CBA program pairs XU students with internships

Williams College of Business offers students internships with local corporations

For the past three years, the Cooperative Education Programat the Williams College of Business (CBA) has been placing business students with companies in and around the Cincinnati area. This semester, the program still has a number of co-op opportunities available, especially for students majoring in human resources and accounting.

There are 70 companies looking for Xavier students to co-op, not to mention those which are looking for more than one student at a time. "I'm going to be placing students through the end of September," said Kathy McClusky, director of the Cooperative Education Program.

To be eligible, business majors (including accounting, economics, entrepreneurial studies, finance, general business, human resources, information systems, management and marketing)

must have earned at least 55 credit hours (junior class standing or above), have a minimum GPA of 2.75 and students are encouraged to have completed Management 301

Students will earn three credit hours upon completion of the coop position and will receive a grade for the experience, which will be based on a project (related to their major and completed with the help of their co-op adviser) and evaluations of their perfor-

Most of the co-op positions are part-time, and require 20 hours of work per week. The majority of students who co-op also take 15 hours of classes. In addition, nearly all positions are paid.

"The majority of the companies we work with do provide the students with significant salaries," said McClusky. "Companies are becoming quite creative in regards to attracting students."

The most important benefit to

these co-op positions, said McClusky, is the hands-on, realworld experience the students will gain.

"I know there are students who don't need to work to support themselves through school, and some who think they can make better money with jobs like waiting tables. And maybe they can, but at the end of it all, a pocket full of tips isn't the same as a major-related experience."

Interested students should make an appointment to visit McClusky in CBA (her extension is x4869). She will discuss the positions sought and what positions are available.

"Everyone who walks in here isn't necessarily guaranteed placement this semester," she

Student wages increase

In order to become more competitive, the university decided to increase its student employees' per hour wages. With a starting wage of \$6.50, the student employee wage base has increased \$1.35 from last year.

Campus jobs pay according to varying degrees of skilled work. Now, the highest wage a student employee can receive is \$10.

With each passing year, a returning student employee can expect a 20-cent raise.

In previous years, student employees were paid minimum wage with an option of a 10-cent increase each year.

Students awarded federal work study from the Office of Financial Aid are given priority for campus jobs. "We want to make sure that all work-study students are given the opportunity to find campus employment" Verkamp-Collopy.

By mid-October, all students will be allowed to compete for on campus jobs.

The Career Services Center (CSC) has job information ranging from the part-time work to more career-focused internships and jobs.



XU democrats support Cranley for Congress

The election for Ohio's first district for the U.S. House of Representatives is engaging political activism in Xavier's College Democrats

Xavier students attended the second of four debates between the two main contenders of this district, John Cranley (Dem.) and incumbent Steve Chabot (Rep.).

The candidates answered questions posed by a media panel and the audience.

The debate was held last Tuesday in the Urban League offices in front of about 200 people.

Two minor party candidates, Libertarian David Grottos and Natural Law Party candidate Richard Stevenson, were present but were not part of the debate.

Adam Calinger, sophomore and

president of XU's College Democrats, was impressed with "Cranley's poise" during the debate

Cranley, who is 26 years old, is one of the youngest individuals running for Congress this year.

On the issue of tax cuts, *The Cincinnati Post* quoted Chabot on Aug. 30 saying he wants tax cuts "across the board, for everybody, not just a targeted few."

Cranley is also in favor of tax cuts for "those who most deserve it," said Calinger.

Chabot has served three terms in office and was elected in 1994. Previously, Chabot has served as a Hamilton County Commissioner and a member of Cincinnati City Council.

Cranley is a recent graduate of Harvard Law School and Harvard Divinity School. "Cranley wants to increase funding for student loans, making them available to more students"

"[Cranley's] leadership is made up exclusively of young people," said Calinger who along with sophomore Liz Kelly are the college coordinators for the Cranley campaign.

Calinger believes this election will affect college students and said that "Cranley wants to increase funding for student loans, making them available to more students."

More than half of the crowd was made up of Chabot and Cranley supporters wearing campaign shirts.

According to SGA records, Xavier's College Republicans are currently inactive.

XU College Democrats plan on continuing activism on the Cranley campaign while supporting all Democratic candidates. The club also is planning a voter registration drive.

The next debate between Cranley and Chabot will be held on Sept. 22 at the University of Cincinnati. A time has not been scheduled.

College Democrats will meet today at the corner of Ledgewood and Herald Avenue at 4:40 p.m. to meet with the Cranley campaign. All students are welcome.

