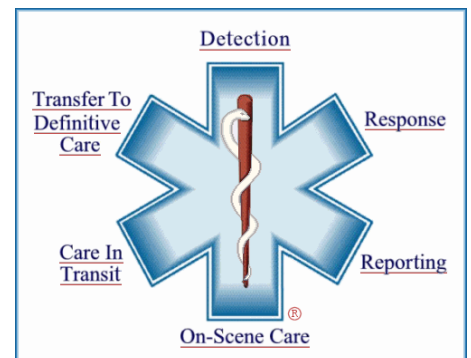

Star of Life

The Star of Life is a symbol that carries meaning to all EMS providers.

1. Early detection is when untrained or involved people realize, observe the scene and identify safety hazards, which then takes the initiative if they can, to ensure safety of the scene when possible.
2. Early reporting is when the actual call for help is made to 9-1-1 and medical staff is dispatched to render care to the injured parties.
3. Early response is when the first rescuers begin to provide basic care to the injured to the extent of their ability.
4. On scene care is when professional EMS staff arrives; begin to treat the injured on the scene and determine the need to transport patients.
5. Care in transit is when the EMS staff has determined the patient will need further medical care and continue to treat injuries as needed in transit.
6. Transfer to higher care takes place between the EMS staff and hospital staff when the transport EMS team reaches the hospital and delivers the patient for further medical care.

Selectmen's Report

The Board of Selectmen are pleased to report the following improvements for the benefit of the Town of Windsor.

The Board continued to focus our efforts to improve the Town's roads. There were a number of roads that were ground and based paved in Town this year (see the Road Supervisor/Road Commissioner's Report for more details).

This year the Town installed the new compactors and placed the large scales into service. The bulky/metal container area has also been placed into operation. Yard light poles were removed and new lighting has been installed.

The Town purchased a new wheeler truck, a new two ton truck, a refurbished Ambulance body on a new truck chase, and a new pumper Fire truck to support the residents of the Town.

Local contractors completed more work at the Town Office to upgrade and improve the entrance to the main office and there are plans to further improve the hall area leading into the office. If approved at Town meeting this year, we will replace the front porch, add an electronically controlled sign, and pave the area between the Town Hall building and the Food Bank.

As always, we welcome visitors to our regularly scheduled Selectmen meetings every other Tuesday night. The schedule is available on the town website for everyone to review at www.windsor.maine.gov. For the latest Town News please check out The Town Hub on the above web site.

The Board of Selectmen wants to thank all those involved with the business of supporting the Town. There are too many to name without missing your contributions, but we deeply appreciate the citizens of Windsor and all that they do to help this community.

Town Manager's Report

Within this past year, the Board of Selectmen and I have worked together to implement the wishes of the voters of this Town. We have had another busy year and I would like to report the following;

TRANSFER STATION

The Board of Selectmen, Transfer Station Committee and I have been working on completing the projects at the Transfer Station that was voted in by the voters. The large scales are up and running at this time. If you have a large amount of Municipal Solid Waste, Construction Debris, Brush or other items that need to be thrown away, please enter onto the large scale. You will be weighed and then when you drop off your items in the appropriate place you will go back on the large scale and be weighed again. The difference in weight is what you will be charged at a \$0.10 per pound. We are still waiting on a roll off container base that needs to be built to have both compactors up and running. I would like to thank the Transfer Station Employees, Tim, Walter and Tom for their hard work and dedication.

PUBLIC WORKS

The Public Works Department works very hard in keeping the roads safe to travel throughout the winter. The Maine Department of Transportation is now plowing and maintaining Route 32 which was a very costly and time consuming road for us to plow and maintain in the winter. This past winter was a mild winter and we still struggled to find plow truck drivers. We were able to get through without using a huge amount of sand and salt that was budgeted. We did have the Reed Road wash out during a heavy rain storm and had to approve this being temporarily fixed for a cost of \$25,000.00. We will need to go back in the future and reclaim/grind this road with some additional ditch work.

If voters approve we will be looking to do more Major Road Construction projects this summer which include shoulder work, ditching, brush cutting and replacing culverts. We are responsible for 32.88 miles of roads. We are looking for some good pricing this year and hope to be able to work on the following roads; Jones Road, Crosby Road, Baker Road, Hunts Meadow Road, Melaney Road, Shuman Road, Main Street, Reed Road, Weeks Mills Road and Windsor Neck Road. I would like to thank the Public Works Employees and Drivers, Keith, Tim, Jonathan, Ed and Don for their hard work and dedication.

TOWN OFFICE

I would like to thank the dedicated Office Staff, Angela, Kelly, Maddy, Debbie, Arthur, Joyce and Bob for being a joy to work with. They take pride in what they do and they are always looking out for our

citizens in the Town of Windsor. Please do not hesitate to call if you have a question or concern. We are looking to see if the voters will approve the paving of the Town Office parking lot by the food bank area and also replacing the front porch with adding an electronic sign. This would be a benefit to all that use the food bank and the Town Office and will take care of the deteriorating porch and will allow us to be able to put up information for the townspeople to see what is going on.

FINANCIAL CONDITION

The Town of Windsor ended the fiscal year in June 2015 with a sound financial condition, with increased assets, good budget control, and enough revenues to cover expenses. We currently have in our Unassigned Fund Balance enough to cover over five months' worth of expenses which is over the auditor's recommended amount of at least three months.

I am very pleased to work with such dedicated and wonderful staff in all departments and without the communication and commitment from every staff member it would be much harder. We all work very well together and are always looking for ways to improve the service to all townspeople. If you have any suggestions, comments or concerns, please let us know.

All employees, Board of Selectmen and Committee Members strive to do what they feel is in the best interest for the Town of Windsor. Town Clerk's Report

Citizens of Windsor,

It is my pleasure to serve the residents and greater communities of Windsor. I appreciate the support of the public and collaboration with our Town Manager, Select Board, fellow colleagues, departments, board and committee members, and election personnel.

