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Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Committee & Citizens of the Town of Bowdoinham In this my first annual report, I shall attempt to cover only that part of the school year which has passed since July 1, 1920 when I assumed the position.

It has been my aim to acquaint myself with your schools and the economic conditions of your town so that harmony and understanding might prevail between this office and the other municipal officers. Only by a full and frank discussion and explanation of ideas and conditions may the best good of the child, who, first and last, must be the object of the machinery of education, be served. In this as in all municipalities, I believe, the citizens are ready and more than willing to provide the best opportunities for the coming generation that economic conditions will permit.

The administration of public education today cannot be made a money-saving process. If it were it would be best to turn education over entirely to private agencies, and thus save the entire expense. On the contrary the proper administration of public education with us today calls for the intelligent expenditure of as large an amount of public money as the community can afford As the late Governor has said, "Our expenditures must be meas used by our available funds." As new needs arise this amount must be increased and the scope of the school system must be extended. The amount of money expended must also be increased to meet the rising costs of all kinds of service, supplies, and material, and to satisfy the public demand for a better and more sanitary type of equipment for the schools.

HIGH SCHOOL

It is common knowledge that at a special town meeting the agricultural department of the high school was abolished. This necessitated some changes in the course of study.

At the beginning of the year Mr. F. H. Aikins was employed as Principal and teacher of Agriculture on the year round hasis.

Miss Mary Hall was employed as First Assistant and Miss Esther Pearson as Second Assistant. Mr. Aikins resigned twice and finally left the state. At the beginning of the winter term the courses were changed. A good course in bookkeeping was introduced. We were fortunate in that Miss Hall was well equiped to handle the subject. We believe that by the rearrangement no credit will be lost by any student who takes conditions as he finds them and goes ahead with the intention to do his best.

Mr. Stephen P. Gould of Rockland was secured as Principal. The services of the Second Assistant were dispensed with.

It is as yet too early to state that the change is entirely satisfactory. No doubt there are still changes to be made. Rome was not built in a day. Neither can a high school course be made over in a few weeks and be conducted in such a manner as will give perfect satisfaction to everyone. Such matters require time and patience for trial and adjustment.

Thus far there seems to be much satisfaction expressed. This is very largely due to the manner in which the students have acquitted themselves during the difficult weeks of readjustment.

At Present the school is in Class A. and is certified by the New England College Entrance Board.

Every effort should be made by parents to continue their students through the high school.

GRADE SCHOOLS

AND REPORTED SAME A SAME

The year opened with the following teachers: Grades I & II Miss Hattie Andros, Grades III, IV & V Miss Gladys Raymond Grades VI, VII & VIII Miss Christine Scott. There have been no changes as yet. The grades are following the State Course of Study and are up to standard. In one case there was a request for a change of method by one of our citizens. The instance was brought to my attention and believing the method then used was satisfactory I directed the teacher to continue. In this case the criticism was carried to the Selectmen instead of to the School

Committee or the Superintendent.

RURAL SCHOOLS

Work in all of the rural schools is along the lines of the State Course of Study and meets minimum requirements.

BISHOP

The year began at the Bishop with Miss Mildred Millay as teacher. Miss Millay resigned at the end of the eleventh week in order to take another position. Mrs. Ethel Temple finished the term. Miss Grace Brawn was employed for the winter and spring terms.

JELLERSON

The fall term was taught by Miss Florence Small who resigned at the end of the term. Miss Cora Lewis of Augusta is now employed.

RIDGE

The Ridge School is under the charge of Miss Helen Hackett Good progress has been made. A School Improvement League has been formed. This league may do much for the betterment of the school. It has been brot to my attention that the League has received the gift of ten dollars from a former citizen whose name is unknown to me.

MILLAY

The Millay School is being taught by Miss Louise Jones who was retained from last year. Miss Jones is an excellent teacher. After having taken even one term of summer school work at Farmington she is well equipped for rural school work and is giving excellent satisfaction. Her project work in Arithmetic is especially commendable.

Better preparation of teachers for the rural schools is the most vital need of the public school system of Maine. Schools in the rural communities should be made inviting and so efficient that the pupils will measure up educationally with the students in city and village schools. The teacher must be trained not only in the methods of teaching but she must have a knowledge of the rural problems and be willing to expend the energy necesary to solve those problems. She must be not only academically and pedagogically prepared, but also interested in the social and home life of the rural people. She must be a good administrator, teacher, disciplinarian, community leader, and should possess the qualities which will change the monotony which generally surrounds the rural school into living interest.

Text Books

books on agricultural subjects have been purchased. Some new histories for grade six were necessary. We are now short on grammars and supplementary readers. A series of community and project maps have been purchased to be used in connection with geography and history. These maps begin with the town and neighboring towns and enlarge to cover the country and the world. New readers have been purchased from time to time to replace those worn beyond further use.

No supplies were on hand, therefore quite a large order for paper etc. was necessary.

There is no indication as yet of a reduction in the war price of school text books and supplies. The alleged shortage of print paper, which in reality does not exist, is given as the reason for the constantly upward trend in the price of books and paper.

Only such a quantity as will meet immediate needs has been purchased.

At the beginning of the year a large outlay for equipment was said to be necessary. This equipment was purchased and is now lying idle. It should bring a good price if sold.

REPAIRS

VILLAGE

We have been obliged to make several unexpected repairs. The west valley on the roof of the village building was found to be leaking. Upon examination it was found that the zinc was entirely rusted out. This condition entailed a considerable outlay for material and labor. The smoke-pipes of the furnace were found to be beyond further use and new ones were necessary. The crematory closets required new gratings, new fire-baskets and fire bricks. All these repairs, which were expensive, were unexpected but necessary to preserve or even to use the building. To make these and other necessary repairs there was available from the repair fund on August 1. \$90.29.

