Three flagpoles have been installed as evidence of the pride in America, the state and the University, in response to the events of Sept. 11, 2001. The event, coordinated by the Student Government Association, will include a welcome by SGA President Brian Martin, **Grethel** senior, and Jocelyn Melvin, **West Liberty** junior and chair of SGA's Campus Involvement Committee. Taking part in the ceremony will be Rowan County Judge-Executive Clyde Thomas, on behalf of Navy Petty Officer Edward T. Earhart, a former MSU student who died in the attack on the Pentagon; Sen. Walter Blevins and Rep. Rocky Adkins, on behalf of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, and President Ronald G. Eaglin on behalf of the Morehead State University community. MOREHEAD, Ky.—As an affirmation of pride, Morehead State University has added a flag ceremony to its lineup of activities for Founders Day on Thursday, April 4. Three new flagpoles have been installed in front of Howell-McDowell Administration Building to signify the occasion.

In response to the events of Sept. 11 and in coordination with the Student Government Association, the University has designated a flag plaza where the American, Commonwealth of Kentucky and Morehead State flags will be displayed. Presiding at the 11 a.m. ceremony will be SGA President Brian Martin, Grethel senior, and Jocelyn Melvin, West Liberty junior, who chaired SGA's Campus Involvement Committee. Presenting the flags will be:

American—Rowan County Judge-Executive Clyde Thomas on behalf of the family of U.S. Navy Petty Officer Edward Earhart, former MSU student who was killed in the terrorist attack on the Pentagon;

Kentucky—Sen. Walter Blevins of West Liberty and Rep. Rocky Adkins of Sandy Hook;

MSU—MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin and Board of Regents Chair Buckner Hinkle Jr. of Lexington.

As part of the ceremony, the MSU Band, under the direction of Dr. Sue Creasap, will play "The Star-Spangled Banner," "My Old Kentucky Home" and the University's "Alma Mater." A marker will be unveiled to commemorate the occasion.

The ceremony is in keeping with a "Pride and Promise" theme as the University celebrates its 79<sup>th</sup> year as a public institution of higher learning. Morehead Normal School, MSU's predecessor institution, opened its doors in 1887 and the campus was converted to a state normal school in 1922.

Among other events scheduled for the day is a Memorial Brick Ceremony at 10:30 a.m. at the Little Bell Tower; an Awards Luncheon at 11:30 a.m.; dedication of the Sculpture Concourse in Crosthwait Plaza at 1:45 p.m.; the reopening and rededication of Breckinridge Hall at 2:15 p.m.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's chapter of the Honor Society of Phi Kappa Phi has selected Carol Martin of **Williamstown** as the 2002 recipient of the Margaret Patton Scholarship.

The presentation will be made during the annual spring banquet, which is slated for Monday, April 8, in the Adron Doran University Center. Reservations are necessary for the program that begins at 6:30 p.m. in the Crager Room.

Martin, a dietetics major, will graduate in May with a bachelor's degree in University Studies after only three years at MSU. She has maintained a 4.0 grade point average on campus and plans to enter dental school at the University of Kentucky in the fall.

She says her interest in dietetics stemmed from an interest in eating disorders and the experience of having a family member with juvenile diabetes. However, Martin says her career choice of dentistry began when her dentist was able to use braces to improve her smile.

"He gave me more than a corrected bite; he gave me confidence," Martin said. "My hope is to return home to Grant County to open a family practice with an emphasis in orthodontics. I want to someday give another little girl the confidence that I received."

Martin, a Phi Kappa Phi freshman honoree, has been named to the dean's list every semester she has been at the University. She has received numerous academic awards, including the Presidential Scholarship, Academic Honors Scholarship, PKP Sophomore Scholarship and Human Sciences General Scholarship from the College of Science and Technology.

The daughter of Jerry and Judy Martin of Cordova, she is a member of Chi Omega sorority and the Baptist Student Union Council, as well as an officer in the Student Alumni Ambassadors and Panhellenic Council. Active in the Honors Program, she has made presentations at various roundtables at the state and national level.

A 1998 Kentucky Governor's Scholar, Martin is listed in "Who's Who Among American College Students." She has been involved in various community service projects at Eastern State Hospital, Shriner's Burn Institute, nursing homes, and the University of Kentucky Hospital's labor and delivery, emergency and operating rooms.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--The Morehead State University Police Department is looking at ways to ensure the campus remains as safe as possible.

In cooperation with the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet's Drive Smart Kentucky program, a Drive Smart visual speed radar unit will be located at various places on the campus until April 17.

"Hopefully, seeing this unit will make drivers be more safety conscious," said Doug Brown, MSU police chief. "This is just another attempt to increase traffic safety for our students and campus visitors."

