

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
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XAVIER'S NEW, ULTRAMODERN ALTER BUILDING

Xavier's new classroom building honors the Archbishop of Cincinnati. In 1960 Archbishop Alter observed the fiftieth anniversary of his ordination, the thirtieth of his episcopal consecration, and the tenth of his coming to the Archdiocese of Cincinnati.


The Alter Building is air-conditioned throughout. Erected at a cost of \$1,175,000, it contains 32 classrooms, four seminar rooms, administrative and faculty offices, the University bookstore, closed circuit television facilities, the Edward H. Kelly Lecture Hall, and the Verkamp Psychological Services Center.

THE UNIVERSITY

The College of Arts and Sciences

Undergraduate programs lead to the degree of Bachelor of Arts, the Bachelor of Science, and the Bachelor of Science in Business Administration. Information concerning departmental organization, curricula, degree requirements, grades, attendance, etc., is contained in the Xavier University Catalogue.

The College of Arts and Sciences is coeducational during summer sessions.

The Graduate School

The Graduate School, established in 1946, offers programs for the degrees of Master of Arts in classics, English, history and political science, and philosophy; the Master of Science in chemistry and mathematics; the Master of Education; and the Master of Business Administration. The School is coeducational.

For a full description of graduate degree programs write to the Dean of the Graduate School and mention the specific program in which you are interested. The following is a brief outline of the requirements for the various degrees.

THE MASTER OF ARTS AND THE MASTER OF SCIENCE

The Master of Arts and the Master of Science require—

Undergraduate prerequisites that assure the candidate's educational background.

Completion of the Miller Analogies Test.

A reading knowledge of a foreign language.

Twenty-four credit hours of graduate study in the subject.

Production of a thesis acceptable for six additional credit hours.

Completion of a comprehensive oral examination.

Applicants in chemistry must have had an undergraduate major in the subject, eight to ten hours of physics, and mathematics through calculus. Candidates in mathematics need an undergraduate major in the subject or at least twelve hours of mathematics beyond six hours of calculus. Plan A in mathematics allows students to complete twenty-four hours of class work and a thesis. Plan B includes thirty hours of class work and a research paper.

THE MASTER OF EDUCATION

The Master of Education requires at least twelve undergraduate credits in education. Candidates must complete these requirements:

Twelve credit hours in four general surveys: Philosophy of Education, Educational Psychology, Educational Administration, and Education Research.

Twelve hours in an area of concentration: administration, guidance, or elementary and secondary education; or in a subject area (especially recommended for high school teachers): business, chemistry, classics, English, history, political science, mathematics, modern lanaguages, philosophy, communication arts, and, in summer sessions, biology and theology.

Six hours in pertinent electives.

An extensive written examination in the general field of education covered by the surveys and in the area of concentration.

THE MASTER OF BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

In summer sessions as well as during the academic year students may work for the Master of Business Administration. As prerequisite they must have had either thirty hours of undergraduate business subjects, including six in the Principles of Accounting and six in the Principles of Economics, or at least two years of experience in business and the prescribed courses in accounting and economics.

Candidates must complete these requirements:

Twelve hours in four general surveys: Economics of Business, Research in Business, Managerial Accounting, and Administrative Operations.

Nine hours of concentration in accounting, personnel, management, marketing, transportation and traffic, advanced business economics, and hospital administration. A three-hour seminar: Advanced Business Problems.

Six hours in pertinent electives.

A written comprehensive examination in the general field covered by the surveys and in the area of concentration.

Candidacy

Students must apply for candidacy for all graduate degrees after they complete six hours at the University. Those judged unfit will be advised not to continue their work.

M.B.A. Hospital Administration

The degree of Master of Business Administration with a concentration in hospital administration is offered with courses cycled over successive summer sessions. Workshops in Hospital Organization and Management, Hospital Business Management, and Personnel Administration and Hospital Problems are conducted over three successive summers. They are available both to degree students and to qualified non-degree students during summer sessions. For information on this program write to Mr. James F. Library

The library is open from 8:30 A.M. to 4:30 P.M. daily during summer sessions. Hours on Saturday are from 8:30 to noon.

Housing

Male students may live in Marion Hall or Elet Hall during the summer sessions. Elet Hall is reserved for priests and seminarians. The Halls will open at noon on Saturday, June 17.

Brockman Hall is reserved for Sisters from June 16 to September 2.

Lay women may arrange accommodations by writing to the Director of Housing.

Food Service

Breakfast is served in South Hall during the summer sessions. Light lunches are also available there.

The University cafeteria offers regular breakfast, lunch, and dinner service.

Admission Procedure

THE COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES

Those who intend to register in the College of Arts and Sciences must apply to the Director of Admissions, Xavier University, Cincinnati 7, Ohio. The application should be returned as early as possible, at least a week before registration. A transcript of the high school record must also be submitted.

Special Summer Enrollment

An undergraduate regularly attending another college may register at Xavier for summer classes. An official of his college must approve in writing the courses he is to enter. This authorization and the usual application form should be sent to the Director of Admissions, Xavier University, Cincinnati 7, Ohio, before registration. Under this arrangement, the usual transcript is not required.

THE GRADUATE SCHOOL

Those who intend to begin graduate study must apply to the Dean of the Graduate School, Xavier University, Cincinnati 7, Ohio. An application form may be requested either in person or by mail. An applicant must also arrange to have his undergraduate college send a transcript of his work to the Graduate School.

THE EVENING COLLEGE

Students may register for evening classes at the office of the Evening College after May 23. The office is in the Karl J. Alter Classroom Building, Room 129. Special registration hours have been arranged for Friday, June 9, from 6:00 to 8:30 p.m., and for Saturday, June 10, from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

Those applying for graduate credit must register in the office of the Graduate School on or before June 12.







