To the President of the Bank  
of Baltimore.

Dear Sir

On the part of Mr Pearce it is our duty to inform the Bank  
that differing as we do from the Board in the view they have  
taken of their responsibility for the defalcation of Richard S. Cox  
after their defalcations became known to the Bank, we have  
thought it desirable to refer the subject to the decision of  
a Court of Law, and in order that this may be done with  
the least trouble to the parties interested, and in a manner  
likely to insure a full and speedy adjustment of the point  
of difference between them by law, through you, to propose  
that suits on either side shall be docketed by counsel at  
the next term of the Court and that under <sup>the</sup> plea of the general  
issue all such matters shall be presented to the Court (without  
being given to the parties respecting interests) as shall bring  
up the entire merit of the question in controversy.