The portable unit is intended to reduce speed and remind motorists to buckle up, according to Erin Eggan, media coordinator for the Division of Driver Safety and its Drive Smart Program. "These radar trailers have been a positive influence in communities throughout the state.

"We've been able to partner with local enforcement agencies and government officials to help make the public more aware of their driving habits," Eggan added. "We continuously see a reduction in speed in communities where we place the radar units."

The University was rated as one of the safest college campuses in the south by "Crimes at College: The Student Guide to Personal Safety." MSU was ranked 19<sup>th</sup> among southern colleges by authors Curtis Ostrander and Joseph Schwartz.

As part of the daily schedule, police officers make rounds to all areas of the campus, looking for potential hazards. "As students get caught up in their routines, they sometimes forget to be observant of what is going on around them. We want to remove any obstacles that could pose a threat, such as a traffic accident from speeding," Chief Brown said.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Applications are now being accepted for classes in the Advanced Placement Program being offered at Morehead State University this summer.

Through a partnership with The College Board, MSU will offer a weeklong Advanced Placement Summer Institute, July 8-12, which will include classes, workshops and conferences for middle and high school teachers and supervisors.

The cost to participants will be \$350 per person, per course for classes in Biology, Calculus AB, English Language, English Literature, Environmental Science, Spanish Language, Statistics, US Government and Politics and US History. Kentucky participants may be eligible for scholarships through the Kentucky Department of Education.

The registration fee will cover the cost of instruction, College Board Advanced Placement packets and other training materials. There is an additional \$25 lab fee for the biology and environmental science workshop. Courses are suitable for those who are new to the AP teaching experience or who have been involved for several years.

To register, applicants must complete the application form and mail it to MSU's Office of Continuing Education, 312 Allie Young Hall, Morehead, KY 40351. Payment may be made by credit card, personal check, school district check, or MSU will bill your district for the registration fee.

The College Board, a national non-profit membership association dedicated to preparing, inspiring and connecting students to college, provides educators with information, tools and strategies needed to build and strengthen their professional skills and techniques. More than half of the nation's high schools now take part in the Advanced Placement Program, which allows students to study subjects of interest, while motivating and challenging them to a more rigorous performance.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---It was a time to honor, to remember and to praise when Morehead State University celebrated Founders Day today (April 4).

Members of the University and the community gathered at the newly-established flag plaza, dedicated in memory of a former student who lost his life in the attack on the Pentagon on Sept. 11. To the strains of "The Star-Spangled Banner," J.C. Thomas of Morehead presented the American flag in memory of his grandson, Navy Petty Officer Edward T. Earhart. MSU's Concert Band directed by Dr. Sue Creasap, played "My Old Kentucky Home" as Sen. Walter Blevins and Rep. Rocky Adkins presented the state flag, and the University's "Alma Mater" as President and Mrs. Ronald G. Eaglin presented the school's flag.

A permanent marker, declaring the University's pride in response to Sept. 11, was unveiled during the Student Government Association-sponsored event. SGA President Brian Martin, Grethel senior, and Jocelyn Melvin, West Liberty junior, who chaired the group's Campus Improvement Committee, led the ceremony.

A memorial brick ceremony was held at the Little Bell Tower Memorial Plaza for those who had retired or died while in service. As the bell tolled, the names of 19 departed faculty and staff members, who had a combined 254 years of service, were read.

Dr. C. Nelson Grote, MSU's 11<sup>th</sup> president, received the University's Founders Day Award for University Service at the Awards Luncheon. In a nearly 15-minute acceptance response, the retired educator chronicled his association with the University, crediting his successes to the support of his colleagues.

"I only wish that such an award could also recognize all of those who helped me earn it, for without their wonderful skills and abilities, it would not have been possible."

The former president noted the change from college to University status, increase in enrollment and more emphasis in classroom and laboratory space among the major changes he experienced since he initially became involved. Dr. Grote served as department chair and dean at MSU before leaving to head other higher education institutions. He returned to the campus in 1987 where served five years as president.

They recognized him for “contributions he has made to the institution and higher education” during his tenure as president, including increasing enrollment, rebuilding the campus infrastructure and initiating a cooperative education program with business and education.

With former retirees in attendance, 11 faculty and staff members received a watch at the ceremony that concluded with a group photo. MOREHEAD, Ky.---Two researchers at Morehead State University are exploring the behaviors that both help and hinder the relationships of people within a workplace.

Dr. Robert Hatfield, chair of MSU's Department of Marketing, Management and Real Estate, and Dr. James Turner, assistant professor of management, have joined forces with Dr. Martha Sale of the University of South Alabama and Dr. Ronald Cheek of the University of Louisiana at Lafayette to identify three distinct behaviors of the average worker.

