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





MOREHEAD, Ky.---Dr. Robert Frank, associate professor of speech, has been named Morehead State University's associate dean for international education.

"With this new position, we have an opportunity to develop a more coherent and comprehensive approach to international education on the campus," said Dr. Michael R. Moore, executive vice president for academic affairs. "Dr. Frank comes with a strong commitment to international education and I am confident that he will make a significant contribution to this field."

Once a foreign exchange student, Dr. Frank will be responsible for all international education programs, including the English Language Center, international student services, study abroad programs and efforts to enhance the international dimension of MSU's curriculum. He also will teach on a part-time basis, throughout the fall and spring semesters as well as during the summer terms.

Another portion of Dr. Frank's new job duties will include overseeing the start of an international studies minor at MSU. Along with co-directors, Janet Gross, coordinator of nursing, and Dr. John Secor, associate professor of romance languages, he will use a two-year, \$134,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Education to put the project in motion.

An introductory course in international studies will be taught this fall. "We look forward to being able to offer students the minor during the spring semester," Dr. Frank said. A proposal for the minor has been sent to MSU's curriculum committee for approval.

"We have already established a strong commitment to Asian cultures and we look forward to expanding to other cultures as well," he said.

A teacher of international and intercultural communication, Dr. Frank sees his new post as "a natural progression of what I do. It's what I've spent the past 10 to 15 years of my life studying."

He holds a bachelor's degree from the University of Richmond and a master's degree from Wake Forest University. Dr. Frank earned a Ph.D. degree in speech communication and a certificate in global studies from the University of Georgia.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---For more than 20 years, Morehead State University's Water Testing Laboratory has been striving to ensure that the citizens of East Kentucky have safe drinking water; now, that mission has expanded to cover the Commonwealth.

During the last year, the laboratory has been overseeing the Laboratory Certification Program for the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet. "The cabinet is required by federal regulations to maintain a certification program for all public water systems or commercial laboratories performing microbiological analysis of drinking water," said Dr. Ted Pass, laboratory director.

Within the state, there are 38 laboratories in 23 counties with approximately 60 analysts that are certified, Dr. Pass noted. He, along with laboratory manager Rita Wright, act as certification program managers, completing annual audits and ensuring that all laboratories are adhering to Environmental Protection Agency regulations. Assisting them for the next year will be Peggy Ryker of Frankfort, a retiree of the Kentucky Division of Water who has 25 years experience as a certification officer.

Public water systems are required to submit monthly water samples for bacteriological analysis to a certified laboratory to ensure their customers are receiving safe drinking water. "The number of samples has grown tremendously in the last 10 years," Wright said, "from approximately 10 samples per month in 1979 to more than 400 per month in 2001." Samples come from public and private companies, federal agencies, health departments and well drillers.

"Under the certification program responsibilities, MSU must offer an annual workshop for laboratory analysts to keep them abreast of new methods and regulations that impact drinking water," Wright said. Since assuming management of the certification program, the laboratory management team hosted 24 analysts from 29 state-certified laboratories for a one-day workshop in October. In May, 36 analysts from 26 laboratories attended a three-day session on the campus. Speakers from the state Division of Water and US EPA in Cincinnati were among those presenting talks on new regulations and waterborne pathogens. During the training, analysts were given the opportunity to perform hands-on activities involving the use of new methods developed to detect pathogens in drinking water.

Since it began operation in 1979, the MSU laboratory has performed microbiological analysis for those in the community and approximately 25 surrounding counties. Because of its extensive involvement in water quality within the state, the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet, Division of Water, Drinking Water Branch, contracted with MSU in 1991 to become the Commonwealth of Kentucky's Principle Microbiology Laboratory, a role that continues today.

The laboratory has assisted the state's Division of Water with environmental issues which have impacted source and drinking water, such as the fish kill in the Kentucky River in 1999.


Dr. Pass became involved in water testing while he was teaching at Miami University in Ohio. After coming to MSU in 1972, he continued his efforts after receiving a request from the local health department. The water testing operation on the campus began in a laboratory in Lappin Hall. It moved to its current facility in 1995 when Ashland Inc. financed the renovation of the former Energy Conservation Laboratory whose construction had originally been funded by Ashland.

To serve as certification program managers, the laboratory staff must receive continual training. Dr. Pass and Wright attend numerous programs each year, including the U.S. EPA workshop in Cincinnati. They recently received certification to perform audits of laboratories performing microbiological analysis of drinking water in Region IV, which is a six state division that includes Kentucky and Tennessee.

MSU is currently pursuing a four-year contract with the state's Division of Water to continue management of the Certification Program through 2006. "We want to ensure that all citizens are receiving safe drinking water. After all 'safe drinking water is our business'," Dr. Pass said.

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

MOREHEAD, Ky.---"Morehead Memories: True Stories from Eastern Kentucky" documents times gone by and the impressions of author Dr. Jack D. Ellis, all in a chronology that is providing enjoyment for readers. Sale of the book will mean rewards for future Morehead State University students.

"Everyone has been wonderful," Dr. Ellis said. "It (the book) motivates people to draw on their personal memories. They tell me what they enjoy the most; their comments have been very rewarding."

While he says he is retired, the author has maintained a busy schedule since the book's release three months ago. He has attended book signings and was a recent guest on WKYT-TV's "AfterNoon." He has been invited to participate in the Kentucky Book Fair. Readers from across the country are making purchases and sending notes of appreciation. He is hesitant to discuss what might be the outcome of a recent call from the History Channel.

