## *Mayor's Address*

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Gentlemen of the Board:

In accord with the requirements of our City Charter, we who have been chosen to manage the affairs of our city are meeting for the purpose of organization.

I want first to express my sincere thanks to my fellow citizens for the confidence indicated in allowing me again to serve you as Mayor. Also for the capable and responsible Board of Aldermen you have elected to work with me. The large majorities you have given us at the polls will stimulate us to greater accomplishment. I have enjoyed being your Mayor and thank you for your fairness and consideration during the trying year just finished.

The problems facing the incoming administration are many and we must again practice the strictest economy. Our State and County tax will be increased this year, we start retiring the school district bonds, our school budget must be increased to purchase a school bus, we must buy a truck for the highway department, and tar that part of route one that we are responsible for. There is a great possibility that we will have to pay a portion of the old age assistance. To some municipalities this simply

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means a raise in the tax rate, but in ours conditions are such that our tax payers cannot pay more, so I recommend that the present tax rate be maintained if possible.

The several departments of the City are functioning very well. The highway department with the same overhead and same regular crew have operated for ten thousand dollars less than usual. The police have been efficient and the fire companies have been loyal and responsive. They have trained faithfully, in other lines, to better serve you in case of fire or accident. The poor department and other departments are being operated in a business like manner, new systems of account and control have been added to some, and the heads of all departments have faced their tasks in a conscientious manner and with economy uppermost in their minds.

We are very proud of our accomplishments of the past year with W. P. A. We have completed four much needed sewers and are now working on that which I consider the most worthwhile project to date, beautifying the cemetery in general, ditching, draining and gaveling the roads, as well as building new avenues and clearing land for new lots. I wish some way could be found to raise money for a mausoleum of modern design to replace our tomb. As soon as weather permits we start the draining and rebuilding of the baseball grounds.

In order that certain State documents pertaining to highway may be filled out and in Augusta by April the fifteenth, it is necessary to make the following appropriations:

For General Highway,	\$10,000.00

For Maintenance of Third Class roads,	680.00

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Other appropriations will be submitted after careful consideration, at an adjournment of this meeting.

Our time payment tax plan has proven of great convenience to the tax payer as well as a benefit to the City Government by producing a more even flow of taxes into the treasury.

A preliminary statement of the last year's business is on hand here and will be distributed among you. You will notice that apparently some of the departments have overdrawn their appropriation, but this is not true, as the overdrafts were caused by bills contracted previous to this year.

As we start our administration I wish to state, for myself and my council; Our chief aim and ambition will be to justify your confidence, and promise to give you our best effort for the welfare of the City of Calais.
