Warrant for Town Meeting

To Ellis F. Blake, a constable in the town of Denmark, County of Oxford and State of Maine, greetings:

In the name of the Stale of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Denmark, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town on Monday, the second day of March, A. D. 1931, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon to vote upon the following articles to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the year ensuing.
- Art. 3. To choose a board of selectmen, assessors, overseers of the poor, auditor and treasurer for the year ensuing.
 - Art. 4. To choose a collector of taxes for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To choose a member of the superintending school committee for a term of three years.
- Art. 6. To choose one or more road commissioners for the year ensuing.
 - Art. 7. To choose one or more fire wards for the year ensuing.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will elect or authorize the selectmen to appoint a cemetery commission consisting of one or more persons, whose duties shall consist of earing for the cemeteries and burial lots including the graves of the old soldiers now in the care of the town, for the year ensuing.
- Art. 9. To choose all other necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- Art. 10. To vote the compensation of the tax collector for the year ensuing.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of the poor for the year ensuing.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the payment of town charges for the year ensuing.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of street lights for the year ensuing.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of roads and bridges for the year ensuing.

- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for payment of snow bills for the year ensuing.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to state aid as provided in Section 19, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money if any the town will vote to raise in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 154, Public Laws of 1917, as amended by Chapter 157 of the Public Laws of 1919, for the construction of a state aid highway through the towns of Hiram, Denmark and Bridgton, beginning at Hiram village at the Pequawket Trail, and extending in a northerly direction over the present designated state aid road to the Demark town line, thence in a northerly direction over Denmark state aid road, No. 2, to Denmark village, thence in an easterly direction over state aid, designation No. 1, to Pridgton town line, thence over Bridgton designated state aid road, to the state highway B in Bridgton village.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for the maintenance of state aid highways for the year ensuing under the provisions of Sections 9-18 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for the support of common schools for the year ensuing.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the repair of schoolhouses for the year ensuing.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the payments of school supplies and text books for the year ensuing.
- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of a free high school for the year ensuing.
- Art. 23. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of \$15.00 for the care of "soldiers" monument for the year ensuing.
- Art. 24. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of \$15.00 for Memorial Day observances for the year ensuing.
- Art. 25. To see if the town will vote that poll taxes be due and payable May 1st, under the provisions of Chapter 163 of the Public Laws of 1917.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money to meet the demands on the treasury when a deficiency occurs.

- Art. 27. To see if the town wishes to give a discount on taxes, if so, to fix the date and amount of discount on same.
- Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to raise \$45.00 toward the support of county public health nursing, under the State Department of Health, to continue work with mothers and school children.
- Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.
- Art. 30. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of \$633.00 for maintenance of the third class highway for the year ensuing.
- Art. 31. To see if the town will raise money to provide music in the schools.
- Art. 32. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for cutting bushes on the highways for the year ensuing.
- Art. 33. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for medical inspection of school children.
- Art. 34. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for repair of road leading from Frank Mitchell's to Jacob Merrifield's house.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town Bouse on Monday, the second day of March, 1931, at 9 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.



Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Denmark:

Herewith my eighth annual report of the progress, condition and needs of the schools of the Town of Denmark.

Schools opened on September 8, 1930. The following teachers were and are in charge.

East, Sadie Ingalls, Denmark.

Primary, Isabel Hughey, Lisbon Falls.

Grammar, Florence Sanborn, Denmark.

High, Principal, Walter K. Lindsey, Union.

High, Assistant, Katharine Rolfe, Bridgton.

It will be noted that there have been no changes of teachers. This is a very satisfactory situation when we have satisfactory teachers and we feel that our teachers are satisfactory. We would like to express, at this time, our appreciation for the courtesy, sincerity, skill and cooperation evidenced by all of our teachers.

No changes have been made in the courses of study. A new State Course of Study is being compiled by the State Department of Education, which will probably be ready for use next fall. At that time any necessary changes may be determined and put into effect.

Attendance has been excellent this year except in one or two cases. No epidemic of contagious diseases have appeared thus far.

