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



HIGHWAY COMMISSIONER'S REPORT.

To the Hon. Mayor and Board of Aldermen: Gentlemen:

As Superintendent of Highways, I beg to submit the following report of the work in the department for the year ending March 31st, 1914.

At the opening of the season we removed the ice from Main street and cleaned the streets and gutters in different parts of the city. Then we surfaced with crushed rock and gravel on Main street near the bridge—570 feet. On North street from W. L. Eaton's store to the water tank 540 feet; on Chapel street 210 feet; on South street 200 feet; on Cleveland street 600 feet; on Harrison

street 860 feet; on School street 150 feet; on Downes street 650 feet; on Union street 110 feet. We also did patching and repairing in different places—we used 300 tons of crushed rock on the above work. On the River road a large amount of work was done; consisting of cleaning out the gutter and drains, filling in with rock and gravel, and removing portions of ledge. On this section of road we built 13 culverts—this work was very much needed.

On the Baring and Charlotte roads we did a large amount of work-surfacing with gravel and rock and removing a portion of ledge on Baring road. We repaired and rebuilt culverts on Steamboat St., 1; on Garfield St., 4; Lincoln St., 3; Washington St., 1; Baring St., 1; South St., 2; Hill St., 1; Lafayette St., 1; besides 13 on the River road.

We repaired 11 Catch Basins on Main St., 2 on Union street, 1 on Monroe St., 2 on Washington St., 1 on Armour St., 2 on Lafayette St., 2 on Germain St., 2 on Downes St., 1 each on Franklin, Garfield and Price Sts., 2 on Barker St.

We repaired Sewers as follows: On Price St., 103 feet; Union St., 98 feet; North St., 37 feet; Winter St., 35 feet; Lafayette St., 38 feet; Washington St., 32 feet; Main St., 29 feet; 18 feet on Monroe St., 15 feet on Germain St., and other repairs in different parts of the city.

On sidewalks we recoated 528 feet on School St., and 875 on Cleveland St., 500 feet on South St., and about 250 feet other places in Milltown. In Calais we recovered sidewalks on Downes St., 1,000 feet; Whitney St., 100 feet and considerable patching in various places. We built gravel sidewalks on Price St., Pleasant St. and Chandler St. We built a retaining wall near the brickyard 104 feet long and 4 feet high using timber 10x12.

Our State Highway work was done on Main street from the Avenue extending from the foot of the Avenue to Eaton street 1060 feet, construction of one culvert. On the advice of the State Highway Commissioner we intend to apply oil to the surface of this portion of the road, which work will be taken up immediately.

On Bridges we have done some repairing at Red.

Beach and at the Upper Milltown bridge. The bridge at Union needs extensive repairs, and arrangements are now being made for that work.

We have 1 Steam roller, 2 road machines, 2 dump earts, 1 truck, 2 sprinklers, 4 snow plows, 1 stone crusher, boiler and engine, 1 portable boiler, also the usual quantity of shovels, picks, lanterns, harnesses &c. One of the dump carts will have to be rebuilt this year.

During the past winter we have had more snow and ice to handle than for several years past. We have endeavored to do this work prudently and at the same time to the satisfaction of the people.

In conclusion I wish to thank the Mayor and Board of Aldermen for their kindness.

During the year just closed, our city has been in an excellent condition so far as contagious diseases are concerned.

We have had, however, a large number of cases of measles, but we have no way of even making a guess at the number as only a very small per cent have been repored. According to our Stat law this disease should be reported as much as scarlet fever or any of the contagious diseases. Some of our physicians have forgotten this fact while others have been very prompt in reporting all cases that came under their observation. In many cases the parent has called to report where no physician was called.

In June 1913 three cases of scarlet fever were reported from Red Beach, these are the only cases of this disease since April 1912.

Our city has been free from diphtheria since Jan. 1912. In making this report we feel almost like doing what so many do when making some good statement, "rap on wood."

The Board of Health would like to call the attention of the City Government to the fact that there are several places along some of our streets which are used for dumping ground.

In driving along South St. above Garfield St., rubbish may be seen in two or three places, and on Garfield St. near South is another place for dumping rubbish. These places ought not to be allowed as they are a disgrace to our city.



REPORT OF THE SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

To the Honorable Ralph T. Horton, Mayor, and Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:—The following is a complete record of the School Department of the city for the year ending March 31, 1914.

During the past year we have not met quite as regularly as in former years. Members of the committee have been very busy and absences from meetings have seemed unavoidable. Some matters have not gone quite as well as we might have wished, but the mistakes may serve as guides for improved action in the year to come. The schools have gone steadily forward in the regular work and some improvements have been made of a permanent nature.

Interesting incidents of the year have been the visit of State Superintendent Smith to our city in May to make an informal inspection of the school conditions. His report was published in the local press at the time.

We have succeeded in extending the house at Milltown so as to accommodate the pupils in comfortable rooms with decent conditions. Some misunderstanding arose as to the proper course of procedure at the time of carrying on the work, but the gratifying thing is that the children have the rooms.