The building should be painted on the outside.

The arrangement of the building is such that boys and girls passing to the laboratory have to go through the boys' toilet. Boys and girls passing to the room designed for shop work must pass through the girls' toilet. This condition has existed since the building was constructed. It can be remedied at moderate expense by placing partitions with doors. It is the intension to do this as soon as funds are available.

We have much trouble with the pump. It has been broken twice this year. I advise buying two bubblers, one for each wing. This will obviate the necessity of children going outside the building for drinking water or of using the pump. The catalog price of a five gallon bubbler with stand is \$24.50.

It is our intention to have the water analyzed as soon as the pump is repaired.

BISHOP

It was necessary to patch the plaster in this building as it had fallen in several places. The lot should be fenced on three sides. If most of the trees and all of the underbrush on the lot were removed a play-ground would be available where there is now none.

A plank having been removed from the culvert, it is nearly impossible to enter the school property with any kind of a vehicle.

JELLERSON

No repairs have been made this year. It would be well when funds permit to change the position of some of the windows in order to admit more light. Some minor repairs are necessary.

RIDGE

This building requires some attention to the sills near the corner next the entrance. None but minor repairs have been made this year.

MILLAY

The town does not, as yet, hold title to the lot on which the Millay School house stands. Arrangements have been made whereby title will pass upon the payment of \$85 for an area of 180 feet square. This payment will be made as soon as funds are available.

Last fall we finished the repairs begun last year. The wall was built around the part left unfinished. The clapboards were renailed and the clapboarding finished on the south side. The pitch of the roof of the toilet is such that water will not run off but leaks into the toilets making them wet and unsanitary. This may be changed by lowering the eaves. After title to the lot is complete the lot will be fenced and gates will be hung.

ATTENDANCE

Attendance in general has been good. We have the most difficulty in the rural schools. This is a matter to which the parents should give thought and attention. An investment in the education of children pays the best dividends of any investment on earth. To allow a child to stay away from school when it is possible for the child to get to the school is a moral crime. It is

also a misdemeanor recognized by the law of the state. To keep a child from school that the child may work at home is an offense beyond pardon. Poverty is no excuse. Society condems it and the law proscribes it. Compulsory education needs no defense. Education is the greatest strength of a nation. Neglect a child and a faulty stone is built into the foundation of our republic. Neglect a community and a bog of mire is tolerated in the thoroughfare of human progress. A child has not the experence to know the value of an education until oftimes it is too late and many a parent is unable, on account of his own lack of knowledge, to hold the proper view-point. Even a parent, says the state, has no right to permit his child to grow up handicapped in his race in life.

To George E. Buker, a Constable in the Town of Bowdoinham, in the County of Sagadahoc.

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Bowdoinham, qualified to vote in Town affairs, to meet and assemble at the Town House in said Town on Monday, the seventh day of March A. D. 1921, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. I To choose a Moderator to preside over said meeting.
- Art. 2 To hear the reports of all town officers
- Art. 3 To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year
- Art. 4 To choose all other town officers except Collector, viz. three Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, Town Agent, one member of the School Board, Treasurer and other minor officers.
- Art. 5 To choose a Road Commissioner for the ensuing year
- Art. 6 To see what per centum the town will pay for the collection of its taxes
- Art. 7 To choose a Collector of Taxes
- Art. 8 To see what sum of money the town will raise for the ensuing year for:

Repair of Highways

' Bridges

' Sidewalks

Snow Bills 1920

For support of Poor

General Expense

Electric Lights

Common Schools

Text Books

Repair of School Houses

Conveyance of Pupils Free High School Memorial Day Soldier's Memorial Lot

Interest on A. Q. Randall Fund, \$131.84 Eliza Mustard Fund 100.57 Bonded Debt 140.00 Payment of Bond No. 10 500.00 Salaries Town Officers 350.00 Cutting and burning bushes

- To see if the town will vote to fix the compensation per hour to be allowed men, horses and oxen employed by the town on roads, sidewalks and bridges.
- Art. 10 To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in section 19 of chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533 for the improvement of the section of state aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways, and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of section 18, chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 12 To see if the town will vote to authorize its Selectmen and Treasurer to make temporary loans in anticipation of taxes
- Art. 13 To see if the town will vote to raise \$35 for Boys and Girls Agricultural Club work in this town, the same to be spent under the direction of the Selectmen
- Art. 14 To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of 2 per cent on all taxes paid in cash before August 1, 1921
- Art. 15 To see if the town will vote to raise \$500 for maintainance of State Highway
- Art. 16 To see if the town will raise \$200, or any amount to reduce the Mustard or Randall Fund notes, or to act anything relative thereto

Art. 17 To see if the town will appropriate \$15 for use of the R. P. Carr field as a ball and playground for the school children or act anything relative thereto

Art. 18 To see if the town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to sell the town farm and town team, or act anything relative thereto

Art. 19 To see if the town will vote to raise a certain sum of money to repair sidewalk on Bridge Street from permanent walk to Main Street, or act anything relative thereto

Art. 20 To see if the town will vote to raise \$200 to be expended in graveling the road near F. P. Webber's, or act anything relative thereto

Art. 21 To see what sum of money the town will raise to pay temporary deficiency now existing of about \$5600.

Art. 22 To see if the town will vote to choose any committees that the town may think necessary or transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
