Baseball field sees repairs, turf

The XU baseball team is looking forward to new improvements on its home field that will benefit both Xavier's baseball and the soccer stadiums.

This past year, a shed was added on the left field line.

In addition, the soccer field will be receiving new turf. The old turf from the soccer field will be transferred to the baseball field around the newly installed shed, and will likewise cover the gravel that currently surrounds the baseball diamond.


This replacement turf will enable the baseball team to better practice pitching and catching ground balls, especially when the field is too wet due to rain, allowing for more productive practices.

"Our facilities have gotten unbelievably better over the last year," redshirt junior pitcher Alex Vice said. "The new turf will add to that."

After the installation of the turf, there are no future plans for any additional changes to the baseball field according to Jim Bergen of the Physical Plant.

The team is currently 9-15 on the season after defeating Indiana University 11-3 last night in Bloomington, Ind. The Xavier baseball team opens Atlantic 10 conference play with a three-game home stint this weekend versus Charlotte. Games begin Friday at 3 p.m. and continue on Saturday at 1 p.m. and Sunday at 12 p.m. at

Xavier University has announced a budget of \$215,965,000 for the upcoming fiscal year, an increase of almost \$12 million from the last budget.

Most notably, financial aid for students will increase by 10 percent, the funds used to renew and replace facilities on campus will increase by \$1.5 million and salaries, wages and benefits will rise by almost \$3 million.

The budget, which was formally approved last month, emphasizes the need to focus on the people and the possibilities of the University. This includes an improvement in mobile technology and technology in the classroom.

The goals of the University are separated into three different categories of importance: mission critical, mission central and mission beneficial.

This year's budget is based predominantly on the "mission critical" issues the immediate opportunities that Xavier University has to take advantage of in the next 18 months to maintain a competitive advantage and the threats that have to be neutralized in that same time frame.

According to Provost and Chief Academic Officer Dr. Scott Chadwick, the budget is full of "new initiatives and great ideas to implement."

Chadwick believes that this year's budget reflects the University's aims to build an intellectual community with possible faculty/student research and likewise form international relationships with universities outside of the United States.

"I have great confidence in the faculty, staff and students at Xavier University and I am pleased with the way that our budgeting process increasingly relies on their good ideas," Chadwick said.

Tuition prices will be increasing for the forthcoming year by around 3 percent, a lower rate than other private schools in the area such as Thomas More College, who will increase their tuition by around 4 percent.

Almost, Maine a success with audiences

"Almost, Maine, a small town in northern Maine that doesn't quite exist...." Is the setting for this past weekend's Xavier Players' show Almost, Maine. This show, written by John Cariani, consists of eight 15-minute segments interconnected by the location of this unincorporated Maine village. As noted in the playbill, each story "takes place at nine o'clock on a cold, clear, moonless, slightly surreal Friday night in the middle of the deepest part of a northern Maine winter."

The play opens with two young lovers, Pete and Ginette, sitting on a bench looking at the stars. Their short story serves as both play, and also brackets the intermission. Cute as it is, the stories in between are the ones that really pull on your heart strings.

My particular favorite was "This Hurts." In this segment, Steve, played by senior Ollie Birckhead, is a mildly mentally disabled young man with a congenital insensitivity to pain. His older brother, Paul, mentioned but never seen, is teaching Steve what should hurt and what he should be afraid of in order to prevent him from harm; Steve writes all of this down in two notebooks.

Marvalyn, a young woman in an unhappy relationship living in the same apartment complex, is the first to point out to Steve that pain is not always physical, but some-

the prologue and epilogue to the times emotional. The tale of their charming friendship captured the show. Birckhead's performance, in particular, was authentic and heartwarming.

My only critique of the play was that all characters stayed on stage during their entire half of the play (four skits), even when their scenes were not performing. While I cannot fault the abilities of all the Xavier Players to stay frozen at the end of their scenes, it gave the skit that was performing limited mobility, and made the stage feel slightly claustrophobic. Overall, however, I loved Xavier's rendition of Almost, Maine. The play itself was delighting and funny and was enhanced by the excellent performance of the Xavier Players.

An event that is usually constrained to a single day in celebration of Earth is being celebrated this year for an entire week on campus.

The Sustainability Club invites Xavier to celebrate Earth Week, April 16-22.

The week's kick-off on April 16, will include live music, sustainability bingo, herb planting and food from Chipotle. Students will also learn how to make homemade composting bins.

Other events throughout the week include the showing of the documentary, *Wasteland*, tours of the Rumpke landfill, composting demonstrations at the NEXUS community garden and community trash pick-up, as well as "SustainabiliTEA," a discussion hosted by Student Activities Council.

