TOWN WARRANT

To Henry H. York, a Constable of the Town of North Yarmouth, in the County of Cumberland,

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of North Yarmouth, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said Town, on Monday the thirteenth day of March, A.D. 1944, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
 - Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To hear and act on the reports of the Town Treasurer, Assessors, Selectmen, Overseers of Poor, and Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 4. To hear and act on the report of North Yarmouth School Fund Trustees, and vote how the money shall be expended.
- Art. 5. To hear and act on the report of the Cemetery Commission.
- Art. 6. To receive accounts against the Town, and raise money for such as may be allowed.
- Art. 7. To choose all such officers as required by law to be chosen in the month of March annually.
- Art. 8. To choose a Cemetery Commissioner for five years.

- Art. 9. To elect one or more Fire Wards, also to designate one Fire Ward as Inspector, fix compensations, and raise money for same.
- Art. 10. To raise money for the Support of Schools as follows: Common Schools, Text Books, Repairs, Supplies, High School Tuitions, Insurance, School Contingent and Electric Lights.
- Art. 11. To raise money for the repair of roads as follows: Town Roads, Snow Roads, Bridges and Culverts, Cutting Bushes on Town Roads, State Aid Road, Third Class Road, Support of Poor, Town Officers, Cemeteries, Contingencies, Interest, Aid to Dependent Children, and Civilian Defense
- Art. 12. To see if the Town will join with the State Highway Commission in raising the sum of \$50.00 in grading the Patrol Road.
- Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to buy a Tractor, and raise money for same.
- Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to buy a V Plow and raise money for same.
- Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to buy a School Bus and raise money for same.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for maintenance and re-surfacing the Third Class Highway as per law.
- Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$200 to cooperate with the Maine Forest Service and the Federal Government in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust in accordance with Revised Statutes, Chapter 11, Secs. 62-63-64.

- Art. 18. To see whether or not the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$25.00 to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.
- Art. 19. To fix the price of Men, Teams, Trucks, per day, and all Town Officers not fixed by law.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the services of the Nurses of the Cumberland County Public Health Association.
- Art. 21. To see if the Town will instruct the Selectmen and Treasurer to enter into an agreement with the men working for the Town to deduct 50% of all their orders, to apply on taxes, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town to sell or dispose of any Real Estate acquired by the Town, for non-payment of taxes thereon, or otherwise at such terms as they deem advisable, and execute quit claim deed for such property.
- Art. 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes, for the purpose of paying obligations of the Town, such loan or loans to be paid during the current year out of money raised during said municipal year by taxes.
- Art. 24. To see if the Town will vote to buy a Treasurer's and Collector's bond for the ensuing year.
- Art. 25. To see if the Town will vote to discount taxes or take any action thereon.
- Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote to set a time when taxes of 1944 shall be paid.

- Art. 27. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for Fire Protection or take any action thereon.
- Art. 28. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$50.00 for Public Health Nursing in North Yarmouth, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local service.
- Art. 29. To see what action the Town will take towards repairing the Town House, and raise money for same.
- Art. 30. To see what action the Town will take towards enforcing and collecting the back Personal and Poll Taxes.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the voting list in said town and hearing and deciding upon applications of persons desiring to have their names entered on the voting list at the Town House at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

Hereof fail not to make due return to one of us on or before the day of said meeting.

REPORT OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE, 1943

Public health nursing is part of the whole community health, medical and educational. The public health nurse is responsible for recognizing health problems and related social problems of families and indiv duals and for assisting them to formulate and carry through plans for the protection and promotion of their own health.

What a child needs for health and growth is to be well born. Being well born depends on the health of the mother during prenatal period and upon the child's being born safely. Visits were made during the year to expectant mothers to assist them in carrying out their physicians' instructions, to provide the patient with general information as to diet, personal hygiene, and to assist the patient in making arrangements for a eleand after care. To develop good health habits, the baby should from the first have regular hours for eating, sleeping, sunshine and play, but the schedule should be flexible and adjusted to his individual needs.

Three well child conferences were held this year. Children under six years of age were given a complete physical examination. Immunization against diphtheria and smallpox were offered at the conference.

Homes were visited by the public health nurse to advise parents regarding the care of their children and to demonstrate to them how much care may be given. Protection from communicable disease depends upon the extent to which the community cooperation in recognizing and securing treatment of early symptoms.

An important function of the public health nurse is the crippled children's program with facilities for locating crippled children and giving them medical, surgical, hosp tal and after care services, to aid in their physical restoration and social readjustment.

I wish to express my appreciation also to all other individuals who have assisted with the program, especially the busy physician. It is to be hoped that the health work will be increased during the coming year.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

It gives me a great deal of pleasure to present to you my second annual report as your Superintendent of Schools. This year has shown to me, and to those of you who are vitally interested in the welfare of your children and their education, what can be accomplished when grades and children of about the same ages are segregated and each teacher has a fewer number of grades with which to work. Divisions can be made and those whose work seems to come a bit slower can have an opportunity to work more at his own speed and obtain from the teacher individual help. Every school in our Town has shown a marked improvement in the amount of work accomplished and the grade of work done.

Your Superintending School Committee found itself confronted with a very difficult problem at the beginning of school last fall, that of an increased enrollment of about forty pupils. (We have averaged thirty-four the entire year). This problem presented the following fact, that two of our buildings must house over fifty children. This in itself was an impossibility, also, at least twenty-five of the new pupils must be transported. After careful study it was found, that a graded system could be set up with the same amount of transportation which must be required and to leave the lower grades in most cases, at their own school. The results of the above arrangement can be easily seen. New books have been purchased, seats for thirty or more have been bought, and additional cars have been secured for transportation. These extra expenditures have been caused, to a large degree, by our increased enrollment. Next year will be even larger, which brings us face to face with our major problem—transportation. I believe the most satisfactory and economical solution to this is the purchase of a suitable school bus. The need is apparent and should be settled once and for all. I believe it is possible to obtain a bus through the Office of Defense Transportation and if voted at your annual meeting, I will attempt to obtain this type of conveyance. Much credit is due the ladies and gentlemen who have attempted this huge task of carrying the children to and from our schools. The great expense has been more on the individual owners than on the Town as cars cannot be replaced at this time. I am sure our taxpayers and parents will give this consideration and support.

The overdraft is caused entirely by the cost of textbooks, new seats, increase in cost of fuel and additional transportation. Again may I remind you that forty additional children have been entered since last June. Our private cars are traveling a total of 173 miles daily at their owners' expense, exclusive of wages.

I wish to urge our parents and friends to visit the schools, cooperate with the teachers concerning absences, homework, and above all be mindful of the fact that when we again return to normal living, an education will be a priceless treasure.

We are very fortunate in having our present staff of teachers. They are loyal, interested, and well prepared for their work.

Only the necessary repairs to the school buildings have been made. Each schoolhouse was thoroughly cleaned. It will be necessary to do painting at several school houses in the near future.

The increased budget is to care for reasonable teacher increases, additional conveyance, and increased tuition cost. The last, being a compliment to our schools as more of our boys and girls are remaining in high school.

I am reasonably sure that our present overdrafts will be met by Federal Maintenance and Operation Funds for which our Town is eligible due to increased enrollment in defense areas.

MISCELLANEOUS

The school financial records are closed twice a year. The accounts are balanced and closed in February for the Annual Town Meeting and also in June for the State Reports.

In order that the school costs published in the Town Report may correspond with State Report figures the following school costs cover the school year beginning July, 1942 and ending June, 1943.

In the Town of North Yarmouth the children are being housed, educated, and in some cases transported at the following per pupil costs:
