## TOWN WARRANT

---

To Lester F. Smith, a constable of North Yarmouth, in  
the County of Cumberland,

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of North Yarmouth qualified by law to vote in Town affairs to meet at the Town House, in said Town, on Monday, the 13th day of March, A D. 1933, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To hear and act on the report of Town Treasurer, Selectmen, Overseers of Poor and Superintendent of Schools.

Art. 4. To hear and act on the report of the North Yarmouth School Fund Trustees and vote how the money shall be expended.

Art. 5. To hear and act on the report of the Cemetery Commission.

Art. 6. To receive accounts against the Town and raise money for such as may be allowed.

Art. 7. To choose all such officers as required by law to be chosen in the month of March annually.



Art. 8. To choose a Cemetery Commission for five years.

Art. 9. To elect one or more fire wards, also to designate one Fire Ward as Inspector, fix the compensation and raise money for the same.

Art. 10. To raise money for the support of schools, as follows: Common schools, text books, repair of school-houses, appliances, apparatus and all other school supplies, music and high school tuition, insurance and school contingent.

Art. 11. To raise money for the repair of roads, snow roads, bridges and culverts, for the support of poor, payment of Town officers, cemeteries, cutting bushes and contingencies.

Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the Town to State Aid as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 13. To see if the Town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the Town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Chapter 25, Section 18 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the Town for State Aid highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State apportionments.

Art. 15. To see what sum, if any, the Town would recommend to take from the joint State Aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to

State Aid roads built within the past five years in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 271, P. L. 1931.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will join the State Highway Commission in raising the sum of \$50.00 to be used in grading the Patrol road.

Art. 17. To see what sum the Town will raise for maintenance and resurfacing the Third Class highway, as per State law.

Art. 18. To see what action the Town will take on cutting and removing bushes on State and Third Class highways as per law.

Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to buy snow fence and raise money for the same.

Art. 20. To see if the Town will cooperate with the State in controlling the White Pine Blister Rust in North Yarmouth and raise money for same.

The State guarantees to add fifty per cent. to the amount raised by the Town, the total sum to be used on eradication work.

Art. 21. To fix the price of men, horses and trucks per day and all Town officers not fixed by law.

Art. 22. To see what sum the Town will raise for maintenance, and resurfacing the Special road as per law.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the services of the nurses of Cumberland County Public Health Association.

Art. 24. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen and Treasurer to enter into an agreement with the men working for the Town to deduct 25 per cent. of all their orders to apply on their taxes.

Art. 25. To see if the Town will vote to choose a Budget Committee of fifteen, ~~no member of which shall be a Town Officer or pay a tax of less than \$60.00.~~

Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote to have all the roads in North Yarmouth named.

Art. 27. To see if the Town will vote to release Ansel L. Dunn and Frances E. Hayes from the amount due on taxes committed to them to collect, or take any action thereon.

Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer to release and convey any title the Town may have in any real estate sold for taxes on settlement of said taxes in any way satisfactory to the Board of Selectmen.

Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying indebtedness of the Town, such notes to be paid during the current municipal year out of money raised during said current municipal year by taxes.

Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum to purchase a school bus for the purpose of transporting school children in conjunction with the establishment of a Grammar school.

Art. 31. To see if the Town will vote to buy a Collector's and Treasurer's bond.

Art. 32. To see if the Town will vote to discount taxes and to charge interest on same after Oct. 1 or take any action thereon.

*Handwritten notes*  
Art. 33. To see what action the Town will take in joining Yarmouth to protect the North Yarmouth Town landings in the Town of Yarmouth and raise money for same.

Art. 34. To see if the Town will vote to set a time when the taxes of 1933 shall be paid.

Art. 35. To see if the Town will vote to have the Town books audited for the ensuing year.

Art. 36. To see what action the Town will take in authorizing the Cemetery Commission to use the interest of the General Fund of the Cemeteries from year to year for the improvement of the yard.

Art. 37. To hear and act on the report of the Selectmen, Town Treasurer and Town Clerk on revising the Jury box.

