MAYOR'S ADDRESS

Gentlemen of the Board of Aldermen:

Ten years ago this present month I relinquished the office of Mayor of this City, after having been connected with the City Government in one capacity or another, for nearly thirty years. I then supposed that I was severing my connection with City affairs permanently, that thereafter I would only come in contact with City Officials once a year, when, with whatever cheerfulness I could assume, I paid my taxes. I will say that during the last few years that annual event has strained both my cheerfulness and my pocketbook about to the vanishing point.

I had had, at least, all of the honor I deserved and I thought I had given all of the service that should be required of me, but our fellow citizens thought otherwise and insisted that I again take up the work I had so willingly relinquished. Whether they were wise or foolish in so doing, only the future can tell. I accepted the mandate with great reluctance, whether I was wise or foolish in so doing is not, in my opinion, an open question. Certain matters that have come to my knowledge since my acceptance, have convinced me the lack of wisdom in my decision.

I fully appreciate the great compliment the people of our City have paid me, and deem it the highest honor

that ever has, or ever will, come to me. Would that I were more worthy of it, and more capable of filling the duties it imposes.

And now having accepted and been elected to this office, I will endeavor to so conduct myself, and so conduct the affairs of the office, as to not bring shame to myself or to those who have been instrumental in placing me here.

I make but one promise and that is, that to the best of my limited ability, I will endeavor to improve existing conditions in City affairs, if I fail it will not be for lack of effort.

Many changes have taken place since last I stood here and addressed a Board of Aldermen; changes in our City, our nation and in the whole world. The great World War, in which some of you were privileged to actively participate, has been fought and won, and now its after effects, the reaction that was bound to come, is with us and I fear will remain with us for some time to come.

The great increase in the cost of all commodities, caused largely by conditions resulting from the war, has placed a great burden on the municipality as well as on the individual, and increased municipal expenses with increased taxes was the inevitable result. But when you examine into the matter as I have, and find that while the appropriations made for conducting the City's affairs ten years ago was \$49,000, and for last year \$105,000, an increase of 111 per cent. it is apt to cause one to pause and perhaps to wonder. Especially when you take into consideration the fact that the valuation of the City has increased but little, and that, by the census report, our population has actually decreased.

The same conditions continuing for a few years more, increasing expenses and taxes with decreasing population, and where will we land. If the great increase in the expense of administering our City affairs is necessary and unavoidable, then we must submit and stagger along as best we can. But was it necessary and

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is it necessary to continue the same course? I say no to

both propositions.

It was inevitable that there should have been increase in the cost of administration of the different departments but not to the extent that has occurred. I do not believe it was necessary to appropriate the sum of \$6,700 with which to conduct the affairs of one department that performed exactly the same service in 1910 for \$2300, an increase in cost of nearly 300 per cent., nor \$18,500 for another department that in 1910 rendered, at least as good service for \$7,900. I do not, in either case refer to the School department, in which the increase, while considerable has not been so great in proportion, as in either of the two cases cited, and the service rendered has been increasingly valuable, and well worth the increased cost.

Now, Gentlemen, what are we going to do about it? Shall we permit matters to run along as they have been going, or shall we call a halt, overhaul the different departments and eliminate whatever we believe to be

detrimental to the City's best interests?

The Mayor alone can do little toward bettering conditions, but with wholehearted cooperation and assistance,

something, perhaps much, may be accomplished.

Before accepting the office to which you have been elected. you knew, in a general way, that City affairs were in rather a serious condition, and having accepted with that knowledge I trust and believe that you enter upon your duties with the same intentions that I have, of doing everything in your power for their improvement; keeping in mind, always, that we are not here as the representatives of any party or clique, but as representatives of our entire citizenship, male and female. Our aim should be, not what is for the interest of the few but what is best for the whole; not what is expedient for the present, but what is best for the present with due regard for the future interests of the city, and in pursuance of that aim we should let no person, city officer or otherwise, stand in the way of it's accomplishment, and should

not hesitate to discard or eliminate any officer or employee whose aims and sympathies are not in accord with ours.