Please join me in welcoming our two new Deputy Clerks, Kelly McGlothlin and Madaleine Michaud. Thank you for your patience as we train new individuals.

The municipal clerk's office primary responsibilities include the care and preservation of municipal records. We record vital statistic information such as births, deaths, and marriages. Birth records from August 2013, and death records beginning in 2011 are kept electronically in the State of Maine's DAVE system. The following is a fee schedule for these records:

Marriage License.....	\$40.00
Birth, Death, or Marriage Certificate.....	\$15.00
Each Additional Copy of Certificate.....	\$6.00

Hunting and fishing licenses, snowmobile, ATV, and boat registrations are also issued in the clerk's office using Inland Fisheries and Wildlife's MOSES system. You must have proof of having held a previous hunting license or having taken a Hunter's Safety Course in order to purchase a Hunting license.

There were 513 dogs registered in 2105. Any dog aged 6 months or older that resides in Windsor must be registered annually by December 31st. You must have a current rabies certificate in order to license your dog. You will also need to provide proof of spaying/neutering. A spayed/neutered dog license is \$6.00, and \$11.00 for an unaltered dog. There is a \$25.00 late fee per dog after January 31st.

Please visit our website www.windsor.maine.gov for the most up-to-date information. Here you will find public notices, calendar of events, meeting minutes, election information, office hours, and contact information.

The Town of Windsor does accept payments by debit/credit cards. There is a convenience fee of \$1.00 minimum, or 2.5% of the total balance. We do not at this time accept payment by phone.

The following page contains records of deaths and marriages from January 1, 2015 to December 31, 2015. There were 28 recorded births in the Town of Windsor.

Registrar of Voters

You may register to vote during regular business hours or at the polls by filling out a voter registration card. In order to vote you must be a citizen of the United States, a resident of Windsor, and be eighteen (18) years of age. You must show proof of residency such as a valid Driver's License, current motor vehicle registration, hunting/fishing license, or any official document showing your current address such as a utility bill. If you are planning to be out of town during an election, or you cannot easily get to the polls, you may request an absentee ballot, either by phone, in person, or online. There is a link to this on the Town of Windsor's website. The request must be made at least three business days prior to the election, unless you have a special circumstance. Ballots will be available up to 30 days prior to an election.

Voting is held upstairs at the Windsor Town Hall, 523 Ridge Road, Windsor, Maine. There is a lift available, just ask the staff for assistance if needed.

Currently there are 1,777 registered voters in Windsor. There are 457 Democrats, 611 Republicans, 104 Green Independents, and 605 Unenrolled.

Election Results

January 1, 2015 to December 31, 2015

Municipal Election June 9, 2015

ARTICLE 2. Election of Municipal Officials. *There were two positions open for selectmen, Ray Bates received 140 votes, and Daniel Gordon received 141 votes. There were three positions open for a three year budget committee member. Christopher S. Haiss received 177 votes as the only candidate on the ballot. Two positions were write-ins. Cheryl Pratt received 14 votes, and Thomas Reed received 8 votes. There was a two year position for a budget committee member, and there was a tie vote for write-ins Cheryl Pratt and Thomas Reed with 5 votes each. There was a three year alternate budget committee member position, and the winner of this was Cheryl Pratt, with 2 votes. There was one three year position for the RSU 12 committee member. F. Gerard Nault received 168 votes.*

Cheryl Pratt and Thomas Reed each accepted the three year budget committee member positions. Thomas Squiers was appointed by the selectmen for the two year budget committee member position, and Carol Chavarie was appointed by the selectmen for the three year alternate budget committee position.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will (1) approve the purchase of a new six (6) man cab fire truck (the "Project"); (2) appropriate a sum not to exceed \$410,000.00 for the Project; and (3) to fund such appropriation, expend \$50,000.00 from the Fire Safety Capital Reserve Fund, (4) use up to \$10,000.00 from the Windsor Volunteer Fire

Department fundraising account and authorize the Treasurer and the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen to issue, at one time or from time to time, general obligation securities or of the Town of Windsor, Maine, including temporary notes in anticipation of the sale thereof and refunding obligations, in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$350,000.00 and to delegate the Treasurer and Chairman of the Board of Selectmen the authority and discretion to fix the date(s), maturity(ies), denomination(s), interest rate(s) and other details of said securities, including execution and delivery of said securities against payment therefore and to provide for the sale thereof.

To see if the Town will (1) approve the purchase of a new E-One/Freightliner 2 man cab rescue pumper (the "Project"); (2) appropriate a sum not to exceed \$335,000.00 for the Project; (3) to fund such appropriation, expend \$50,000.00 from the Fire Safety Capital Reserve Fund, (4) to expend \$35,000.00 from the Unassigned General Fund/Fund Equity Balance and authorize the Treasurer and the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen to issue, at one time or from time to time, general obligation securities or of the Town of Windsor, Maine, including temporary notes in anticipation of the sale thereof and refunding obligations, in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$250,000.00 and to delegate the Treasurer and Chairman of the Board of Selectmen the authority and discretion to fix the date(s), maturity(ies), denomination(s), interest rate(s) and other details of said securities, including execution and delivery of said securities against payment therefore and to provide for the sale thereof.

Public Works/Road Commissioner's Report

The Public Works Department Road Supervisor (Keith Hall) and part-time employees have been very busy keeping the Town roads safe to travel throughout the winter. This past winter we once again struggled with finding drivers to cover during snow and ice storms. With the mild winter, we will be going into next year with a sand and salt surplus. We did however have the Reed Road wash out during a heavy rain that took a great deal of our budget.