The first is altruism, which denotes the unselfish concern for the welfare of others. It is exemplified by acts of giving, caring and assisting others with no expectation of reward.

The second behavior is reciprocity, or the mutual exchange of favors and privileges. Within a workplace, people tend to be friendlier when co-workers are friendly to them, as well as angrier when others are angry with them.

The third is cynicism, which manifests as negative acts of distrust or suspicion, such as questioning the motives of others.

The research team has used their findings to create an "ARC" model to predict pro-social behavior. They say the model can be used to help managers maximize positive attitudes in their workplace and eliminate cynicism.

The group will present their findings at the International Journal of Business Ethics at the Allied Academies Spring International Conference in Nashville, Tenn., on Thursday, April 11.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Brian Shimer, a 2002 bronze medalist for the U.S. four-man bobsled team and a graduate of Morehead State University, has been named as one of the grand marshals to this year's prestigious Pegasus Parade in Louisville.

Shimer will join fellow team members Mike Kohn, Dan Steele and Doug Sharp, an Indiana native and assistant track coach at the University of Louisville, for the honor during the Kentucky Derby Festival's 47<sup>th</sup> annual Pegasus Parade on Thursday, May 2.

"These four world-class athletes – and especially those with Kentucky ties – have brought a great deal of pride to our community," said Derby Festival president and CEO Mike Berry. "The suspense of that medal-winning effort certainly fits the theme of this year's Pegasus Parade – 'The Thrill of the Game.' These competitors have represented our country in heroic fashion. We are thrilled to have them join the long line of deserving individuals who have served as Grand Marshals of the Derby Festival Pegasus Parade."

Shimer and his teammates led the USA II bobsled team to a third place finish at the 2002 Winter Olympic Games in Salt Lake City, Utah. The USA I team captured the silver medal. The medals were the first in U.S. Olympic bobsledding since 1956.

A native of Naples, Fla., Shimer was a running back and wide receiver for MSU's football team and graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in 1985. He was working on a teaching certificate when the opportunity arose to try out for bobsledding. After competing in the 1988 Games at Calgary, Shimer became a driver and missed a bronze medal by only .02 seconds in Nagano in 1998. He realized his medal dream in the final run of his fifth and final Olympics in Salt Lake City.

The Pegasus Parade, the Derby Festival's founding event, is one of more than 70 events dedicated to promoting the pride and tradition of the Kentucky Derby. The two-week festival entertains more than 1.5 million people and is the largest single attended event in Kentucky each year.

Kicking off at 5 p.m., the Pegasus Parade will be televised live on NBC affiliate WAVE-TV in Louisville with Willard Scott of the "Today" show as commentator.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Student Government Association has drafted a resolution to address a potential legislative threat to the autonomy and accreditation of Kentucky's public universities.

In the April 3 resolution, SGA president Brian Martin addressed the implications of state budget legislation, now before the General Assembly, saying "the institutional autonomy of Morehead State University is critically important in gaining public support and achieving prestige in teaching, public service and research..."

Specific budget provisions in House Bill 507, approved by the House in March, require that all of MSU's proposed \$1.4 million in new state funding for 2003-2004 be used for mandated pay raises for certain groups of employees and for special projects, none of which were requested by the institution's leadership.

The budget language also supersedes the statutory authority of MSU's Regents to oversee the institution's fiscal affairs. The wording in question was inserted by the House Budget Review Subcommittee on Education, chaired by Rep. John Will Stacy, D-West Liberty.

The resolution urges the members of the General Assembly to "recognize and support the existing statutory authority of the University's Board of Regents to administer all fiscal and other policy matters in the same manner during the 2002-2004 biennium as other public postsecondary education institutions in the Commonwealth of Kentucky."

The SGA's action follows a similar resolution adopted by the University's Board of Regents March 16.

The General Assembly is expected to continue debate on the budget when it completes the 2002 regular session on Monday, April 15.

**WHEREAS, the Student Government Association of Morehead State University is mindful of the constitutional responsibilities of the Kentucky General Assembly in funding public postsecondary education, and**

**WHEREAS, the Student Government Association is supportive of the Morehead State University Board of Regents in the exercise of its current statutory authority to develop and administer the operating budget of the institution in an efficient and equitable manner; and**

**WHEREAS, the academic self-governance of an institution of higher learning is a key measure of stability and, as such, is closely scrutinized by accrediting agencies; and**

**WHEREAS, the institutional autonomy of Morehead State University is critically important in gaining public support and achieving prestige in teaching, public service and research; and**

**THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Student Government Association of Morehead State University that the members of the Kentucky General Assembly are respectfully requested to recognize and support the existing statutory authority of the University's Board of Regents to administer all fiscal and other policy matters in the same manner during the 2002-2004 biennium as other public postsecondary education institutions in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.**

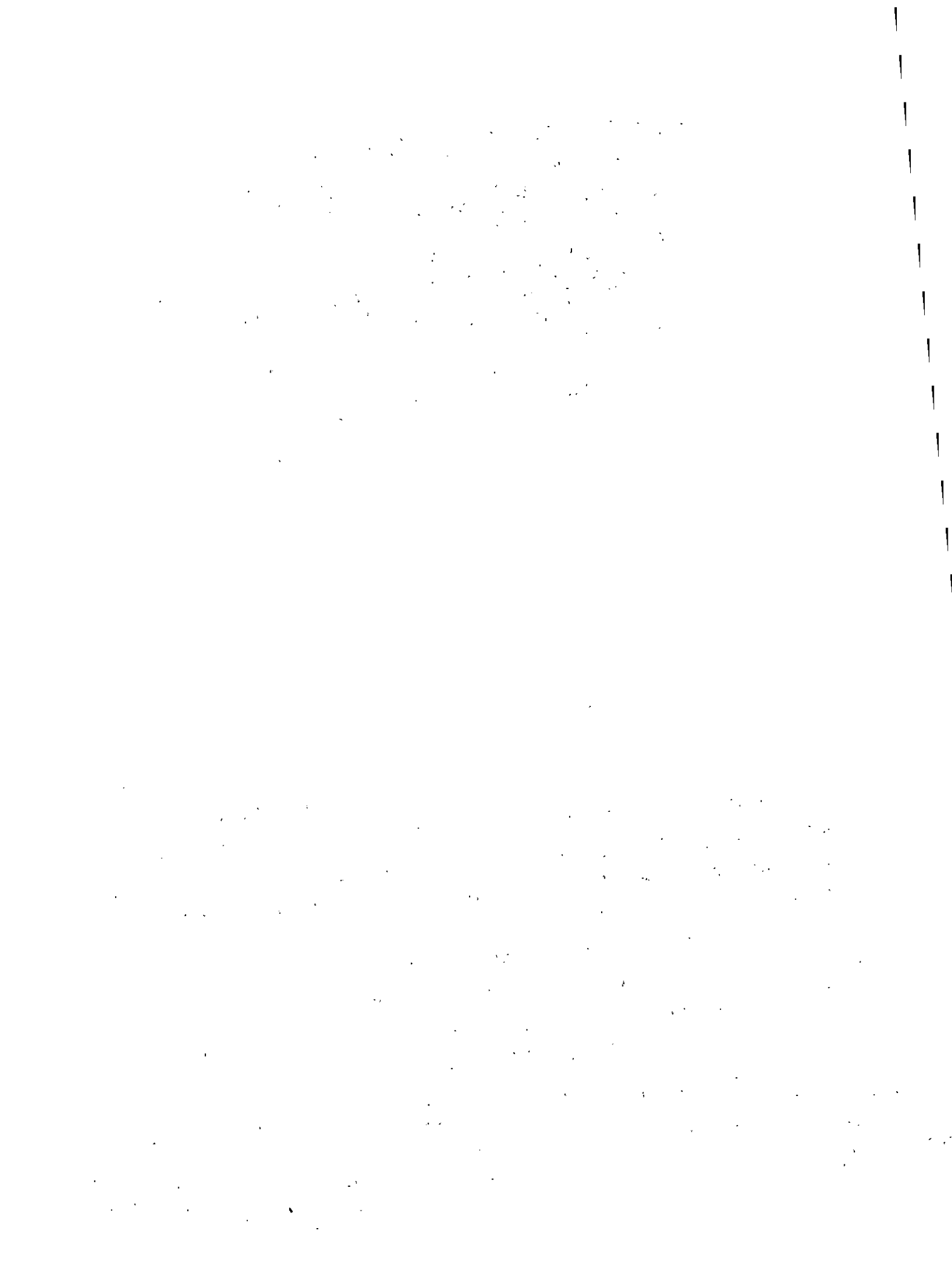

“Bear Me Safely Over” by Dr. Sheri Joseph, assistant professor of English, is being released this month by Grove Atlantic Press. Dr. Joseph will read excerpts from her book on Tuesday, April 23, at D’s Main Street Bistro in Morehead, beginning at 8 p.m.

Set in rural and urban Georgia, the novel traces the paths of a twenty-something couple, Sidra and Cecil, as they struggle to strengthen their relationship despite the distractions of their fractured families. Sidra has lost a sister to drug abuse and Curtis’ defiant young stepbrother seems to be drifting out of control. As Curtis fights to save his brother, Sidra finds herself overwhelmed by a fierce need to protect and care for him.

