer notary and Dedimus Justice services.

In May of this year we started accepting credit and debit cards to process transactions. Even though there is a third-party fee associated with using the card; people are appreciative that this service is available.

Again we held our annual Rabies clinic on December 1<sup>st</sup> at Town Hall and the Lake Region Animal Hospital gave the shots. Thank you Dr. Griffin.

I began another search for Windham's oldest resident this spring as our previous Boston Post Cane holder, Winifred (Dolly) Ingalls, passed away on March 18, 2012. She held the cane for almost 4 years. I am pleased to say that Clista Loring who is 104 years old now holds the Boston Post Cane. The cane was presented to her on September 19<sup>th</sup>.

Judy Vance and I went on our annual Christmas shopping trip to help Human Services buy gifts for the children. I would like to thank Allied/RE-MAX for their annual contribution and those residents who generously give as well; which we then added to the money we collected from doing marriages and Dedimus Justice Service.

Our elections this year were held on June 12<sup>th</sup> and November 6<sup>th</sup>. The June election was for the RSU14 School's Budget Validation and State Primary; we had 11,404 registered voters and 1,238 people voted. The November election was the Presidential and Municipal Referendum; we had 11,747 registered voters and 9,124 people voted; a difference of 234 less voters from the last Presidential in 2008.

I would like to thank my staff, Rita Bernier and Judy Vance for all their hard work throughout the year. Also, a big thank you to all of my election workers who put in long hours every election, but especially for all you did at this past Presidential election. You worked diligently and even though we had food to eat, we did not have time to eat it because we were so busy!

Dear Friend,

I hope this letter finds you and your family well. It continues to be an honor to represent you, and I wanted to take a moment to share with you some of the work I've done in Washington and Maine over the last year and look ahead to the rest of this year.

Given the partisan environment and lack of compromise in Washington, I have been looking for ways to help Maine people and the Maine economy that rise above those partisan differences.

One issue I worked hard on last year was local food and local farming. Farming—particularly smaller, sustainable farms—is a growing part of Maine's economy. For too long national farm policy has primarily benefitted giant agribusinesses in other parts of the country. So I introduced the Local Farms, Food and Jobs Act to bring local farmers the resources they need to keep growing.

Every five years, Congress is supposed to pass a farm bill, which sets the nation's farm policy. As we debated a farm bill last year, we were able to get most of the provisions in the Local Farms, Food and Jobs Act included in the legislation. Congress has yet to pass that farm bill, however, but we are working to make sure those important provisions that will help local farms in Maine remain included when they do.

Sometimes the most practical solutions don't even involve legislation or Washington. For example, as the lobster industry struggled with low prices and an oversupply of lobster last summer, I wrote to the heads of all the cruise ship companies that visit Maine. I was surprised to learn that none of them were buying local, fresh lobster for their passengers and I asked the CEO's of each company to consider doing so. I'm happy to say that a number of them agreed to buy lobster locally when their cruise ships made stops in Portland, and ordered thousands of pounds of Maine lobster for their passengers.

I am beginning this year with a new assignment to the House Appropriations Committee. This is a big responsibility, since it is the committee where virtually all the spending decisions are made. These decisions can have a real impact on Maine, from how much funding is available to shipbuilding to things like funding for first responders and schools.

Everyone agrees we need to reduce the deficit, but how we go about that is a matter of great debate. I believe we need to cut unnecessary spending but at the same time keep investing in the things that will grow our economy and provide a bright future for our children. And I'm sure we will debate those issues on the Appropriations Committee.