On June 10, 2015 the townspeople approved to have \$550,000.00 for Major Road Construction. This allows us to work towards a very aggressive road program which will get us back on track on a scheduled maintenance plan for all of our roads. We were able to do the following;

1. Legion Park Road – 0.25 miles of Shim and 2.76 miles of Overlay.
2. Lamson Road – 0.31 miles of Reclaim/Grind and Overlay.
3. Shuman Road – 1.23 miles of Reclaim/Grind.
4. Erskine Road – 0.82 miles of Overlay.
5. Hunts Meadow Road – 0.44 miles of Reclaim/Grind.
6. Wingood Road – 0.4 miles of Overlay.
7. Baker Road – 0.38 miles of Reclaim/Grind.
8. Maxcy's Mills Road – 0.28 miles of Shim and Overlay.
9. Jones Road – 1 mile of Reclaim/Grind.

The 1.8 miles of Overlay on the Choate Road was done in this fiscal year and the money was carried forward from last year. We have cut shoulders back, ditched and replaced culverts as needed prior to these roads being done.

THE TOTAL AMOUNT ON THE ABOVE LISTED PROJECTS WAS \$581,650.00. We received \$31,650.00 from local contractors that did damage to our roads during the Central Maine Power Substation

Project and this was used towards Major Road Construction. Thanks to the townspeople voting towards these projects being done of the 32.88 miles of town roads we have accomplished from 2008/2009 to 2015/2016 the following;

- 16.93 Miles of Reclaim/Grind which is 51.49% of our total roads
- 12.389 Miles of Overlay which is 37.68% of our total roads
- 6.2 Miles of Shim and Overlay which is 18.86% of our total roads

For a combined Overlay of 56.54%

With the prices of asphalt being on the low side this year we are looking to ask for \$550,000.00 towards the following projects;

1. Jones Road – 0.16 miles of Shim and then 1.14 miles of Overlay.
2. Crosby Road – 0.47 miles of Overlay.
3. Baker Road – 0.40 miles of Overlay.
4. Hunts Meadow Road – 0.26 miles of Shim and 0.88 miles of Overlay.
5. Melaney Road – 0.25 miles of Overlay.
6. Shuman Road – 1.22 miles of Overlay.
7. Main Street – 0.08 miles of Overlay.
8. Reed Road – 0.63 miles of Reclaim/Grind.

We are then asking the voters to approve an additional amount of \$250,000.00 to be taken out of the Town's Unassigned Fund Balance towards the following projects;

1. Weeks Mills Road – 1.17 miles of Shim and Overlay.
2. Windsor Neck Road – 1.31 miles of Reclaim/Grind.

We are also asking the voters to approve taking \$100,000.00 from the Town's Unassigned Fund Balance to pave the Transfer Station/Public Works area and then \$75,000.00 from the Town's Unassigned Fund Balance to pave the parking lot at the Town Office by the Food Bank area with replacing the front porch and an electronic sign.

We will be looking to include shoulder work, brush cutting and replacing cross culverts as needed in this next year's budget.

You are responsible to obtain a license within 10 days after:

- **Your dog reaches the age of 6 months.**
- **You become the owner or keeper of a dog aged 6 months or more.**
- **You move to a new community. (\$1 fee to transfer)**

This past year has been a very productive year. The Cemetery Board Committee met and updated the Cemetery Rules. Below is an Executive Summary of the rules:

The Town of Windsor cemetery rules are enforced by the Town Manager or appropriate Town employees. Cemeteries are open to the public from dawn to dusk year round via foot traffic and open to vehicle traffic after the adjacent roads are unposted in the spring until November 1st. Carry in/carry out policy on all items brought to the cemetery. Please review the list of adornment of gravesites section for the do's and don'ts. Trees, shrubs and any item placed on the lot may be removed at the Town's discretion. The Town of Windsor requires stones, other than the family stone, to be flush with the ground and arranged in a specified fashion. Selling of gravesites is restricted to the Town of Windsor only, see sale of burial lots for appropriate fees. Approval is required prior to any earthwork or

stonework and must be requested 72 hours in advance during Windsor office hours. The Town would like to thank you for your adherents, so that the cemeteries can be properly maintained.

You can obtain a full copy of the Cemetery Rules by calling the Town Office or from the Town of Windsor website at www.windsor.maine.gov.

Several maintenance projects took place this past year:

North Windsor Cemetery:

Five large trees were removed from North Windsor Cemetery and fencing was replaced.

Windsor Neck Cemetery:

Eighteen stones were repaired

Chain fence was replaced on one side of the cemetery

Resthaven Cemetery

Sixteen stones were repaired and there were a number of trees that were trimmed.

Last, but not least, I cannot express enough gratitude for the work that the previous Sexton, Tom Reed, has done and continues to do. The work that he has provided for the Town of Windsor's administration and the towns people is extremely outstanding. Just to name a few, he has done a vast amount of work in the plotting of our cemeteries, creating maps and layouts of each cemetery. He has and continues to create a history of each cemetery lot and their respective plots. This work is extremely valuable and we are very fortunate to have such a caring and dedicated individual that has given so generously. I also would like to thank the American Legion Auxiliary Post 179 for placing flags on our Veterans' graves for Memorial Day. I would also like to thank our Public Works Department for their support and assistance in the maintenance of our Cemeteries. Finally, thanks to AJ Mowing for their work and all the extra care and attention that they provide our cemeteries.

2016 Assessors' Agent Report

Last year in this report I wrote about proposed changes to the Maine Homestead Exemption. None of those changes were enacted for last year, but the exemption was changed beginning with this year's tax commitment. For last year's tax commitment, the exemption in Windsor was a reduction of \$10,000 in assessed value for qualifying property. State law was changed last year to increase the amount to a \$15,000 value reduction for taxes assessed on April 1, 2016. For taxes assessed on or after April 1, 2017 the assessed value reduction will increase to a total of \$20,000. If the law is not altered this session, taxpayers will see an increased benefit in this August's tax bill.