According to the Grove Atlantic Book Catalogue, Dr. Joseph’s “remarkably assured debut explores the interior lives of two families soon to be linked by marriage. [It] tackles dark themes—a young daughter dying of AIDS, the menace of homophobia, the splintering of families, the discordant voice of religious fundamentalism—but at its core, it is a hopeful portrait of the different and often elusive faces of salvation.”

Dr. Joseph received her Ph.D. degree in English and creative writing from the University of Georgia. She is in her second year at MSU where she teaches undergraduate and graduate courses in creative and expository writing. Her award-winning stories have been published in numerous literary magazines and she was a finalist for a National Magazine Award for the concluding chapter of her novel.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Three Morehead State University faculty members have been selected by their colleagues to receive MSU's most prized faculty awards for distinguished service in their respective fields.

**Dr. Lloyd Jaisingh**, professor of mathematics, who specializes in teaching statistics, mathematics, operations research and industrial engineering, was named the Distinguished Teacher.

**Dr. Sarah Morrison**, professor of English, whose published research projects have focused on the literary works of Milton, Samuel Johnson and Jane Austen, was named the Distinguished Researcher.

**David Bartlett**, professor of art, who has revived an almost forgotten photographic process known as photogravure, will receive the Distinguished Creative Productions Award.

The awards will be presented at the University's 18<sup>th</sup> annual Academic Awards Convocation on Sunday, April 14, at 2 p.m. in Button Auditorium. The ceremony also will honor outstanding graduate and undergraduate students, perfect grade point average students, Academic Honors Program seniors as well as faculty and staff service award recipients.

Dr. Jaisingh, an accomplished speaker and author of several articles in the fields of applied statistics and reliability theory, joined MSU in 1985 after working as a part-time lecturer for the World Health Organization at the University of Guyana. He also was a teacher and principal of an Evening Institute in the Turks and Caicos Islands, British West Indies.

After receiving a bachelor's degree in mathematics and physics from the University of Guyana, he earned his master's degree in mathematics from Tennessee Tech University in 1982 and his Ph.D. degree in industrial engineering from Texas Tech University in 1985.

At MSU, he has served on the Faculty Senate and numerous campus task forces and committees. He also was named as the University's Distinguished Researcher in 1989.

A co-sponsor of MSU's Cosmopolitan Club since 1987, Dr. Jaisingh has served as host to international students from several countries and, in 1995, he received the Clement Liew Award for Outstanding Service to International Students.

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He is known for his non-threatening classroom techniques to make students feel at ease and overcome the often difficult and daunting subject of statistics. He even published a book using his teaching methods titled "Statistics for the Utterly Confused."

An author of several textbooks on mathematics and statistics, he also has developed three courses for the Department of Mathematics curriculum. He is currently developing online software with tutorials, tests and grade books for elementary statistics courses.

Dr. Morrison, an MSU faculty member since 1988, has used her academic research expertise to explore such subjects as the poetry of Milton, the non-fiction prose of Samuel Johnson, the drama of Jane Austen's novels and the use of romance convention in the works of Margaret Atwood and Susan Fromberg Shaeffer.

After receiving a bachelor's degree in mathematics from the University of Missouri, she attended the University of Kansas and earned a Master of Arts degree, Master of Philosophy degree and a Ph.D. degree in English. She worked as a graduate teaching assistant and administrative assistant to the dean of educational services at Kansas before coming to MSU.

On campus, she has participated on and chaired several committees, advised students, obtained grants, worked as a faculty adviser for the Gamma Beta Phi honor society, and taught such courses as composition, writing, the short story and novel, British literature and Milton. For the last three years, she has attended a language and reading enrichment program for advanced students.

Praised by her peers for her dedication and commitment to her field and her students, Dr. Morrison has published articles in such world-renowned literary journals as "The Age of Johnson" and "Studies in the Novel." She is widely known for her expertise on Milton and consistently tackles subjects that require the mastery of hundreds of books and articles.

She is currently working on a book proposal based on her recent studies of Samuel Johnson's use of language as a clue to his awareness of women in his audiences.

Bartlett, who joined MSU's faculty in 1980, has used his love of photography to revive a lost art known as photogravure. Developed in the 1850s, the costly process unites photography and intaglio printmaking to create richly detailed images with the ink art quality of a lithograph.

Introduced to it as a graduate student in Michigan, he decided to study and master the forgotten art form after his arrival at the University. His photographic creations have been

displayed at hundreds of juried exhibitions around the world, claiming nearly 40 awards. In 1996, his work earned him a prestigious Al Smith Fellowship from the Kentucky Arts Council.

