## Excerpt from the "Chronicles of Knox County" circa 1922

#### WARREN

The Town of Warren is situated on both sides of the St. Georges River which divides the town and village into nearly two equal parts. It is bounded northerly by Union, easterly by Camden, Rockland and Thomaston, southerly by Cushing and westerly by Waldoboro.

It contains nearly 30,000 acres and is equal to a tract of land six and three-fourths miles square.

The village is nearly 34 miles from Augusta and nine miles from Rockland, the county seat. It was known as a trading post as early as 1631. The first permanent settlement was made on the St. Georges River by the Scotch-Irish and became a town in 1776, it being the first town in the county to be incorporated.

The town was named Warren in honor of General Joseph Warren who fell in the battle of Bunker Hill. The village is situated in the central part of the town at the head of tide waters of the Georges River which is navigable for vessels of light draft as far as the village.

In early times the leading business of the people was lumbering, lime burning and ship-building, 169 vessels of different classes having been built within the limits of the town. Within the last 75 years these industries have gradually declined and are not now followed as an occupation.

Warren has two fine water power plants, one at the village where the woolen mill is located and the other, a short distance above at what is known as the "Upper Falls" where an electric power plant has been installed and used as an auxiliary power at the woolen mill.

The Georges River Woolen Mills is the only manufactory now in operation. Ever since 1842 the manufacture of woolen goods has been conducted except at short intervals to the present time. The Company employ about 100 operatives and manufacture a substantial grade of goods which commands a ready sale.

Warren also has a fine shoe shop building where Rice & Hutchins did a successful business for 38 years. For several years the plant has not been occupied except for short periods. At the present time M. Shortell & Son of Beverly, Mass have leased the building and have already installed a carload of machinery and more coming and it looks as if they were going to start a permanent business.

Ever since the town was settled, Warren has been somewhat noted for its Alewives Fishery. Altho (sp) this business does not furnish employment except for a few weeks, yet it has continued to be a source of revenue to the town. Warren is the best farming section of the county.

# Town of Warren Minutes for March 23, 2015 Annual Town Meeting

County of Knox, SS.

State of Maine

At the opening of the polls on Monday, March 23, 2015, at the Town Office, John W. Black of Waldoboro was nominated and elected as moderator with four ballots cast.

The results of the secret ballot election on March 23, 2015 are as follows:

For Board of Selectman, Assessor and Overseer of the Poor for three years and three months Seat #3: James Kinney was elected with 394 votes. Opponent Edmund LaFlamme received 106 votes.

For Board of Selectman, Assessor and Overseer of the Poor for three years and three months Seat #4: Wesley Richardson was elected with 344 write-in votes. Opponent Michael York received 115 votes.

For RSU/MSAD #40 Board of Directors for three year term: SaraLee E. Andrews received 462 votes.

For Warren Sanitary District Trustee for three years Seat #2: Clayton Winchenbach received 473 votes.

For Warren Sanitary District Trustee for three years Seat #3: Edward Courtenay received 445 votes.

The Annual Town meeting at Warren Community School on March 24, 2015, was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance at 7:00 p.m. by Moderator John Black.

A motion was made to allow non-residents Town Manager Elaine Clark and Assessor Jim Murphy to speak at the meeting. Moved and seconded, it was passed by a show of hands.

Note: Three Selectman were not present; Chair Michael York, Vice Chair Edmund LaFlamme & Arnold D. Hill.

Article 3: To choose all necessary town officials for the ensuing year, other than those now required to be elected by ballot under the provisions of Maine law.

Budget Committee Members Paul Andrews, Pamela Mason, and George Knutson, whose terms expired in 2015, were reelected following a Motion, a Second, and a show of hands. Two vacancies on the Budget Committee were filled by Michael Philips, completing the remainder of a term that expires in 2017 and Melody Sainio, completing the remainder of term that expires in 2016. Mr. Philips and Ms. Sainio were elected following a Motion, a Second, and a show of hands.

Edward Courtenay was re-elected as Fish Warden for 2015 following a Motion, a Second, and a show of hands. A Motion to elect Joseph "Ike" Johnson as Fish Warden was seconded and was passed with a show of hands. Mr. Johnson will serve in the seat formerly held by James Doyle.

Article 4: To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen pursuant to 12 MRS § 6131 to promulgate such regulations compatible with the General Laws of the State to govern the time when and the manner in which alewives shall be taken therein (Note: Municipal rights in existence on January 1, 1974, which are not exercised for 3 consecutive years shall lapse 12 MRS §6131.)

Article 4 was moved and seconded. It was passed as written, without discussion, by a show of hands.