To qualify for the Maine Homestead Exemption, you must be a legal resident of the State of Maine, have owned residential property in Maine for at least the past twelve months and the homestead must be your permanent place of residence. You can only claim the exemption for one property and cannot claim the exemption in any other state. When a property is sold, the exemption is removed and the new homeowner must apply for the exemption. Applications for this program are available at the Town Office and must be filed by April 1 each year. Applications received after the filing date are not valid for the current year. Once your application has been approved, it is automatically renewed each year that you qualify for the exemption.

An important change was made to the Veteran's Exemption eligibility. The law eliminated the requirement that a veteran of the Vietnam War must have served on active duty for a period of more than 180 days. If you are a veteran of the Vietnam War who would otherwise qualify for the exemption in the past, but has not because of the 180 days of service requirement, passage of this bill would allow you to apply for the Veteran Exemption.

All participants with parcels enrolled in the Maine Tree Growth Tax Program are required to certify to a current forest management and harvest plan and file an application and Forest Type Map with the local assessor every ten years. If a piece of property enrolled in the Program was transferred, the new owner has one year from the date of transfer to comply with the provisions of the law. Landowners who fail to meet the requirements of the law are disqualified from classification, and must be withdrawn from the program and the required penalty assessed by the Town.

The Maine Residents Property Tax and Rent Refund "Circuitbreaker" Program was repealed and replaced by an income tax credit called the Property Tax Fairness Credit that is claimed on the Maine Individual Income Tax Form. This program is administered by the Income/Estate Tax Division of Maine Revenue Services. Assistance in applying for this credit is available by calling 207-626-8475 weekdays from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The Assessors' Agent's schedule is available at the Town Office by the first of each month. If you would like to meet with me, please call the office to schedule an appointment.

I am thankful to your dedicated Town Office Staff for their assistance and to the Assessors for their support. Thank you for the opportunity to serve as your Assessors' Agent.

Report on the Financial Statements

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities and the major fund of Town of Windsor, Maine, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2015, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on my audit. I conducted my audit in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that I plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. 
Other Matters

Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. I have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge I obtain during my audit of the basic financial statements. I do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide me with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, I have also issued my report dated August 5, 2015, on my consideration of Town of Windsor, Maine's internal control over financial reporting and on my tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of my testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and should be considered in assessing the results of my audit.

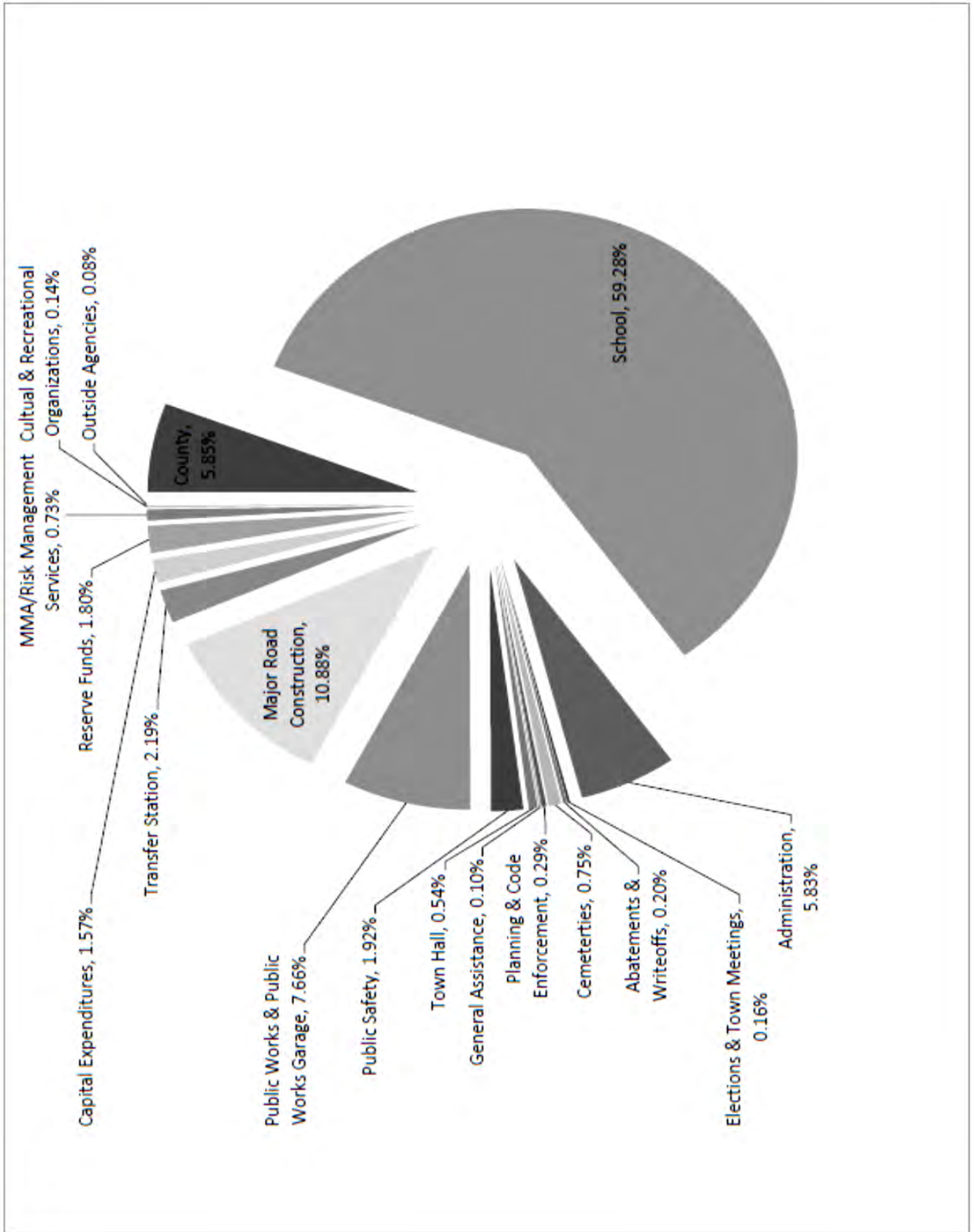

Dear Friends of Windsor:

It has been a privilege to serve the State of Maine since being sworn into the U.S. Senate.

