Warrant for Town Meeting

To Irving Bryant, Constable of the Town of Stow, County of Oxford, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Stow, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said town, on Monday, the seventh day of March, A. D. 1949, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.'
- Art. 3. To allow accounts.
- Art. 4. To choose selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor for the ensuing year.
 - Art. 5. To choose a school committee for three years.
 - Art. 6. To choose a town treasurer for the ensuing year.
 - Art. 7. To choose a road commissioner for the ensuing year.
- Art. 8. To choose all other town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for common schools for the ensuing year.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for school books, apparatus and appliances for the ensuing year.

- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for repairs of schoolhouses for the ensuing year.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for high school purposes for the ensuing year.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for repairs of roads and bridges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for support of poor for the ensuing year.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for town officers bills for the ensuing year.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 29, Public Laws 1937.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise money and what sum, for maintenance of State Aid highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to pay snow bills.
- Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise \$60.00 for electric lights.
- Art. 20. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$10.00 for public health work in Stow, said sum to be expended by the Bureau of Health, State Department of Health and Welfare, in co-operation with local authorities.
- Art. 21. To see what disposal the town will vote to make of any money received of the Federal Reserve during the present fiscal year, such money must be used for schools or roads to comply with the law.
- Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying the indebtness of the town, such notes to be paid during the current municipal year by taxes.

- Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to give a two per cent discount on taxes paid before July 1, 1949.
- Art. 24. To see if the town will vote for one-half of all orders drawn after June 1, 1949, to be turned in on taxes until paid.
- Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to dispose of any property acquired through tax deeds or liens.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise money and how much for the care of the Stow Corner Cemetery and the Emerson Cemetery.
- Art. 27. To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of (\$25.00) twenty-five dollars to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 80, Section 95, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.
- Art. 28. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town House on Monday, the seventh day of March, 1949, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to revise the list of voters. Given under our hands at Stow,

Report of Superintendent of Schools

You will note several changes in the report. If you wish an itemized list of expenditures under textbooks and supplies I will be glad to continue the practice and the same practice may hold for the repair account. The school committee sees all of the bills in these accounts and approves their payment. It seems to me that such lists are just added printed matter in the report. The secondary tuition account often appears quite an expense to the town, but the state reimburses the town for two thirds the cost of tuition up to \$1,000 and you will note from the budget plans that on this basis secondary tuition is a minor item in the total school expense.

You have a very fine school. The school committee has had the walls and ceiling decorated which makes the room lighter and much more attractive. Plans should be made to have a new ceiling in the near future.

I have found Mrs Andrews very cooperative and the success of your school is mostly due to her interest and industry.

This year your school program has had the added cost of conveying the Butters children to the North Fryeburg school. These children are transported by Horace Gray at a cost of \$4 a week.

Your school enrollment at the present time is as follows:

Can you visualize this?

A school room with several groups working industriously in different parts of the room. A group of sub-primary children in a small entry space playing with blocks, dolls and cars; they had just finished a reading class. A group of two first graders at the blackboard working on number facts. A third grader was having a flash card drill with his teacher. The fourth grade children were really working; they were making a microphone to use during their English class. At a large table were four children from grades six, seven and eight, and they were studying social studies. You should have seen all of the books those children were using to solve the problems they found in their study outlines.

This might not seem like a school to many who attended the conventional formal school, but I like it. You should have spent an hour with me. The microphone was finished and a radio program was put on. The program involved oral and written expression, music and reading, and woven into all of this was co-operation, industry leadership, politeness and a democratic way of life which we all hope to see developed to the fullest extent.

The above is only a part of what took place in an hour visit. I hope it pleases you as much as it does me. It is a school that develops considerably more than the Three R's.

Annual Report of Public Health Nursing Service

STOW-1948

Fifteen school children had their hearing tested by the public health nurse with the Audiometer.

Thirty-seven visits were made by the public health nurse to infants and pre-school children for the purpose of instructing the mothers and to urge them to follow their doctor's advice in regard to immunization, Cod Liver Oil, diet and general good health measures.

Twenty-five visits were made to the homes of school children with physical defects in order to interest the parents in follow-up work with the family doctor, or to secure attendance at specific clinics to which their doctor referred the child.

There are still many health problems in the community. Perhaps next year will bring about their solution with the aid of the people in the community at large. We need to plan for a physical examination for the school chidren, and conduct some Child Health Conferences, so that the new babies and young children may enjoy the privilege of a physical examination and immunization against the communicable diseases.