Once the options have been discussed, McClusky will provide students with a Web site address, login name and password.

This information is for Xavier's new online database program, Place Pro Database. Students can view company information and job descriptions online, as well as post résumés for companies to peruse.

The software will automatically match the students' majors with the companies' needs. Companies can then call the students directly or contact the Cooperative Education Program if interested.

In Cincinnati there is much competition for co-op positions. Every college in the area, including the University of Cincinnati, Northern Kentucky University and Thomas More College, has a program similar to Xavier's.

"I'd like to think that Xavier students are some of the best out there," said McClusky, "which is why I'm so strongly encouraging students to give this a try."

Roughly 75 to 80 percent of students who come to McClusky's office will be placed in co-op positions.

"The majority of the students do and will stay with their companies after the co-op term has ended," said McClusky, "and significantly more than 50 percent of these students receive job offers upon graduation.

"I consider these co-ops to be three-and-a-half-month interviews," she said. "They give companies the opportunity to see if the students fit in, to determine their knowledge and skills, and the option to view them as permanent candidates."

Among the companies that are currently working with the Cooperative Education Program or have done so in the past are Kroger, Delta, Toyota, the City of Cincinnati, Paine Webber, Firststar Investments, Jergens, the Chamber of Commerce and Cincinnati Bell.

Students are limited to a total of two co-op positions. There is a fee of \$225, and the credit hours are covered under general full-time tuition.

For more information, contact McClusky at 745-4869, or see the Cooperative Education Program's booth at Club Day on the Mall on Monday, Sept 11.

"I'd really like to encourage business students to take advantage of these opportunities because they are incredibly valuable," McClusky said.

"When applying for a job, with two candidates with identical academic experience, the one with cooperative work experience would get the job," she said.

The fact remains Xavier has done something in response to the desires of the students and does recognize each individual for what they are, a real soul-carrying human being, without regarding their sexual orientation.

Xavier as an institution has done its share for now. It is time for the individuals of Xavier to make what they desire a personal reality in the hopes that this effort moves to a greater and more necessary venue.

It is ridiculous it costs \$15 to replace a lost All Card. A small piece of plastic could not possibly cost that much. Xavier already takes enough of our money.



The Musketeers travelled to Columbia, S.C., to take part in the Carolina Classic. For their effort, the team was awarded three losses over the four-game trip.

Playing against strong competition, including Duke and Western Michigan, who both qualified for the NCAA Tournament last year, the Musketeers struggled to find their rhythm.

"We started off slow but I kind of expected that," said Deaton. "We had been working on a new defense which we had to get used to. But we got better as the week went on."

On the positive side, though, senior Tami Ores was back into the lineup, accumulating 132 assists over 13 games.

"It was the first weekend and she was a little shaky. She was trying to get her timing back in the preseason, but it's not the same as when you are in actual game situations," said Deaton.

DUKE DEFS. XAVIER (15-4, 15-2, 15-2)

Facing the Blue Devils was going to be tough no matter what the Muskies did. Playing without the services of juniors Sara Bachus and Amanda Lang and sophomore Katey Wygant made the task nearly impossible.

Bachus and Lang were forced to sit out after violating an NCAA rule, while Wygant sat out the Duke game for violating a team policy.

After losing 15-4 in the first game, things only got worse for the XU women as Duke went on to win each of the next two installments 15-2.

As a team, the Musketeers were only able to manage a negative .035 hitting percentage for the match, compared to Duke's .351. The inability to score, along with the Blue Devils committing just 10 errors on the night, left them at a distinct disadvantage.



Junior Jill Hampton led all players with seven kills followed by senior Gina Geraci with six. Ores posted team-highs in assists with 10, and digs with five.

Freshman Kimberley Cockerel posted four kills in her first collegiate match. Sophomore Anna Yasuhara recorded three service aces during the match.

TEXAS TECH DEFS. XAVIER (15-11, 15-7, 15-4)

Though the team managed to score more points in the first game against Texas Tech then they did in the entire match against Duke, the Red Raiders, who would go on to win the Carolina Classic, had little difficulty defeating the Musketeers in straight games.

Aside from Bachus, who hit for a .412 percentage and racked up three service aces, the team again was rather inefficient on the offensive side.

Bachus tied with Hampton for a team-high 10 kills, followed by Wygant and Lang with five, apiece. Ores dished out a team-high 31 assists.

Defensively, the Musketeers were led by Hampton and Lang who each registered seven digs.