Much of my time in Washington this past year has been devoted to the Senate Armed Services Committee and the Select Committee on Intelligence. Protecting our homeland and the people of Maine from terrorism and violence remains one of my top priorities. Through my work on the Armed Services Committee, I was able to secure several provisions in the 2016 National Defense Authorization Act that benefit Maine. The legislation authorizes the construction of an additional DDG-51 Arleigh Burke Class Destroyer that could be built at Bath Iron Works and expands the HUBZone program to stimulate economic growth at former military installations like the former Brunswick Naval Air Station.

Returning control to teachers, school districts, and states has also been a primary concern of mine. I am encouraged that the Every Student Succeeds Act has become law. It eliminates the burdensome requirements of the No Child Left Behind Act and ensures access to a quality education for all students. A provision I helped author in the bill will give states the opportunity to pilot the use of their own proficiency-based assessments in lieu of federally-mandated standardized tests. Also included in the bill are several measures I secured to promote local input, fund education technology initiatives, and explore new strategies to increase student access to the internet outside of school.

Communities across Maine have taken bold action to improve their broadband connectivity, and I have been proud to foster federal support for these types of projects. My amendments to the Every Student Succeeds Act will promote the type of work already occurring in Washington County, where students who lack broadband access are able to check out mobile hotspots from their local libraries. Additionally, a bill I co-sponsored, the Community Broadband Act, helped pave the way for the FCC to enact rules protecting the ability of municipalities to invest in better broadband. I am excited by Maine's leadership on this important economic development issue and will continue to support local efforts in this area.

After extensive negotiations, the Senate passed a five-year transportation bill that will increase highway and transit funding in Maine and provide stability to improve our transportation infrastructure. The legislation contains provisions I cosponsored to cut red tape and improve predictability and timeliness by streamlining the federal permitting process for large infrastructure projects. Also incorporated in this bill are my provisions to relieve financial regulations on Maine's community banks and credit unions and to reauthorize the Export-Import Bank, a critical tool that supports communities and small business across the state.

Following my inquiries in the Energy and Natural Resources Committee, the National Park Service has announced they will begin exploring strategies to allow park visitors to purchase electronic passes online and will pilot the program at Acadia National Park. These passes would improve access to our nation's most treasured landscapes and would generate resources for years to come. I remain deeply engaged in preserving Maine's natural beauty and strengthening our outdoor recreation economy.

It is with solemn responsibility that I have focused my energy addressing the opioid epidemic in Maine. This work includes convening roundtables with a wide-range of health care and law enforcement professionals to combat addiction; introducing a proposal to safely dispose of excess prescription drugs; cosponsoring a

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate. I am grateful for the trust the people of our State have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments from 2015.

Growing the economy by encouraging job creation was and remains my top priority. The tax-relief bill signed into law at the close of last year contains three key provisions I authored to help foster job creation and provide small businesses with the certainty they need to invest, grow, and, most important, hire new workers. Another provision I authored that became law last year gives a boost to both Maine's economy and traffic safety. This provision permanently changed the federal law that previously had forced the heaviest trucks onto our country roads and downtown streets, rather than allowing them to use Maine's federal Interstates. In addition, I was glad to help secure another significant award for the University of Maine's deepwater offshore wind initiative, which has the potential to advance an emerging industry and create thousands of good jobs in our state.

Maine's historic contributions to our nation's defense must continue. In 2015, I secured funding toward a much-needed additional Navy destroyer, likely to be built at Bath Iron Works. Modernization projects at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard that I have long advocated for were also completed, as were projects for the Maine National Guard.

I was also deeply involved in crafting the new education reform law to better empower states and communities in setting educational policy for their students. The law also extends a program I co-authored that provides additional assistance to rural schools, which has greatly benefitted our state. A \$250 tax deduction I authored in 2002 for teachers who spend their own money on classroom supplies was also made permanent last year.

As a result of a scientific evaluation of the nutritional value of potatoes required by a law that I wrote, the wholesome fresh potato finally was included in the federal WIC nutrition program. I also worked on other issues important to Maine's farmers and growers, including research on wild blueberries and pollinating bees.


As Chairman of the Housing Appropriations Subcommittee, I have made combating veterans' homelessness a priority. This year's housing funding law includes \$60 million for 8,000 new supportive housing vouchers for homeless veterans. Since this program began in 2008, the number of homeless veterans nationwide has dropped by one third. Maine has received nearly 200 vouchers to support homeless veterans.

Last year, I became Chairman of the Senate Aging Committee. My top three priorities for the committee are retirement security, investing more in biomedical research, and fighting fraud and financial abuses targeting our nation's seniors. I advocated for the \$2 billion increase in funding for the National Institutes of Health to advance research on such diseases as diabetes and Alzheimer's. The Senate also unanimously passed my bill to support family caregivers. The Aging Committee's toll-free hotline (1-855-303-9470) makes it easier for senior citizens to report suspected fraud and receive assistance and has already received more than 1,000 calls.

A Maine value that always guides me is our unsurpassed work ethic. As 2015 ended, I cast my 6,072nd consecutive vote, continuing my record of never missing a roll-call vote since my Senate service began in 1997.

I hope this letter finds you and your family well. I appreciate the opportunity to give you an update on my work in Maine and Washington. It continues to be a great honor to serve the people of Maine's 1st District in Congress.

Over the last year, I have introduced a number of bills to address the problems my constituents face. One of the most concerning issues is hunger. Nearly 50 million Americans don't have reliable access to enough food. At the same time, 40 percent of the food produced in the country goes to waste. That is why I introduced the Food Recovery Act, comprehensive legislation to cut food waste while providing more food to the people who need it.