MAINTENANCE

This year we have effected the following repairs and improvements. The East Denmark building was wired and equipped for electric service. The cost of this work was \$69.00. Of this amount \$25.00 was paid from the Cobb gift fund. The balance was paid from the Repair Account. Just a week or two before schools opened it was found that one of the chemical toilet tanks at the East building was aleak. The only thing that could be done was to have a new tank installed as these tanks cannot be mended to any extent. This was done at considerable cost, the bill for which has not yet been paid. This was an emergency which had to be attended to if the building was to be used in conformity with the law. At this building new flag equipment was set up.

The wiring in the boys play room in the basement of the village building was renewed with BX cable. One of the outside toilets was covered with roofing. The water system fails us at times and it appears necessary to keep these outbuildings in some sort of condition for temporary use.

It is hoped that this year we may be able to change the lighting arrangements in the village building as outlined last year. We have about \$50.00 of the Cobb Gift Fund which may be used towards defraying the expense. Minor upkeep work will be necessary, for instance, a new floor is needed on the entrance porch to the East building.

This year we had a larger enrollment in the grammar school than ever before. The room was so crowded that another emergency appeared. The partition between the school room and the library was in part removed. The books and shelves were taken from the library and placed in the laboratory. This takes up valuable space in the laboratory, already too small. However, we have more room in the grammar school than before. This room is not ideal in shape and size, but serves very well. There is a bill of \$27.55 outstanding against this work.

NOON LUNCH

The hot noon lunch has been served for years at the East School. This year the grammar school has taken on this feature. A small electric table stove was purchased through the Cobb Gift Fund. This matter of a warm dish with a pupil's dinner is a far cry from the stone cold school dinner remembered by some of us during our school days.

HEALTH WORK

We are unable, this year, to offer a report from the State Field Nurse. Mrs. Laura J. Best was engaged in this work until Thanksgiving, when she left her position to become Mrs. Dr. Fred Varney of Monson, Maine. All who knew Mrs. Varney will wish her happiness. She will be long remembered for skillful and sympathetic service. Her place was taken by Miss Elsic A. Anderson of Norway, who has just begun her work.

MUSIC

It appears that the work in Music holds its popularity both with pupils and parents. The town does well to support this excellent feature. The report of the Supervisor will be found below.

HIGH SCHOOL

A more complete report by the Principal follows. The High School still holds its classification of Class A. A visit by the Secondary School Agent last spring brought many comments as to the excellence of the housing and equipment of the High School. This year we have one non-resident student. This fact will bring in revenue in the form of tuition. As indicated by the present enrollment in the High School and in Grade Eight, there are 26 students who may attend the High School next year.

Principal's Report

Superintendent Charles A. Snow, Members of the School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Denmark:

I have the pleasure of presenting to you my fifth annual report relating to Denmark High School.

Denmark High School opened September 8, 1930, with a total enrollment of twenty-two. By the end of the fall term, four pupils had left. Two of them transferred to Fryeburg Academy. -This makes our present enrollment eighteen, two Seniors, seven Juniors, three Sophomores and six Freshmen.

Thus far in the work of the year we have been blessed with good health and very regular attendance. The general standing of the pupils is good. We have no delinquents on our records. Cooperation between the teachers and pupils is an established habit. All pupils are participating in some type of activity outside their regular work, viz: basket ball, league meetings, poster making, or school play.

It is a pleasure to have Mrs. Rolfe with us again this year. In addition to her regular work, she conducts the high school and primary school singing, under Mr. Hurd's direction. She also coaches the girls' basket ball team.

Our school calendar for the year 1930-31 records the following events: Dance and supper, given by the Athletic Association, a Hallowe'en party and a Christmas entertainment by the school during the fall term.

The Seniors and Juniors, with the assistance of one pupil from each of the other classes are working on the drama, "Clover Time." This play will probably be offered during the first of the spring term.

Sophomore and Freshmen Prize Speaking will come around the usual time. The High and Grammar Schools plan to present the cantata, "Lindy" under Mr. Hurd's direction.

Our girls have played four games of basket ball and have three more scheduled. They defeated the Casco girls and came within two points of winning from the Bridgton girls on Bridgton's floor. The boys have played six games of basket ball and have three more scheduled. They have scored no victories, but have played some fine games against strong competition.

