My dear father

I found your kind letter laying on my desk when I came down to work this morning and having read it at it down to answer it.

I read the letter and approving the good advice you gave me and I intend to follow it in future I can tell a little about cotton and when we are shipping I can tell in 3 cases out of four which Brand is to be put on the Cotton.

Hitherto we have had breakfast at Uncle Pick's between half past eight & nine and so we don't get to work till late.

I do not have any thing to do hardly and can not fix things up much as Uncle Pick does not like to have his things troubled.

I am sorry to say that since I have been here I have thrown away about \$20 not a vestige of which remains it was spent in the following manner

died in 1787.

My dear Father

I received your kind letter <sup>Sunday</sup> Saturday and thought I would reply to it today. I wrote to Mama on the receipt of your letter and told her about all the news but I guess I can scrape enough more up to help you along and to fill up your letter.

In the first place the first seven bucke were laid in the foundation of the "Confederate monument" of this place and the corner stone is to be laid on Decoration day which is the twenty sixth of this month and it has been told me that the "Committee" were going to put the small sum of two million dollars under the cornerstone which if it is done will be the biggest piece of extravagance I ever heard of and what is more if they have that sum why do they not make a fine Monument with part of it and take the rest for the Poor or else the Missionaries or if they did not like that they could take it for their own separate uses or else may be they could give it to the Orphan Asylum, Hospital, or the best use yet, they could give it to the Tornado sufferers which would do both a great deal more good than putting it under any cornerstone would.

In the second I intend to "Christen" my "Chamois" skin pin on Confirmation day by writing mama a letter with the particulars of my half weeks exertions to the right path and then next Sunday may be next day I am going to give particulars of this the greatest event in my life and also I intend to wear my cravat which grand-ma sent me on the same day. Edward Butt is to be confirmed at the same time I am also Robert C. Lee and Joseph Sacre two friends of mine and add to this list Charles C. Hunt, who is also a friend of mine and a nice boy, and another boy whose name I forgot and you have a list of the boys to be confirmed in St. Paul church on Thursday night at 8 P.M.

Monday April 18<sup>th</sup>

I awoke up this morning and the sun was a little ways up in the sky and got my bottle and started up to Aunt Kitty's for milk for Ed and as I went by the market I found it was quarter to seven; I was a little behind time so I walked fast and reached home at twenty minutes past making a walk of about two miles in forty minutes before breakfast so I get plenty of exercise on that score.

After breakfast I walk up to the office, a distance of about three quarters of a mile and I generally stay there till half after one and come back at three and stay till Uncle Dick says I may shut up shop and then I go home for good that day.

Nothing much stirring this morning I do not think so I am in the office sitting still and writing.

We moved Saturday and this office we have come to is a very nice one because it has gas and water, which commodities our last office had not.

Our cow had a calf the other day and we are looking for milk.

I wrote to mama telling her that I would be confirmed and I think it is about time I should be as I am big enough and old enough and ugly enough to be so I've set my mind on it and so there is the end  
All are well here

P.S. I forgot to mention a boy in my list of the Confirmation class whose name is Frederick William Brum, he stays across the river in Flamborg which place is considered low by the people here though for what reason I do not know.

Dear Father

Saw Mr. H.

L. Patterson this morning, he says that there is no occasion to send in another application, that the one made before Barrett's death is still on the table.

All Officers have to be here to enter upon their duties on the 1st prox. so you had better keep yourself into close communication with Canon City so that if I send a special telegram it may be forwarded at once to you, even if it should take a special carrier. the election here is arranged in a very ugly manner, it comes off on Saturday the 16th, the Mayor is inaugurated Monday and Council meets Tuesday, of which Mr. P. is confident, as he has bolted the regular Democratic ticket

to benefit you, he is confident you will receive the appointment having both Mayor and Council on your side; if Britton, he proposes to bring other influence, keeping himself in the dark, and trust to that and the Council.

Oversoltz advised Rechtien to make the appointment himself, saying that in the event of his election he could trust to Mr. R's discretion that far, that no matter who was appointed there would be a howl, and he did not see why it should not come for one thing as well as another. Rechtien, however, declined the responsibility.

The only others proposed are Kelly, who declined, Southard, and Singleton, the former is a sub, whose experience is doubted, and the monument the latter raised to himself, in the present City Hall, is hardly a lasting or credit-