The Safe and Affordable Drugs from Canada Act takes on another serious concern for Maine families—the high cost of prescription drugs. Just over the border in Canada, the same medications are available at half the price on average. My bill would lift a ban that prohibits consumers from importing those medications. Other bills I introduced touch on a number of issues, from helping veterans secure benefits to protecting our coastal economies. My seat on the House Appropriations Committee—which has a powerful role in setting federal funding levels—has also put me in a position to influence policies and programs that affect Mainers. But not all my work takes place at the Capitol. Here at home, I had the chance to visit many communities to help celebrate their victories and discuss their concerns—critical feedback to take to Washington. And over the last year, my hard-working staff has helped hundreds of constituents on their issues with federal programs and agencies.

I hope 2016 finds you and your family doing well. It is an honor to represent you and this community as your State Senator. These are challenging times for so many people in Maine. Which is why I am pleased to have some good news and information to help you through some of the challenges.

This past year, the Legislature made significant progress in providing direct tax relief to Maine homeowners. We increased the Homestead Property Tax Credit for all Mainers, from \$10,000 to \$15,000 starting in April of 2016; and the exemption will increase again to \$20,000 in 2017. We also prevented Municipal Revenue Sharing cuts while increasing funding of K-12 schools by \$80 million. As key influences on municipal revenues, they are critical to avoiding property tax spikes.

Additionally, we implemented meaningful, fair changes to the state's income tax code, which will result in a \$135 million annual tax cut for 579,000 Maine families. This Legislature also eliminated the income tax on pensions for all military families.

Moving forward, I will continue to focus on making state government effective in meeting people's needs, with good oversight and accountability, providing property tax relief and tax reform that works for every day Mainers, not just the wealthy. As the Legislature continues its work, please know that I appreciate hearing from you about your concerns, your hopes, and your ideas for how to make our communities and our state better. The Kennebec County Sheriff's Office experienced many changes in 2015. Former Sheriff Liberty accepted a position at the Maine State Prison. We appreciate his 29 years of service and wish him the best. As an agency we will continue to offer the same quality service as has been provided in the past. Those services include the Law Enforcement Division, Corrections' Services, Civil Process, Court Security and Transport Division. We provide many regional assets to our communities including Drug Investigations, K-9, Dive Team, Sex Offender Registry, Veterans Advocacy, Accident Reconstruction and the Special Response Team.

In 2015 nineteen Deputy Sheriffs serving in the Law Enforcement Division both in full-time and part-time capacity responded to over 18,000 calls for service. There were 44,674 service entries into our data base. As a result deputies made 922 arrests, issued 722 traffic summonses, and responded to 580 motor vehicle accidents. Deputy Sheriffs also responded to 566 alarms, 128 domestic disturbances, and assisted other agencies 687 times. Deputies and Detectives made 934 drug seizures, of which 852 involved cocaine, crack cocaine, heroin, or other opiates.

Our Civil Process deputies serve documents from a number of legal agencies, state agencies, lawyer's offices and other entities. In 2015, the four deputies served 7,826 documents or legal papers to the citizens of Kennebec County.

During the past year, our Correctional Facility managed 3,438 inmates, 110 more than last year. The offenses committed by defendants included everything from Burglaries to Homicides. Substance abuse and the proper treatment of citizens with mental illness continue to be two primary concerns at the Correctional Facility. With the help from many members of the Kennebec County delegation, we were able to secure funding for CARA (Criminogenic Addiction Recovery Academy) Program within the State biannual budget. CARA was delayed for several months because of the long delay in financing. We were still able to complete five CARA program courses reaching a total of 29 inmates with treatment.

Inmates at the Kennebec County Correctional Facility are asked to work and earn time off their sentences if applicable. Inmates who are considered to be a risk to the community work inside the facility cleaning and cooking, while others are supervised on outside projects. For every two days worked, one day is reduced from their sentence, resulting in a \$496,467 bed day savings to the citizens of Kennebec County. Throughout 2015, inmates worked 8,681 community service hours, valued at approximately \$65,102. Our inmates raised 55,225 pounds of produce for the inmate kitchen, area food pantries, churches, homeless shelters, schools and elder programs in 2015.

Service Report – Windsor 2015

Delta Ambulance, founded in 1972, is the leading provider of high quality, compassionate emergency services and medical transportation in central Maine. Our superior training, experience and state-of-the-art medical technologies set us apart from other ambulance services. We are pleased to be able to provide emergency Paramedic response and care to the people of your community and to continue supporting your First Response Rescue at no cost to the community.

As a regional not-for-profit organization, we continue to fund our operations solely by reimbursement for patient calls directly from the patient and the patient's insurance policy. This is possible in large part due to our economy of scale. We do write off a significant portion of our charges annually as charitable giving to the uninsured and underinsured. Additionally we continue to support many special community events throughout our coverage area.

In 2015, we responded to 222 911-calls. Of these, 11 calls were for assistance from patients who did not require hospital care. These patients were evaluated by our paramedics and received no charge for service. Additionally, we serve your community by regularly providing non-emergency care and transfer services for patients as well as standby for fire calls.

Our average response times, the time between our receipt of the call and our arrival, for delivery of paramedic care was 12.6 minutes for emergencies.

Paramedic care is the highest level of Pre-Hospital care available. Our Paramedics exceed State Standards for recertification and respond with the latest medical technology available including 12 lead EKG and pharmaceutical interventions. Our care is reviewed in our Continuing Quality Improvement (CQI) program, which is recognized as a leading process in Maine.

Our support for your Rescue Services continues to include continuing medical/rescue education and on-scene replacement of medical supplies used on the call, all at no cost to the town.

Dear Friends of Erskine Academy:

It has been an enterprising year of school improvement and increased and accelerated student achievement for Erskine Academy.

