on the Coast of Fla, which brings us a very high sea,

Relief is well organized here - at
a time like ours have had, which
is seldom - the whole force of
firemen turn out to assist in
saving property - And thus these

I suppose you will be going South, this Spring - I am thinking of taking a trip home myself, but am not sure that I can - I am hoping, that Clara, will come down for a short time, and if so will go back with her but she & Lewis are so interested in their little house that I do not know, if she will come -

It is very quiet here now, different from last winter, & scarcely any tourists, I suppose on account of the stringency in money - I see George Platt, and her daughter frequently - Lezlie is such a fine young woman, and I like her so much - Georgia has not been well - Will's wife is very pretty - & has a fine little girl - She is about your two years old - It is ~~but~~ ^{very} surprising how quickly she speaks English to the family, and from eight up, and talks to her nurse in Spanish - It is wonderful how these little people pick up a language -

I hope you are feeling better, and will be able to go South - Augusta is much changed, many old friends will be missed - Frank Miller is gone, and poor Julia alone - they have been a happy successful couple, and have lived a long time together -
