subscribed the following Oath; "I John H.
Cutler do solemnly swear, that I will not
directly or indirectly, during the period for
which I may receive a License to Retail
Spirituous Liquors; sell, give, exchange
barter, or in anywise deliver, any Spirituous
Liquors to any Slave or Slaves, contrary to
the true intent and meaning of the laws
for the preventing the selling or delivering
of Spirituous Liquors to Slaves.

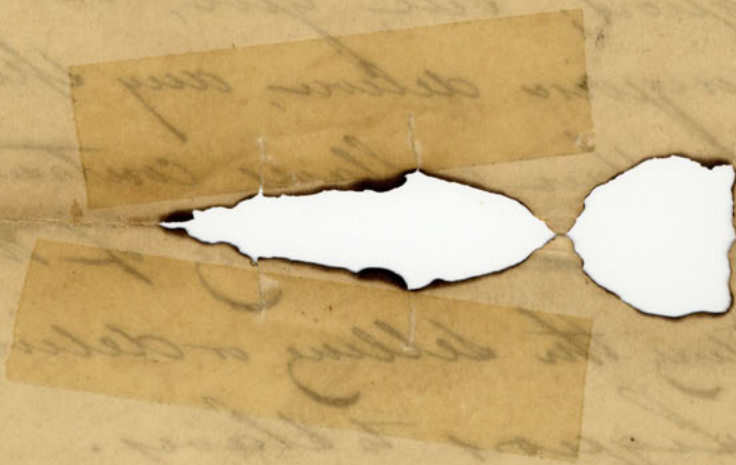