Last spring, our successful reaccreditation by the *New England Association of Secondary Schools (NEASC)* affirmed Erskine Academy's effective and efficient use of human and fiscal resources to implement the school's mission and long-held traditional values. We were commended by the Commission for our comprehensive and extensive programming to meet diverse student abilities, interests and needs; our well-maintained physical plant; our carefully cultivated, distinctive, and healthy school culture; and our commitment to the success of every student. Areas currently being strengthened by our improvement plan include: the professional and leadership development of our faculty; an ongoing analysis of student work and achievement data; and scheduling regular reviews and revisions of our curriculum.

As the State of Maine has legislated "proficiency-based" diplomas for all public school students, Erskine Academy has instituted its own system to enable students to exceed proficiency. Our approach is to analyze our current students' and recent graduates' achievement data and experiences to inform program improvements and enhancements. Recent developments and trends include: In our third year as a *MELMAC Education Foundation* school, we have increased students' preparedness and aspirations for continuing their education after high school, resulting in our 87% continuing education rate for a third consecutive year. We have reduced barriers to accessing higher education and once in college, our graduates require less remedial coursework than their public school peers. For fall 2014, we connected more students to the *University of Maine at Augusta* than any other high school. This fall, we were named by the *University of Maine at Farmington* as their top high school for students who graduate in four years with a degree.

Teachers' professional development has focused on ensuring that an Erskine Academy diploma signifies that its holder has met the academic and behavioral performance standards demanded by industry, the workplace and adulthood. In its fifth year, our *Jobs for Maine Graduates (JMG)* program has increased student exposure to various forms of higher education and vocational trades programs, and teaches essential work seeking, training and employment retention skills. By valuing all students and believing they deserve a welcoming school and professional teachers who will build on their strengths, 20% of our students receive academic or special education support services to meet our learning standards. Orienting ourselves to our learners in this manner, for a fourth consecutive year, 98% of our students graduated high school in four years, one of the highest graduation rates in the state, and our dropout rate is less than 1%.


We continue to create the conditions to make our students more competitive for higher learning and marketable for the workplace by increasing relevance and rigor in our program of studies. Second only to its host school, Cony, we have the largest enrollment at the Capital Area Technical Center, where nearly sixty students will earn a certificate in a craft or trade. This past year, 142 students took at least one of our seventeen *Advanced Placement* courses, a 9% increase over the previous year; and we had 197 enrollees in one or more of our ten dual enrollment courses with local colleges. Both types of courses are taught here by our teachers, resulting in nearly two-thirds of the graduating class earning college credits while in high school at a considerable savings in college tuition. Nearly 68% of our class of 2015 earned college credits while attending Erskine Academy, which we estimate to be the financial equivalent of approximately \$347,000.00 at the University of Maine tuition rate. It is for this achievement that we were recognized by the *College Board* and the *University of Maine*, and we were one of only seven Maine schools to be named *America's Most Challenging High Schools for 2015* by the *Washington Post*.

With 590 students in grades nine through twelve, Erskine is the largest town academy in Maine to serve a nearly 100% local contingent, and one of few schools whose entire enrollment attends on a school choice basis. Our students continue to be drawn primarily from eight central Maine towns and humble, hard-working backgrounds to experience a school program that blends traditional values with contemporary programs and best practices to become the most academically and personally prepared young people in the region. To support this heritage, for a fifth time, we brought nearly 250 area sixth graders to our school for a program of early exposure to high school designed to build their confidence for doing high school work.

Pursuing excellence and our mission is a continuous and unyielding work in progress. With our institutional strengths now validated and a school improvement plan established, we are committed to adding value to the diploma and the high school experience. We will transition and transform with the times to do our very best for our students by providing quality educational experiences and the conditions to inspire them to their highest potential in school, at work, and within their communities.

We are grateful to our students, families, alumni and sending communities for their confidence in and support for Erskine Academy. Together, we create a school and legacy that adheres to what we know is right and good for our young people—preparation for quality living founded on scholarship, leadership, stewardship, and relationships.

The 2015-2016 school year has been an exciting year for the Sheepscot Valley RSU 12 school district. The Sheepscot Valley RSU 12 school district includes the towns of Alna, Chelsea, Palermo, Somerville, Whitefield, Windsor, and Westport Island. RSU 12's vision is to "build a foundation of lifetime learning for our students, families, and communities." RSU 12 continues to move forward working towards this vision. This year, RSU 12 Board of Directors and staff have worked to expand PreK programming for four-year-olds. RSU 12 successfully established four PreK classrooms this year. There are two classrooms located at Chelsea Elementary School, one classroom at Whitefield Elementary School, and one classroom at Somerville Elementary School. There are plans to add a PreK classroom at Windsor. Transportation is provided to these programs. All programs filled with a total of sixty-four students attending. Funding was made possible for these programs by working in collaboration with regional Headstart agencies and leveraging Federal grant funds. It is hoped that RSU 12 can continue to expand and maintain these programs in order to accommodate all PreK students in RSU 12 in the future.

Educators in RSU 12 continue to work towards implementing a proficiency-based learning environment. This type of learning environment provides a structure that creates flexibility and allows students to progress as they demonstrate mastery of academic content regardless of time or pace of learning. Proficiency-based strategies provide flexibility in the way that mastery can be accomplished, and provide students with personalized learning opportunities. This type of learning leads to better student engagement because the content is relevant to each student and tailored to their unique needs. It also leads to better student outcomes because the pace of learning is customized to each student. By enabling students to master skills at their own pace, a proficiency-based learning environment helps to save both time and money.

RSU 12 is currently working on the goals in our Long Range Plan. You can find this plan under Goals on the www.svrsu.org website. Below are the broad goals of the plan.