I want to also take this opportunity to remind you that I am always ready and willing to help you out if are having an issue with a federal agency. My office can make inquiries to a federal agency on your behalf; connect you with resources and more. No question is too small and we are always happy to hear from you. Thank you for the opportunity to be your representative in Augusta. Members of the 126th Legislature were sworn into office on December 5, 2012. It will be a privilege to represent District 110 as we will face many challenges when the 126th Legislature convenes on January 8, 2013. During the next five to six months, legislators must find ways to deal with large and structural budgetary problems. As many of you know, state projected revenues from state sales taxes and corporate taxes are running well below what was previously projected, similar to what many other states are experiencing. This makes it necessary to adjust the state's budget in ways which will impact Maine's citizens. Dear Friends,

It is a privilege to represent Maine in the United States Senate, and I am deeply grateful for the trust the people of Maine have placed in me. Public service is a responsibility I take seriously. In 2012, I reached a milestone by casting my 5,000<sup>th</sup> consecutive roll-call vote. I have never missed a single roll-call vote, a record unique among current Senators.

As we enter 2013, the economy and jobs remain my top priorities. As a senior member of the Defense Appropriations subcommittee, I am committed to keeping our nation secure and our skilled defense workers on the job. I secured funding to increase the shipbuilding programs at Bath Iron Works and advance essential modernization projects at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard. I was honored to receive the Navy League's Congressional Sea Services Award for 2012 as the leading advocate for our maritime services and US shipbuilding.

Maine's economic future recently received a boost with significant federal funds for deep-water, offshore wind energy research and development at the University of Maine and in private sector firms. Maine has some of the strongest and most consistent winds off our coast, and we have some of the world's leading researchers. These funds will help Maine be a world leader in developing this clean, renewable energy source, ultimately resulting in the creation of thousands of good-paying jobs for our state.

As a leader on the Transportation Appropriations Subcommittee, I am also working to ensure that investments are made in our transportation infrastructure. Early last year, construction began on a modern, safe, and efficient replacement for the Memorial Bridge at Kittery, a project for which I worked to secure funding. Working with the State Department of Transportation, I also secured federal funding to replace the aging Martin Memorial Bridge in Rumford and the decrepit Richmond-Dresden Bridge. In 2013, I will continue to seek funding for improvements in our roads and bridges to make traveling safer and more efficient for our citizens and to facilitate commerce. It is also gratifying to see the heaviest trucks on the Interstates where they belong rather than on our downtown streets and country roads. This is the result of a law I authored in 2011.

Maine's environment is critical to our economy and the health of our residents. I opposed efforts in 2012 that would have weakened the landmark Clean Air Act and would have exposed our state to emissions from coal-fired power plants elsewhere. At the same time, I have continued to work with a bipartisan group of Senators to ensure that federal regulations on industrial boilers



protect our environment without imposing onerous burdens on our forest-products industry and other manufacturers.

Many Mainers contacted me last year to express concern about the Postal Service, which is essential to our economy and our way of life. Last year, the Senate approved legislation I co-authored to help put the Postal Service on a sound financial footing since it has been losing billions of dollars. Although the House failed to act on our bill, the Postal Service has heeded my requests to keep open the vital mail processing center in Hampden. I will continue to work to ensure that all Mainers, regardless of the size of their communities, have access to the postal services upon which they rely.

As the daughter of a World War II veteran wounded in combat, I know how important quality, accessible health care is for our veterans. This past year, I worked to ensure that our rural veterans' health care facilities are fully staffed and to strengthen our Veterans' Homes. Federal health agencies also began an investigation into whether Maine veterans were exposed to toxic defoliant chemicals while training at Gagetown, New Brunswick.

With shortages of medications putting patients at risk, I co-sponsored legislation to encourage manufacturers to report anticipated production problems to help avert shortages. Through this voluntary approach, more than 200 potentially life-threatening shortages were prevented last year.

While Congress averted a huge increase in tax rates for middle-income American families and small businesses, there remains a lot of work to be done to reduce our unsustainable \$16.4 trillion debt. It is essential that we do so in a responsible way, but that Washington stop delaying decisions that will help shape our economy and future prosperity.

I remain committed to doing all that I can to address your community's concerns in 2013. If I may be of assistance to you in any way, I encourage you to contact my state office in your area.
