A THEATRE WITH A PURPOSE

The Department of Public Speaking at Otterbein College was organized in the fall of 1906. Since then 198 full-length major productions have been staged. A great portion of this activity has evolved recently for 72 of these shows have been presented since 1950.

This season, through our varied program, the Otterbein College Theatre will add to this already impressive record of theatrical activity, and strive to maintain its three-fold objective: ENTERTAINMENT, ARTISTIC AND CULTURAL APPRECIATION, and EDUCATION — both to its spectators and to its participants.

The Theatre program includes four major productions during the regular academic year, a Summer Theatre, an international Film Series, a Color Travel Film, a Children's Theatre production, a Touring Religious Drama Company, and several one-act plays directed by advanced students, in addition to extensive academic work in theatre drama, theatre history, interpretation, acting and technical theatre

All winter productions are given in Cowan Hall, a 1300 seat auditorium which is well supplied with the latest in modern equipment.

The Department of Speech and Theatre has approximately 75 majors in a student body of 1400. Otterbein students regularly usher for all professional theatre productions that come to Columbus, thereby seeing the shows free of charge.

MERCHANT OF VENICE

The first play of William Shakespeare's maturity, Mer*chant of Venice,* is a good tale, well told, and intro-duces two of the Bard's most famous stage characters, Portia and Shylock. The play's success is attributed to its well-knit plot which combines the story of Portia's wed-ding and Shylock's agreement to lend a sum of money on the condition that if the debt were not repaid by a certain date the debtor should forfeit a pound of his flesh.

WAITING FOR GODOT

Samuel Beckett is frequently described as one of the most modern and most controversial of today's theatre writers. Waiting for Godot is one of his most important works. The original production of this tragi-comedy starred Bert Lahr.

THE CRUCIBLE

Arthur Miller's exciting drama about the Puritan purge of witchcraft in old Salem is a combination of historical play and timely parable about parallel issues in our contemporary society. The production will feature a PRO-FESSIONAL GUEST ARTIST and a "town and gown" cast. Hans Conried, Ed Begley, Arnold Moss, Kim Hunter, Viveca Lindfors, and Albert Dekker have been seen in previous guest star shows. An artist of comparable stature will be cought will be sought.

Highlighting May Day week activities will be Rodgers and Hammerstein's Pulitzer Prize winning musical comedy about the navy in the south Pacific during World War II.