1. *Maximize the use of resources to serve students and the community to their highest potential.*
2. *Enhance school involvement with communities.*
3. *Hire, develop and retain talented and dedicated staff, to serve as positive role models for students and the community.*
4. *Enhance parental involvement in student learning.*
5. *Develop a cohesive, personalized and rigorous curriculum that is relevant and directed toward the fulfillment of the future aspirations of our students.*
6. *Foster a comfortable, safe environment; providing an atmosphere of support and respect for others, where the complexity and diversity of individual learners is recognized and accommodated.*

At the time of this writing, the 2016-2017 RSU 12 school budget has been approved by the RSU 12 Board of Directors and is headed to voters for approval. There is an overall local increase of 2.8%. State subsidy has once again decreased proportionally to last year as the state is asking towns to raise more locally. In spite of this decrease in state funding, the RSU 12 Board has worked hard to develop a FY17 budget that maximizes programming while remaining fiscally conservative. We are grateful for the support of the town in fulfilling our mission. The building, utilities and the maintenance the town provides alleviates a large financial burden for the food bank. With this support we can focus a lot more of our donated dollars on food costs. The food bank is an ecumenical partnership between Windsor Christian Fellowship and North Windsor Baptist. We serve those in need on the first and third Thursday of every month from 6:30–8:00pm. There is no requirement either expressed or implied for anyone receiving the services of the food bank to participate in any of the programming of either of the churches.

Donations of food and money are always a constant need for the food bank to continue our mission. The monies donated are stretched in a conservative manner so that we get the best bang for our buck. All of the food is given away free of charge to those in need in the town of Windsor. We source our food from the USDA, Good Shepherd Food Bank, China Hannaford, and purchase a small amount wherever the cheapest bargain is. There are many organizations that support us with food drives. Some of those include the Windsor Elementary School, Windsor Post office, Lions Club, and Erskine Academy. We have received food from local farmers and gardeners as well during the season. Fresh food is much anticipated and makes a huge impact on the families we serve. Through these methods we provided over 20,000 meals to the town of Windsor.

We could not do this work without the great support of our financial donors. We have some that send small amounts in the mail monthly or quarterly and some send larger amounts. The impact of both is very important to us and no amount is too small. We have an awesome group of people who come together to make the food bank run. The volunteers and board members are some of the most loving and caring people in the town. A great amount of people from the town participated by either walking or donating funds and this year's total amount raised was over \$1800. These monies are a great boost that will help us to consistently supply food for a few months.

Lastly we would like to thank Debbie Gray for over 10 years of service to her community. She was a great leader for the food bank and made my transition a very easy one. In the Name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Windsor, qualified by law to vote in Windsor affairs, to meet at the WINDSOR TOWN HALL, in said Town of Windsor on TUESDAY, the FOURTEENTH day of JUNE, 2016 A.D. at 8:00 a.m. in the morning, then and there to act on Article 1 and Article 2 by secret ballot. **The Polls shall be opened at 8:00 a.m. and closed at 8:00 p.m. Absentee ballots will be processed at 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m.**

And, to notify and warn said inhabitants to meet at the WINDSOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOL in said Town of Windsor on WEDNESDAY the FIFTEENTH day of JUNE, 2016 A.D. at 6:30 p.m. and then and there to act on Articles 3 through 38;

All articles being set out below to wit:

ARTICLE 1. ELECTION OF MODERATOR: To elect a moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE 2. ELECTION OF TOWN OFFICIALS: To elect all necessary Town of Windsor Officers/Officials by Secret Ballot.

ARTICLES 3 THROUGH 13 DEAL WITH TAX & FISCAL ADMINISTRATIONS

ARTICLE 3. TAX ADMINISTRATION: To see what method the Inhabitants of the Town of Windsor will adopt for collection of taxes in FY2017.

- A. The payments, as stated on the bills, shall be due and payable on September 30, 2016 and March 31, 2017.
- B. The Tax Collector shall accept no advance payments, except as provided in section C below, before commitment of taxes.
- C. The Town will treat all overpayment of taxes as prepayments on next year's taxes pursuant to 36 MRSA §506 and shall pay no interest on such payments.
- D. The Town will pay interest at the rate of 3.0% per annum on abated taxes for any period, pursuant to 36 MRSA §506-A.
- E. Charge interest at the rate of 7.0 % per annum, on any taxes owed after the due dates.
- F. The Town Report will list all taxes outstanding as of April 1, 2017.
- G. Authorize the Treasurer to waive the foreclosure of tax lien mortgages pursuant to 36 MRSA §944 upon a finding by the Board of Selectmen that ownership of the property subject to the lien would be contrary to the Town's best interest.
- H. Administration of Tax Acquired Property:
 - 1. Authorize the Board of Selectmen to dispose of tax acquired property as they shall deem to be necessary and in the best interests of the Town.

2. Authorize the Board of Selectmen to execute and deliver quit claim deeds, without covenant, for the conveyance of such property and/or the removal of tax liens from public records as justice may require.
3. Give delinquent taxpayers a thirty (30) day grace period in which to redeem their property upon payment of all taxes, liens, interest, and other applicable costs.

- E. Only taxpayers who do not have outstanding tax obligations for prior tax years are eligible to participate in the tax club program; and
- F. Taxpayers wishing to participate in a tax club for a particular property tax year shall enter into an agreement with the Town by a publicly-advertised deadline determined by the Tax Collector.

The Windsor Volunteer Fire Department will be sponsoring a **Rabies Clinic** at the Windsor Fire Station, 671 South Belfast Rd, **of Saturday, December 10, 2016 from 12:00 p.m. to 1:00 p.m.** The fee is \$10.00. All dogs must be leashed and all cats must be in containers. Animals should be at least four (4) months of age and not pregnant.

A clerk will be onsite enabling you to also license your dog. Owners must bring a current rabies certificate, and a spay/neuter certificate if applicable if they wish to renew their dog's license.

All dogs owners are reminded that **dog licenses expire December 31st** each calendar year, and you may license your dog beginning October 15. There is a late fee of \$25.00 per dog after January 31st.