Bartlett received a bachelor's degree in philosophy from Carleton College in Minnesota and a Master of Philosophy degree from Yale University. He later earned his Master of Fine Arts degree in photography from the University of Michigan.

As a Peace Corps volunteer, he taught school in Micronesia in the early 1970s. Before arriving at MSU, he taught photographic processes at the Center for Creative Studies in Detroit.

As a faculty member, Bartlett has conducted workshops, obtained grants, served on the Faculty Senate and various committees, lectured and published some of his photographs. In 1985, with the support of the Kentucky Historical Foundation, he collaborated on a project to compile photographs of "Vintage Fiddlers of Eastern Kentucky," part of which now belongs to the University.

In 2000, he lectured and exhibited his photogravure prints during a month-long trip of China. His work has been honored recently with solo exhibits in Boston and New York, as well as in group exhibitions in Texas, Nebraska, Tennessee and Washington D.C.

## IET provides career exploration opportunity to elementary students

Students poured into the Mt. Sterling Elementary School gymnasium with a mission: Career Exploration.

At 8 a.m., the students, ranging from kindergarten through the fifth grade, set out among the local businesses and professional leaders to explore displays of various occupations at the Career Exploration Program. The theme was "A Rainbow of Careers."

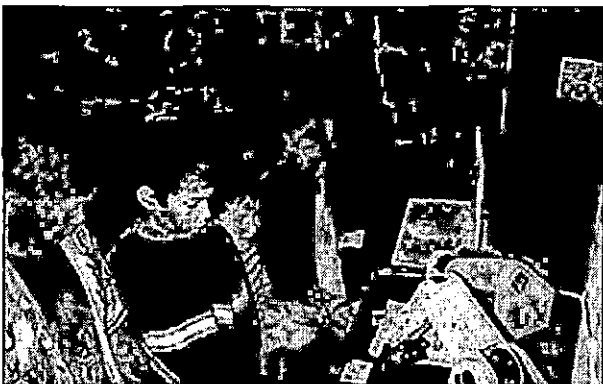
Among the business and professional leaders in attendance on this day (March 15), were instructor Sam Mason and two graduate assistants, Kimba Bush of Lexington and Aaron Cochran of South Portsmouth, representing Morehead State University's Department of Industrial Education and Technology. On display were electronic devices, robotics videos and two training robots performing a routine to continuously move a plastic cube from one position to another?

It didn't take long with the students watching the demonstration, before one would ask, "How did you get them to do that?" On cue, Mason stopped the continuous routine and handed the robotic teach pendant to the student. With basic instructions, Bush coached the student toward successful operation of the mini-robot.

Cochran stopped continuous motion of the second robot and instructed another child on the basic operation to move the cube from one position to another. "It was really a wonderful experience to see the young students so enthusiastic about wanting to learn technology," said Cochran.

This created an explosion of interest that brought more than 30 students at a time to the display, with many making a return visit once they had checked out the other displays around the room. "It was a delightful experience to see such young students enjoying cutting edge, state of the art relevant technology," Bush said. "I believe that a high interest at a young age inspires future enthusiasm in learning. I am convinced that our role in the career

exploration program was successful; for us as motivators and the students as recipients."

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Noted national speaker, Kentucky professor and former NASA astronaut, Dr. Story Musgrave will speak on the new generation of technology and teachers during an April symposium at Morehead State University.

“Teaching the e-Generation: A PT<sup>3</sup> Symposium on Teaching with Technology” will be held on Monday, April 29, from 9 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. on campus.

Teachers are now educating the first generation of students who have never known life without computers or the Internet. Schools across the nation need to maintain up-to-date programs and integrate new technology to respond to this so-called “e-Generation.”

This symposium, funded by the MSU Department of Education’s PT<sup>3</sup> (Preparing Tomorrow’s Teachers to Use Technology) Program, will address many education issues now facing today’s educators at all levels.

Following a welcome by MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin, Dr. Musgrave will discuss new e-technologies and their impact on society in Baird Music Hall. He will then answer questions at a session in nearby Breckinridge Hall.

Dr. Musgrave, although born in Massachusetts, considers Lexington, Ky., to be his hometown. A Marine, aircraft pilot, mathematician, surgeon, professor of physiology and biophysics at the University of Kentucky Medical Center and NASA scientist-astronaut since 1967, he holds six degrees in various subjects, including a Ph.D. degree in medicine from Columbia University. He has flown on all six space shuttles and holds the record for space walks for his work during the first repair mission on the Hubble Space Telescope.

Also speaking at the symposium will be Bonnie Bracey, a former Fulbright Exchange teacher in India now working with the George Lucas Educational Foundation. Co-founder of the Online Internet Institute and member of President Clinton’s National Information Advisory Council, she will discuss the most innovative models of learning in the digital age.