While the accolades keep coming, Dr. Ellis is completing another book, this time on veterans of World War II. After that, he plans to write the second edition of Morehead Memories which will include the timber industry, the Lee Clay Plant and the Morehead-Norfolk Railroad.

The first volume is a compilation of research completed for the author's weekly column that appeared in "The Morehead News" during a three-year period prior to 2000. While the focus is the happenings of this Eastern Kentucky town, the book provides insight into the culture and people of Appalachia.

Writings for this book began on Veterans Day 1997 when Dr. Ellis penned an article about his first cousin who was missing in action. While it was written to share information with his children, interest in this soldier's life led to the story's publication in the local newspaper.

Topics of interest to those in the area led to future articles. For historical accounts, Dr. Ellis researched documents at the Kentucky Department of Libraries and Archives, Government Documents and the county's school board records. Another source of information was Morehead State University's Camden-Carroll Library where he had served as director for 18 years before retiring in 1985.

Dr. Thomas D. Clark, Kentucky historian laureate, wrote in the introduction: "This book is rich in the presentation of the past in the contest of decisions made, of failures and mistakes, and of the consequences of the collective experiences of the area."

"This three pounds of 'Morehead Memories' is priceless," Dr. Ellis jokes.

The historian credits the success of the book to some advice he was given: write about something where there is a broad knowledge of the subject and write about what you know. He takes that one further: don't wait until you are 74 to begin a writing career.

In actuality, Dr. Ellis began writing much earlier. For more than three years, he worked for Esquire Magazine's Coronet Education Films. While traveling across the country, he wrote grant proposals for colleges under the National Defense Education Act. His work gained him the title of "a member of the fastest pencil boys" because he had to be accurate, precise and of few words.

Additionally, he was a pastor for 23 years, writing out his sermons in long-hand, 10 of those years while he was working at MSU.

The Morehead native credits knowledge of the region to his former employment, a postal worker and driver of the bookmobile. An MSU graduate, he earned a bachelor's degree in 1957, then continued his education at George Peabody College and University of Southern Mississippi where he earned the Ed.D. degree in 1968.

Dr. Ellis chose to write his first book because he wanted to fulfill a need. "There is no history of Rowan County. There was no collection of local history. People had a real hunger for a positive history."

After the research, Dr. Ellis shares the information with other writers. Information on Cora Wilson Stewart became part of a performance by Laura Duncan-O'Connell. He provided materials on the late Dr. Louise Caudill for James McConkey's "Rowan's Progress."

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Welcomed by the sounds of Bluegrass music, Morehead State University faculty and staff members ushered in the 2001-2002 academic year at the University's annual convocation.

To begin the assembly, the Licking River Ramblers, a student group sponsored by MSU's Kentucky Center for Traditional Music, performed for the group. Following the introduction of new faculty and staff by vice presidents and deans, Dr. Gordon Davies, president of the Council on Postsecondary Education, addressed the group.

The commonwealth's comprehensive universities, like Morehead State, educate "people who not only have the capacity to put bread on the table...but also the desire to put roses on the table," Dr. Davies said. "Those are the people who care about their communities," he added.

Serving as the CPE's president since 1998, Dr. Davies pointed out that higher education is a public health issue, not just that of the body, but also of family, community and spirit. "Universities are the means to the end, which is better lives," he said.

The former director of the State Council of Higher Education in Virginia, Dr. Davies toured the state when he first took the job. "I learned about the value of serving a region and marshalling its resources to a common good," he said of that experience.

Many of Kentucky's resources are in its one million citizens. However, 40 percent of the state's workforce is challenged in mathematics or reading skills, Dr. Davies said.

By 2010, the CPE wants to help improve the skills of 300,000 of Kentucky's working people. "It's not just for them, but for their children," he said.

The goal of the CPE is to build a postsecondary education system that makes a difference to everyone in the community, not just the ones who attend college, Dr. Davies said. "We can't possibly control whether Kentucky's economy improves...We can make a huge difference."



MOREHEAD, Ky.— Nearly \$2 million for initial funding of Morehead State University's new Space Science Center and two related projects has been approved by the U.S. Small Business Administration.

Announced earlier this year when Congress authorized the funding at the request of U.S. Rep. Harold (Hal) Rogers, the grant of \$1,966,000 will assist in the relocation of a \$20 million NASA satellite tracking system and fully fund the establishment of two new GPS (global positioning system) stations at MSU and at the Center for Rural Development in Somerset and the creation of meteorological monitoring stations in Morehead and Somerset linked to the National Weather Service in Jackson.

"We are pleased that the funds have been released to start the antenna relocation and to connect science and research to the region and to provide more telecommunications infrastructure for economic development," said MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin. "We are deeply indebted to Congressman Rogers for his strong advocacy of this project and his assistance in linking our efforts with those of the Center for Rural Development, a national leader in economic development and telecommunications."

MSU will establish an Office of Economic Development and Research Outreach at its Institute for Regional Analysis and Public Policy (IRAPP) to manage the delivery of useful research to the business community, according to Dr. Eaglin. He described the GPS technology as a "critical tool" in economic development.

Dr. Eaglin said the funding would cement the University's partnership with NASA, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, the Small Business Administration and the Kentucky National Science Foundation Experimental Program to Stimulate Competitive Research (EPSCoR) program.

The New Space Science Center at MSU will be administered through the College of Science and Technology.

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
