If \$1,200.00 is appropriated under Construction of State Aid Highways, we will receive \$2,100 00 from the State and this amount of \$3,300.00 will be expended on the Birch Point road from No. 1 Highway thus giving our citizens a highway to take the place of the bridge that will be far better than it now is.

SCHOOL REPORT

To the Citizens of the town of Wiscasset

GREETINGS:

In making this annual report of the condition of your schools as required by law under Chapter 19, R. S. 1930'Sec. 70 (c) it gives me great pleasure to transmit the following:

The same eight schools have been maintained during the fiscal year just closing as during the past, with enrollments since the opening day of school on September 10, 1934 as follows: Primary School 31; Intermediate School 31; Second Grammar School 33; First Grammar School 27; Birch Point School 6; South School 14; North School 18; Lowelltown School 5. Attendance and progress have been excellent in all these schools. No board of scholars has been furnished since June, 1934, and all expense of conveyance has been avoided.

The personnel of your teaching force is well-trained, and as fast as new methods are proven effective and actually progressive your children are given the benefit of these in their daily work insofar as our equipment permits, but your teachers never lose sight of the need for fundamental subjects thoroughly mastered, and those of you who visit the schools will observe that the three R's occupy the principal place, as they should. In the village school a man has been employed to teach the upper grades, and he has been given authority to act as administrative principal. While this innovation is still somewhat in the experimental stage, the results seem most promising at the present time.

This winter the E.R.A. has provided beef soup for hot lunches to be served those children who cannot go home to dinner. The legislative investigation of Maine public schools as voted by the last legislature has been completed, and copies may be secured from the Maine Public School Finance Commission, State House, Augusta, Maine. This Commission's recommendations, if enacted into law, will increase the money given Wiscasset by the State for public schools from \$2,132.31 to \$4,288.31, at the same time reducing your taxes by several mills.

The Commission in making its study has revealed some interesting educational data, and perhaps it will not be out of place for me to emphasize some of their While the salaries paid Wiscasset teachers are not unreasonable considering the hard times, all Wiscasset elementary salaries, including the principal's, are below code prices for unskilled labor. Wiscasset is actually doing very little in the way of financial support for its schools, compared with other towns, as shown by latest statistics from the Report of the Commissioner of Education for the School Biennium ending June 30, 1934. Whereas the state municipal rate is .0536 the municipal rate in Wiscasset is .049, which is near average, but whereas the state average school rate is .01148 the Wiscasset school rate is .00677. In other words, Wiscasset is raising nearly average rate for roads, and the like, but only about half the average for public schools. Some folks have wondered why Wiscasset receives no equalization money from the State, but it would be necessary to raise nearly double what you are raising for schools to share in this fund.

I give these various figures for your information merely, realizing that conditions differ in every place, and that no rule can be made to apply to all parts of the state and country.

In financial support of education the United States stands 9th among the nations of the world. It may be true that the schools in the southern states bring the national average to this 9th place, but remember that with the exception of one state Maine is the lowest north of the Mason-Dixon line, standing far below the other New England states, and 40th among the 48 states. In Maine Wiscasset stands in the low-level group of towns when the state is divided into high-level, middle-level, and low-level expenditure groups.

We are optimistic enough in Wiscasset to believe we get a great deal more educational value for our money than the amounts we invest in public schools would indicate, and I believe this is true to a certain extent in that your school committee, working with limited funds, squeezes every dollar's worth of education possible out of every dollar you raise for schools.

But when we consider that 78.9% of class-room lighting in American schools is improper, with 10,000,000 defective young eyes in these American schools, when we consider that we have no correct-posture adjustable seats in Wiscasset, that conform in any way with modern requirements, to mention only the most obvious matters, I wonder if we should be too complacent with regard to the educational facilities which we provide our children. I mention these things not to appear unreasonable, for I realize the desperate financial condition in which some Maine towns find themselves, but I simply wish to indicate that we should plan to put first things first when the proper time comes.

I will merely touch upon the various much-needed repairs made on the school buildings. Three of these, as you know, were the result of special appropriations, and the details have been carried out as voted by the town in a workman-like and wholly satisfactory manner. The boys' and girls' toilets in the grade building have been modernized and made to conform with modern stands in every way. The roof to this building has

been shingled. Unexpected repairs on the Academy boiler were so serious that upon investigation it was deemed best to replace the old boiler entirely, and this was done and the funds provided at a special town meeting. Flag-poles have been erected at the Village School, Birch Point School, and Lowelltown School to conform to the state laws relative thereto. Necessary minor repairs have been made to foundations, roofs, steps, and the like, and the manner in which these have been attended to is a decided asset to the town.

To those citizens who are interested in raising the standards of your public schools I should like to recommend for your consideration the possibility of pre-school group of some type to take care of those children in the village who enter school when they are 5 years of age, and yet who are not intellectually mature enough to start in on the State Course of Study and do a full year's work their first year. Your present system leaves very little latitude but to promote such very young scholars into second grade, whether or not they are fully prepared for it, with the result that while you formally eliminated the 9th grade some years ago, you have, in effect, under the new and exacting State Course of Study, partially eliminated the first grade now. Thus the Wiscasset school system as organized at the present time provides about one year's less training that I believe it should. My recommendation would be a preschool group similar to a kindergarten that could meet with a special teacher in the old Academy Building or other suitable place and there study music, games. dancing, marching, organized play and similar beginning school activities, with a minimum of emphasis placed upon formal study of school curricula until it became apparent the children were sufficiently mature. expense of such a pre-school unit would not be heavy, and the State would refund to you \$100 per year if you

employed a properly certified teacher for more than half time.

