#### TOWN WARRANT

To Francis E. Hayes, a Constable of the Town of North Yarmouth, in the County of Cumberland.

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of North Yarmouth qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House, in said town, on Monday, the fourteenth day of March, 1927, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles to wit:

- Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
  - Art. 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To hear and act on the report of the Town Treasurer, Selectmen, Overseers of the Poor and Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 4. To hear and act on the report of the North-Yarmouth School Fund Trustees and vote how the money shall be expended.
- Art. 5. To hear and act on the report of the Cemetery Commission.
- Art. 6. To receive accounts against the town and raise money for such as may be allowed.
- Art. 7. To choose all such officers as required by law to be chosen in the month of March, annually.
- Art. 8. To choose a Cemetery Commission for five years.

- Art. 9. To raise money for the support of Schools as follows: Common schools, text books, repair of school houses, appliances, apparatus and other school supplies. Music and high school tuition.
- Art. 10. To raise money for the repair of roads, snow roads, bridges and culverts, for the support of poor, payment of town officers, cemeteries, cutting bushes and contingencies.
- Art. 11. To elect one or more Fire Wards; also to designate one Fire Ward as Inspector; fix the compensation and raise a sum of money for the same.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 13. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provision of Section 18, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will join the State Highway Commission in making a sum of \$50.00 to be used in grading the patrol road.
- Art. 15. By petition of L. F. Smith and others. To see if the town will vote to buy a road machine or what action they will take in that line, and raise money for the same.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to hire a tractor to break snow roads on the main roads in town.

- Art. 17. To see what action the town will take in regard to the following article: To the inhabitants of the Town of North Yarmouth, County of Cumberland, State of Maine, by its committee, E. G. Hayes, A. L. Dunn and H. N. Sweetsir, acting for and in behalf of said North Yarmouth Memorial Highway of said town, hereby recommend that the care of said highway be placed in the hands of North Yarmouth Cemetery Commission, and the money in our hands be paid over to the Town Treasurer and the income of said fund apply for the improvements of said highway, in accordance with the provisions and purposes of the by-laws of the North Yarmouth Cemetery Commission, and that he be authorized to receive and add future donations to said fund. That this provision take place on or before Jan. 1, 1928.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.
- Art. 19. To fix the price of men and horses per day, and all town officers not fixed by law.
- Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to buy a Collector's and Treasurer's bond.
- . Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to discount taxes or take any action thereon.
- Art. 22. To see what instruction the town will give the Selectmen and Treasurer to meet liabilities which might arise during the ensuing year.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the voting list in said town, and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons desiring to have their names entered upon the voting list at the town house at nine o'clock, in the forenoon, on day of said meeting.

Hereof fail not to make due return to one of us, on or before day of said meeting.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee and Citizens of North Yarmouth:

Herewith I submit my second annual report of the schools of the town of North Yarmouth.

Teachers. With the beginning of the fall term Mrs. Evelyn Huston entered upon her third year in the Dunn school, her total experience amounting to fourteen years in school work. This is Mrs. Hayes' second year in Walnut Hill school, and her fifth year of teaching experience. Both Mrs. Huston and Mrs. Hayes are among their neighbors and friends and need no words from me as to their faithfulness in their respective positions. It may be said that for the salaries they receive considering their experience only "home" teachers can be considered.

After two years in the Buxton school Miss Viola Baston resigned at the close of the spring term to enter upon the larger field of home making. Miss Bessie Small of Portland, a graduate of Gorham Normal school, was appointed to this position. Miss Small came to Buxton highly recommended by her teachers and, I am glad to say, is fulfilling our expectations. Of the four teachers in town she is the only normal graduate.

Miss Cora Fox came to the Hicks school in September, Mr. Curtis Hughes resigning after two terms, at the close of the spring term. Miss Fox came to this position with exceptionally favorable credentials. While not a normal school graduate she has had three summer terms of normal training and eight years teaching experience.

In point of numbers this is the most difficult position in town, and it was considered wise to employ an assistant on part time. Miss Myra Chadbourn was so employed for several weeks, when, her health failing, Miss Florence Richards was assigned to the position. Miss Richards, after graduating from North Yarmouth Academy in June, attended Gorham Normal school during the summer, and is demonstrating much natural ability as a teacher. The Hicks neighborhood is certainly to be congratulated upon the efficient leadership of Miss Fox and her enthusiastic assistant. The spirit of this room of forty odd pupils of all grades from sub-primary to eighth inclusive is nothing short of marvelous.

Music. Much to the regret of all interested parties Mrs. LeGrow resigned her position as supervisor of music at the close of the spring term. Too much credit cannot be accorded Mrs. LeGrow for the pioneer work she did for musical instruction throughout the union. It was a pleasure to observe her conducting a class exercise. She was unusually popular with both teachers and pupils.

This is not an easy position to fill owing to the fact that there is much expense involved in the matter of transportation. Local candidates, only, can be considered for this reason. During the summer we had only two applications for the place, and after careful consideration, Mrs. Esther Rowe of Portland was elected on the basis of bi-weekly visits to the schools. It should be understood that this half-time plan was inaugurated solely as a measure of economy.

Mrs. Rowe came to our schools with a special training for supervisory work, and, I am pleased to say is maintaining the former high standard in this department.

The place of music in the public schools is well established. It may be said most emphatically that musical instruction in school is not a "fad" or "frill". The ability to sing adds to the joy of life. There is a truly

uplifting influence in the understanding and appreciation of good music. It was Horace Mann or some other notable educator of his class who said that anyone that was not able to sing should not attempt to become a teacher. This is a strong statement but it is plainly evident that if musical instruction is to meet with even a fair degree of success in the rural schools, one of the first characteristics to be considered in the selection of teachers is the ability to teach this important subject. It is this ability on the part of the regular teacher that will make supervision profitable and I may say successful.

Attendance. The importance of a high standard of attendance has been stressed throughout the year. The records show an encouraging gain in this particular. In any case there is little excuse for tardiness, and, barring illness, absence approaches the inexcusable. Here is a fundamental life lesson for the individual to learn, and the school is a good place in which to begin the practice of punctuality and regularity in attendance upon one's duties. The school register reflects unmistakably the spirit of the school. Here the home influence is most decidedly felt.

Buildings. It is well understood that the physical surroundings of the child at school have a direct bearing upon his educational progress. Every reasonable effort should be made in order that the children shall have a pleasant school home, well lighted with comfortable furniture, clean and attractive. To this end the interior of both the Hicks and Walnut Hill buildings need immediate attention. The walls and ceiling are dingy and out of repair. The budget that will be presented to the citizens at the next annual meeting includes these two items, also an estimated amount for painting the Buxton building. The fences about the Dunn and Walnut Hill

lots are in need of repair also. It is to be hoped that all the buildings can be equipped with electric lights in the near future, which will add greatly to the efficiency of the schools.

Conclusion. I wish to express genuine appreciation for the hearty co-operation I have received from the School Committee and teachers. The earnest purpose of all for the good of the schools has rendered our relations most happy. For this delightful attitude I wish to thank you all.