We might smooth over matters for this year by compromise, postponement or evasion, leaving the real tangle for future City Governments to wrestle with, but I do not believe in doing business in that way. I believe in facing the situation squarely and to the best of our ability solving whatever problems arise, and there will undoubtedly be enough of them to try our metal, but let us not shirk matters however difficult or disagreeable they may be, but grapple with them and earnestly endeavor, each helping the other, to find the right solutions.

We must expect many of our acts to be criticised, but honest criticism is to be encouraged rather than feared or condemned, any other kind of criticism, condemns itself. So let us not fear criticism, nor waste time in making excuses or explanations, but with honest purpose and fearless courage, do our best and worry not over

what may be said about it.

In expending the City's money, let us see to it that for every dollar expended we receive a dollar's value, and also see to it that every City officer and employee honestly performs the duties incumbent upon him, without fear of, or favor for anyone, high or low; failing in that re-

spect, eliminate him and try another.

This year marks a new era in politics; it is the first year that women have been permitted to vote in municipal elections. We gladly welcome them as fellow citizens, and are glad to see that they already take great interest in our City affairs, and I am more than pleased to see so many of them present this morning. It augurs well for the future. I trust many of them may be present at future meetings of the Council. They will expect miracles of us, and when we fail to come up to their expectations, will not be backward in telling us of it, but the mere fact that they expect much of us will be an incentive to greater endeavor, and when later they decide to take over the duties and responsibilities that now devolve upon us,

we may confidently expect to see real improvement and

progress.

In regard to the proceedings today I am going to recommend a change from the usual routine. I have not. as yet, had time to fully investigate and master the situation and consequently am not prepared to make specific recommendations in regard to the different departments, or in regard to appropriations for the coming These matters I will submit to you at an adjourned meeting. For today I recommend that we elect only a City Clerk and Chairman of the Board of Aldermen, and perhaps one or two others if deemed necessary, and defer the election of all others until the finance committee, consultation with other committees, shall have recommended the amount of salary to be paid the different officers for the coming year, and also until we all have had time to study the situation more fully and can de cide in what manner, if at all, we can cut off some of the City expenses.

The City's valuation probably will not show much. if any, increase this year over last, and may show a decrease, and so if we do not wish to face an additional increase in taxes, we must devise some means of retrench-

ment.

One further recommendation I will make in regard to the standing committees of the Council. I believe that the fewer committees we have, the less confusion there will be in regard to the duties of each, and the more efficient service rendered.

I recommend that instead of the 13 committees here to fore appointed that they be consolidated into 10, as follows:

Finance Committee, to be composed of the Mayor as chairman ex officio, and three Aldermen. The duties of this Committee will be to examine into and report on all financial matters, including payrolls, accounts and claims against the City, taxation and abatement,

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and with the City Auditor to audit and verify the accounts, books and vouchers of the Treasurer, Tax Collector and all other officers collecting or expending funds of the City.

Highway Committee. Duties as heretofore, three Aldermen and Mayor.

Fire Committee. Duties as heretofore, three Aldermen.

Police Committee. Duties as heretofore, three Aldermen. Poor Committee. Three Aldermen. Duties to supervise all matters relating to the poor and insane, distribution of the Chase Poor fund and of any and all other charities.

City Property Committee. 3 Aldermen. Duties to have supervision of all matters relating to City Property, including Cemeteries, Library and Parks.

School Property Committee. 3 Aldermen. Duties as heretofore.

New Streets Committee. 3 Aldermen. Duties as heretofore.

Lighting and Water. 3 Aldermen. Duties as heretofore. Contingent, Licenses. 3 Aldermen. Duties as heretofore.

I defer all other recommendations until our adjourned annual meeting.

In closing you will pardon me if I call your attention to the importance of regular attendance at all meetings of the Council. It may be unnecessary to remind you of this, and I trust it is, but it will not do to trust to other members to make up a quorum. It is important not only that a quorum be present at every meeting, but that we have a full board, only in that way can we have the benefit of the united judgment of the board on questions as they arise.