USC DEFS. XAVIER (15-13, 15-1, 12-15, 15-8)

The host Gamecoks weren't very hospitable in the team's third match of the tournament. While the Musketeers stayed close in the first game and avoided the sweep by taking the third game, they suffered another defeat.

The Musketeers received inspired play from several players, including the trio of Bachus, Hampton and Lang who each recorded a double-double.

Bachus posted a team-high 19 kills to go with her 15 digs. Hampton registered a team-high 22 digs

with 13 kills. Lang closed out the double-double trifecta with a 16-kill, 18-dig performance.

Wygant nearly joined the group, finishing one dig short on the night, with 15 kills and nine digs.

Ores registered a double-double of her own, passing out 44 assists to go with her 14 digs.

XAVIER DEFS. LIBERTY (15-13, 15-4, 9-15, 15-12)

The Musketeers closed out their trip to South Carolina on a high note, earning their first win of the year against Liberty.

After taking a close first game, the XU women used the momentum to roll over the Flames in the second game. While Liberty kept it close, the inspired Muskies played the role of oppressors, extinguishing Liberty's fire in four games.

Bachus, who earned All-Tournament honors for her efforts, was spectacular, registering a team-high 20 kills on just 29 attacks for a .621 hitting percentage. Add that to her team-high 15 digs and you can see the Flames had a bit more than they could handle.

Hampton posted her second double-double of the season with a 12-kill, 11-dig performance. Lang nearly equaled the feat but fell short on the offensive end with nine kills and 10 digs.

Wygant played well in the middle, recording six kills and 14 digs, but still has work to do if she hopes to replace the departed Jenny Janszen.

"Katey played well this weekend. She wants to get better and is," said Deaton.

Ores made a strong case in her quest to regain her starting position, finishing with 47 assists and 12 digs, but the job is not hers yet.

"Angela (Rohling) is still in the running for the setter position. It's a battle for playing time," said Deaton. "Angela came out a bit rusty in the preseason but she's not out yet."

Though they lost three games, the Musketeers won't be affected terribly by the losses. The most important games are the conference matches (which don't begin until a Sept. 22 game against Rhode Island).

Kane shoots her way to Sydney

Xavier sophomore rifle All-American Thrine Kane headed to 2000 Summer Olympic Games

When one thinks of an athlete, the most common thoughts turn to those of superior strength, endurance and ability. Add concentration and accuracy to the mix and you've got the foundation of a champion marksman.

In the case of Thrine (pronounced Tree-nah) Kane, you have discovered the formula for an Olympian.

The XU sophomore qualified for the 2000 Summer Olympic Games and will be representing her country in Sydney, Australia.

Upon notification of her all-expenses-paid trip to Sydney, Kane recalled she received good luck wishes ranging from friends to her seventh grade physical education teacher.

"It's unbelieveable."

Although not an aggressive or spectator sport, rifle requires extreme mental toughness and determination.

"Shooting is 90 percent mental and 10 percent physical," explained Kane.

Rifle is a sport that requires a large amount of patience and self confidence. Competiters shoot for a period of time ranging from 45-80 minutes per round.

Standing, squatting or lying prone (on the stomach) shooting at targets the size of a dime 50 meters

away is most certainly not a past time for the meek.

Kane's rifle career got off to an early start, beginning at a local gun club in her hometown of Merrick, N.Y., at the age of seven. She immediately loved the sport. Most children don't get involved in the sport

until they are between the ages of 11 and 13.

Although a very serious sport, Thrine remembers some humorous episodes from her past.

"When I was younger I used to have very bright shooting clothing. My jacket pants used to be green, blue, black and red. And I'd wear bright yellow spandex and a big blue floppy hat. I was a sight to see. I figured if I couldn't beat anyone at least I could make them smile."

Her determination and dedication have helped her to win multiple awards. She holds over 20 state records and was the New York State and County 3P and Air Rifle Champion every year she was enrolled in high school (1996-1999).

Kane has stockpiled 22 medals
— an astonishing 20 gold, one silver and one bronze — in the Empire State Games.

Since Thrine joined Xavier, their position in the shooting community has skyrocketed. But finishing in second place at the 2000 NCAA Rifle Championships last season always seems to have a positive effect on a program.

One would be led to believe that in between all the meets and practice sessions Kane has attended, she would have little time to spend on academics. This, however, is far from the truth.

Aside from earning All-American honors in both the air rifle and smallbore events, she is a dual major in international affairs with a concentration in modern Europe and Spanish.