Article 5: To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to sell surplus alewives for one or more years, or take any action relative to the same.

Article 5 was moved and seconded. It was passed as written, without discussion, by a show of hands.

Article 6: To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the six-month Fiscal Year 1/1/2015 through 6/30/2015 General Government departments.

#### Discussion:

A resident asked why there were 5 votes by the Budget Committee in opposition to Section B, Administration.

It was explained that \$8,500 was for a study of the public works truck turnarounds that are located private property. The budgeted funds were intended to be used to research titles, contact property owners, and document turnarounds with easements. Many turnarounds also are used by school buses.

A Motion to remove the \$8,500 from section B was seconded, reducing the amount to \$144,406. Sub Total \$237,162.

A resident asked if the funds would be used for survey work. The Manager responded that the funds would not be used for survey work.

A resident asked what the ramifications would be if a property owner did not allow a turnaround. The response was that trucks and buses would have to exit in reverse unless a substitute turnaround was negotiated.

A resident offered an amendment to the Motion to restore the \$8500. It was seconded and approved by a show of hands.

Article 6 was moved and seconded. It was passed as written, by a show of hands.

Article 7: To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the six-month Fiscal Year 1/1/2015 through 6/30/2015 Protections departments.

Motion was made to pass Section A. Seconded. It was passed as written without discussion, by a show of hands. Motion was made to pass Section B. Seconded.

#### Discussion:

Section B includes funding in the amount of \$12,090 for a midnight to 6 am weekday shift. Volunteers with one exception have jobs and find it difficult to cover that time slot. Selectman Lufkin who is a volunteer with the Warren Ambulance Service believes that the department can maintain its operations without the paid night time slot for the next 3 months. He indicated that he would support funding for midnight to 6 am in the next fiscal year budget.

A resident asked whether any funds had been paid from this budget line during the first three months of the six month fiscal year. The answer was no.

A motion was made and seconded to remove the \$12,090 from Section B. The motion passed by a show of hands. The revised total for Section B is \$73,312. The revised total for "Protections" is \$189,383.

Motion was made and seconded to approve Section C as read, without discussion, by a show of hands.

Motion was made and seconded to approve Section D as read, without discussion, by a show of hands.

A Motion was made and seconded to separate the two subsections of Article 9.

The Amendment failed via a show of hands. Article 9 was considered as a whole.

#### Discussion:

A resident asked why there was a split vote from the Budget Committee on section B.

Several budget committee members felt that the Recreation Department budget has "too much money for too few kids."

A resident replied that he had been to many Recreation Department functions and observed that a staggering number of children participate.

There is a great deal of participation in the Town of Warren with approximately 500 kids in the program.

A resident asked for a breakdown of expenditures for salary versus maintaining the grounds. The Manager replied that Salary for 6 months is \$15,000 and the cost of Grounds work is \$2,000.

One resident thinks that parents should pay higher fees for kids to participate.

A resident complimented the work of Warren's wonderful Recreation Director, noting that he vastly exceeds the number of hours he is paid for and does a phenomenal job.

Another resident observed that any money spent on kids by the Town is money well spent.

Article 9 was moved and seconded. It was passed as written, by a show of hands.

Section C comprises FICA, Medicare, health insurance, insurance reimbursement, personnel performance and unemployment (self-funded direct pay obligation).

A resident asked why section A (Social Services and Contributions) was a lower amount than usual.

The Town's contributions are made at the end of the calendar year and will be included in the twelve-month budget. The non-profits requesting contributions include Broadreach and Red Cross, by way of example. The social services included in this six-month budget are General Assistance and half of the Town's usual contribution to the Historical Society. The remainder with be in the upcoming 12-month fiscal year budget.

Article 11 was moved and seconded. It was passed as written, without discussion, by a show of hands.

Article 12 was moved and seconded.

#### Discussion:

Resident asked why we would need a Vehicle Life Cycle Study if the State already does one.

It was stated that the Selectman who requested this was not present at the meeting, however the same data that a life cycle study would collect is being gathered by public works employees, who are tracking expenditures by truck.

Regarding the "records restoration" reserve account, a resident asked why the Town is restoring records and what is being restored.

Documents will be placed in archival quality plastic sheets to protect them for handling and environmental conditions in order to preserve them.

A resident questioned why records were not being digitized. Town records and processes are being converted to electronic form, however the conversion will take time. Priceless old town records will be retained in paper form, particularly because some residents do not have computers. Not all information is accessible by the general public and therefore cannot be put on a web page. For example, death certificates and birth certificates are available only to family members.

A resident asked what a Life Cycle Study is.