CALAIS FREE LIBRARY AND READING ROOM

To the Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Calais:

Gentlemen:—The Trustees of the Calais Free Library and Reading Room submit their Annual Report for the year ending March 31, 1921, as follows:

The past year has shown continued growth in the usefulness of the Library. A large number of volumes have been added and many delapidated and worn out books that were in demand by readers, have been replac-

ed by new volumes of the same.

The whole number of volumes purchased during the year was 270, number presented to the Library, 6. The whole number of volumes now in the Library is over 12,000 besides more than 3,000 Public Documents, mostly State and National Reports, some of which are valuable and will become increasingly valuable as the years go by. We regret that we have not room in the Library building to properly arrange and classify them so that they might be readily available for the use of the public, but so crowded is the only room we have available for them that they can be made use of only in rare instances. We

hope to have this condition remedied sometime in the future.

The number of books given out for home reading during the year was 18,134, an increase over last year of more than 1,000. The number of readers availing themselves of the privilige of the Reading Room was 5,626.

It was necessary during the year to grant an increase of salary to the Librarian, Miss Bertha E. Boyd, in order to retain her valuable services. This was done with the knowledge and consent of the City Council and this increase together with the extreme high price of fuel accounts for whatever overdraft there may be in this department.

We trust that the appropriation for the coming year may be such as will not necessitate an overdraft. Our expenses are practically all fixed charges and will vary but little from last year.

Following is our financial statement prepared by the Auditor.

SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the City of Calais:

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I have the honor to submit herewith for your consideration the annual report of the condition and progress of the schools of the City of Calais. The School census taken April first showed a total of 2099 persons between the ages of 5 and 21. These figures show an increase of 75 over the census last year. Of the above number 1154 are registered in the city schools exclusive of those registered at the parochial school. Tables showing enrollment, expenditures, etc., will be found at the end of this report. In many ways this has been a very successful year for the schools. The attendance has on the whole been very satisfactory, and there has been but one resignation from a corps of very efficient teachers. Teachers are being paid and while below the State average, it is far better than that of former years. This has helped to eliminate much of the restlessness on the part of the teachers. However if we are to hold the best teachers further increases are necessary.

The junior high school plan introduced last year continues to prove its supericrity over the old 8-4 plan of former years. A glance at the enrollment table will show that the pupils are being held in school beyond the compulsory school age. The introduction of the new courses will do much toward preparing the boys and girls for their work as citizens of your community. The course in conversational French taught by Mrs. Leon and the course in Domestic Science taught by Miss Mc-Kellar are both worthy of your attention. While the new plan costs slightly more than the old, the better re-

sults obtained more than justifies the increase in the cost of instruction. Pupils are being taught how to study,

to use and enjoy good books.

The new Calais Academy has been used not only as a school but as a community center as well. You have every reason to be proud of the fine new plant and also of the excellent work being done under the direction of Principal Emily Rockwood and a very efficient corps of teachers. Among the new things introduced by Principal Rockwood are the social side of school life and the better school spirit brought out by the work in physical training and athletics. These outside activities are fully as important a part of a pupil's life as his work in school and are far from being the waste of time some are inclined to think. Teachers have built the social work around the school through the organization of boys' and girl's clubs. All agree that the school work has shown a marked improvement.

Realizing that I should fail miserably in any attempt I might make to properly describe the fine school plant you now have, I wish to take this opportunity to invite each and every citizen to visit the school that they may see for themselves the changes made during the past year. I feel sure you will agree with one of the business men of the city who when visiting the school for the first time mentioned but one mistake in the whole plan. He said, "This should have been long ago that I

might have had a chance to enjoy it.".

Your plan of remodeling and repairing one building at a time seems wise as all the school buildings are sadly in need fo repair. The Milltown building should be the next in line for extensive repairs. There you have a perfectly good building rapidly going to ruin for the lack of paint and a few minor repairs. A new heating plant should be installed as soon as possible.