At an event called "Taste of Xavier," local "restaurants, businesses and resources will be on campus to educate students on ways to support the local community," junior Elle Ross, sustainability intern and co-president of Sustainability Club, said via e-mail.

On Earth Day, Sunday, April 22, the Bellarmine Chapel Mass at 10 p.m. will take on a special sustainability theme.

Behind the salad

Though I agree that the endowment should be larger, the size of the current endowment is directly related to financial decisions made by past administrators who are gone from Xavier. While current administrators are trying to increase the size of that endowment, in an economy such as this one, an endowment is hard-pressed to grow quickly (unless anyone happens to know an alum or two willing to donate millions of dollars tomorrow).

He also argues that Xavier should be renovating buildings like Alter instead of starting new construction and

increasing the student population. I will counter this argument by first addressing the issue of increasing student enrollment. First, I would like to congratulate Xavier on increasing its enrollment in a bad economy, while still providing its students with financial aid and scholarships. Secondly, I would argue that one of the reasons Xavier grew its population was in order to help current students absorb inevitable tuition increases. The reasons our tuition increases are this low (even though it was advised to the Provost and CFO that they could be higher) is in part because of the size of the student body. Secondly, once the student body has increased, there must be somewhere to house, feed and teach students-hence the building of Fenwick, Smith and CLC before Alter's renovation. Though I think that author raises excellent points in challenging the institutions policies and viewpoints, I just wanted to provide the student body with a counter argument so that they

could see the real picture this institution is trying to paint.

You might wonder, then, why you see us asking questions on the worlds of Twitter and Facebook instead of taking concrete steps toward challenging the University. We have had many conversations with other students and professors that have led us to believe that our concerns are shared, but we see no space for those conversations to grow into dialogue with transformative power. Therefore, our course of action is not to speak for the student body, but to experiment in facilitating the creation of a public space. We hope this would be a space where students could speak and listen. Without such a space, we cannot know what students

So now we turn to you, our fellow students, and ask that you help us to create this space. Every day we see fragmented attempts at change, but we can only begin to imagine the power of a movement driven by the collective student body. Favorite player: Andre Walker



The men's team traveled to Florida and finished fifth at the Florida Atlantic Invitational.

The women's team stayed in Ohio and placed fourth at the

This marked only the second and third spring outings for the men's and women's teams, respectively.

The men's team was led by senior Chris Burger, who was the top Musketeer, finishing in a tie for 11th place in the tournament. Burger's 1-under-par 212 was a result of his impressive performances on the par-4 holes, where he finished first in the tournament with a 3.82 scoring average.

Freshman Korey Ward was only four strokes behind Burger with a final score of 3-over-par 216, good enough for 20th place in the field.

Rounding out the top five finishers for the Musketeers were senior Sebastian MacLean (218), freshman Tanapol Vattanapisit (218), and freshman Connor Tendall (228).

The Musketeers shot a 10-over-par 862 for the tournament, which placed them fifth in a field of 15 teams.

Back in Ohio, the women's golf team notched their fourth top-five finish of the season by shooting a 62-over-par 926.

Senior Michelle Winkler led the Musketeers with a 12-over-par 228 for the invitational, good for 13th place

Junior Breanna Patz scored 230 for the weekend, earning her a tie for 22nd place. Sophomore Kristin

Tan (234), sophomore Christine Cash (237), and freshman Abby Smith (246) rounded out the top five finishers for Xavier.

The women's team returns to the links on April 9 when they travel to Phoenix to compete in the Cowgirl Classic.

The men's team will jump back into competition this weekend in Charlotte, N.C. at the Irish Creek Collegiate.

Record-breaking weekend for Xavier track and field

The Xavier track team traveled south last weekend to compete in the Alabama Relays. The Musketeers set a team record and had many big races.

This meet had a considerably bigger field.

"It's a bigger meet and we kind of like to go to a couple of meets like this during the year," head coach Dan Flaute said.

The women's 4x400-meter relay team shattered a school record with senior Brittani Peltz, junior Rachel Clark, sophomore Susannah Shelley, and freshman Samantha Birchfield turned in a time of 3 minutes 56.37.

Peltz added to the school record by winning the 400-meter dash with a time of 57.97.

Clark placed third in the 800-meter run with a time of 2:13.82.

Not to be outdone by the relay runners, freshman Audrey Ramos placed sixth in the 1,500-meter run with a time of 4:47.04.

After finishing third in the 5,000-meter run last week, Ramos is continuing to have a successful freshman season.

"Last week was good because it was a smaller low key meet, and it was a good place for them to debut," Flaute said. "Now they're being thrown to the wolves where it's easier to compete at a higher level"

The women's team matched up against a top Big East team in Louisville and failed to earn a


Xavier was swept in the doubles matches and struggled in the singles matches.