She also has a minor in Peace Studies and maintained a 4.0 GPA in the spring semester last year. Not too shabby considering her trials for World Championships were wedged between final exams.

Kane credits Allan Joseph, head rifle coach at Xavier, for helping her through many tough times.

"Whenever I've needed help there has always been someone to go to for help or a shoulder to cry on. You can always go to Al, and Al's always good for advice."

Kane will be heading to the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, Colo., and then on to Minnesota to train with the rest of the team. She is planning on marching in the Opening Ceremonies in Australia on Sept. 15.

Kane is the perfect example of the power of dreams and hard work. Good luck Thrine!

The Musketeers started off against the No. 12 ranked Stanford Cardinal at the 19th Annual Nike Goal Rush Classic.

The game began with intensive offensive control by Stanford, who scored within the first 10 minutes (Corey Woolfolk, 8:19). Woolfolk was set up by a well placed cross into the box by Luke Rust.

Head coach Jack Hermans described Stanford as "a top five caliber team. We were lucky to be exposed to that level of play."

'We were simply outclassed by their superior ball movement," said Hermans

The defense held firm for most of the first half.

Xavier managed to hold off the Cardinal's pressure until 16 seconds before intermission, when Scott Leber scored off a hard shot from outside the box. Stanford led at the half 2-0.

In the 56th minute, Aaron Biddle got by Xavier's senior goalkeeper Paul Wesseling to give Stanford a 3-0 edge.

Xavier was unable to capitalize on offense, getting off only four

The Musketeers were able to

hold off Stanford's relentless offense until the last five minutes of the game.

Stanford scored two unassisted goals within two minutes of each other to finish the match. The final score was 5-0. Wesseling had a standout game and finsished with nine saves.

The Cardinal would go on to win the Gold Rush Classic.

FRESNO STATE 4, XAVIER 2

In the second game of the season, the Musketeers faced host team Fresno State.

Xavier junior forward Andy Crouch headed the ball into the back of the net early into the first half, giving Xavier its first goal of the 2000 season. Junior Rob Bakker had the assist.

The lead held for almost all of the first half. Fresno State forward Derek Lopez connected off of a pass from midfielder Kupono Low at 44 minutes to put Fresno State on the board.

This late scoring by opponents is consistent with the previous year's play. Hermans attributes these late goals to the defenses' inability to adapt to new offensive strategies. The score was tied 1-1 at halftime.

As the second half started, the Musketeers again scored early. Sophomore forward Scott Lagedrost beat a Fresno State defender off the dribble and easily hit the goal to give Xavier its second lead of the game.

Again, the Xavier lead would

fail as Fresno scored three goals in the final 13 minutes of the game.

Freshman defender Casey Fischer received a red card in the Fresno State game. In the first half, he received a yellow card and was ejected in the second half. Both were a result of late tackles.

Fischer now must serve a one game suspension, and will miss the team's game against Wright State.

Also, 20 minutes into the game, co-captain sweeper senior Koen Kuiken left the game with an apparent pulled hamstring.

The absence of his elite defense skills and leadership contributed to the late game Fresno State goals. However, Wesseling held up well with 10 saves.

Xavier's home opener is against Wright State on Friday. They then travel to Louisville on Sept. 12.

They will be looking for more consistent play on defense, as well as strong offensive output.

The West Coast trip proved to be a "valuable learning experience," said Hermans. "Now we'll be looking forward to some wins."


While some may consider the Cintas Center a new basketball arena, the volleyball team has the honor of hosting the first-ever athletic event inside the new arena.

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

A change of pace for the big budgeted

TRY SOMETHING NEW WITH VINEYARD CAFE'S UNIQUE MENU; JUST BE SURE TO HIT THE ATM FIRST

Got some extra cash and a desire to try some unique food? Check out Vineyard Cafe, right on the corner of Erie and Edwards Avenues, where you can impress your date with a wide selection of wine and food choices you may not be able to pronounce.

The Vineyard Café is unlike any other restaurant we have reviewed, combining unique cuisine with a casual atmosphere.

The menu, with a wine section twice as large as that for food, offers a wide variety of appetizers, salads, sandwiches and entreés.

Expect to try something new at the Vineyard Cafe, because you won't find your average American fare, like steaks or burgers. But, if you are brave, you won't be disappointed by what you get. For your reading convenience, we will include a "college-level" translation in parenthesis.