The buildings at Red Beach, Brook, South Street, and Church Street are in fairly good condition except for the lack of paint, while the buildings at the Union, Munroe Street and Sand Bank are practically beyond repair. However they must be made to do until something better can be provided. You have under consideration a plan for the better housing of the pupils of the city and I trust that in the near future at least a part of that plan may be carried through successfully. After the three main buildings are put in first class condition a new grade building would take the place of the three that are beyond repair. You would then have a first class school plant.

While good school buildings and equipment are to be desired, they alone do not make a good school. Having all these and lacking a wideawake energetic teacher your school is bound to be a failure. The teacher makes the school. Calais is very fortunate in having teachers willing to teach at home for far less than they could demand elsewhere. I have as a whole found them eager and willing at all times to do their best for the schools and the pupils entrusted to their care. Because of this fine spirit of co-operation on the part of the teachers the work in the grades compares very favorably with that of other schools in this section of the State.

The Manual Training department continues to train boys in the use of tools that they may work out the practical problems connected with the home and school. The work is made as practical as possible. Boys are encouraged to make and repair articles of furniture for the home. During the past year the boys from this department have made and repaired nearly one hundred seats and chairs, also many other articles, for the school rooms of the city. At the present time they are engaged in painting their own building and in making apparatus for the playgrounds of the other schools. A small forge and anvil have been installed in this building as well as a few tools for the practice of sheet metal work. A small band saw would be very helpful in getting out stock. The apparent overdraft in this department is due solely to a change in the matter of bookkeeping and will be eliminated at the end of the present

year.

The work in Domestic, Science under the direction of Miss Gertrude McKellar has been carried on in one of the new rooms at the Academy building. Instruction in sewing and cooking is being given to pupils in grades 7-8-9. The work undertaken is made as practical as possible. Although the course was begun late in the fall term many of the pupils are already doing excellent work. This promises to be one of the most valuable additions to your school. The boys should be encouraged to erect a small two room building for the use of these classes. The P. T. A. have donated sufficient funds to pay approximately one-half the cost of the necessary materials.

The attendance while by no means perfect shows much improvement over that of last year. The enrollment in the lower grades shows a slight falling off while

continuing to increase in the higher grades.

While all the school grounds are inadequate in size something in the way of physical training has been undertaken under the direction of the teachers since we have no director of physical training. Swings and basket ball courts are being set up and teachers are required to supervise the playgrounds before and after school as well as during the recess periods. Medical and dental inspection are needed but of little value without some follow up work, such as might be undertaken by a school nurse. There have been several cases of scarlet fever and measles among the younger children, but thanks to the vigilance of the teachers, afflicted pupils have been excluded from the schools in time to prevent an epidemic of these dreaded diseases.

One of the leading jewelers of the city recently presented the Calais Academy with a fine new clock, while one of the physicians having in mind the need of better physical surroundings for the pupils very thoughtfully provided for the installation of running water in the Munroe Street school. Both of these gifts are much ap-

preciated by teachers and pupils.

In closing I wish to take this opportunity to thank all who by their co-operation and assistance have helped to provide better educational facilities for the boys and girls, the future citizens of the community for whose benefit the schools are maintained.

Gentlemen:

In accordance with the request of your superintendent of schools, Mr. W. H. Phinney, I here submit my first annual report of Calais Academy. It presents what has been attempted in the school during the past year, what conditions prevail at present, and a few changes deemed advisable for the coming year.

When school opened in September, 1920, there were several changes in the teaching staff. Mr. M. G. Phelan was engaged as submaster and athletic coach. Miss Lou Hill, whose efficiency and faithfulness need no comment, filled Miss Lizabeth Mann's place. Miss Alice Harmon had charge of the science department, and Mrs. Irene Somes of the English. Miss Case remained in the Commercial department. During the winter term, some classes were found to be altogether too large, and Miss Evelyn McLaughlin, who had taught successfully in the Academy two years before, was engaged to take care of the extra classes. Mr. Phelan resigned in March, Mr. W. P. Bangs taking his place. All the teachers have been most interested and have worked their hardest to hold Calais Academy among the leading secondary schools of the state.

The enrollment this year has been larger than ever.

