Stowe Visits for 2nd Annual Tyson Lecture by John Lane

In October of 2010 I got off a plane in Hare, Zimbabwe and stepped onto the runway in the dark. I could smell fire all around me. The whole country was burning. A few hours later I'd driven east to Africa University and the smell of fire was with me the entire way.

As I drove I thought about how this smell—of a landscape burning is probably older than our species itself.

SC Department of Natural Resources biologist, outdoorsman, land manager, Johnny Stowe visited last week. He'd made it onto our short list for the Annual Tyson Family Lecture on Restoring and Preserving Southern Ecosystems early on.

Then, as if as a precursor to this last week's lecture one of my neighbors burned his lawn, as if the landscape was saying to me, Johnny Stowe is on his way.

Johnny talks about fire, but he's a true fire man— a scientist with the burning soul of a poet who quotes Aldo Leopold.

His time with us last week—at lunch, in class—proved that to be true.

On Thursday night he talked to us about the human and natural history of burning, something he's experienced, studied, and managed in the south for many years now.

He gave me insight into Zimbabwe and all of us insight into the long experience of human beings and fire—going back 80,000 generations—and he got me to look at my neighbor in a different light.

In any case I left his talk with new insight—into fire, into land, into what Faulkner said was worth considering, the human heart in conflict with itself.
