ENVS Guest Speaker Latria Graham



Dr. Telligman's ENVS 101 class recently visited Pacolet Heritage Preserve learning about place, history, and cultural and natural interaction over time.



On Wednesday, Environmental Studies welcomed Latria Graham to campus. Latria's a Spartanburg native who has become one of the country's most effective voices on environmental racism, cultural connections, and diversity in wildness. The event was also sponsored by the department of African/African-American Studies, the Dean of Diversity and Inclusion, and the Provost for Curriculum and Co-Curriculum – it was a real team effort.

Latria's risen to prominence partly on the strength of an article, published in Outside Magazine, entitled "We're Here, You Just Don't See Us." Many Environmental Studies students – maybe most – love hiking, camping, paddling, and other adventures in natural landscapes. We emphasize wilderness as a core part of our curriculum. But wilderness has often been a pretty segregated space, in public perception and in reality.

Latria's piece explores all this, and shows how things are changing, and may continue to change – she herself, like many African Americans, feels a deep connection to the land, and loves hiking and trail running. A new generation of African Americans is indeed exploring natural landscapes, and just as the rest of society is changing, so too are our trails and campgrounds.

In the visit, Latria met with Dr. Brewitt's freshman humanities class before heading out to Glendale. A good friend of John Lane, she is eager to participate in our long-term reflection project on the banks of the Lawson's Fork. In the evening, she gave a talk called *Taking the Long Way Home*, reading from her work and sharing her perspective and experiences with some fifty students. We are all looking forward to strengthening Latria's connection with Environmental Studies in the seasons to come.