We are holding the pupils in school longer than was the case ten or twelve years ago, when to graduate thirty-five or forty per cent. of an entering class was considered doing well. Now we hold forty-five or fifty per cent. until graduation. The daily attendance and punctuality might be improved, though it has been better than in some years.

The building itself cannot receive more praise than is its due. Light, clean and pleasant, it is at last adequate, and, despite the high cost of remodeling, is well worth while because of its unconscious influence upon the behavior and character growth of the students. Teachers and students alike are grateful to the citizens who made the improved building an actuality.

The Commercial department of the Academy has been equipped with a Dalton adding machine which is going to be of great value to the students in the department. We feel that our graduates need only experience to be fully prepared for responsible positions. The Domestic Science department is proving its helpfulness every day, and has an increasing interest for some of our citizens.

We have attempted to fall in line with progressive secondary schools in holding the interest of the students by outside activities, superintended by members of the teaching force. We have had a live Athletic Association, three troops of Girl Scouts, a Wireless Club, and have had frequent socials and supervised dances in the assembly room. All these activities have proved their worth, in the renewed interest in school, the better attendance, and the ease with which order is maintained.

There is only one recommendation that we have to make in regard to our good building, and that is that we really need a Principal's office, or teacher's room, where records may be kept, students interviewed, etc. This room could be arranged in one of the cloak rooms at small expense.

In all our work, we are trying to bring our students to a realization of their civic obligations, present and future and to a self-discipline that will serve them well in after life.

THE CHURCH STREET BUILDING

Mr. W. H. Phinney, Superintendent of Schools:

In accordance with your request I herewith submit my first report for the Church Street School.

The enrollment this year has been very satisfactory, between 260 and 300 pupils being registered. The attendance, in a few cases, might, as in the Academy, be improved by more interest on the part of the parents. The average attendance, however, is gratifying to all who are interested in the welfare of our school popula-

of course, in keeping some of the pupils from school.

The teachers have had charge as follows: Misses Mae Greenlaw, Ethel McPherson and Winifred Clark in the Senior class of the Junior High School; Emma Robinson, Doreen Gregory, Lelia Dick in the Junior and Freshman classes; and Miss Minnie Haycock in the sixth grade. All the teachers have been willing, responsive and able.

The building needs much in the way of repairs. A new heating plant and a few new floors seem well-nigh essential. New drinking fountains would not be amiss. The outside of the building seems twice as dingy as it did last year, on account of the fresh paint on the Academy. We wish the Church Street building, so near and so deserving, might be given the same treatment. A teachers' retiring room is, if not a necessary, yet a desirable feature. A uniform system of signals would be helpful, also.

The aims of the Junior High School are too well known now to need comment. Suffice it to say that the establishment of this system in our city was well-nigh certain.

We have given, this year, either Haggerty or Otis intelligence tests to the Junior High School pupils and are planning to utilize the results of these tests in arranging the class divisions next year.

It is now a generally accepted fact that a child's mental condition depends largely upon his physical condition, so that to have progress in school we must consider the individual health of the child. We need a director in our schools who will try to prevent disease in children and to promote health. A teacher of music and of drawing would be genuinely appreciated.

In closing my report, I should like to thank Superintendent and teachers for their whole-hearted support and co-operation.

Gentlemen: In accordance with the requirements of office I herewith present a detailed statement showing the receipts and expenditures of the several departments of the city for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1921. These accounts have been carefully compared with the City Books and are certified correct. Vouchers are on file at the office of the City Clerk.

A statement showing the assets and liabilities of the city March 31st, 1921, appears in its proper place with these reports. I would respectfully call your attention to the fact that the valuation given to the properties of the city are those given per appraisal made in 1899, and it seems to me that a new appraisal should be made. Some of the properties are over valued and some are undervalued.

I would also state that during the year the city has expended for repairs and enlargement of the Calais Academy building the sum of eleven thousand seven hundred and eight dollars and six cents (\$11,708.06), and that there are bills outstanding approximately nine thousand dollars (\$9,000.00).
