The Institute, *Challenges for the '80's II*, repeats the very popular and successful one of the 1973 Intersession. The program is timed specially for the community "busy people" and for teachers whose schools do not close until Friday, June 14. The Institute begins at 3:30 P.M. on the 14th and ends the evening of the 18th of June. Daily sessions run from 3:30 to 9:30 P.M.

The Institute, featuring the "Challenges for the '80's", will offer such nationally known figures as *Alice S. Rossi*, sociologist and authority on women's role; *Will Herberg*, noted lecturer and civil religion author; *Albert S. Sabin*, outstanding medical researcher and microbiologist; *C. Delores Tucker*, authority on Black women in politics; *Philip R. Adams*, noted art critic; *Madeline C.*

*Hunter*, renowned educator; *Jayne B. Spain*, Vice-chairperson, U.S. Civil Service Commission and businesswoman; *James C. Bostain*, lecturer on communications problems; *Jack Anderson*, nationally syndicated reporter; and *Ashley Montagu*, anthropologist and author.

The Institute is offered for two graduate or undergraduate semester hours of credit in the fields of education, business administration, political science and sociology. The Institute incorporates also the grading concept of Pass/Fail. Degree students may carry the Institute for credit in addition to having carried it for credit in 1973.

The Institute is under the direction of Dr. Anna Mayans, Xavier University, the Graduate School, and the Summer Sessions.

## EVENING CLASSES

The College of Continuing Education will offer a variety of evening courses during both sessions of the University Summer Sessions. Degree and non-degree students may register for these courses. Students of the College of Continuing Education may register also for day courses.

The College of Continuing Education offers Associate Degree programs and the A.B. and B.S. degrees from a broad spectrum of major University concentrations. Interested persons should contact the office of the College for particulars about any of these programs.

The University offers free parking to all students attending evening classes during the Summer Sessions. Classrooms are air-conditioned.

During the first session, evening classes meet on Monday and Wednesday evenings for one course sequence and on Tuesday and Thursday evenings for the other. Two additional Friday evening meetings are included in the schedule for the evening classes. Class hours run from 6:45-9:45 P.M. for most courses during the session. During the second session classes are held on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday evenings from 7:00-9:30 P.M.


University housing and board will be available for students who choose to meet the energy crisis by this manner.

## SUMMER VARIETY

An extensive variety of courses are available during the Summer Sessions at the University this summer," stated Dr. Milton Partridge, Summer Sessions, Xavier University.

"The schedule includes courses at the graduate and undergraduate level—both day and evening—an enlarged Intersession, short-term workshops and institutes. We feel that we are offering an excellent summer opportunity for many people."

The offerings include an extensive selection of courses for degree students, course options for anyone in the community interested in continuing education, and courses for the high school junior or senior of above average ability.

"The out-of-town student, home for the summer, will find many courses acceptable for transfer to his college or university," added Dr. Partridge.

Dean Raymond McCoy, Graduate School, pointed out also that "The Summer Sessions offer a golden chance for the professional educator, the Master of Business Administration candidate, and for the Master of Arts and Master of Science candidates."

"For teachers whose schools do not close until Friday, June 14, two Intersession courses are especially attractive. One, starting in the afternoon of June 14, is *Challenges for the '80's*. In the week of June 17 is the Workshop: *Children's Books and Related Media for the '70's*. During the week of July 22 two workshops (*School Community Relations for the Principal and Group and Interpersonal Dynamics*) and an Institute (*America, A Society in Crisis*) will be offered."

Individuals may register as special students if they do not wish to pursue a degree program. Any person holding a bachelor's degree registers through the Graduate School of the University, while anyone without a college degree registers through the University's College of Continuing Education.

## Community Resources Workshop

JUNE 17-JULY 12

Xavier University will host the 1974 Queen City Community Resources Workshop. The workshop is offered in conjunction with the University of Cincinnati, Miami University, and the Greater Cincinnati Chamber of Commerce.

Enrollment is limited to school personnel selected by the Workshop Trustees and acceptable to the student's Graduate School.

Four credits are granted, but the amount of such credit accepted for graduate degrees is left to the discretion of each institution. Applicants should inquire to the school at which they plan to register. Applications for appointment can be requested from the Queen City Community Resources Workshop, Greater Cincinnati Chamber of Commerce, 55 Central Trust Building, Cincinnati, Ohio, 45202, or by calling the Education Center, Cincinnati Public Schools, 369-4044.

## Workshops In Science Education



Dr. Napoleon Bryant, Jr., Assistant Professor of Education and highly acclaimed science educator, will direct science workshops in *Elementary Science Curriculum Projects* and *Intermediate/Junior High Curriculum Projects*.

Science Curriculum Improvement Study (SCIS), Elementary Science Study (ESS), Science-A Process Approach (S-APA), and Science-Understanding Your Environment (S-UYE) will be studied in the elementary science workshop.

Intermediate Science Curriculum Study, Levels I, II, and III will be emphasized in the intermediate/junior high science workshop.

The workshops will be offered the first three weeks of the Summer Sessions from June 17 to July 5 and will meet 2½ hours daily.

Both workshops will provide "hands-on" experience with program materials and in working with children.

Each workshop carries three graduate or undergraduate credits.

### STUDY ABROAD

Xavier University is offering a 4-week and an 8-week opportunity for Spanish Study in Bogota, Columbia, during the Summer of 1974.

A 6-week program at the University of Vienna, Lake Wolfgang (Strobl), is also available. Partial scholarships are funded for the Austrian session.