For an appetizer, we tried the portabella bruschetta, which we discovered was heavy on the portabella (mushrooms) and light on the bruschetta (tasty Italian bread with olive oil). This appetizer, which also contains to-

matoes and a sheet of parmesan cheese, was a little overpriced for the amount served. We both agreed tasted good, but it wasn't anything to write home about.

Other appetizers ranging from \$6 to \$8, some of which we

were afraid to try, included tuna and smoked scallop tartare (avacado with lumpfish caviar and olive oil flavored music paper ... yeah! That's what we thought too!).

The Vineyard Cafe had some very interesting salad choices all for around \$8, like the Spanakopita, a flaky pastry crust with a filling of fresh spinach and feta cheese, served on a salad

Or, if you would prefer to order a salad you might recognize, go for the smoked chicken salad. It had a mixture of field greens (sorry, no dande-

lions), fresh fruit, a gigantic tortilla wafer and, of course, smoked chicken drizzled with a raspberry vinaigrette. You should definitely go for this if you're dying to see the world's biggest Tostido©, which is served standing in the middle of the salad.

Things get really interesting when you move over to the entrée section of the menu. You can try anything from pasta to roasted pork loin.

If you are a seafood fan, they had several choices including crab

cakes, halibut or tuna. Upon our server's suggestion, we tried the tuna nicoise. The tuna was flavorful yet mild, but the mustardy sauce is what made this hit home. It was


served along with green beans, red potatoes and some unidentified mild peppers. At \$15, it was a fair deal and is definitely recommended.

We also had the roasted pork loin, which was served with a mush-

room based bread pudding. Though the description doesn't make your mouth water, the actual food did. The pork was tender and delicious, and the rich bread pudding complemented its flavor very well. The portion was very large and is suggested to anyone who enjoys the other white meat. The price is very fair at \$15.

In addition to the entrees, there are also some pizzas and sandwiches to choose from, which are as distinct as the dinner fare.

One sandwich you won't be able

to find at Friday's is the roasted leg of lamb, which is served on a warm pita and topped with field greens, tomatoes, kalamata olives and cucumber yogurt. This sandwich seemed expensive for its \$9 price tag, but it, along with the other sandwiches, is served with a choice of horseradish broccoli slaw, farfallini pasta salad or potato chips.

One of the more interesting pizzas available is the verde pizza, garnished with smoked bacon, sautéed leeks, capers and arugula pesto.

There were five desserts to choose from: chocolate mousse cake, raspberry caramel crème brulee (a custard dish), marscarpone white chocolate parfait, hazelnut marquis and a fruit and cheese tray.

We tried the hazelnut marquis, a chocolate sponge cake with a layer of chocolate mousse, a layer of hazelnut mousse, and a layer of chocolate. This dessert was rich and delicious, but was overpriced at \$8.

The atmosphere of the Vineyard Cafe is simple yet warm and inviting. It was noisy, but we were able to carry on a normal conversation with no problem.


The restaurant walls were actually mostly windows or mirrors, which enlarged the small restaurant and allowed for a great view of Hyde Park Square. Outdoor seating was also available, without any loss in atmosphere. When outdoors, diners sit in a garden setting with oversized umbrellas for shade and

antique-style street lights for evening dining.

The server was very businesslike, giving us great service without becoming overbearing. The servers all wore simple black and white attire and seemed to have ample knowledge of the menu. The prices were high in some areas, such as the desserts and pizzas, but the entreés were priced fairly.

Although we were unable to sample, the Vineyard Cafe had a huge selection of wines which could be purchased by bottle or glass. Being the Vineyard Cafe, the restaurant menu was based around the wine selection, and discounts are given on bottle purchases.

Overall, this restaurant has a wonderful atmosphere and offers exciting and fresh food choices that provide a break from the monotony of the Cafe, and it's much better for a date. However, atmosphere and food like this doesn't come cheap.

However, *Problematic*, their new album, falls short of that mark that has always set All above the rest. *Problematic* simply lacks the glue tying their musical talents together.

The real tragedy with *Problematic* is how mediocre it is. Several of the tracks simply lack definition and style (thanks in part to a plethora of underdeveloped choruses). There is not much bad to say about them, but there is nothing good to say either. Put simply, they are bland.

No one wants to listen to the incoherent, unmelodic barking of Chad Price as he grumbles at light speed through tracks such as "Nothing to Live For" and "I Want Out." Price slows down a little in "Drive Away," but that only gives the audience an opportunity to hear how lifeless the song actually is.