In regard to the kindergarten recommended above may I suggest that it is well recognized that chronological and intellectual ages do not necessarily correspond in all children, and that often the brightest children may be the slowest in maturing. The above recommendations are in full accord with modern trends in education, as those of you who have had contact with other schools know.

The school committee and superintendent recommend that you vote to continue Lowelltown and Birch Point Schools another year.

I have always considered it a privilege to be associated with Wiscasset schools, and to have some small part in the encouragement of educational activities for your children. The budget committee has gone over the financial matters connected with the schools, and will recommend to you such sums to be raised for school purposes as in their judgment will enable the public schools of Wiscasset to maintain their present education standards. I can assure you that whatever amount you raise for schools will be expended by your school committee with the utmost economy, and with the greatest possible educational return. Your school committee and superintendent pledge themselves to continue to do the best they can for Wiscasset children, always.

TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF MAINE

To CHANCELLOR C. BLAGDON, Constable of the Town of Wiscasset, in the County of Lincoln,

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby notified and required to warn the inhabitants of the Town of Wiscasset, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble in Red Men's Hall, in said Wiscasset on Monday the 11th day of March A. D. 1935, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

- ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- ART. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- ART. 3. To choose three Selectmen for the term of one year.
- ART. 4. To choose a Board of Assessors and Overseers of the Poor for the ensuing year.
- ART. 5. To choose three Road Commissioners for the ensuing year.
- ART. 6. To choose a Fire Ward for the ensuing year.

- ART. 7. To fix the compensation of the Fire Chief for the ensuing year, also the Firemen.
- ART. 8. To choose an Auditor for the ensuing year.
- ART. 9. To choose all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year, including a member of the School Committee for three years.
- ART. 10. To choose a member of the School Committee for two years to fill the vacancy caused by the Resignation of Rev. Charles E. Titus.
- ART. 11. To see if the town will vote to raise \$637.00 in payment of note of like amount falling due March 22, 1935. The authority to borrow this money was given the Selectmen at a special town meeting, November 5, 1934, for the purpose of renewing the steam boiler in the Academy Building.
- ART. 12 To see if the town will vote to raise \$2,-087.00 in payment of note of like amount falling due March 22, 1935. The authority to borrow this money was given the Selectmen at a special town meeting February 11, 1935 for the purpose of Snow Removal.
- ART. 13. To see if the town will vote 'Yes' or 'No' on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Sect. 20, Chap. 28, Revised Statutes of 1930.
- ART. 14. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway

Commission (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provision of Sec. 19, Chap. 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Sec. 3, Chap. 175 P. L. of 1933.

ART. 15. To see what action the town will take in regard to the discontinuance of the Birch Point Bridge except for foot travel.

ART. 16. To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$652.20 or any other amount for the maintenance of State and State Aid Highways, during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under provision of the Revised Statutes of 1930, and the Public Laws of 1931.

ART. 17. To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$585.00 for the maintenance of Third Class Highways, as required by Sec. 5 of Chapter 175, Public Laws of 1933, relative to Third Class Highways.

ART. 18. To see if the town will vote to continue the Lowelltown School, so called, and the Birch Point School.

ART. 19. To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for following accounts:

- ART. 20. To see if the sum of \$50.00 or more will be raised for school nursing in the Town of Wiscasset under the auspices of the Bureau of Health of the State Department and Welfare. As the amount of appropriation increases the length of service will be greater.
- ART. 21. To see what sum of money, the town will vote to appropriate and raise for the painting of school buildings.
- ART. 22. To see if the town will vote to authorize its Superintending School Committee to make a contract with the Trustees of Wiscasset Academy for the tuition of its scholars, qualified to attend such school, in accordance with the Revised Statutes and the Public Laws of 1931.
- ART. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate and raise for maintenance of a free High School for the ensuing year.
- ART. 24. To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$100.00 to reimburse Chewonki Tribe, No. 112, Improved Order of Red Men, for the use of their Hall for practice for basket ball teams of the Wiscasset Academy, or take any action relative thereto.
- ART. 25. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in an-

ticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying indebtedness of the town. Such notes to be paid during the current municipal year out of money raised during said current municipal year by taxes.

- ART. 26. To see if the town will vote to fix a time limit for the payment of poll taxes within the current municipal year for which the tax is assessed.
- ART. 27. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for abatement of taxes.
- ART. 28. To see if the town will vote to give a 2% discount on all taxes paid on or before August 1st and 1% discount on or before Sept. 1st, 1935.
- ART. 29. To see if the town will vote to adopt the same wage scale as will be established by the Highway Department of the State of Maine, for work on town ways and bridges, or take any action relative thereto.
- ART. 30. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$85.00 to complete the costs of repairing and painting the interior of the Selectmens' office.
- ART. 33. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair and care of town clock.
- ART. 34. To see if the town will vote to elect or appoint a traffic officer for village streets and fix compensation, or take any action relative thereto.
- ART. 35 To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$300.00 to be put in gravel on

the road from Donnell's Corner to the residence of A. D. Morris.

- ART. 36. To see if the town will raise any sum of money for improving the road extending by the residence of Mary J. Fullerton in a northerly direction by the residence of Baker Cunningham.
- ART. 37. To see if the town will vote to pay the State of Maine or the State Highway Commission one half the excise tax collected by the town on automobile vehicles for the privilege of crossing Carleton Bridge free of tolls, or do or act anything thereon.
- ART. 38. To receive the report of the Committee relative to an alleged claim in favor of the Wiscasset Water Company for the sum of \$400.00 against said town.
- ART. 39. To see if the town will grant the State Highway Commission whatever control the town may have over the old town landing on the south side of Wiscasset-Edgecomb bridge for the purpose of erecting a building about 10x15 feet with the west end of same 18 feet from center of Narrow Gauge track.