Barry Kort, a visiting scientist from the MIT Media Lab who is a representative of the IBM Global Learning Village, will round out the day’s agenda of experts on technology in education.

In response to recent media statements attributed to State Rep. John Will Stacy, Morehead State University today denied that its tuition policies discriminate against students on the basis of where they live in Kentucky.

“Mr. Stacy was incorrect in his assertion that students from Morgan or any other county pay more than students from Rowan County to attend Morehead State University,” said Dr. Dan Connell, associate vice president for academic outreach and support.

“Kentucky undergraduate students enrolled in our degree programs pay \$113 per semester hour, regardless of where they live or where they take a class,” Dr. Connell said. “We also have a program that allows students admitted to degree programs at Rowan Technical College to enroll in our lower division general education courses in West Liberty, Mt. Sterling or Morehead at the rate of \$61 per hour, no matter where they live.”

Dr. Connell noted that West Liberty and Mt. Sterling are the only locations outside of Morehead where MSU offers freshman and sophomore-level classes. MSU’s other off-campus centers are located in cities that have local community colleges – Ashland, Jackson and Prestonsburg – which offer their own general education courses to freshmen and sophomores.

“We want to make sure that everyone understands that the agreement we signed last year with Rowan Technical College has no restrictions on the residency of Kentucky students at RTC who enroll at MSU as visiting students,” Dr. Connell added.

In addition to dual admission and the special lower tuition rate, Dr. Connell said that MSU and RTC also have an understanding on the handling of student registration and payment of fees.

Dr. Connell said MSU has invited Rowan Tech to use its new classroom building at West Liberty to offer new technology courses and programs in the West Liberty area.

The Governor's Minority Student College Preparation Program will bring 55 minority students from Kentucky to MSU for a pre-college experience complete with basic coursework, career planning, social activities and cultural experiences like an Underground Railroad tour. The program pays transportation and student housing fees.

Started in 1988, the institute is sponsored by annual grants from the Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education (CPE) and Kentucky Department of Education. The institute's goal is to increase the number of African-American students that attend Kentucky colleges. In 2001, more than 900 students attended institutes at various campuses across the state.

"It is our main student recruitment effort," said Ernestine Winfield, director of MSU's Minority Teacher Education Program (MTEP). "Many students have attended the program for four years, graduated high school, earned their degree from MSU and are now teaching in the public school system."

Participating students do not have to pursue a career in education to benefit from their involvement in the program.

"If the students major in education at MSU, the MTEP can award them up to \$6,000 per year for four years," said Winfield, "but if they choose not to major in education, we can still help them with up to \$1,000 per year."

MOREHEAD, Ky.---A component of Morehead State University's Radiologic Sciences Programs has been granted the maximum approval term possible by a national accrediting agency.

The Joint Review Committee on Education in Radiologic Technology (JRCERT) recently notified the University that its associate degree radiography program accreditation has been renewed for eight years. The continuing accreditation distinction was awarded following the JRCERT's site visit to the MSU campus in October to evaluate the program.

"What this means is that the accrediting agency thinks the quality of our program is sufficient enough that they don't need to evaluate more often," said Barbara Dehner, associate professor and coordinator of radiologic sciences programs. Dehner noted that the last accreditation period given to the program was also the maximum term permitted at that time (five years).

"Again, our program is continuing to meet and even exceed the benchmark of expected performance set by JRCERT," Dehner said. "But the quality of our teaching on campus is not all of it," she added, saying that the excellent educational experiences their students have had at the 13 clinical sights throughout Kentucky contributed significantly to the program's successes.

A part of the Department of Nursing and Allied Health Sciences, the Radiologic Sciences Programs team includes six full-time faculty members, with NAHS Chair Dr. Cyrus Whaley teaching part-time within the program.

Dr. Whaley said the eight-year accreditation status "recognizes the quality of the MSU program."

The JRCERT is recognized by the US Department of Education as the official agency for evaluation and accreditation of all educational programs for radiography and radiation studies nationwide. It currently recognizes 267 associate degree programs at colleges and/or universities.

Dehner said that while JRCERT is not scheduled to make another site visit to MSU until Fall 2009, interim reports and evaluations will be submitted on a regular basis.

According to Dehner, 32 students are candidates for graduation from MSU's associate degree radiography program this spring. The graduates will then be eligible to apply for and take the American Registry of Radiologic Technology, the national licensure examination, to qualify to work as a radiologic technologist.

MSU's last associate degree class (2001) earned a 93 percent passage rate on the ARRT, Dehner said.