The school has had the "Den-of Mark" and later the "Mount Pleasant Echo", an annual paper, published for the past three years. Each year a profit has been realized even though the cost of printing has been high. This has proven to have been a highly worthwhile project.

The library collection of reference books and fiction is being increased each year. Magazines such as the American Forestry Magazine, Nature Magazine, The National Geographic, World's Work, and Popular Science make valuable reference material to save for future usc. The above magazines, with the exception of Popular Science, have been gifts from friends of the school.

The Grammar School enrollment is larger this year than it usually is. More floor space was required than was before provided. This situation was remedied by removing the partition between the grammar school room and the Library. The shelves and books were then moved into the laboratory. Our laboratory has always been too small. Now, with the addition of the library equipment, we are more handicapped than ever. It would be a fine improvement if there could be a room partitioned off in the northeast corner of the basement for a new laboratory. This would not be a very expensive matter.

The water supply has been more satisfactory for our use than it has been in the past. We have taken every precaution possible to prevent the supply from being wasted. I am certain that we are all happy that the system has proven satisfactory in view of the expense involved.

The lighting problem has not been remedied as yet. We are obliged to face the glare of a group of lights installed in the center of the room which serve to cast shadows on whatever work we are doing at the desks. As the lights are required frequently in the winter, it is very essential that this situation be improved by the installation of proper fixtures.

It has been much easier to regulate the heating of the building this year. Check dampers have been installed in the hot air pipes and metal weather strips put on the windows of the grammar school and recitation rooms. The supply of dry wood is limited. At present it is necessary to burn some green wood. This works very well as the green wood will hold a better fire overnight.

Ranger George E. Spinney of Conway, N. H. (U. S. Forest Service) visits us every spring and gives an illustrated lecture on Forest Conservation. His lectures are enjoyed very much and we appreciate the efforts of our Superintendent, who has arrangeed these visits and

assists the Ranger with his lantern slides. We hope that an evening program on Forestry may be arranged this spring in order that the citizens of the town may be present.

In concluding, I want to extend our sincere thanks to the Superintendent and School Committee for their patience and loyal support and to the citizens for their generous assistance in making our school and school entertainments so successful.

Report of the Supervisor of Music

To the School Board and Citizens of Denmark, Greetings:

It is with pleasure that I await on you with the report of the condition and progress of the music in your schools.

Music is slow in developing and I have been able to establish the course in your town much quicker and obtained better results than I expected. My greatest effort has been to get the boys and girls to sing in perfect pitch and, with the help of the teachers, have succeeded to near the A mark.

I have also endeavored to infuse the pupils with a love for good music. We are getting results, and as the years go on, will get more. This is done by starting with the first grade and working up through the high school. Certainly the boys and girls of Denmark love to sing. Musical theory is not so important as results in singing and appreciation.

There were several appearances of the school chorus last year, the school play, prize speaking, and the class sermon.

The grammar room is preparing the cantata "Lindbergh" to be given at a date in the near future. We are fortunate in having the books without cost as a loan from the Fryeburg schools. The pupils in this room are having their first experience in part work and are enthusiasm personified.

At this place I wish to speak of the East Denmark school. The school is small, but it is a true example of accomplishment. Of the sixteen schools that I visit, it is here that I hear what I consider the ideal music lessons. They are lessons that I should be proud to have the most exacting critic hear; and work that I have been proud to report to the President of the Supervisors' Conference of the Educational Department of Maine.

It is a very difficult task to try and give you any idea of what we do in music in your schools. The best way is for you to come and hear the lessons, to see the machine as it works. This I can tell you, that your boys and girls are getting an appreciation of the best in music by actually indulging in it; building character and fitting themselves when they go out in the world to be able to compete with their fellowmen, who have been educated in larger towns and cities.

Education is no longer confined to the three "R's", but it is general. For a man or woman to compete with others now, he or she must have general information or knowledge. As the years go on, still more will be needed. Denmark can justly be proud of the advantages she is giving her future citizens, proud of the example she is setting. The example she has set is to be followed by one of our larger sister towns this year.

I close with this message. The torch has been thrown to you, hold it high and keep lighted with the fire of advantage and advancement for the boys and girls of Denmark.
