Warrant for Town Meeting

To Edward Hodsdon, one of the constables of the town of Stow, County of Oxford, greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Stow, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said town, on Monday, the seventh day of March A. D., 1932, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To allow accounts.
- Art. 4. To choose selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor for the ensuing year and grant their compensations.
 - Art. 5. To choose a town treasurer for the ensuing year.
 - Art. 6. To choose a school committee for three years.
 - Art. 7. To choose a road commissioner for the ensuing year.
 - Art. 8. To choose all other town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for common schools for the ensuing year.
- Art. 10. To see what sums of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the repair of roads and bridges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to defray town charges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the support of poor for ensuing year.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for school books, apparatus and appliances for the ensuing year.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to grant to raise the amount required to equal Chatham's part in regard to a doctor.
- Art. 15. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to state aid as provided in Section 19, of Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

- Art. 16. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of (\$300.00) three hundred dollars for the improvement of the section of state aid road as outlined in the report of State Highway Commission in addition to the amount regularly raised, for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provision of Section 18, of Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise money and what sum, for the maintenance of state aid highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provision of Section 18, of Chapter 130, of Public Laws of 1913.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to pay overdrawn bills.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for high school purposes for ensuing year.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for repair of schoolhouses for the ensuing year.
- Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money to pay town bills.
- Art. 22. To see if the town will vote and grant money for Memorial Day.
- Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to give a two per cent. discount on all taxes paid before July 1st.
- Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to raise money for maintenance of third class road and if so, (\$167.00) will be the least figure acceptable by the state.
- Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to cut bushes on the state aid highway within the limits of the town.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise \$20.00 to match the State Department Health Fund.
- Art. 27. To see what disposal the town will vote to make of any money received from the Federal Reserve during the present fiscal year, such money must be used for roads or schools, to be according to law.
- Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay in interest and principal of town debt.
- Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise money to repair town house, tractor house and roller shed.

- Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road leading from the Simon Smith place, so called, to the Barbour Place, so called, for town use.
- Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to allow the names of S. B. Harriman and Edward Hodsdon in jury box.
- Art. 32. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the Town House at 9 o'clock on Monday, the seventh day of March, in the forenoon to revise and correct the list of voters.

Superintendent's Report

To the School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Stow:

Herewith, my minth annual report of the condition, progress and needs of the schools of the Town of Stow:

Schools began Sept. 14, 1931, with the following teachers in charge: Union Hill, Merrill G. Safford, Monmouth, Maine; village, Isabel Hughey, Lisbon Falls, Maine.

Statistical information will be found in the tables following this report.

Our schools are progressing well. Mr. Safford is serving his second year at Union Hill. This is the first time for several years that we have had the same teacher there for more than one year. This is due to the isolated location of the school rather than to the school itself. Miss Hughey, a teacher of many years of successful service, is teaching for us in Stow for the first time.

Enrollment at Union Hill, 9, is at about the usual number. At the village school this year we have a larger enrollment than for some few years past, there being 22 pupils enrolled at that school during the fall term. We are glad to note this increased enrollment. Of course some additional expense was necessary in the way of books and supplies.

Some new reading books and new arithmetics have been put into use. These were badly needed.

This year the State Department of Education has put into operation a new course of study for elementary schools. This new course requires some few changes in our system, the most important of which is the inclusion of a Sub Primary Grade, making again a nine grade system. We are making progress in adopting the new course which adoption will be a matter of some time and some few changes which will appear as time goes on. The Sub Primary Grade should be organized next fall. This will enable the schools to more properly handle the problem of the very young beginning pupil. It will make the elementary course one year longer, but will entail no additional expense.

The Tinker prizes are being continued this year as usual.

The village buildings were painted two coats and now present a fine appearance. Minor upkeep jobs were done as needed.

We are badly in need of new desks in both buildings. Those in use are old, out of date double desks. Some of them are falling to pieces. If any repair work is to be done this year I advise that we equip one building with new movable desks. If we equipped the village building we would need about \$150.00 to \$160.00. At Union Hill building with less pupils we would need around \$100.00.

Our State Apportionment was \$149.46 less than last year. This decrease was entirely beyond our control and has resulted in an upset of our budget to the extent of an overdraft of about \$57.00 on the Common School Account.

To cover the overdraft and to cover the shortage in state funds for the coming year we should increase the common school appropriation by \$275.00, making it \$1,275.00 instead of \$1,000.00 as last year.

TUBERCULOSIS CLINIC

A clinic for the detection of tuberculosis conducted by the staff of the Maine Public health Association was offered in all the schools of this school union during the fall term. This was held without expense to the town, the cost therefor being met through the sale of the Red Cross Health Seals in this county. This clinic served a threefold purpose: First, it was to detect the presence of the infection; second, to determine the condition of the infected person and the progress of the infection and third; to prescribe remedial treatment.

No child was tested whose parent did not sign a request slip. Those children who reacted to the test, that is, those whose test showed the presence of infection, were submitted to an X-ray examination. Those whose X-ray plate showed that the infection had made some progress were then examined by Dr. Brewer of Hebron, a chest specialist. This examination was made in the presence of the parent of the child. The specialist was thus able to carefully check the progress of the infection and to instruct the parent upon the necessary measures in order to arrest the progress of the disease.

The clinic seems to have met with universal approval in Stow. It may be repeated next year if desired by the parents.

COUNTY FIELD NURSE

While the home work usually carried on by the County Field Nurse has been omitted this year, the nurse has given considerable time and attention to work in the schools.

Our County Field Nurse is Miss Elsie Anderson, with headquarters at the Oxford County Building, South Paris. She may be reached by letter or phone and will be glad to respond to such cases as fall within the scope of her work.

This work is carried on under the supervision of the State Department of Health and the expense is largely borne by that Department. Stow, last year, failed to make the small appropriation requested in order to aid in the expense. This work is very much worth while, especially in Stow, for it brings to home and school a very valuable service which could not otherwise be secured except at great expense.

The appropriation requested this year is \$20.00 and I know that we can make no better investment.