Art. 38. To have the records of said meeting read and adopted.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the voting list in said Town and hearing and deciding upon the applications of persons desiring to have their names entered upon the voting list at the Town House at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

Hereof fail not to make due return to one of us on or before day of said meeting.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

---

To the School Committee and the Citizens of the Town of  
North Yarmouth:

I herewith submit the annual report of the public schools in North Yarmouth for the year ending February, 1933.

### TEACHERS

The teachers throughout the length and breadth of this land are sympathetic to the tax situation. They have responded heroically to the tax burden on real estate by accepting cheerfully reductions in their salaries. They as usual are setting worthy examples. Teachers are imbued with the spirit of service and they willingly render that service wherever needed.

### RELATIVE VALUES

The world is confused but it must steady itself to preserve its quality. Composure is essential to any balanced consideration of relative values. It will be unfortunate if our most worthy endeavors suffer while many rather useless undertakings continue to sap the life from our credit system. Let us think before we act. Let us evaluate before we decide.

Public Education is one of the most cherished American institutions. The very foundations of our representative form of government rest upon the theory of an

enlightened citizenry. Horace Mann, a pioneer in American Public Education, stated, "Public Education under our form of government is not optional, it is obligatory."

### EDUCATION AND TAXES

It is the obligation of the teaching profession in America in conjunction with the various school committees to plan and carry out a progressive and sound educational program for the youth of our land. This they have done during the past ten years in a broader and better way than ever in the history of our country. As a consequence it has become the ambition of practically every parent with children of school age that their children have the desire and opportunity to complete the course of Public School Education through the high school.

Educators have been reluctant to specify ways and means by which funds should be raised and appropriated for educational purposes. That obligation rests primarily with the lay public. However, our credit system is being tapped at so many points for so many unnecessary undertakings that it may be imperative to unite forces to insure that the children continue to get the use of a fair share of our national income for educational purposes.

All the costs of Public Education—elementary and secondary—in the United States total only 2.97% of the National income. It might be well to call to the attention of the public that all of the funds used for Public Education get back into the channels of business at once. Large sums are not accumulated from the meager salaries paid to teachers. It is interesting to note that for every dollar of credit allotted for educational use, \$5.10 is allotted for the purchase of automobiles—much of this consumed in changing styles and much permanently withdrawn from local communities.

It would seem poor practice that over 80% of all

school support should come from property taxes levied in local communities. Part of this support from a Sales Tax would relieve real estate and thus protect the home.

#### SCHOOL BUILDING ARE NOT LUXURIOUS

School Union No. 13 is very favorably located. It is composed of the Towns of North Yarmouth, Cumberland, Falmouth, and Cape Elizabeth. In these towns 15 of the 25 school buildings have no cellars; these 15 are exposed to the elements on all sides and are heated by wood stoves; the other 10 are assets in the communities in which they are located.

The buildings in this town have been kept in repair during the fiscal year ending March, 1933, at a cost per pupil of 68.4 cents. How does this compare with the repair bill on your home per person housed therein?

#### MISCELLANEOUS

In the Town of North Yarmouth the elementary children are being housed, educated, and in some cases transported at a total yearly cost per pupil of \$45.49; a daily cost of 25.2 cents; an hourly cost of 3.6 cents. How do these costs compare with the costs of other services for which you have to pay?

The present number of elementary pupils per teacher is 26.5.

## CENTRAL GRAMMAR SCHOOL

At sometime in the near future the schools of North Yarmouth should be consolidated so as to form a grammar school for grades 7 and 8 and possibly grade 9. If grade 9 is included the high school tuition for that grade would be saved and that would help finance the establishment of the grammar school. This year that item of tuition would equal between \$1,000 and 1,250.

Consolidation on the above basis would provide three schools with grades from 1 to 6 and one school for grades 7, 8, and 9. Decreasing the number of grades per teacher increases the length of the recitation periods.

A transportation bus, starting at the Dunn School and going to the Hicks School, then to the Walnut Hill School, then to the Buxton School and return, could easily convey the children.

The new arrangement next September would be as follows—(exclusive of entering sub-primary class):

Buxton School, 30 (including Walnut Hill grades 1 to 6).

Hicks School, 32 (including Dunn grades 1 to 6).

Walnut Hill School, 43 (including all in grades 7, 8, and 9).

Dunn School, (closed temporarily).