The work of the Board has been somewhat broken by the resignation of Mrs. W. A. Murchie, who has served the city so long and efficiently as a member of the committee. Mr. E. M. Nelson was elected to complete the year.

Repairs.

Much might be written of the pressing need of expenditures for the up-keep of our houses. A very few important matters need immediate attention at Milltown. Some grading should be done to protect the work of the past year. The front steps should be covered. A platform should be built for the fire escape. A concrete floor should be laid in the basement. The building painted without, and two drinking fountains installed. The condition at Monroe and Union remain the same as last year.

At Church Street Grammar school some alterations should be made in the toilet arrangements. The building will soon need painting and needs shingling at present time. New floors are much needed in the corridors and the walls should also be whitened. Some of the blackboards in the building are in very poor condition.

There seems to be a very urgent need of some form of signal on the Academy building. Possibly a large gong or bell placed in the belfry would answer the needs of calling pupils at the close of periods of intermission.

New desks and ceilings are needed at the Sand Bank.

South Street building should be thoroughly cleaned and bubbling fountains installed.

Some four of five years ago attention was called to the fact that the underpinning on the Cottleville house was rapidly falling away. No expenditure has been made to repair it.

At the Brook school some grading is necessary to protect the work done there two years ago.

At Red Beach the basement should be excavated to make room for the storing of fuel and it would be highly desirable if some improvements could be made in the arrangements of the out-houses. In the course of the year these become filthy

Conveyance.

On the Charlotte Road Mr. John Tracey has been driving the school team. The pupils in this locality are taken to the Milltown schools.

Mr. C. H. Mahar has been conveying the pupils from the Wilson school to the Bog Brook school building. Toward the close of the summer a feeling developed among the residents of this district that the Wilson building should be reopened. The plan did not meet with favor among the committee. These children have been very carefully cared for under the present arrangement. Possibly the committee may decide to open a small school in response to the wishes of this community during the coming year. The question should be carefully balanced in order that no step backward may be taken. Some pressure was brought to bear upon the committee during the latter part of the summer to reopen the Ford school. A few of the residents and the city council favored the plan. In response to this feeling the building was reopened for school purposes with reluctance. At the opening of the winter term the school numbered three pupils, when the folly of this plan became so apparant that the school was again closed. No conveyance is now offered in this locality.

Manual Training.

Mr. Adams has had charge of the Manual Training school during the fall and winter terms. The feeling prevails that the work turned out by the pupils this year has been of a very fine quality. Strict economy has been practiced in the purchase of stock and tools. The educational element seems to have been the dominant factor of the school under the present management. Large pieces of furniture have not been made, it is true, but instead the boys have been held strictly to a systematic course of work. This is the second year of the life of the school. We ought to be able perhaps to decide more carefully and accurately just what it will mean to the city to continue this line of work. That the appropriation has been too small for the school will be readily seen from the following figures. We have expended, or will expend:

It will be noticed that the above items do not include fuel or service of janitor. The appropriation made one year ago by the city council was only \$385 00 and had it not been for assistance of the Parent-Teacher Association matters financially would have gone rather hard with us in this deepartment. This association has already turned over to the city treasurer \$100.00 and has also voted to set aside an additional \$20.00 for the purchase of stock by the instructor. For the coming year it seems necessary to make provision for the following items of expenditure:

Truancy.

By rigidly enforcing the compulsory education law we have succeeded in reducing the number of infractions of this law to the minimum. Mr. Doyle does not seem to be alarmed by the irate parent and makes it known without fear that it is the truant he must have. Parents do not fully undeerstand that the state is the prosecuting party and not the city. Other than a few cases which may need vigorous treatment at thee hands of the court, probably very little will be required of the truant officer during the coming year. Your attention is called to the discussion of this subject in the report of last year.

FREE LIBRARY AND READING ROOM.

To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Calais:

Gentlemen:

The Trustees of the free library and Reading Room respectfully offer the following report of the operation and present condition of the institution.

The year just closed has been one of marked prosperity as respects both the growth and the use made of the library and reading room.

The number of books added is greater than in any preceding year of the library's history and the circulalation has exceeded by at least one thousand volumes that of the preceding year.

A number of periodicals have been added to the subscription list, the number now received being thirty-five. They represent various interests, literary, scientific and practical arts.

The interior of the library building has been thoroughly renovated and repairs made upon the exterior. The cost of this work has been met out of a gift of five hundred dollars made directly to the trustees by the will. of the late Mrs. Mary C. Robbins of Hingham, Mass. A portion of the legacy is retained in the hands of the treasurer for similar expenditure foreseen as likely to be required in the near future.

The librarian reports the following summary of work performed:

The number of volumes making up the library, exclusive of government publications is about nine thousand eight hundred and seventy. The cost of administration tends to increase with the growth of purchases and circulation. The amount of the appropriation in recent years is required for the proper performance of the work.

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MAYOR'S ADDRESS.

Gentlemen of the City Council:

At this, the beginning of a new municipal year, I desire to thank the members of this board and of the former board of aldermen, all the city officers and members of the several departments for the faithful performances of their duties and for the aid and co-operation with me in all matters pertaining to the interests of the city during the year just ended. I also wish to express my sincere thanks to the voters of the city and my appreciation of their attitude and support in returning me to this important office for a second term, and I feel confident that with the aid and counsel of the incoming members of the city government, I will be able to correct any errors in judgment which may have been mine in conducting the affairs of the city during the past year, due to my inexperience in matters of this nature.

At our last meeting resolutions in recognition of the valuable and untiring services of Alderman Henry B. Colson of Ward one were passed, and I wish again to refer with my sincere personal thanks to Mr. Colson for his frequent-aid and advice during the past year, and his punctuality in attending all meetings.

Mr. Colson's place on this board is to be filled by a gentleman whose standing and ability we all recognize, and from whom we have every reason to expect efficient and careful attention to all business relating to the city's welfare. I join with all the citizens in congratulating Ward one in its choice and election of Mr. McKnight to represent the ward and the city at large.

The fact that all other members of this board were returned by their constituents needs no comment and speaks for itself in appreciation of your affairs during the past season, and of the high esteem in which you are held by your fellow citizens are manifested by your re-election to represent them in the conduct of city affairs for the current year.

Taking the city's finances as a whole I think we have reason to feel satisfied at the results shown of our last year's business, and with reasonable and careful expenditure of the funds entrusted to our care for the incoming year we may be enabled to show at this time next year that we have used good judgmentand economy in each department and at the same time treated those with whom we have had business dealings for the city with due consideration and fairness.

It is customary for an incoming mayor to recommend amounts to be appropriated for the several departments. and such recommendations are later confirmed by the council with or without change, as the council may decide, after conditions have been carefully looked into and the report of the assessors received, so it would seem proper and necessary for the head of each department to know the final amount of his appropriation before making definite plans for his expenditures and make every reasonable effort to keep within the amount thus appropriated for his department. I will submit the following for your consideration:

Common Schools.

No one department is more important from any stand point than that of our common schools, where we prepare our boys and girls in a few short years for the duties of a lifetime, not only in the matter of book education, but in their manners, deportment and health. During the past year it was found possible to erect the much needed addition to the Milltown Grammar School at a cost of about \$2,500 and as fast as further improvements to our several school buildings can be consistently made I hope and believe such improvements will be made, particularly in the matter of sanitation. I would call particular attention to the buildings at the Union school, the Monroe street school and the Red Beach school, and in each case alterations and improvements should be made at the earliest time possible.

For common school fund I would recommend that the sum of \$1,650.00 be appropriated, unless in your judgment this amount should be changed.

Free High Schools.

This important department of our schools seems to be under particularly good management in every way, and judging from all reports is being conducted in a highly commendable manner. In this department I would recommend an appropriation of \$3,100.00.

Our Manual Training school is of undoubted value, and I think we cannot do too much towards making this department as much of a success and benefit this year, as I have reason to believe it has been in the past. I would suggest as an appropriation for this school the sum of \$385.00 which, with our State aid towards the instructor's salary should be sufficient.

Our Free Library, Police and Fire Departments are being conducted in a manner without doubt satisfactory to everyone, and for these I would recommend the same amounts as last year, namely; Library \$850.00; Police \$2,475.00; Fire \$2,900.00.

Poor Department.

One of the accounts most liable to vary in amount required is the Poor Department on account of sickness, insanity and contagious diseases liable to develop any time among those under the care of this department.

General satisfaction is shown at the efficient manner in which this account has been handled, and notwithstanding the prevailing prices of all living requirements I have reason to consider that last year's appropriation of \$3.-100.00 is adequate, as a large stock of dry wood is on hand in value much more than covering the small overdraft shown in the past year in this account.

Street Department.

The matter of streets, sidewalks and sewers is possibly the most widely discussed and most important item of our city expenditure and one requiring more care and consideration by all concerned in the city's welfare than any other. In the case of our city it is generally admitted that our mileage of streets and sidewalks is out of all proportion to the money available for their upkeep, and for this reason every allowance should be made for any seeming neglect or want of expenditure in any one year. Outside from usual repairs to streets and sidewalks there seems to be particular need of new sewers in several localities, and it is to be hoped that our street committee will see their way clear to meet these demands as fully as the city's finances will allow this season.

There is also great need of extensive repairs on the Union Bridge which will require a large amount of money, besides much needed repairs to the approach to Ferry Point Bridge.

South street and South street sidewalks should also receive attention, particularly that portion running from Garfield street to Milltown.

During the past season very satisfactory work has been done by our street department, both in amount of work and in point of economy, and it is to be hoped that the work can be conducted as much as possible in the same manner during the present season.

I would ask you gentlemen, to favorably consider the appropriation of the sum of Fifty Dollars towards the maintenance of the Calais City Band, as a slight recognition of the excellent work being done by its members and of the just pride every citizen feels in its value as a Calamounts as appropriate appropriations:


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