Those associate degree graduates who successfully apply for advanced track programs work toward a bachelor's degree in radiologic sciences at MSU, with specialization in either ultrasound or computed tomography.

Dehner says the new approval term is indicative of JRCERT's confidence in the MSU program.

"They believe we can fulfill their expectations," she said.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---New findings by a Morehead State University researcher suggest that many U.S. companies struggle and fail because they neglect to plan for a long-term future.

Richard "Rik" Berry, MSU assistant professor of management, along with fellow researchers Tony Polito of East Carolina University and Kevin Watson of Maris College, are studying why U. S. companies focus mainly on "short horizons" and the effects that action has on their competitiveness in the global market.

The trio found that American businesses lag behind their Japanese counterparts because they often turn to "quick fixes," like mergers or selling off assets, in order to meet the immediate quarter-by-quarter demands of the U.S. financial market. They say this tendency is even more evident during economic slowdowns when the prevailing attitude is more about saving and surviving than long-term planning.

Their study points out that companies need to strive for long-term success by increasing production and efficiency, improving manufacturing quality and equipment and measuring their performance with short-term and long-term criteria. Companies who take these steps tend to survive difficult economies without resorting to "quick fixes."

The group presented their findings recently at the International Applied Business Research Conference in Puerto Vallarta, Mexico.

In the tie-breaking fourth game, Esterson rolled an eight spare to begin the 10th frame. Needing seven pins for the title, she bowled a strike to edge out the Lady Shockers 178-174.

"There's nothing like winning," said Larry Wilson, MSU women's bowling coach, "especially for Stacey, Joy and Jessica, who were also on the national championship team in 2000."

Bokina, who received the tournament's Most Valuable Player award, was named, along with Esterson, to the 2002 IBC Women's All-Tournament Team.

Wilson says he's now looking ahead to defend the title next year. "Four members are returning and we're already getting commitments from students who plan to join the MSU team in the fall."

MOREHEAD, Ky.---A Morehead State University professor has proposed a new way for businesses on the World Wide Web to measure and improve their performance.

Dr. Robert Hatfield, chair of MSU's Department of Management, Marketing and Real Estate, recently collaborated with Dr. Martha Sale of the University of South Alabama and Dr. Ronald Cheek of the University of Louisiana at Lafayette to study the success rates for so-called "e-businesses."

The trio found that half of the nation's homeowners are now involved in some way with e-businesses. However, many such businesses fail because of a lack of adequate methods to measure and realize their success.

Using the Analytical Hierarchy Process of measurement, the researchers designed a model to divide the performance of an e-business into distinct categories such as customer satisfaction and innovation. The process allows an e-business to use a "scorecard" to chart its success in various areas and concentrate improvements where they might be needed.

The researchers recently presented their findings at the International Journal of Business Ethics at the Allied Academies Conference in Nashville.

Dear Governor Patton, President Williams and Speaker Richards:

To come directly to the point, we are deeply distressed by yet another effort to compromise the statutory authority and autonomy of the Board of Regents of Morehead State University by treating the University's state general fund appropriation differently than those of Kentucky's other public universities and in a manner that threatens the University's governance.

We believe that the House Appropriations and Revenue Committee was not fully informed at its meeting on April 23 regarding the nature of three specific expenditures totaling \$407,000. Rep. John Will Stacy told the committee that he had "edited out most of the objectionable language". However, we believe he was fully aware that the University had objected strenuously to all of the budget language in his earlier effort to usurp the statutory authority of the Board of Regents and that the Board's position on that issue had not changed.

Further, Rep. Stacy described the University's proposed 2003-2004 general fund appropriation as "unobligated money". Yet, it is widely known that Morehead State and other postsecondary institutions use state general fund increases to cover higher operating costs, including faculty and staff salaries and health insurance premiums.

Although the proposed expenditures listed in Rep. Stacy's amendment could have merit and might be considered for future funding, not one of them came forward through the University's internal planning and budgeting processes. They were neither recommended by the Council on Postsecondary Education nor included in the budgets proposed by the Governor. Further, members of the Board of Regents still have not even seen the details of the proposed expenditures.


The University's leadership has worked, and will continue to work, in good faith with the executive and legislative branches to advance the interests of the University and the Commonwealth. This advancement must be achieved through an orderly, balanced budgetary process that evaluates all legitimate needs. Unfortunately, this amendment appears to be a blatant attempt by a single legislator to disrupt the internal affairs and budget of the University for what appear to be personal reasons.

More importantly, the budget amendment could result in establishing a dangerous legislative precedent threatening the academic autonomy and accreditation of Morehead State and Kentucky's other public universities.


On behalf of this institution and the public universities across Kentucky, we urgently request that you take immediate and appropriate action to help us thwart this new attack on our fiscal integrity.
